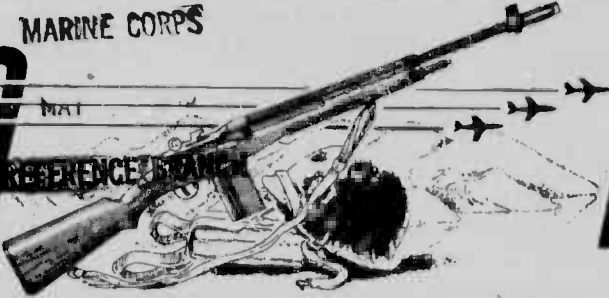

Training Exercise

1/3 Marines Prepare For Big Isle Move

Nearly 1,250 Leathernecks of the 1st Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment and its supporting units will participate in an Air Movement Exercise next week as they move from K-Bay to the "Big Island" Po-

hukuloa Training Areas.

The Battalion Landing Team, commanded by LtCol D. J. Hunter, will undergo extensive live-fire training exercise for nearly a month, before returning to K-Bay.

The first portion of the Air Movement Exercise will terminate when all the men and equipment of the battalion and its supporting units have been transported from Oahu to the "Big Island." The Marines will move by land from Kaneohe to Hickam Air Force Base where they will board Air Force Military Airlift Command C-141's and leave for the training area. The air-lift move will be made in three increments on May 6, 7 and 8.

The month-long training at Pohukuloa will culminate with the firing of the final protective line (FPL). The FPL is an imaginary line dictating when a position is in serious danger of being over-run by an enemy force. At a given signal, all weapons of the battalion and its supporting units, including mortar, recoilless rifle and artillery fire, concentrate their combined fire power against the enemy.

With the conclusion of the Pohukuloa training, the final phase of the Air Movement Exercise will begin - bringing the Marines, their weapons and equipment, back to Oahu and their home base.

Civil Defense Sirens

Prior to 11 a.m. today the monthly sounding of Civil Defense sirens on Oahu will take place. The test will consist of a steady blast of one minute duration followed by one minute of silence and then one minute of the wailing 'Take Cover' signal.

The tidal wave warning system will be tested one minute after termination of the wailing tone. This will be a one minute steady blast on the coastal sirens only.

An Employment Assistance briefing, scheduled for 9 a.m., May 7, will be held at the Marine Barracks Theater, Pearl Harbor. The purpose of this briefing is to provide information on civilian employment to military personnel who plan to retire within the next 12 to 18 months. What It Takes To Be A Wise Shopper

One of the most common and successful gimmicks in the field of business is the advertising of what we refer to as "Fictitious prices: The files of the Commission are stuffed with cases revolving around ads showing "was" and "now" prices, "Value X dollars our prices \$19.95" or "usually" etc.

I have investigated many pricing cases and have often found where even the so-called "sale" price is higher than the normal course of business! If you start with the assumption that such an ad is probably not true, you have advanced a long way toward being a wise shopper. There are, of course, instances of comparative price ads and price reduction ads being proper, but these are in the minority.

NOT SUCH A BIG DEAL

Under examination, the merchant will often admit to me that his so-called former price is a suggested price listed by the manufacturer, or that he has deliberately ballooned the former price in order to make his so-called sale price look enticing to the prospective buyer. Experience has shown us that too often the advertised "was" price of say \$29.95, was in effect a couple of years ago, but that in the meantime there have been quite a few markdowns such as to \$25.95, then \$19.95, down to \$15.95 and finally to the advertised sale price of \$12.95. So you can see that an ad which says "Was 29.95, now 12.95" is deceptive. It should have stated "was 15.95, now 12.95" which wouldn't have seemed like such a big deal.

Bear in mind that a merchant is in his business to make money, not to engage in giving away his products. DO NOT RUSH, especially in buying big ticket items (TV, appliances, etc) until you have shopped around a bit to see what the competition has the same item priced for. It makes you feel a bit stupid when you rush out and pay \$300 for a "sale" item and then see it down the street \$275!

Expanded GI Bill Signed, Includes 35% Money Hike

WASHINGTON (AFPS)—President Nixon has signed a law raising GI Bill educational assistance by 34.6 per cent for Vietnam-era veterans.

The increased benefits are retroactive to Feb. 1. However, Veterans Administration officials expect it will be several months before the additional money will be reflected in allowance checks.

The rates for single veterans or servicemen still on active duty have been hiked to \$175 per month. The rate for a veteran with one dependent is \$205, and the veteran with two dependents may receive \$230 per month. Each dependent beyond two means an additional \$13 per month.

Another provision of the law permits a pre-separation plan for servicemen enrolled in Project Transition.

The Transition plan authorizes servicemen within 180-days of separation to attend secondary and preparatory schools during duty hours. The law authorizes the Veterans Administration to pay Transition students up to \$175 per month for tuition, fees and book expenses.

