

# Col. Palmer to relinquish group Tuesday

"This has been the proudest tour of duty in my career," were the words of Colonel Kenny C. Palmer, who will relinquish command of Marine Aircraft Group-24 on Tuesday to Col. R. E. Carey.

The colonel was reflecting on his tour of duty with the Group since he assumed command in October 1969.

Colonel Palmer, who will move to a staff position with the First Marine Brigade, had nothing but praise and respect for the Marines he refers to as the "Group Team".

In talking about the "team," Colonel Palmer said, "Because of an all-out effort of every Marine in the Group, we are now flying more flight hours, a greater sortie rate and a greater aircraft available system than any other similar unit in the Corps."

When talking to the colonel it becomes apparent that his respect for his Marines, both officer and enlisted, is a deep sense of pride for them. "My Marines in Maintenance positions," continued Colonel Palmer, "are a big part of this

"Group Team." Despite a shortage of personnel and resources these Marines constantly have our aircraft in flying order. They can rise to any occasion. They have proved this countless times over."

It became apparent during this interview that Colonel Palmer was a leader more proud of his men's accomplishments than his own.

Nov. 23, 1970 was a big moment for the "Group Team." "Marine Air Base Squadron-24 did a tremendous job in readying the Short Airfield for Tactical Support area for take-offs. Thanks to their superb job we launched our first Phantom on Nov. 23,"

Colonel Palmer commented. Colonel Palmer touched on all his units during the interview with the enthusiasm of a father talking about an outstanding play his son made in a football game.

"Although we have only six CH-46 helicopters here," stated the colonel, "they are still flying an average of close to 200 hours a month."

I asked the colonel what his proudest moment has been since he assumed command of MAG-24 and he answered: "It would have to be the fly-over we did for the First Marine Brigade Change of Command ceremony last year. We flew every type of aircraft we had (See Palmer, Page 3)

## Degree program needs applicants

A desirable goal for all Marine Corps officers is at least a college degree. Many officers have been commissioned without this qualification. A majority of these officers are voluntarily continuing their formal academic education during off-duty hours.

Recognizing the benefits to be gained from college training for both the individual career officer and the Marine Corps, the Commandant of the Marine Corps will continue to give maximum encouragement and assistance to those officers who are continuing their college education through off-duty study.

In addition, the College Degree Program will continue to permit qualified officers to attend accredited colleges and universities on a full-time basis to fulfill residence requirements for a baccalaureate degree.

Eligibility is limited to

Regular and Reserve officers on active duty in the grade of warrant officer through lieutenant colonel who have sufficient college credits to permit them to obtain degrees in a maximum period of 21 months.

Regular and Reserve officers must agree not to tender a resignation or request retirement while participating in the College Degree Program. Officers must further agree to remain on active duty, after completion of degree requirements, for a period of three years or, if the enrollment is longer than one calendar year, for a period four years.

Further, they must agree that they will not submit a resignation or request voluntary retirement during this period of obligated service. The foregoing obligation is in addition to any obligation previously incurred.

## Commandant praises COs for tightening-up efforts

General Leonard F. Chapman, Jr., Commandant of the Marine Corps, has told his commanders that their responses to objectives set during 1970 was "highly gratifying."

In a letter to all general officers and commanding officers, the general said that 1970 was the year of transition from peak wartime commitments toward a post-Vietnam smaller, lean, tough, combat ready, highly professional Marine Corps. "Your responses to the objectives set," General Chapman said, "have been most gratifying and today we are, in fact, well on our way towards this type of Corps."

General Chapman noted that 1971 will be a year in which the Marine Corps must continue to

fight in Vietnam, and at the same time complete some remaining transitional tasks to achieve fully the Corps desired. "At the same time, we have the important continuing task of sustaining the effectiveness and quality of the Corps for the long haul," he said.

Additionally, the Commandant said, "The key to sustaining, in an all-volunteer environment, the highly dedicated, professional Corps that this Nation needs is a team effort to lift ourselves up by our bootstraps in every phase from procurement, through development, to retention of highly selected Marines."

