

RUDE AWAKENING — Residents of Cochran Street aboard MCAS Kaneohe Bay awoke to this alarming eight Saturday as an electrical fire caused by fallen power lines, consumed two compact cars and damaged two other vehicles and the surrounding area. The incident is under investigation.

Power lines collapse

Residents of Cechran Street in MCAS Kancohe Bay's housing area were rudely awakened Saturday morning by a fierce electrical fire caused by fallen power lines.

SEVERAL PERSONS de-SEVERAL PERSONS described hearing a loud explosion at about 6 a.m., followed by the sight of scorching flames. No one was injured by the blaze, but a number of families were forced to flee their homes, leaving their personal possessions behind.

None of the housing units caught fire but a number of people reported their television sets were rendered useless by the high voltage that coursed through the wires. One unidentified man was reportedly running around the neighborhood attempting to put out some of the smaller fires with an extinguisher.

Witnesses described the scene as an inferno, with electrical sparks flying, clouds of multi-colored smoke billowing and flames higher than the housing units shooting into the air.

FIREFIGHTERS responded quickly to the emergency, but were campeted in their efforts to douse the flames by the number of live electrical wires lying about. Once the electrical power was shutdown firemen were able to bring the fire under control quickly.

firemen were able to bring the fire under control quickly. Two small care were gutted by the intense fire and two other vehicles were extensively damaged. The two burned-out compacts were surrounded by molten debris. Large solidified puddles of melted rubber, shards of twisted metal, charged wire and twisted metal, charged wire and broken asphalt were visible around the remains of the two blackened automobile skeletons.

REMARKABLY, one vehicle in the same parking area was unscathed. The relieved owner of the car said a live wire landed less than a foot from the front of the car but never made contact. "My husband and I were pretty sure our car was a goner, but we werd lucky," she explained.

Not only were power lines down, telephone and cable television lines were burned out as well. The fallen live wires left numerous pitted areas on the concrete side pitted areas on the concrete side-walks through which they burned. Two power lines scorched deep, blackened twin four-inch swaths horizontally across the front lawns and sidewalks of several dwellings. Firemen kept trees in the area heavily soaked to prevent them from catching for. them from catching fire.

ELECTRICITY has been restored to the neighborhood. Many residents said they are still stunned by the suddenness of the fire and they are glad no one, especially children, had been

Immunizations will not be given on the days scheduled for school physicals. Several things are required to complete the child's physical. Their health record can be obtained from the clinic. Parents must bring the child's immunization record, a urine sample and eye glasses (if worn). A parent must accompany any child under 18 years of age.

To accommodate the large scale operation of school physicals, usual clinic activities must be curtailed. Active duty personnel will be assisted in the Military Sick

The purpose of the STRAT-MOBEX was to evaluate the deployment readiness of the 7th MAB by mustering and transporting elements of the force to possible aerial ports of embarkation. Simultaneously, the MAB's readiness to load personnel and equipment aboard the sircraft at embarkation sites was examined. Aerial embarkation training is a required portion of the 7th MAB's routine training syllabus.

DURING THE loading exercise phase of the STRATMOBEX, Marines were instructed on actual

aircraft loading precedures. They were assisted by personnel of the 63d Airlift Control Element from Norton Air Force Base which provided training teams at each explantation point.

During the three-day exercise, only a portion of 7th MAB's personnel and equipment was transported to specified points of embarkation. The entire force was alerted and mustered at individual home bases at Marine Corps Air Stations Yuma and El Toro; Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton, Calif.; MCAGCC/CAC, Twentynine Palma, Calif. Personnel were required to report to their assembly areas fully.

THE STRATMOBEX is routine training evolution. One military transport aircraft, typical of those that would be employed during an actual deployment, was positioned at each aerial embarkation site. There were no flyaways in conjunction with the

exercise.

A limited number of vehicles, communication vans and palletized individual equipment, were loaded aboard the aircraft. Additionally, a C-5 aircraft, located at El Toro, was used to load various models of helicopters.

