

### Shopping in the Far East

THERE'S a certain boost to morale and a sense of well-being associated with payday. The "green stuff" has a nice feel; the wallet is comfortably padded, and the day somehow looks brighter.

For some servicemen payday adds up to only a fleeting moment of happiness. The wallet shrinks as the money goes thither and yon. Sometimes it's gone before the sun goes down. It happens in a number of ways, but, here's a "sleeper" that fleeces the unsuspecting in short order.

Many of us have patronized local merchants in Far East cities. Servicemen now Stateside may be doing the same thing in months



to come. In every case the motive on the part of the serviceman is an honest one. He simply wants to buy merchandise and send it home

an honest one. He simply wants to buy merchandise and send it home as souvenirs, gifts or mementoes.

Uncle Sam has rules about such things, and they're strict ones, too. In some cases the serviceman isn't even getting a fair shake for his money. He's just throwing it away. So, if you're in the Far East, or will be going there, remember the following four points:

1. Don't buy anything made in mainland China, North Korea or North Vietnam.

2. Don't buy Chinese-type goods in any country unless the shop-keeper can supply a special certificate of origin acceptable to the U.S. Treasury. At present, such certificates for tourist or gift purchases are available only in Hong Kong.

3. Don't believe the shopkeeper who says you will be able to import Chinese-type goods to the United States without an acceptable certificate of origin.

4. Purchases of embargoed goods for gifts are subject to restrictions, regardless of value.

Don't waste your money. Before you buy, check with your overseas command on the latest regulations covering shopping restrictions.

All of us from time to time have to learn how to live with frustration. Frequency and repetition are often the keys to good training or careful hand-ling of a job and may result in boredom and frustration. Let me tell you the story of Arnold Cream as it appeared in

Link. "Sixteen - year - old Arnold Cream, born of a poor colored family, turned to fighting to escape the misery and poverty of a dreary boy-hood. He started slowly, improving in each bout that he fought. The years went swiftly by. Arnold had not amassed a great fortune in his two-fisted trade, nor had he made sports headlines. As time passed further by, fights became harder and harder to come by, so he began fighting throughout the globe, anywhere there was a purse to be had. He was thirty-one years old now, penniless, tired and disillusioned when he decided to call it quits in the ring. In order to feed his family of six, the old fighter collected garbage, dug ditches or whatever he could find to do.

He received an invitation to fight in the ring again and reluctantly accepted. He won. Other bouts followed and he kept on winning. He even got a chance at the crown, a chance he had had four timas before and four times before he had failed to gain the Championship. His fifth chance came July 18, 1951 when he was thirty-eight years old. Could such an old man hope to beat a young and able champion? Arnold had fought and lost to this same fighter on two prior occasions.

For six rounds the young champ battered the old fighter. In the seventh,



# 1/27 RECONSTRUCTS VIET CONG VILLAGE

After nearly a month of hacking away at underbrush, picking holes in coral rock and slashing bamboo shoots, a 20-man team from C--1/27 completed the reconstruction of the Brigade's guerrilla warfare training area.

H&S Company Marines were the first to use the area last week when 140 Brigade infantrymen received lectures and demonstrations of current-day devices and tactics employed by guerrilla forces.

The training area was constructed with two work crews. SSgt. E.F. Burlem and his crew completed the rebuilding of the existing VC village complex while SSgt. D.A. Gros's men undertook the placing, building and rebuilding of the numerous punji traps, drop-falls and booby traps which dot the trail leading from the school's headquarters to the guerrilla harboring site.

Gros's men also completed the rebuilding of fences, gates and facilities at the harboring site and cleared the trails of the waist-high undergrowth that had cropped up since last used.

Future plans call for the school's facilities to be utilized by both Station and Brigade Marines. It is anticipated that the VC village area, which is suitable for platoon-size training exercises, will also be made available for all commanders.

This is the first group to go through the facility since it's closing nearly two years ago when the Brigade's 4th Regiment deployed to WestPac.