"This is the year to raise each individual Marine to the level where professional pride and

confidence in being a Marine will be reflected in his zeal to remain a top Marine," he continued.

In conclusion, General Chapman told commanders, "I recognize that we still will have in 1971 a degree of personnel

turbulence that may make our task difficult. Nevertheless, with full understanding of the problems and the objectives, I

expect everyone to be an active participant in the meticulous self-effort to restore fully the standards of professionalism and sense of brotherhood that must epitomize the Marine Corps. WE TAKE CARE OF OUR OWN."

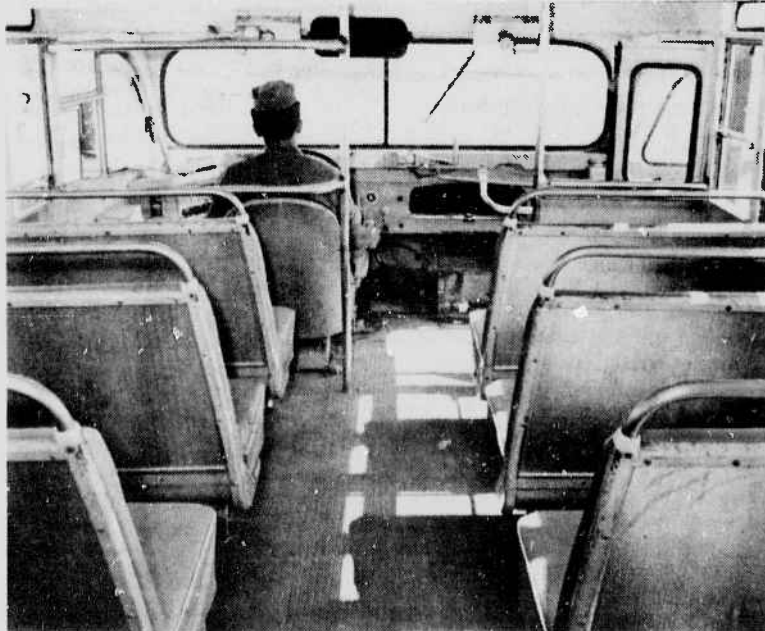
Brigade Marines are going back to Molokai.

## E-6 problems reported

# Housing situation explained

(During the Commandant's recent visit to K-Bay, a question was aired pertaining to staff sergeant on-base housing. Basically, the question was this: Why are some staff sergeants placed in housing other than Capehart units? In an effort to clarify this point, and to insure that all personnel fully understand the housing assignment policy, the following information is printed.)

"Staff sergeants (E-6) are eligible for all staff privileges at this Station. The policy for assigning quarters, however, is based on the Department of Defense policy implemented by the Commandant of the Marine Corps directing assignment to designated quarters as follows:

a-general officers; b-senior officers (O-6); c-field grade officers;

d-junior officers; e-all enlisted men.

"For the purpose of maintaining consistent application of the assignment policy, sub-allocations within the enlisted assets of 91 public quarters are as follows: 407 Capehart quarters for E-7 to E-9 and 503 other public quarters for E-4 to E-6. Staff sergeants, however, are eligible for assignment to Capehart quarters when there are no E-7 to E-9 on the waiting list. This sub-allocation does provide an equal opportunity for assignment to base housing for all.

"A study of the enlisted housing situation to insure an equal assignment opportunity has been completed. The present policy does allow assignment opportunity to approximately 50 per cent of the staff sergeants to Capehart quarters. On the other hand, combining E-6s with E-7 to E-9 would result in extended waiting periods for assignment to Capehart areas, and would leave vacancies in the other public quarters.

"It is the objective of the family housing program to insure that married career men have adequate, economic housing in which to live. The influence of family housing on morale and retention is well recognized. The major problem is that the supply of Marine Corps family housing assets is only a small percentage of the demand.

"To maximize the morale benefits of existing houses, every military man must be able to feel that he has been treated fairly in relation to his contemporaries in his opportunity to obtain base housing. It is intended that the burden of responsibility and seniority will control where other factors are equal.

