On New Year's Eve 1916, a chaplain spoke to a gathering of British Commonwealth soldiers in Cairo, Egypt. Standing before men whose lives had been turned upside down by World War I, Oswald Chambers talked to them about yesterday and tomorrow.

WwW (Who was Willey?)

Who was Master Sgt. William G. Willey?

If you had asked me that question before I wrote this article, the most I could've told you was that there is a trophy named after him that gets awarded to a unit member.

That hardly scratches the surface I was soon to find out.

Back when the 177th Fighter Wing was called the 177th Fighter Interceptor Group, several members of the 177th were honored at the General Chester A. Charles Competition Formation and Awards Ceremony on June 13, 1982.

One of the honorees was Tech. Sgt. Bill Willey who worked in the Engine Shop and volunteered with the Base Honor Guard.

At the ceremony he was dressed up in the uniform of a Minuteman - the first American soldier - and he was being presented, with of all things, the Minuteman Award. He received the statue for leading the Wing's annual Toys for Tots drive, which he started in 1979. Willey started the program when he was cleaning out a closet, discovered some old toys and donated them to a hospital. By the time he received the award, Toys for Tots had become a yearly tradition at the 177th.

Four years and six days after receiving the statue, Master Sgt. William G. Willey died at the age of 44 on June 19, 1986.

Five months later, another Honor Guard member, Tech.



Sgt. Skip Watson of the Aerospace Ground Equipment shop took over the Toys for Tots program, to ensure that it didn't fade away.

That year, more than 3,000 toys were collected and distributed to various organizations and area families. When asked about the program's success, Watson said: "...it will always be Master Sgt. Bill Willey's Toys for Tots campaign."

In 1987, the Chief's Council created the Master Sgt. William G. Willey Award to honor the memory of Master Sgt. Willey.

At the end of each year, the Chief's Council examines the year's nominees and selects the recipient for the Willey Award,

which is presented during the following Promotions and Awards Ceremony.

The criteria are daunting: the selected individual is chosen based on superior performance, community service, professionalism and leadership; all the highest standards that are expected of a Senior Non-Commissioned Officer.

Based upon that selection process receiving the Award would be very difficult; yet, when you think about what Willey once said, the motivation behind the award makes it very worthwhile.

"Seeing the smiles on (the) children's faces makes me feel like I've accomplished everything I could possibly want to." 🇺🇸

Celebrating the life of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.



His name was Dr. (Reverend) Martin Luther King Jr. and he died in the cause of civil rights. Born when many of the states in the Union were still legally and officially segregated, his name became synonymous with equal rights for all in the United States during the latter decades of the 20th century.

Born in Atlanta in 1929, Martin Luther King Jr. the son of a pastor graduated from Morehouse College there in 1948, earned his Bachelor of Divinity degree from Crozer Theological Seminary in 1951 and his doctorate from Boston University in 1955. His first pulpit was as the pastor of a Baptist church in Montgomery, Ala., ironically located one block away from the first capital of the Confederate States of America. In 1955 and 1956, Dr. King led the African-American boycott of the segregated city bus lines in Alabama's capital city. Shortly thereafter, the city desegregated public transportation and Dr. King earned a high level of recognition and prestige as a leader of the burgeoning civil rights movement.

Dr. King then went on to help found the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and this organization enabled him to develop a base for further civil-rights activities locally and somewhat later, throughout the rest of the United States. Much like Mahatma Gandhi in India, he espoused a philosophy of non-violence and his passive resistance to civil authority in the Deep South led to numerous arrests in the 1950s and 60s. While more than a few of his early campaigns against institutionalized segregation met with limited degrees of success, the protest he led in Birmingham, Ala., in 1963 brought him international attention and prestige.

Continuing to defy state and local authorities, King then spearheaded the August 1963 "March on Washington" that brought more than 200,000 of all races together to demand the end of discrimination in the United States. It was on August 28, 1963, during this event in Washington, D.C., that Dr. King delivered his now famous and historic "I Have A Dream" speech. While the title itself is well known, it is the less well-known contents that delivered the powerful message that Dr. King hoped to impart. The stanzas of his speech resonated with a message of hope and reconciliation and perhaps more



importantly, an overt attempt to begin the healing of a nation that heretofore had been divided along racial lines. Some of the more famous lines of the speech included: "I have a dream that one day my four little children will live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character.

He continued: "I have a dream that one day on the red hills of Georgia the sons of former slaves and the sons of former slave owners will they be able to sit down together at the table of brotherhood." Studied for years by religious leaders, Dr. King's acclaimed speech has been recognized as emblematic of his training as a clergyman. It holds appeal for students of the Bible and political activists. It invokes the United States Declaration of Independence, the Constitution and the Emancipation Proclamation issued by President Abraham Lincoln. During the delivery of the speech Dr. King laid a firm foundation for the battle for the

equality of all who lived within the United States.

The leadership exhibited by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and his passionate pleas for true justice for all, regardless of race, creed or origin also served to place pressure on the Kennedy Administration in its final months before JFK's assassination in November 1963. After that tragic event, the Civil Rights Movement with Dr. King in the vanguard pressed for additional reforms from President Lyndon Johnson. Ultimately, President Johnson pushed for federal laws and these became reality after the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

For his leadership in the Civil Rights movement, TIME magazine named Dr. King the 1963 Man of the Year and in 1964, he became the youngest person to ever be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.

Sadly, the early potential for national leadership in the arena of Civil Rights ended all too soon when Dr. King was struck down by an assassin's bullet on April 4, 1968 at the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tenn. Martyred at the age of 39, others, including King's widow, Coretta Scott King took up the banner of the movement he helped found. His legacy lives on today in the progress that has been made through legislation and societal transformation. 🇺🇸

Annual dental exam

The annual dental exam will be completed by your civilian dentist.

Exceptions include pilots, base newcomers, class three individuals or those who have never been seen by a wing dentist.

Start with DD Form 2813 from the clinic or it is available on the local area network (K:\FORMS\DD\2800\dd2813.pdf); have your dentist complete the form and return it to the clinic. Questions call x6240.

SFRC Increases grants

The New Jersey National Guard State Family Readiness Council has increased the amounts of family and business grants up to \$5,000 and \$10,000.

Both are what are known as TIER I grants. TIER II family grants are also available to Guard non-deployed service members who were on State Active Duty or State Missions (e.g., hurricanes, floods, border missions) for more than 20 consecutive days. Those who meet these criteria can apply for a financial hardship grant up to \$1,500.