Mokapu: Intensive volcanic eruptions create a peninsula royal Hawaiians established as sacred land

Long before man first appeared on the face of the earth, a huge fissure opened on the floor of the Pacific Ocean.

Through intense volcanic activity a string of both large and small islands were created. They numbered in the hundreds and dotted the blue Pacific from Hawaii to as far away as the island of Midway.

DURING THIS period the island of Oahu and Mokapu peninsula, now home of MCAS Kaneohe Bay were formed.

Mokapu received its geometric configura-tion through a series of great eruptions on the southeast end of the

towering Koolau mountowering Koolau mountain range. Those same eruptions and lava flows are also credited with the creation of secondary tuff cones. Today these cones are familiar to Ouhu residents as Koko Head, Punchbowl and Diamond Head.

Four volcanic cinder Four volcanic cinder cones appeared on Mokapu. Only two remain today, Ulupau head, the semi-crater on the northeast corner of the peninsula, and Puu Hawaii los known to Hawaii-loa known to Kaneohe Bay Leather-necks as Kansas Tower.

THE SHORELINE of the peninsula was gradually enlarged by limestone deposits, sand, algae and through graphic surveys indi-cate the original shoreline was 12 feet above its present location.

The sector of land that joins Mokupu to the major land area of Oahu is about a mile in width. The area in-cludes the historically ich area known as the rich area known as the Nuupia fishponds. Today Nuupia is a bird sanctuary for many of Hawaii's seabirds, including the endan-gered Hawaiian stilt.

MOKAPU CAN be monapu Can be roughly divided into two land portions. The western half is dominated by Kansas Tower, the coral bluffs of Pali Kilo and Pyramid Rock. The only distinctive feature on the eastern sector is

used a complex system of lund division and Mokapu probably changed hands numerchanged hands numerous times. Each new Moi (king) would redivide the land as he wished among his alias (chiefs) and relatives. Those who lost their land through this method of redivision had to either accept their lot or risk a revolt, neither of which was yery appealing. very appealing.

THE AHUPUAA (land district) was the basic unit of land among the aliis. Each among the ams. Each ahupuan varied in size and shape. It is doubtful any two were identical. Ahupuans generally followed terrain characteristics or imaginary boundry

Mokapu was divided into three such ahupuas: Kailua, Kaneohe and Heeia. These were subdivided into six smaller areas called ilis. The western lobe of Mokupu was located in the Heeia uhupuas. On the western portion lay the ahupuas of Kaneohe containing the ilis of Heleloa, Kuwasohe, Ulupau, Halekou, Kaluapuhi and Nuupia. Kailua ahupuas was the area around the present Mokapu gate and may have also been the site of salt evaporation pits.

evaporation pits. In the earliest known history of Mokapu the peninsula was restric-ted for use by kings, aliis and their familles. King Peleiholani built a palace near the Nuupia fishponds and a hundred years later Kamehameha The Kamehameha The Great established Mokapu as the royal meeting place for his chiefs Likemany areas throughout the Hawai ian Islands Mokapu received its name from Kamehameha

HIS SACRED land was originally called Molu-kapu, a joining of two Hawaiian terms. Moku is the word used to indicate island or peninsula and Kapu means forbidden sacred.

Kamehameha.

Mokapu is a short way of saying, "Keep out for what lies here is sacred."

Mokapu was once heavily populated. This is substantiated by the many bones, artifacts and ruins discovered. It stands to reason that wherever Hawaiian royalty lived so, too, would their servants, lesser chiefs and followers.

IN 1917 a professor from the College of Hawaii named Vaughan MacCaughey made an Mokapu to gain infor-mation in the ruins, particularly the heiaus or temples. Here is a sample of his observa-

"On the flat summit of this elevated part of the coast, several hundred yards inland I found a maze of old ruins. Among these ruins were traces of a native heiau. It is of the husbandry class and I believe Hina and Ku are its deities."

Kamehameha heiau exclusively. There were also two lesser temples located on the Pali Kilo bluffs. One was used by the servant class who were mostly fishermen. In their worship they prayed the gods would replenish the sea with fish. The other was utilized by farmers who prayed for more taro and other staple foods of the early Hawaiian diet.