"The Marine Corps recognizes no inherent right to government housing for any group or individual. The Marine Corps addresses itself to housing matters solely for its own purposes and without accepting any implied responsibility to persons who are or who might be housed, except as provided by law."

During the past four fiscal years, 1,389 fires occurred in Pacific Navy housing, resulting in 17 deaths, 207 injuries and \$977,338 in losses.

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Frequency of fires in family housing and barracks exceeds any other single class of occupancy by a large margin.

## the Windbag

Q. "Why is it easier for Marines and/or their dependents to cash checks (government or personal) off base than it is to cash checks at the Bank or one of the service's facilities on base? Off-base requires only a driver's license while our bank and Exchange/Commissary need ID card, unit, rank, service number, phone number and frequently more, such as home address and phone number and the question 'do you have an account here?'" (Name withheld)

A. "The Marine Corps Exchange requires a positive identification check of personnel cashing checks to insure that they are (1) an authorized patron, and (2) the information be recorded as to rank, service number, unit to which assigned and telephone number, in the event the check is returned for insufficient funds or other reasons. Therefore, the Exchange can locate the person(s) involved."

A. "Credit Union members may cash checks in most cases with only their ID card and signature. Non-members may not cash checks at the Credit Union. Membership may be acquired by paying a fee of 25 cents and having a minimum deposit of \$5."

A. "Effective immediately, the Commissary will only require name, rank and service number or a Social Security number on personal checks. If this information is embossed on the front of the check it is sufficient. An identification card must be shown to establish positive identification. The change fund limit prohibits accepting government payroll checks at the commissary."

A. "Identification procedures for check cashing purposes are the same at all branches of Bank of Hawaii throughout the Pacific. It is important to understand that these procedures are designed to protect the payee (person to whom the check is payable) and the maker of the check.

"When the payee wishing to cash a government check has an account at our branch, we can verify his endorsement with his signature in our file. However, if he does not have an account with us, we do need suitable identification and the unit to which he is assigned, should the check be returned for any reason. "For personal checks, the same procedures are followed, except that we must also be certain that the maker's signature is valid if he is not the payee and that sufficient funds are available to pay the check.

"It is important to understand that a check is not cash; it is a promise to pay, made by the maker of the check. The difficulty can therefore be greater when a non-depositor presents a personal check drawn on a mainland bank.

"Forms of identification normally considered acceptable are: passports; military and State of Hawaii ID cards; Bank of Hawaii courtesy cards; Bank of Hawaii Charge Cards and BankAmericards; selective service registration cards; and Hawaii drivers licenses issued since January, 1968.

"There are a number of lost, stolen or forged instruments (including government and personal checks as well as ID cards) reported daily. Check cashing is therefore a serious responsibility for our Bank personnel. We do make every effort, within the limits of responsible banking, to give the best possible service to the personnel of this base.

# NRS sets up dependents education

A Navy Relief Society Educational Fund has been established to help high school graduates who are military dependents with further schooling.

The fund is earmarked for undergraduate education at accredited colleges, vocational training, or for preparatory academies. Postgraduate work is not included in this program.

To be eligible for financial assistance, applicants must be unmarried children, step-children or legally adopted children of living or deceased personnel of:

The regular Navy and Marine Corps.

The reserve components thereof when on extended active duty.

The regular retired list, Fleet Reserve, Fleet Marine Force Reserve with 20 years active duty or physically retired for service connected disability.

Dependents must not be older than 23 at college or school entrance date.

Parents are expected to furnish an appropriate share of college expenses in accordance with their income and assets. Applicants who, by their own efforts, expect to help in some way to defray educational expenses will also be assisted. As much as \$1250.00 annually, interest free, may be loaned depending on need.

