This past weekend a dozen children accompanied by six Marines from the Provost Marshal's Office spent two nights camping at Bellows Air Force Station in Waimanalo.

THE PROJECT, spearheaded by Sgt Carl Twigg Jr., noncommissioned officer-in-charge of the juvenile branch, Criminal Investigation Division, gave the boys a weekend outing hoping to achieve better relations between PMO and the juveniles aboard MCAS Kaneohe Bay.

"I thought of the idea because I was involved with one of the boys who had run away," Twigg said. "I thought that if all he wanted to do was get away, I could take him and some of his friends on a camping

trip. "I spoke to GySgt Robert Williams, CID chief, and he thought it was an excellent idea.

He showed me how to get the idea cleared.

"I MADE ARRANGEMENTS to get the campsite at Bellows. The tents, sleeping bags, carts and other equipment came from the 1st Marine Brigade. Everybody thought it was a good idea and they were very cooperative.

"There are really no delinquents in the group," states Twigg, "because nobody has been to court. Just a few of them got into a little trouble, the kind of pranks we used to do when we were younger."

The boys, ages 5 to 17, received a taste of the way their fathers live while in the field. They were given the option of sleeping in tents or beneath the stars.

The first night the children were a bit nervous since some had never been camping before. Even the first meal was a challenge.

WHEN THEY WERE told the menu would be "C" rations a few of them didn't know what they were, and the rest expressed no interest. But by breakfast time, even the youngest boys were experts in making the field stoves.

During the outing the children enjoyed sports such as volleyball and their own version of football played in the ocean. Anybody leaving the water was out-ofbounds. The adults won 30 to 0.

The boys enjoyed the outing and expressed an interest in returning. One child told his sponsor that they (PMO) should change it from a weekend to the whole summer.

Joe Cailey, 14, who had never been camping before said, "It was a lot of fun. I like being this close to nature."

was conducted tactically. Upon arrival at the site, the helicopter circled the landing zone that had been secured by "gound forces."

The "chopper" made a quick landing and immediately the second squad from the landing support platoon disembarked. The helicopter took to the air as quickly as it had landed and the landing support team began setting up shop.

THE NINE-MAN team from the landing support platoon proceeded to set up three approach lights on either side of the landing zone in a Vshape. These lights indicate the zone's

low and the green light indicates the helicopter is flying right on the money.

ALSO providing helicopter direction are two Marines, the inside and outside directors. Positioned about 200

meters apart, the inside and outside directors, with lighted wands in hand, extend their arms horizontally and await the approaching aircraft.

As the helicopter comes within distance, the directors begin guiding it directly over the load. The aircraft

will not be signaled to descend until it is properly stationed. Once the pilot receives the sign, he cautiously lowers the aircraft.

Masked man robs club's night manager

An armed, unidentified man robbed the night manager of MCAS Kaneohe Bay Commissioned Officers' Club Wednesday night, escaping with approximately \$1,800.

PETER CHING, the night manager, told authorities he was in the club's office at 11:30 p.m. when a man wearing a Halloween mask approached him from the rear, held a knife to his throat and instructed him to hand over the keys to the safe.

"The man was obviously waiting for me in the laundry room. I didn't get a good look at him but I knew he was wearing a monster mask. He told me to give him the keys to the safe and then lie face down on the floor.

"My hands and legs were bound together with tape and then I was dragged into the laundry room. After I was sure he was gone, I worked myself free and telephoned the military police," said Ching.

JEFF BAKER, a Naval Investigative Service special agent said there are no concrete leads but, according to Ching's description, the thief was about 5 feet, 8 inches tall, of medium build and weighed between 160 and 180 pounds. Baker added that the robber is believed to beCaucasian, with a mainland accent.

During the robbery, Ching received razor cuts on his neck and a finger, and a small puncture wound in his back. He said the robber took bills and a sack of quarters, but left the receipts.

Baker said it is unknown how the robber entered and exited the club, but an eyewitness saw a van leaving the area around the time the robbery occurred.

LOU LEGARE, the club manager commented, "This is the first time someone has robbed the safe. We've never had any trouble here before.'

The robbery is under further investigation.

chain sling and its load doesn't begin until the helicopter is about fourfeet above ground. As the rotary-winged helicopter reaches that level, the sling is connected to the bellyhook of the helicopter.

BOWMAN pointed out that the time the helicopter hovers. varies from two to four minutes.

Once the connection has been made, the aircraft is signaled to slowly ascend, and the final go ahead is given to take the load to its destination.

Street Scoop Tobacco ration tempts troops

"The federal government's attempt to stop smoking is another example of institutionalized busy-bodyism. It is abhorrent and two-faced. For example, if we were to go to war tomorrow, do you have any doubt that Uncle Sam would make sure that the men in the trenches were amply supplied with cigarettes?"