PYRAMID ROCK was designated as a lookout point for spotting schools of fish as well as possible intruders.

The seas and bays surrounding Mokapu were off-limits to the common people for use as fishing grounds. Certain types of fish were designated for use by royalty only. The Hawaiians traditionally have had a strong sense of affinity for the sea and considered sense of arminy for the sea and considered fishing to be almost a religious ceremony. Kuula was the chief fish-god and fisherman prayed to Kuula for their success. The first fish caught, no matter its size, was custom-arily offered to Kuula in gratitude for good fishing.

Anthropologist Dr. Charles Snow spent nearly a year at Mokapu conducting exhaustive studies of the burial grounds, particularly the sand dunes of Heleloa Beach. His findings often contradicted accepted notions. From accepted notions. From some of the bones he studied he was able to determine that ancient Hawaiian were hard workers. Worn parts of workers. Worn parts of bones meant certain kinds of labor. For example muscles used in planting taro or cance paddling left clearly identifiable markings an arm bones. He also proclaimed both men and women to be expert hula dancers, basing this on the extensive wear he observed on hip joints and pelvic bones,

IN ANCIENT times the average Hawaiian became a senior citizen at the ripe old age of forty. Most of the skeletons Snow studied were of men and women approximately women approximately thirty years of age. These people lived prior to the arrival of Captain Cook. This is demonstrated by the absence of the jewelry commonly worn after the arrival of Cook and other adventurers. other adventurers.

Bikers head for trouble

Motorcyclists who choose not to wear helmets are twice as likely to incur head injuries and at least three times more likely to die of head injuries than helmeted riders.

injuries and at least three times more likely to die of head injuries than helmeted riders. That was the conclusion of a report by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to Congress.

In its report examining the effects of helmet law repeals the NHTSA said that 27 states have either repealed or substantially weakened helmet use laws. One consequence was a 46 percent jump in total motorcycle deaths, from 3,132 in 1976 to 4,850 in 1979.

Critics of helmet use laws had argued that part of the increase was due to increased use of motorcycles, yet the safety agency's report showed that motorcycle sales and registration remained virtually level during the period covered.

Beginning in 1967 and until 1978, a Federal highway safety standard required that all states enact and enforce mandatory motorcycle helmet laws.

California, Utah, and Illinois were the only states that failed to comply. In 1976 Congress passed a law revoking Federal sanctions against states not complying with the helmet standard.

In studies conducted by the safety agency, data revealed that helmet use laws

In studies conducted by the safety agency, data revealed that helmet use laws were effective in attaining nearly universal usage rates because of the ease of enforcement.

In States where helmet laws have been In States where heimet laws have been repealed or weakened, helmet use has declined from nearly 100 percent to between 50 and 60 percent. The agency found that helmet use was lower for crash-involved riders and strikingly low for cyclists who were fatally injured in crashes.

crashes.

Another recent study, this one by the University of California, covered some of the arguments used by anti-helmet law proponents and discounted most of them.

Among the arguments were these—

e "Helmets reduce peripheral vision." Investigations showed that more than three-fourths of all crash hazards were within 45 degrees of either side or straight shead, and actual measurements of peripheral vision found that full coverage helmets restrict the field of view by less than three percent.

"Helmets make it difficult for cyclists to hear." Measurements in the study showed that helmet use did not lower the cyclists' ability to hear critical traffic sounds.

"Helmets can contribute to neck injuries." Studies conducted in Nebraska, California, and Canada revealed that neck injuries occur in less than two percent of all motorcycle crashes.

Will champ stake reputation again?

When Muhammad Ali noistly chattered

Ali noisily chattered his way onto the professional fight scene 20 years scene 20 years ago as young Cassius Clay he was a fistic oddity. A fighter who could actually talk, he loved to ballyhoo his fights, reveling in predicting the outcome of his bouts, spouting poetry and loudly proclaiming

and loudly proclaiming to anyone who cared to listen that he was the prettiest and the greatest. Love him or hate him, he was seldom boring.