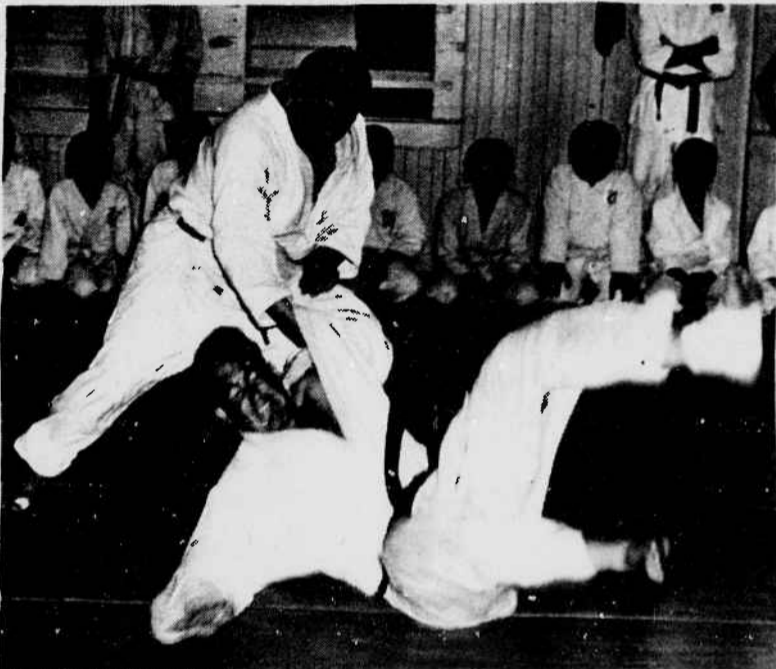

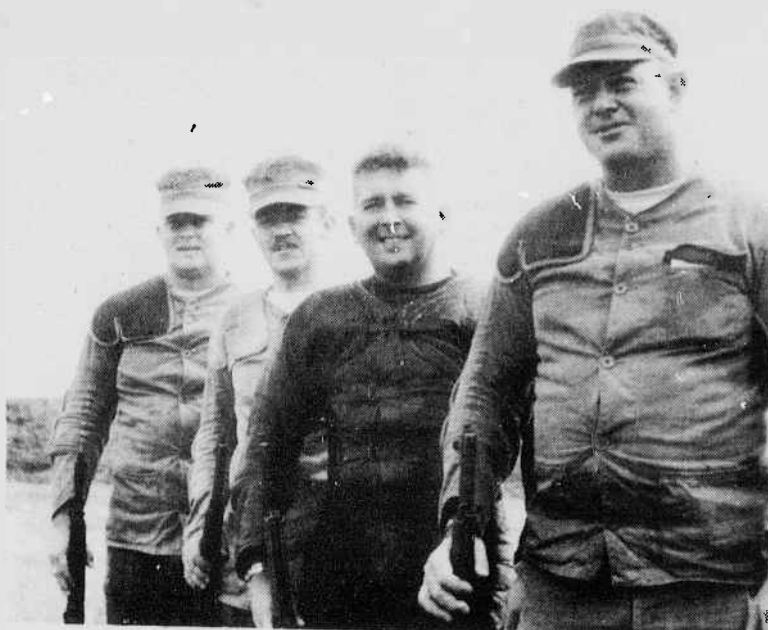

# Career Comments

During every Marine's enlistment there comes a time when he finds himself sitting on a fence—a fence of confusion and indecision. This is the time he needs guidance. One of the men to see is his career planner.

Career planning is a service at all command levels designed to aid the Marine in solving his problems. It makes no difference if those problems concern a career in the Marine Corps or a career in civilian life.

A career planner is not a reenlistment non-commissioned officer. Contrary to what many Marines believe, the career planner does not try to counsel individuals into reenlisting. According to career planning NCO's, 70 percent of all the men in the Corps are not suitable for retention, basically because every Marine is not militarily inclined. But, on the other hand, the military is interested in retaining that certain percentage of men who are militarily inclined and meet the standards prescribed for a chosen military career.

Out of the thousands of Marines scheduled for release from the Corps each year, the Marine Corps would like to keep 30 percent. They will guide and aid the other 70 percent to pursue their goals in civilian life.