Men on active duty who attend other approved schools also will be paid at the tuition-cost rate, with a \$175 maximum allowance for full-time attendance.

New GI Bill Benefits

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — Here are highlights of the educational benefits added to the GI Bill in a law signed by President Nixon:

Monthly Payments	Old	New
Single veteran, or serviceman on active duty	\$130	\$175
Veteran with one dependent	\$155	\$205
Veteran with two dependents	\$175	\$230
Each additional dependent	\$10	\$13
Orphans, widows	\$130	\$175

Tutor Assistance
Tutor assistance for students failing college studies—Up to \$50 monthly for nine months will be paid but only to failing students, not those who simply want to raise their marks.

Pre-Separation Education Plan
Permits payment up to \$175 monthly for tuition, fees and book expenses in a special pre-separation education plan for servicemen working toward a high school diploma or attending courses to prepare for college. The plan is open to men with less than 180-days' active duty remaining and the payments are not counted against other GI Bill entitlements.

Vocational Rehabilitation Training
Increases full time vocational rehabilitation training to \$135 per month for single men, \$181 for those with one dependent and \$210 for men with two dependents with \$6 for each additional dependent.

Lower Minimum Hours
Permits payment of full GI Bill allowances to veterans taking as few as 12 semester hours per week (14 was previous minimum). This applies only at colleges which consider 12 hours "full-time study."

Other
Permits veterans to draw education help from more than one government agency at one time.