And he rarely failed to back his words up in the ring. During his prime he was the ultimate, a bigger version of Sugar Ray Robinson. He defeated

of two decades, never ducking a challenge. Neither Joe Frazier's smashing left hook nor a broken jaw could derail him. He was fast, leaver and coursesses.

clever and courageous Many denounced him for his political views. Those who did however, could not possibly deny his athletic brilliance.

He fought them all

and sometimes it seemed he would go on forever. It was not to be. In the greatest fight of his career in October 1975, after being relentlessly pummelled

by Joe Frazier for 10 by Jos Frazier for 10 rounds, he reached down in the wellspring of his greatness and produced a blistering rally. By the 14th round 'Smokin' Joe' was helpless and the fight had to be stopped.

HE SHOULD have HE SHOULD have quit then, but he chose to continue. That his skills were rapidly eroding was painfully evident. It appeared he had drained the well in that final do-or-die effort against Frazier. The great All had reached the end of the road. He continued to deny it. His fights with Jimmy Young and Ken Norton were gifts to him. He won neither of them but just the aura of being Ali was enough in the judges eyes to get him by. Finally in February 1978 he lost the crown

to a hungry young Leon Spinks. He asked for one more shot and became the only man to win the heavyweight crown three times. It was a fitting climax to an illustrious career. Or so it seemed.

NOW THERE are rumblings of Ali

fighting Larry Holmes for the World Boxing Council Heavyweight Championship. It's a tragic mistake. I hope the fight never hap-

As much as I admire Ali for his past pugilistic accomplishments, he has no business being in the ring now with Larry Holmes or anyons else for that matter. Ten years ago Holmes wouldn't have been good enough to carry Ali's gym bag. Those days are long gone. Despite past miracles, Muhammad can't possibly win this one.

I REMEMBER see in films of an old paunchy Joe Lout being savaged by rugged young Rocky Marciano. I fear Ali may suffer the same humiliation at the hands of Holmes who is at his physical peak. It would be a sad sight to see a man nearing his thirty-ninth birthday end up on his back.

So please stay retired, Champ. You went out a winner. Most of us would like to remember you that



OPERATING out of Hangar #105, forecasters and observers at the weather section of Station Operations and Maintenance Squad-ron, MCAS Kaneohe Bay, provide services for both brigade and tation units.

The weather person-nel perform two jobs: observation and fore-casting. Observers nake hourly weather checks and take readings from equipment known as GMQ-291. This equipment monitors and air temperature the amount of and the amount of precipitation and measures wind direct-ion and wind speed. Maximum and minimum temperature readings are monitored every six hours. Fore casters make their predictions of the weather based on information taken from equipment readings and pictures of cloud activity transmitted by

"I CAN generally forecast what the weather will be throughout the Pacific just by looking over 25 stations within the Pacific," says MSgt Homer Lawless, forecaster at the weather unit.

Using sophisticated machinery such as the Consus Meteorological Data System, the

Data System, the weather section is able to receive information on weather conditions around the world. A micro-computer terminal with a printer, it is primarily an informa-tional unit. This data is drawn from a main computer source in Texas.

TO ADD TO the list

of highly technical equipment, the station weather service has a rader has a range of 200 miles and is used to locate and monitor cloud formations and cloud formations and rainstorm activity. In cases when hazardous weather conditions become a threat to the air station, local commanders are advis-ed immediately so that personnel and property.

FORECASTERS and observers also provide additional weather services for the various units aboard the nir station. One such service provides unit commanders with weather data for plans regarding future opera-tions and exercises on Oahu. In addition, forecasters provide flight briefs on weather conditions for pilots with inbound and outbound destinations on the air station.





Rich's Review

BRIGHAM is a movie about the plight and development of the Mormon Church and how one man devoted his life to it.

his life to it.
Maurice Grandmaison
plays the legendary
Brigham Young. Though
appearing stilted and
uncomfortable in early
scenes, he relaxes as
the film rolls on.

