HQMC to decide who rates SPP

Marines who fail on the rifle range, here at K-Bay, could fail to be selected for superior performance pay (SSP) at Headquarters Marine Corps.

According to a change to MCO 7220.12H, SPP will be run by Headquarters rather than field commanders. Started last year, SPP is for all Marines, lance corporal through gunnery sergeant, who are exceptional in their performance who serve in fields not eligible for other types of

Beginning July 1, Headquarters will decide who gets the dollars. It won't be by name, but by utilizing a system similar to the composite score/cutting score computation used for NCO promotions.

The commander will still pick his superior performers, using an evaluation system like last year. There

Pay taxes on TLA

Marines receiving Temporary Living Allowance (TLA) after January 1, this year will use this figure to be included as gross income for Federal Income Tax purposes.

This is a result of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) revenue ruling 72-123 which revolks IRS's revenue ruling 61-111.

What does all this mean? It means that actual expenses incurred for meals, and lodging while occupying temporary quarters in location of a new duty station for a period of 30 consecutives days, after reporting to a new duty station, may be deducted from the gross amount of TLA received.

Personnel recelving TLA are advised to retain receipts, expense statements, etc., to substantiate such deductions for the calendar year 1972.

IRS extends tax deadline

The Internal Revenue Service has extended the deadline for postmarks on Federal income tax returns to midnight on Monday, April 17.

The deadline usually is April 15, but since it falls on a Saturday this year, the IRS has given taxpayers a two-day grace period.

For mail to be postmarked by midnight on Monday it would have to be in the hands of the Kailua Post Office by 5:30 p.m. This doesn't mean you can go down at 5 p.in. and drop it in the mail box. It must be given personally to the employees there by

are some scoring changes that crank in the new physical fitness, rifle range and fitness report systems.

The scores will be computed and a minimum level acceptable for each grade will be set. Anyone at or above those levels will get SPP. And, in another change, the award will be for an entire year, instead of six month increments as now.

There is going to be a rush in getting the new system into operation. Commanders have only until the end of April to get composite scores to Headquarters. Headquarters, in turn, hopes to have the cutting scores back to the field in June.

Shortage Special Pay (SSP) is also outlined in the order, however there aren't many changes here. No MOSs will lose the pay, while 17 have been

There are still two levels of SSP, P-3 which give \$100 monthly and P-2 for

P-3 again will go only to a series of MOSs in OF 59. There will be 18 MOSs in the OF that will qualify, however one - 5951 - will be lowered from P-3 to P-2.

Ninety-three MOSs will be, getting P-2. Space prevents listing them all, but they are listed in the order. There are 17 MOSs added for P-2. One --6712 -- is in the Air Control-AA Warfare field and the remainder are the Telecommunications Maintenance. They are MOSs 2811 through 2819, 2821, 2822 and 2825 through 2829.

The other type of pro-pay, special duty assignment, has no MOS changes. Recruiters and drill instructors still will get \$50 a month and career planners \$30 a month.

However, there is a change on the way to the field in a separate bulletin which will allow individuals promoted to first sergeant to retain pro-pay until they finish their tours. Previously master sergeants retained the stipend, but anyone who made first sergeant who was a recruiter, DI or career planner lost his.

Civilians in mess halls?

WASHINGTON, D.C.' Hiring of civilians to work in non-FMF Marine Corps mess halls in CONUS is in the planning stages at Headquarters, but it will be at least a year before any large

The first phase is tentatively scheduled to go into effect next spring if the proposed Fiscal Year 1973 budget holds. The process will take at least five years under a long range program initiated by the Department of Defense. Eventually the program will result in the hiring of civilian cooks, bakers and supervisory personnel as well as messmen.

It is expected that 650 civilian messmen will be hired initially, about 30 percent of the total requirement for CONUS messhalls. Twenty-one civilian food service personnel have been employed at the Marine Corps Supply Center, Albany, Ga., for several years. Nearly1,100 national cooks, bakers and messmen are employed overseas, most of them on

The initial phase of the program will cost \$1.12 million and ultimately \$24 million. The civilians will be hired either under the civil service system or by civilian contract. Local commanders will have the prerogative of choosing which system best suits their needs based upon existing

The elimination of mess duty will result in more efficient utilization of manpower. Marines on mess duty are not available to their units for a month at a time. Also, mess duty has long been an unpopular assignment for Marines, so hiring civilians for mess duty should go a long way in improving troop morale.