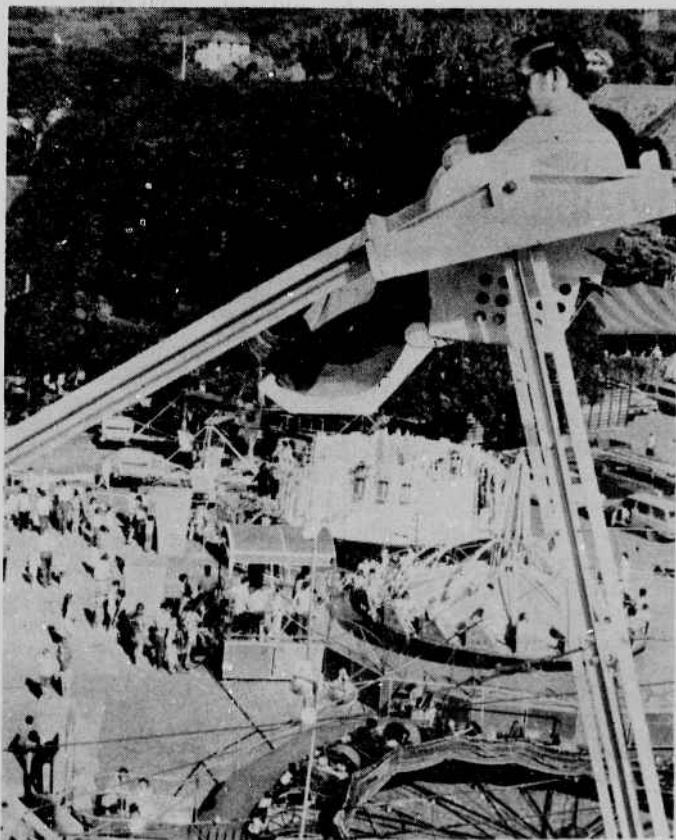

WINDWARD BOWMEN

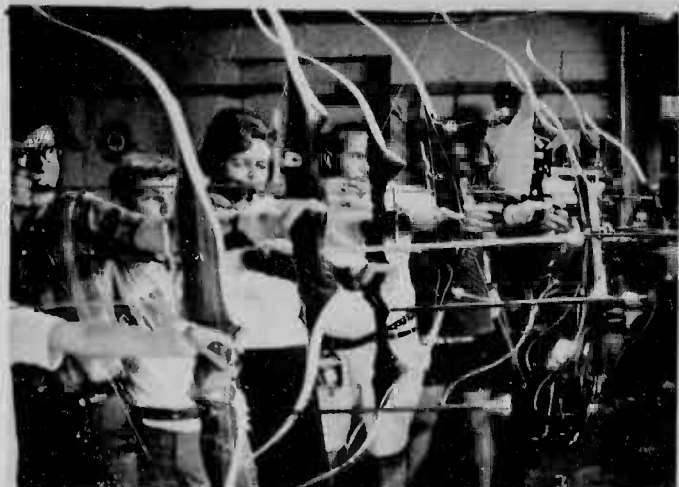

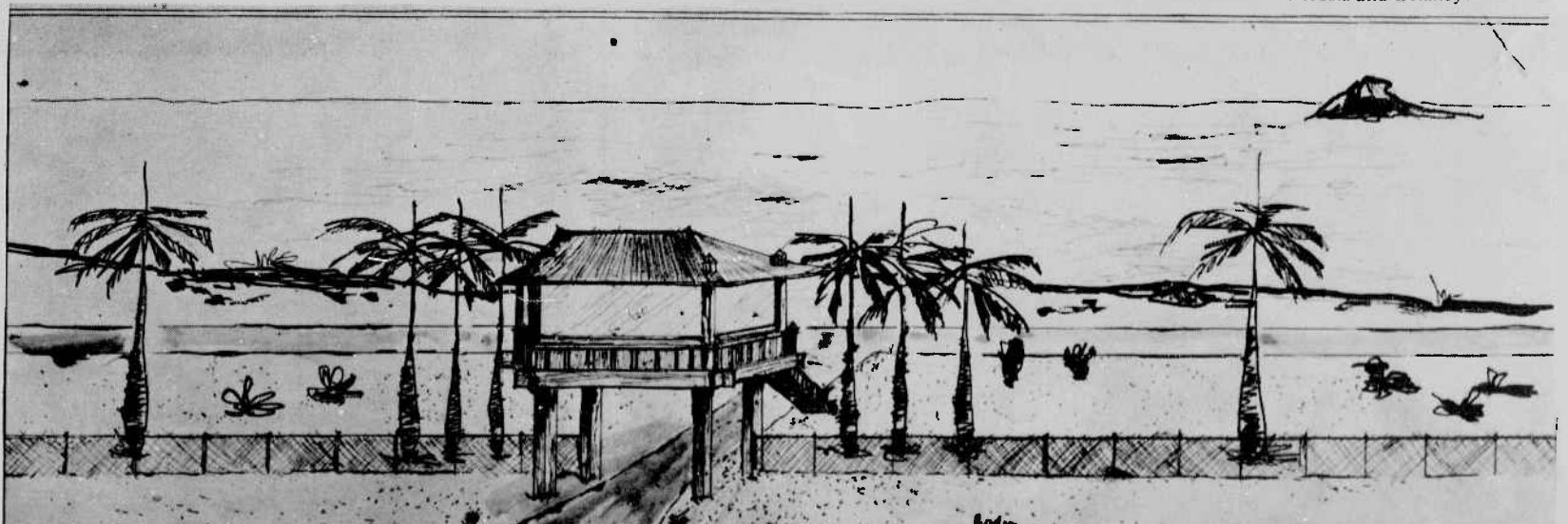

1st Marine Brigade Proves Its Power,

Today, marks the 14th anniversary since the 1st MarBde FMF came into being. Its main function then, as it is today, was to provide a hard hitting air ground team trained and prepared for amphibious warfare in the atomic age, and for any other duties it might be directed to perform.

In 1956 as today, the Brigade was unique in that it was the only combat unit in which air and ground elements lived and trained together. By December 1957, their training had advanced until Gen. Randolph McCall Pate, CMC, said that he considered the Brigade to be "the outstanding Fleet Marine Force unit in the Marine Corps."

During the next seven years Brigade units covered the Pacific from California to Taiwan and the Philippines on training exercises.

In 1965, the increased U.S. involvement in Vietnam meant the deployment of Brigade units to Okinawa and then into the war zone. Once in Vietnam, the units were detached from the Brigade.

In July, 1965, the 1st Bn., 5th Marines, arrived here as replacement for the 4th Marines, who were engaged in operations in Vietnam. Later that year, in December, Marine All Weather Fighter Squadron 212 became the first unit to return to its parent organization from being deployed.

Two months later, in February, 1966, the ground unit was once again ordered "south" to Vietnam. There was no ground element of the Brigade until June 1, 1966 when the 1st Bn., 27th Marines, was reactivated here.

During the 1968 Tet offensive, the Brigade once again was used to supply needed manpower thwart Communist intentions in Vietnam. Ordered to Vietnam in Feb., 1/27 remained in country until September, when they returned to Hawaii to once again become the ground element of the Brigade.

After the deactivation of 1/27 in November, Blt. 1/3 incorporated 1/27's remaining units and became the ground support team for the 1st Mar Bde.

Today, the Brigade is commanded by Col. B.G.

Cass and is in constant preparedness to protect the security of the South Pacific.

Last week, 1stMarBde demonstrated its preparedness by staging a fire power display for the benefit of 600 members from the Navy League.

The fire power demonstration graphically illustrated the variety and effectiveness of weaponry available to Marine Corps units. Shown was the 1st Mar Bde's air/ground team in action. In addition, Marine riflemen advance supported by jet aircraft and a variety of supporting weapons against a simulated enemy were also depicted.

Overall, the demonstration reaffirmed the fact that the 1stMarBde was ready for any emergency.

"On May 1st 1970,

as the officers and men of the current 1stMarBde observe the 14th Anniversary of their unit's activation, they may be justifiably proud of their accomplishments and those of the thousands of Marines who carried their banner throughout the world since the original 1stMarBde was activated more than fifty years ago.

"Yours is a new generation and the history of traditions you now share are an enviable and awesome heritage. However, I am sure you will fulfill your responsibilities with honor and distinction in the highest traditions of the 1stMarBde.