Career planning NCO's discuss and assist Marines with problems of all types. Most often these problems are of an educational or vocational nature.

Besides having the office library to rely on, the career planners are continuously working with commanding officers in the mutual exchange of ideas and information.

If a Marine's problem cannot be resolved locally, the career planning office uses its "Hot-line" to Headquarters Marine Corps. Don't let fear or misunderstanding of career planning restrict you from bettering your skills, knowledge and financial status. Don't remain sitting on a fence of indecision and confusion. Go see or call your career planner and get the straight scoop. There are more than 21 career planners aboard the base. They are trained and ready to help you.

## Regulations altered for extending tours

A recent change to the Career Planning Guide has made several changes in Extensions of Enlistment and this information can be of vital interest to many Marines.

### NEW INFORMATION

The Commandant of the Marine Corps will approve all requests for Extension of Enlistment. None will be executed without prior approval. The normal time frame in which to get an approval will be approximately one month, so if you are in the category of extending your enlistment see your Career Planner as soon as possible.

### REASON FOR EXTENSION

A Marine may agree to extend his enlistment in order to have sufficient obligated active service to accept a promotion or to qualify for a preferred assignment. Specific tour lengths are not guaranteed for extensions of less than 3 years. Receipt of the desired assignment constitutes approval of the benefit for which the extension agreement was effected. Reason will be entered in specific terms on line 12 of the Agreement to Extend Enlistment form.

### LENGTH OF EXTENSION

Voluntary extensions of enlistment will be for a period of one through 11 months, one year, two years, three years, or four years. Those for two, three or four years are considered career length extensions.

Short term extensions are for duration of one year or less. They are intended to provide sufficient obligated active service to permit serving a tour of specified length and are primarily of benefit to the Marine Corps. Short term extensions may only be effected to provide the required service to participate in a particular exercise, deployment, official project, study, course of training or to gain sufficient obligated service to qualify for a specific assignment. No more than two extensions of any duration will be permitted on any one enlistment of which the total of both will not exceed 4 years.

### PAY ON EXTENSIONS

A Marine will be paid for unused leave and travel pay on his first extension of enlistment when it is effected if it is a career extension. He will not be paid for unused leave or travel pay on his second extension when it is effected.

# Messhalls get new menus along with soda machines

Messhalls 1 and 2 are starting to take on an "international look" when it comes to the meals being served because of a new 42-day cycle menu now in effect.

Personnel eating in the messhalls will notice more seafood

platters, Chinese dishes and many other localized meals on the "chow" line.

Meat, potatoes and gravy will continue to be the mainstay on the menu. However, it is hoped the new dishes being introduced will please more "tastebuds."

Breakfast meals will include oatmeal, grits, and in addition to

fried eggs to order each morning, omelets will be available periodically.

The 42-day cycle menu method offers a far better answer to the continuous attempts to develop new recipes and dishes.

This method should also contribute to happy and satisfied personnel with a gourmet's appetite.

Captain C. D. Watson, Station food services officer, pointed out that these menus were developed on the basis of availability of subsistence items, climatic conditions, command requirements, cost limitations, weight control programs and troop acceptability, using the Marine Corps Menus as a guide.

Another change in the messhalls are the installation of soft-drink machines for Marines desiring this form of liquid refreshment with their meal.

## Dental treatments for K-Bay children

All parents stationed or housed at K-Bay are again reminded that Monday marks the beginning of National Children's Dental Health Week. All school-aged children of active duty military personnel are eligible.

As stated in last week's article, a preventive dentistry treatment for dependent children will be offered Feb. 13 by the K-Bay Dental Department.

Flouride is applied directly to the teeth in the dentist's office and is desirable for children regardless of whether their water is flouridated. However, children whose drinking water is flouridated should not be given vitamins with a flouride component. This may lead to an undesirable esthetic effect to the teeth.

Parents wanting to take advantage of the preventive treatments for their children must pick up a special dentifrice and tablet between Monday and Friday at the dental department, Bldg. 216, during working hours.