Phiblex plagued by bad weather

More that 850 Marines culminated a four day training exercise on the island of Molokai today.

Representing elements of the First Marine Brigade here at K-Bay and the First Marine Division, Camp Pendleton, Calif., the Leathernecks teamed up for an amphibious training exercise (PHIBLEX-3) that was plagued by adverse weather conditions.

Originally, plans called for an amphibious landing, with elements of K-Bay's Third Marines and the Camp Pendleton based Seventh Marines 'hitting the beach' at Molokai by amphibian tractors of the Brigade's Third Amphibian Tractor Battalion.

Apply early for housing

A K-Bay Marine in receipt of orders may apply for military housing at his destination although his name will not go on the waiting list until the date of his detachment from his present command. He still will be required to report to the housing officer upon arrival at his new duty station for assignment to quarters or assistance in finding suitable family housing locally.

If housing is immediately available, he will be so notified and he could be told that occupation of family housing is mandatory. If housing is not immediately available. but will be within a reasonable amount of time, he may be advised to make temporary housing arrangements for his family until he is assigned quarters.

Housing officers will assist Marines in finding suitable housing if family housing is not available, but individuals must attain the approval of the local command before accepting civilian housing.

Full details are in Marine Corps Bulletin 11101 of Jan. 20.

Heavy surf, experienced throughout Hawaiian waters this week, precluded both the amphibious assault at Molokai, Tuesday, and a pre-exercise ship-to-shore landing at Bellows Air Force Station, Monday.

Not bothered by prevailing weather conditions, the Marines displayed flexiblility by reverting to use of another Leatherneck pioneered specialty--vertical assault by helicopters-borne assault forces.

On Tuesday, assault units were helo-lifted from Naval vessels off-shore into "hot" landing zones in 'aggressor controlled' areas of northwest Molokai. Both CH-53 and CH-46 helicopters of Marine Aircraft Group-24 provided expeditious ship-to-shore movement of personnel and such heavy equipment as field artillery pieces and vehicles.

A company of the Brigade's First Battalion, Third Marines, which had been involved in training at Pohakuloa on the island of Hawaii, was previously diverted to Molokai to provide aggressor forces in opposition to assault units.

Once ashore, the landing force proceeded to seize a series of aggressor held objectives during the day and night operations, with the final obstacle being overcome today.

Some units participating in PHIBLEX-3 are being backloaded onto a Navy Landing Ship Transport (LST)

for a scheduled Friday morning return to waters off Windward Oahu. Others will take part in a helo-lift training exercise from Molokai to K-Bay.

Weather conditions permitting, those aboard ship will execute an amphibious landing at Bellows Air Force Station in order to obtain training missed earlier in the week due to excessively high surf.

HQMC asks help in reducing fires

Because of an increase of fires on Marine Corps Bases, Headquarters Marine Corps has initiated action, and asks that both military and civilian alike "adopt a more positive attitude towards fire prevention safety."

While the bulk of the responsibility goes on the shoulders of K-Bay's Fire Department, fire prevention is the concern of everybody. In their quest for stopping fires

before they start, K-Bay's Fire Department conducts periodic inspections of every family housing unit and every building on the base. They also present fire prevention demonstrations to children at Mokapu School.

Every Monday and Tuesday afternoon firemen visit some family quarters, checking for the safety of the homes, and distributing useful information. The visits are systematic and through the course of a year, all the units are inspected.

During their visit, the Department explains and shows the use of fire extinguishers, distributes a

booklet titled, "Fire Safety in the Home," and they stress the importance of fire drills so individuals will respond in the proper way during an actual fire. They also stick decals on phones with the following inscription: FIRE 422-2747, MILITARY POLICE 25-72181, **AMBULANCE 25-72505.**

"The biggest cause of fires at K-Bay," warns one fireman is, "things left cooking on the stove and forgotten about." The major cause of fires and

other useful facts can be found by looking Into fire experience records which show:

* Carelessness is the major contributing cause of fires;

* Most deaths from fire occur in

family housing quarters;

* In most fires where fatalities do occur, asphyxiation, not burns, is

the primary cause of deaths; and * The number of arson-type fires are increasing.