CHARLES MOLL portrays Joseph Smith, a driving force behind a driving force behind the religion's growth. Smith is heralded as a prophet by these who accept the Mormon faith but is not appreciated by those they consider gentiles.

Young and Smith are brought together early in the movie as a result of Young's wife's death. The evening following her funeral Young is distraught. A Mormon missionary calls on his household and leaves him a copy of "The Book of Mormon." After reading the book, Young begins to question his selfidentity in the world. He asks God whether is just an animal, like an ox, or if he has a purpose in life yet to be

fulfilled. He seeks the prophet Smith and learns of the Mormon faith. Young then becomes a missionary and leaves his Kirtland, Ohio homeland to spread the "Word."

WHILE YOUNG is trekking the wilderness Smith learns firsthand of the gentiles' hatred for Mormons. While of the genules hatred for Mormons. While tending his sick wife Smith hears horses outside. Several men burst inside and drag him away while others beat his wife and baby. A discussion of what is to be his fate yields a verdict of tar and feathers. What follows is an artfully directed scene of torture. Use of slow motion photoggraphy, over-dubbed sound tracks and crossfadded angle changes is very effective in presenting the pain Smith experiences as hot tar cooks his skin. The only unbelievable part is that, in later scenes, not even a scar remains.

PERSECUTION of Mormons fills most of the movie's 126 minutes. Producer David Yea-man and Director Tom

McGowan wrap up the film's storyline just in time to keep viewers from getting bored. Well-placed attempts at comedy also prevent

monotony.

Mormons and religion

history buffs might find discrepancies in the chronology but nothing major. General audiences will find this to be an enjoyable way to fill a slow evening. I wouldn't recommend

passing up a hot date or free pizza for it but the movie definitely demovie definitely de-serves consideration. If nothing else, the special effects and scenery provide a relaxing evening.



Rigorous trial camp tests endurance

A stranger walking into our open squadbay was greeted with the smell of analgesic balm, sounds of laughter and quiet conversa-tions and the sight of bodies resting weary bones or nursing what sppeared to be "war wounds."

He saw 29 women Marines gathered in what looked like a cross beween boot camp, the brig and a hospital . . the All-Marine Softball Trial Camp at Barstow, Calif.

FOR 30 DAYS our performance on a softball field, coupled with our knowledge of with our knowledge of rules and positive attitudes determined our earning of a position on the team to represent the Marine Corps in Inter-Service competition. Each individual's goal was to establish herself as one of the top 15 women softball players in the Corps.

The women's trial

wasn't a vacation or a party. You're probably thinking . . . "Well, it couldn't have been all that bad. Playing ball for a couple of hours a day, no uniforms or standing duty. It must have been a blast! Softballer's heaven!"

Personally, I think it was a little bit of heaven and a little bit of Hades, but nobody said it was going to be easy. Each of us expected a challenge and was prepared to accept it.

OUR DAY began around 6:30 a.m. in the squadbay with the flick of a lightswitch. Bodies fell, slid and rolled out of the racks, sleepy-eyed and usually unprepared to face the day.

Grumbling and mumb-ling we embarked upon the ritual of getting ready for a 6 a.m. practice. Slowly but surely we came alive, some faster than

and mentally prepared to hit the field. Casey "Doc" Jones kept busy taping ankles, patch-ing knees and wrap-ping arms, barely having time to get dressed herself.

A few minutes before the hour we wandered down to the field, going over previous practices in our minds. We knew what to expect. The sun thad just peeked over the desert mountains with the promise of intense heat before the morning session would

WE STARTED by we STARTED by stretching out muscles, sore and tight from the day before. Then came the normal arm warmups and a quick game of "pepper." Following drills and exercises we got down to business. The coach hit grounder to the in-The coach hit grounder after grounder to the infielders while a pitching machine spit flies to the outfielders. We went through game situations and batting practice, base running, and diving and diving and

diving

many other painful activities. After several hours of practice the coach would finally tell us to pack it up. What he really meant to say was "take your laps."

