Pass in Review

Beach access

Beachgoers are using unauthorized access routes to and from MCAS Kaneohe Bay beaches.

According to Maj Malcolm Massie, special services officer, major problem areas are the access to the 13th Tee and Pond

Many Individuals are crossing various areas of the golf course to get to and from the 13th Tee Beach. Massie said that this disrupts golf matches and damages fairways, tees, and greens besides endangering beach patrons.

According to Massie, there are two authorized points of access to the 13th Tee and Pond Road beaches:

Via the Pond Road Park adjacent to the intersection of Pond and Bancroft roads (parking at this facility is restricted to station housing residents) and; via the path extending north from the intersection of Lawrence Road and McClennan Drive, passing between the 3d and 4th fairways (parking for this route is available to all authorized patrons at Coleman Field).

"The road passing between the golf course clubhouse and the racquetball courts is not an authorized beach access

route," noted the major.

According to GySgt Gwinn Henry, operations chief at the Provost Marshal's Office, military police are enforcing the access restrictions. Two measures ensuring compliance are:

Ticketing vehicles not authorized to park in the area and; apprehending persons crossing the golf course for being in a restricted area.

Unauthorized surfers

During the seven-day period from Dec. 23 through 29, 33 illegal surfers were apprehended, processed and escorted off station by the Provost Marshal's Office.

This marked increase in unauthorized surfers has prompted the following information to identify those persons who have authorized access to the beaches.

According to station regulations, only persons in the following categories are authorized to use air station

Active duty servicemembers of the U.S. Armed Forces; Retired members of the U.S. Armed Forces;

Dependents of active duty and retired members of the U.S.

House guests of air station residents. (House guests are defined as persons who reside at least overnight in the household of a resident sponsor. Requirements for a house guest privilege pass can be found in the Station housing Manual provided to air station residents, through the Station Housing Office, or through station regulations.); Civilian employees of the air station; and

Persons with permission in writing from the commanding officer of the air station.

Other than those mentioned, no other person may use air

station beaches.

Pseudofolliculitis barbae

WASHINGTON, D.C. (MCNews) - Commanders having general court-martial authority may now authorize "Convenience of the Government" separations to Marines suffering from pseudofolliculitis barbae, according to ALMAR 235/80.

The facial skin condition, which afflicts many black males, causes extreme irritation when shaving, and those acutely afflicted with it must often grow permanent beards.

Prior to the ALMAR's release, cases of all Marines so afflicted had to be sent here for final determination by medical authorities. Now, the ALMAR states, "When a medical officer determines, after a reasonable period of treatment, that a patient can only control the condition by continual beard growth, the Marine will be processed immediately for separation for the convenience of the

Commemorative stamp

The U.S. Postal Service Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee has agreed to consider a proposal to issue a commemorative postage stamp in honor of the 35th anniversary of the Blue Angels. The team will mark its 35th birthday June 15, 1981.

The committee will meet later this month to review about 1,500 stamp requests. This is the second time in 10 years that the Citizens' Committee has decided to consider the proposal for a commemorative stamp depicting the Blue Angels as the world's oldest flight demonstration squadron. The first time, the squadron lacked the number of years required by the postal service for an organization to apply for the honor.

1981 schedule emphasizes basics

On the move to more and better training, services, and quality of life is the course plotted for 1st Marine Brigade and Marine Corps Air Station units as they enter


Within the brigade, the theme is "back to the basics" and train, train, train. Heavy emphasis will be placed upon traditional Marine Corps requirements such as physical fitness, personal appearance, military courtesy, and overall occupational proficiency.

MARINE CORPS AIR Station units and departments will continue their drive to improve the facilities and services which create a pleasant working and living environment for military and civilian employees and their families. Current plans vary from such ambitious projects as the construction of a new Consolidated Package Store and pizza parlor complex to the completion of normal maintenance on the 7,767foot runway and connecting taxiways.

The year will start off with extensive spring cleaning as both units prepare for a thorough evaluation by the Inspector General of the Marine Corps and his staff. The biannual visit is scheduled for May and current IG checklists are in heavy demand by

Inspections are always a challenge, and the importance of this year's IG review is clear to everyone. BrigGen W.H. Rice, brigade commanding general, emphasized the point, "The 1st Marine Brigade will be inspected for the first time in two years by the IG. Back to basics and mastering the profession of arms is our goal and we have an opportunity to show the commandant, via the IG, just how good we are. This inspection is the high point and it will take a dedicated effort by the whole team to be prepared in all of the various areas that will be evaluated. We constantly demonstrate our proficiency on deployment and the IG gives us an opportunity to make it a matter of record."