The child must chew the pleasant-tasting tablet thoroughly and brush with the special dentifrice prior to reporting to the dental clinic on Feb. 13, for treatment. The child should not eat after this brushing until after the visit to the clinic.

Children whose last names start with the following letters should report to the clinic according to the below schedule: 7:30 - 8:30 a.m. A,B; 8:30 - 9:30 a.m. C,D,E,F; 9:30 - 10:30 a.m. G,H,I,J; 10:30 - 11:30 a.m. K,L,M,N; 1 - 2 p.m. O,P,Q,R,S; 3 - 4 p.m. T,U,Z.

## Returning of fitness forms speeded up

Individual officers will be notified when fitness reports have been received by the Commandant of the Marine Corps according to newly established procedures.

Current regulations provide that the initial preparation and submission of fitness reports is the responsibility of the individual officer. Previously there was no provision for informing the officer that the report had arrived at Headquarters.

Now, each officer must personally attach a self-addressed Marine Corps postal card to his fitness report upon completion of section A. The reverse side of the card will contain a notation that the report has been received at Headquarters and the inclusive dates of the report.

Upon receiving the fitness report, Headquarters will detach and return the postal card as a receipt.

Individual officers will also be responsible for notifying Headquarters if the receipt has not been returned within 120 days of initial submission.

## Station conservationists still doing their thing

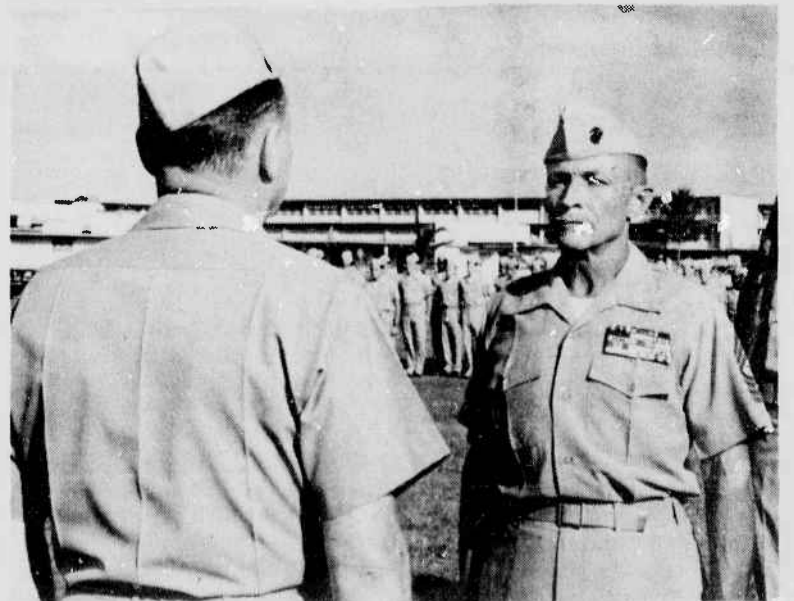
The Conservation Club, along with K-Bay Boy Scouts from Troop 225, have cleared a nursery area and built lean-tos in order to shade the potted plants. The Girl Scouts of K-Bay Troop 219 and 347, have also joined in the effort. The girls have taken charge of planting plants in cans to help build up the base nursery.

The club is also continuing its compost pickup every Sunday in the base housing area. Compost is any item which can be used as ingredients for a fertilizing mixture.

Here is a chance for K-Bay's residents to get rid of those excess leaves, palm fronds, tree limbs,

and bush trimmings. Also needed are garden tools, hoses, wheel barrows, garbage cans (55 gallon) and any excess fertilizer. Residents can have these items picked up free of charge and be contributing to the K-Bay conservation effort at the same time. All items should be placed along the curb by 9 a.m. every Sunday. Residents are reminded not to mix trash with the compost and to wash the cans and milk cartons to reduce the insect problem.

Anyone desiring to work on the park should report to the Old Mokapu School at 9 a.m. every Saturday and Sunday.
