Champ Skiier, Chutists Slate Carnival Feats

Ken White, an internationally known water skiier, will combine his many talents with other skiiers from the Oahu and Hickam Water Ski Clubs to entertain the Water Carnival audience with his skill on and above the water.

A familiar sight to Carnival fans, Ken won the world "trick ski" title in 1965-66 in Queensland, Australia, defeating competitors from 34 nations in the process.

SET RECORD

In an earlier carnival, Ken set an Oahu ski jump record when he soared 113 feet after hitting the jump ramp. He also performs high above the bay while suspended from an oversized kite pulled by a power boat.

Both ski clubs work many hours perfecting their performance for Water Carnival fans. That "practice pays" is readily proven by their intricate maneuvers over the waters of the bay.

The Marine Corps' oldest sport parachute club, reactivated in October 1966 after a short inactive period due to Vietnam committments, will be represented once again as three of its members drop out of the sky in an exhibition of precision jumping.

BOTH DAYS

Ray Compton, Scott Gritton and Kent Meyer will jump both Saturday and Sunday during the Water Carnival.

They will not be alone in floating down into the Bay. Marine Reservists from the 6th Force Reconnaissance Company, will follow them out in a demonstration of a combat jump both days.

Still another unit, the 1st Air Naval Gunfire Liaison Company, (ANGLICO), stationed show their capabilities as jumpers in a combat-type drop.

MATCU And MARS Aiding Apollo Shot

Two units from K-Bay have been assigned missions connected with the Apollo 11 flight and President Nixon's visit to Johnston Island.

Marine Air Traffic Unit - 70 Control (MATCU-70) is assigned as the primary ground radar support for Air Force One's flight into Johnston Island. K-Bay's Military Affiliate Radio System (MARS) is the emergency back-up facility for communications from the Hornet. The Hornet is the recovery ship for the Apollo astronauts.

FOR NIXON'S FLIGHT

Three officers, 13 enlisted men, and the equipment of MATCU-70 flew out of K-Bay yesterday for Johnston Island. MATCU - 70 provides ground controlled approach radar.

At Johnston Island, they will be the sole ground control radar for the President's flight. Should it prove necessary, they could bring Air Force One down to an altitude of 200 feet and within 1/4 mile of the runway.

Selected due to their high mobility, MATCU-70 can move its entire operation at the proverbial drop of a hat. The "hat" for this mission consists of two C-130s and 34,000 lbs. of equipment.

EMERGENCY BACKUP

Providing the backup communications for the Hornet is K-Bay's MARS station. K-Bay was the first MARS station to establish contact with the Hornet. Contact was established on July 14 at 2 p.m.

The circuit was authorized by the Chief Navy - Marine Corps MARS, Washington, D.C. It will be available for phone patching from either the Hornet to Hawaii or via Hawaii to the mainland.

Col. B. Cass Takes Brigade Command

Colonel Bevan G. Cass will assume command of the First Marine Brigade today during ceremonies to be held adjacent to Hangar 101 at 3 p.m.

The ceremony will be highlighted by a pass in review of Brigade units and will be open to the public.

Colonel Cass, who recently completed a tour of duty with the Military Assistance Command in Vietnam, relieves Colonel William C. McGraw. Colonel McGraw has been reassigned to duties with Marine Air units in the Western Pacific area.

Colonel Cass was born March 8, 1920, in Newark, N.J., and graduated from Germantown Academy, Philadelphia, Pa., in 1938. He was graduated from Virginia Military Institute in 1943.

He was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Marine Corps in August, 1943, and has served on continuous active duty since that time.

Following basic officer's training at Quantico, Va., he was transferred to Camp Lejeune, N.C., in December, 1943. He was first assigned as a platoon commander with gurad battalion and one month later transferred to the 18th Defense Bn.

He took part in the campaigns for Saipan and Tinian in the summer of 1944 with that unit. In November, 1944, he was assigned to duty as aide to the Commanding General, 6th Marine Division. In that capacity he was involved in the Okinawa Campaign.

In August, 1945, he became Staff Secretary, Task Group A, 3rd Fleet Landing Force, a position he held for one month until the peace treaty was signed in September.

From October, 1945, to May, 1948, he was stationed at Headquarters Warine Corps, Washington, D.C., first with the Division of Reserve as a Naval Reserve Officers Traning Course lecturer and then, in February, 1946, was assistant operations officers of the Division of Printing and Publications.

Swim Safely!

If you or any of your family are non-swimmers, now is the season to waterproof yourselves.

Whether you're a swimmer or not, the lure of the water is often irrestible in summer, making summer months the peak periods for drownings. In recent years, most drowning fatalities have occurred in the early months of summer, with July rating the highest, and June running a close second.

Even if you avoid entering the water this summer, because you are a poor or non-swimmer, there is a chance of meeting trouble. More than one-half of the thousands of drownings each year are labeled non-swimming fatalities - people who fell into the water from such spots as docks, bridges, shores and boats. These accidents have contributed to making drownings the fourth leading cause of accidents.



The National Safety Council advises that each person needs to learn: How to hold or row to someone in trouble in the water, how to stay afloat with clothes on, how to swim, and how to use simple life-saving skills.

Many groups such as the YMCA, YWCA, Boy Scouts, and Red Cross have classes that can teach you to swim at least 20 feet. Enroll now for the swimming lessons offered by these groups and beat crowded summer classes.