Maximum emphasis should be stressed on local fire prevention programs by initiating the following:

* Utilize professional fire department personnel for building inspections, and fire education training services. Special consideration should be given to training occupants of family and bachelor housing;

* Instruct personnel in the hazards associated with cooking, heating and open flame devices, combustible trash cans and wall finishes, children and matches, flammable liquids and careless smoking habits;

* Practice fire exit drills to ensure the adequacy of building evacuation plans;

* Advise all personnel of the generally unrecognized deadly hazard of smoke asphyxiation even in small fire situations; and

* Publicize the increased trend in arson type fires and alert responsible personnel in the recognition of fire symptoms where arson or incendiarism is suspected.

With the above as guidelines, it is believed that the number of on-base fires can be cut down. Follow them: the life you save may be your own!

Armed Forces YMCA needs \$1 million

New income tax system in effect

WASHINGTON, D.C. - A new federal tax withholding system is now in effect, brought on by changes by the Revenue Act of 1971.

Marine Corps disbursing offices are now using new tax tables in the computation of federal income tax withheld from wages. The changes involve the amount being withheld and are designed to eliminate underwithholding which was common in previous years.

The new system is not an increase in taxes, but a way to bring the amount of taxes withheld closer to the individual's year-end tax liability.

But the new system can result in too much money being withheld, especially in the case of single persons and married individuals whose spouses don't work who have a large amount of itemized deductions on their tax

To prevent this the new law created a special withholding allowance for those who qualify. Employers must give every employee an opportunity to complete revised Treasury Form W-4, Employee's Withholding Exemptions Certificate. Single persons and married individuals

whose spouses don't work are entitled to one special withholding allowance. The allowance may not be

obtained by either husband or wife

when both work or by anyone who has two or more concurrent jobs. Checking out the provisions of the law could mean extra money in your pocket. One Headquarters Marine

Pohakuloa, Hawaii. When one lives in a home away from home, he is apt to lose out on a lot of luxuries.

But, when one lives in a home away from home, away from home, away from home. . .luxury becomes a memory

That's the way it is for the approximately 375 Marines of 1st Battalion, 12th Marines 1/12, 1st Marine Brigade, living in the "bush" for a week while training here at the Pohakuloa Training Area on the Big Island.

The only unit of it's size to endure a week long tactical bivuac during the month of training here, 1/12 has it's sights on proving their ability to live and work under simulated combat conditions in the field, being entirely self supporting.

Away from their temporary home at the Pohakuloa Base Camp, their permanent military home at K-Bay and for most, their individual homes back on the mainland, these Marines set about "roughing it."

Under the command of LtCol. R.J. Coogan, 1/12 has a multi-purpose mission during their stay in the bush.

Because of the tactical requirements everything from the individual guns to the field mess hall is camouflaged to foil detection from alr craft.

And If your stomach jumps at the words "field mess hall" you should take the opinions of the cannoneers of 1/12, according to them it is great chow.

The training at Pohakuloa for 1/12's Alpha, Bravo, and Headquarters Batteries Includes: coordinating with infantry units for supporting fire during day and night, moving under black-out conditions, working with MAG-24's, CH-53 helicopters for moving their guns from one location to another by air, and cross-training on

all aspects of crew-served weapons. Perhaps one of the most interesting manuevers in the artillery men's training while at PTA is what is known as the "hip shoot."

This is moving a battery of guns from one place to another and all of a sudden getting the order to stop the move, set up the guns, and start shooting. .


Of course moving a 105mm howitzer artillery battery is no casy task. Each gun weighs nearly two and one half tons.

Forward Observers (F-O's), four teams per battery, do the sighting for the guns. Usually the gun crews do not see the targets they are firing at.

The FO's locate the target from