It wasn't easy to keep It wasn't easy to keep going when your body ached with pulled muscles, scrapes and bruises. It wasn't easy to put out 100 percent when the sun was beating down and the air you were breathing felt like fire in your nostrils and lungs. But no one said it was going no one said it was going to be a breeze.

Practice was over. We drifted back to the barracks, some limping, some not. Time to hit that long awaited shower and grab some chow.

Your letter should solicit information concerning any special problems or needs the family may have. Inform the Marine of available car rentals, schools on and off base, recommended clothing as far as uniforms and civilian attire for the family, and, finally, request addition al information that may aid you as a sponsor. 

Supplement diminishes medical bills

WASHINGTON, MC-News — While CHAM-PUS pays the major portion of allowable medical charges, the patient's cost may still be substantial in the event of extended medical requirements.

FOR THIS reason, some service families have turned to a type of

private health insurance policy. This CHAMPUS "supplementary insurance", policy, is designed to pay some or all of the beneficiary's portion of a medical bill cost shared by CHAMPUS. CHAMPUS supplements are endorsed and sold by a number of military associations

such as Retired Officers
Association, the Association of the U.S.
Army, the Fleet Reserve Association,
Marine Corps League
and the Air Force
Sergeants Association.
In addition, some
commercial insurance
agencies sell them.
Normally, one must be
a member of such an such as Retired Officers

association to obtain its CHAMPUS supplementary insurance.

THE COST of the plans and the extent to which they bridge the gap between the price doctors or hospi-tals charge and the amount CHAMPUS pays varies from plan to plan. Some associations offer several plans to accommodate different categories of


beneficiaries.
In some circum stances, these plans do not completely bridge the gap. One reason is that supplementary plans base their payments on the CHAMPUS determined allowable charge.

THIS MEANS you still must pay any amount of the medical bill above the amount allowed by CHAMPUS if you use a nonif you use a non-participating practi-tioner. On the other hand, if your physician

or other practitioner participates in CHAM-PUS, the payment of the allowable charge is

payment in full.
Different types of plans have other limitations.





Hawatians, like certain tribes of American Indians, bound the skulls of their infants. This practice lowered the forehead and flattened the back of the skull, forming a high crown.

The Hawatian people were relatively free of the diseases common to other parts of the world. They did, however, possess a high rate of arthritis which afflicted roughly 70 percent of the adult skeletons Snow studied. He attributed this malady to the combination of the strenuous lifestyle and the many leisure hours spent practicing the beloved hula.

NOT ALL authorities agree with Snow's findings from the Heleloa burial sites. One account contends that the bones were actually those of warriors slain in battle. It is believed a raiding party of raiding party of Molokai might have

Molokai might have been annihilated at Heleloa beach. Many broken bones of both male and female skeletons and what was believed to be the remains of battered remains of battered canoes would seem to strongly substantiate that theory. Women in battle were a common sight in Hawaiian armies as they often accompanied their

THE FIRST known military application of Mokapu may have been Mokapu may have been as an outpost for soldier-spies of Kahekili's son, Kalanikupule, figured prominently in Hawaiian history by being on the losing end of a battle against Kamehameha. He was soundly defeated by The Great One at the legendary battle of Nuuanu Pali where Kalanikupule's army was forced off the treacherous cliffs by Kamehameha's superior forces.

With the arrival of foreigners to the islands times began to islands times began to change rapidly, especially in the midnineteenth century. The influx of new visitors and settlers made a substantial mark on the economic and cultural, practices of the Hawaiian people. The focal point of much of this change was on the leeward side of Oahu. Royalty dethe leeward side of Oahu. Royalty de-parted Mokapu for the new place of relaxation named Waikiki.

THE COMMON people were given rights to the land of Mokapu, a privilege previously reserved for royalty. This important land apportionment was known as the Great Mahele.

Farmers and trades-men arrived at Mokapu and tiny herds of cattle dotted and grazed on the flatlands. Farming was also a small-scale operation. Most people raised small patches of taro and sweet potato. Other with more grandiose ideas attempted to grow cotton on