Thus reasons the U.S. Senator from California, S.I. Hayakawa, in complaining about the government's current campaign to discourage smoking. And as if to back him up, an official volume of the U.S. Army Center for Military History,"The Quartermaster Corps," mentions a World War II incident when a tobacco shortage, which developed after an allied landing in Italy, was given priority attention. When the troops' supply of tobacco didn't make it to the beaches, Gen Mark Clark twice sent his personal plane to Palermo, Sicily, for tobacco supplies which were brought to a forward air strip and speedily distrubuted to the troops.

In "Up Front," Bill Mauldin expressed the sentiments of the troops when he wrote, "When you wake up in the mud your cigarettes are all wet and you have an ache in your joints and a rattle in your chest. You get back on your feet and bum a cigarette from somebody who had sense enough to keep a pack dry inside the webbing of his helmet liner. The smoke makes the roof of your mouth taste worse but it also makes your forget the big blister on your right heel."

Why does the American fighting man seem to have a need for cigarettes? One World War II combat psychologist explained that the simple act of lighting up along with a few buddies gave the smokers a sense of comradery.

Smoking has been a way of life for the soldier and sailor all the way back to the American Revolution. Even Gen George Washington was no prude when it came to smoking; as a southern planter, he raised tobacco himself. And during lulls in the American Civil War, the troops of the North and South would get together to trade, the Union soldiers swapping food and other supplies for Confederate tobacco.

Although smoking has long been a favorite pastime of the fighting man, there

logic that it can kill just as certainly as a bullet, if not as quickly.

A recent Department of Defense directive now prohibits smoking in certain work areas under certain conditions, thus ensuring that the nonsmoker gets a fair shake by not having to breathe air polluted by smokers.

The Surgeons General of the military services are all behind the Department of Defense in pointing out the perils of smoking, but the Surgeon General of the Navy goes one step further by saying: "As a physician and Surgeon General of the Navy, I am opposed to any form of selfdestructive behavior. Although selfdestruction takes many forms, one of the principal methods is cigarette smoking."

It used to be considered bad luck to light three cigarettes with one match; it has since been proved unlucky to light just one.


I'm sure the job is a tedious one. Among other things they deal with are blinding headlights each morning as Marines and sailors head to work. And that's just the beginning.

The hustle and bustle of the holiday season is not limited to shopping centers and department stores. Airports are also "very busy this time of year. To ease some of the rush, plans for trips should be made as far in advance as possible.

SEVERAL airlines and service organizations are doing what they can to help military travelers. Eleven airlines offer a 50 percent discount furlough fare to active duty military, service academy cadets and personnel traveling within seven days of their discharge.

The 11 airlines, Trans World; American; US Air, Western; United; Continental; Braniff; Northwest; Piedmont; Eastern and Pan Am, are offering the half-off fare on selected routes on a trial basis until March 31. except US Air which has no expiration date. Eighteen additional airlines offer a 25 percent furlough fare discount.

Piedmont offers the 50 percent fare on selected routes with no restriction on dates of travel. The other airlines do not have the discount on Dec. 19, 20 or 24, and Jan. 3, 4 and 5.

TRANS WORLD and US Air offer the 50 percent fare on all domestic flights. The

nine other airlines provide the reduced furlough fare on selected domestic routes only, however, a 25 percent discount is still available on routes where the half-off fare doesn't apply.

To utilize the discount fares personnel must he traveling at their own expense on authorizedleave, pass, furlough, liberty or be a dischargee.

Traveling in uniform is not required but showing a military ID or separation papers to buy tickets may be. Travelers are urged to shop around for the best prices because airline tariffs are constantly changing to meet.competition.

FURLOUGH fare discounts for bus travel are limited to Eastern states and between Eastern and Midwestern states. Fares apply to both one-way and round trip coach tickets and apply year round. The reduced military fares don't apply on the Metro-

liner. Military members in transit have many services available to them at airports around the country. The United Services Organization, Inc. has major lounges located in Atlanta, Chicago, Cleveland, Honolulu,

THE USO also has information centers or desks at airports in Colorado Springs, Colo., Los Angeles, Oakland, Calif., Washington, D.C., Andrews Air Force Base, Md. and Kimpo International Airport, Seoul, Korea. Some USO lounges are open 24hours a day, but most are only open during heavy traffic hours.

Most airlines also offer lounges at major airports around the country. Airline ticket agents at the terminals should have specific information. Military members traveling through the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport can take advantage of the Servicemen's Center, Inc., located on the ticketing concourse. This facility is open 24hours daily, year round and provides free services including refreshments, game room, and a lounge and sleeping area.


FRANCE - Christmas may mean frantic shopping and big bills in January to many