Waterproof yourself now for a fun-filled, safe summer in the water. (AFPS)



Jesus was just as interested in the lowest layer of the social structure, as He was in the Adducees who were the wealthy and aloof upper crust. Christ had come to save all. There would be no servants' entrance and no steerage in heaven!


It was not in heaven but upon this old earth of ours that our Lord met all these people. In this respect; I fear that many holy pictures and statues tend to give the wrong impression of our Savior. From them you might easily get the image of a serenely comfortable Christ leisurely pacing the walks of a flower garden.

The truth is that the moment our Blessed Savior appeared, the mob would swarm upon Him, a sweaty crowd, an ill-smelling crowd, their breath strong in His face and their cries loud to His ears. It was among these and not the marble statues of the saints, not their quiet people in the stained glass windows, so attractive in their antiseptic splendor, that Christ moved. It was for these that Christ lived and for whom He eventually died. He took the people as He found them. He was good to them as they were.

We, on the other hand, though we would scarcely admit it, secretly believe we could be nicer to people if more prople were nicer to us. This is virtue? This is business. Some of us postpone being kind to others till they become a bit more educated, polished, attractive. But this may be waiting forever.

Perhaps you remember that old king, Charles V, who retired from kinging and took up watchmaking. He had a whole hall, hung with a hundred clocks, and his ambition was to make them all chime high noon in perfect unison. He never succeeded of course, and sometimes would ruefully say, "What a fool I was as king, to hope for harmony among hundreds of thousands of human beings, when I cannot achieve it even with a hundred mechanical clocks."

Neither can we expect all people to be uniformly nice or educated or considerate. This, after all, is not our motive. We are supposed to be good to people not because they deserve it as individuals, but simply because they are people, human beings, brothers and sisters in Christ. And, above all, because God commands it! We must overlook their minor differences and see the great common denominator; sonship of God.

Bicycle Safety Rules Expanded

Last week Windy ran an article listing safe bicycling rules. In that article we INCORRECTLY stated that cyclists should always ride on the "left" side of the road. The correct rule is reprinted below with other safe cycling rules.

- Ride on the RIGHT side of the roadway; single file except when crossing.
- Walk bicycles across streets using appropiate crosswalks.

Bicycles operated at night must be equipped with a light visible from 200 feet to the front and a reflector visible for 200 feet to the rear.

- Bicycles must have a brake capable of skidding the wheel on dry level clean pavement.
- State licensing is required for all bikes leaving the Station.

Match Play

If a player, when starting a hole, play a ball from outside the teeing ground, the opponent may immediately require the player to replay the stroke, in which case the player shall tee a ball and play the stroke from within the teeing ground, without penalty. Rule 13-1.

Stroke Play

If a competitor, when starting a hole, play his first stroke from outside the teeing ground, he shall count that stroke and any subsequent stroke so played and then play from within the teeing ground with the privilege of teeing his ball. Penalty: Disqualification. Rule 13-2.

Note: Stance. A player may take his stance outside the teeing ground to play a ball within it.





Morest: Pilot's Insurance

It would happen on a typical humdrum day. Somewhere between the perennial coffee and cigarette. A pilot's call breaks into the radio static.

"Kaneohe tower. This is whisky Delta 6. I have a malfunction in my forward landing gear. Request emergency morest landing. Repeat. Request emergency morest landing."

Immediately Crash Crew, Sea and Air Rescue, and the ambulance would be notified. But what is a morest landing and who are the people responsible for it?

Morest is the old term for what is now Station Aircraft Recovery Section. At K-Bay it is composed of an 11 man section led by Capt. I L. Sylvester. Their mission is to provide the air station with emergency arresting gear.

Their main equipment is the E-28 rotary hydraulic arresting gear. This emergency arresting gear prevents aircraft from overrunning the runway.

The E-28 implements two energy absorbers, one on each side of the runway. Stretched between them and wound around twin drums is nylon purchase tape. The concept is for the plane's hook to catch the tape, and the energy absorbers to dissipate the plane's kinetic energy.

The E-28 can stop a plane weighing 78,000 lbs. and traveling up to 160 knots.

The pilot desiring an emergency arrested landing has two choices for catching the tape. He may use the roll out method, where he rolls into the tape. Or he may fly in, and catch the tape carrier style.


The roll in is used when the pilot merely wants to stop quickly due to a warning light. The fly in is used whenever the pilot fears a loss of brakes or landing equipment and wants to make sure he can be stopped before he commits himself.

The emergency arresting men are all school trained. They attend the basic aviation school at Memphis for around three months. Afterward they receive an additional two months specialized training at Lakehurst, NJ

Since 1961, the station arresting gear has stopped over 15,000 aircraft. However, only one has been an actual emergency.

In addition to the E-28s on station, K-Bay has two other emergency arresting systems. Crash Crew has two E-5s (chain gears) and MAG-24 has the M-21.

Basically, the Station Aircraft Recovery Section is a form of insurance. Like your car insurance, most of the time it seems to actually accomplish little. But just in case, the Recovery Section is making sure that the premiums are being paid in full.

Chaplain Fletcher Active In Protestant Chapel, PTA

He was an enlisted Seabee for four and a half years before becoming an officer. In November 1968, he took the oath of office as chaptain. This is his first tour of duty with Marines.