FOR BRIGADE UNITS, 1981 looks like the year of the tactical Marine. Combat readiness evaluations and other prepara-



tions required for unit deployments are very familiar to the veterans of Marine Aircraft Group 24, the 3d Marines, Brigade Service Support Group, and Communication Support Company. But early this year, longtime members of the brigade headquarters staff will get an opportunity to strap on '782 gear and test their field skills during a brigade command post exercise.

If the hopes and dreams of the "operators" in brigade G-3 come true, headquarters Marines and sailors will saddle up and hike to Bellows Air Force Station for a week of field work in late February. The hike route has successfully

survived the proposed stage and a full CPX scenario is expected within a few weeks. LtCol Jim Ingram, assistant chief of staff G-3, explained the purpose of the exercise, "We have two reasons for conducting the CPX. First, is to enable Marines on the staff, many of whom have never worked in the field before, to learn to operate under field conditions with tents, field desks, and without the normal garrison-type equipment. "The second reason is to teach

everyone how to function as a staff in a command post environment. We will be running communications to the various subordinate commands. Our junior officers and enlisted Marines will learn staff planning, scenario design, and how to use command/control communications to deal with a simulated higher headquarters and subordinate units.

"The subordinate units will be involved, but only through communications. There will be no tactical play. All will be mapboard

AS THE BRIGADE STAFF brushes up on the care and maintanance of field desks, the 3d Marines will continue to move forward on their well-established deployment training cycle.

"Our primary purpose is preparing battalion landing teams for deployment," stated LtCol J. R. Brandon, 3d Marines executive officer. "We are constantly trying to hone the training schedule to make better use of the time available to train and evaluate our squad through battalion size units. We also want to get all units through the new countermechanized training course."

A glance at the training schedule indicates that time will be a precious commodity. BLT 3/3 completes mid-Pacific operations and heads for the Western Pacific in February. BLT 1/3 returns to a few days of hard work, a short rest, and then back into the training cycle with a readiness evaluation scheduled for October, BLT 2/3 moves into high gear with a CRE during May and deployment in August.

BATTERIES OF ARTILlery pieces are always attached to deployed BLTs, but the howitzers do not stand idle when the unit is out. During May and September the thunder of 105mm and 155mm howitzers will awaken Pele from her slumber in Kilauea crater, not far from Pohakuloa Training Area on the Big Island. The tubes will also get a workout at Kahoolawe during March and April.

Not to be outdone by her sister units, Company D, 3d Assault Amphibian Battalion will hit the surf for landing training every month. Primary exercises are scheduled for Bellows Air Force Station during February, March, April, July, November and December. The tracks will also train at Kahoolawe in May and June.

"There is never any doubt when MAG-24 hits a peak in the training cycle. This is particularly true when training involves the F-4S Phantoms and, in late January, Marine Fighter Attack Squadrons 212 and 232 will be involved in an air-to-air missile proficiency test over the Pacific Missile Range Facility at Barking Sands, Kauai, Missile assistance teams are

Additions expand helicopter capabilities

Squadron gears up for deployment

Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-165 recently took the first step to prepare for its next deployment. Almost 100 people from units stationed at MCAS Kaneohe Bay joined the squadron.

THE SQUADRON was officially composited in December at which time the execution started, explained LtCol Gary Thiry, commanding officer HMM-

HMM-165 will also be augmented by officers and enlisted Marines from Camp Pendleton when they board the Navy's amphibious shipping.

"Planning for the deployment

actually began when we finished our last deployment," said Thiry. "But now we are starting to execute those plans and are faced with new challenges before the next float. We must work as a team to ensure that all our aircraft are ready, and that the squadron runs as a finely-oiled machine.'

HMM-165 TOOK some precautionary steps to guarantee smooth operations during the check-in process by establishing a single check-in point, which included everything except sections such as the armory.

The squadron is also defining critical problems that must be

resolved before combining people from different units. HMM-165 is prepared to meet the challenges that face them.

"This is an interesting and challenging evolution because of the mixture of personalities,' commented Thiry. "Some of these Marines will meet old friends because they've been on floats together before. But for many Marines it will be a new experience."

WITH THE ADDITIONS of more people and helicopters, '165's capabilities have been greatly increased. "Once we are deployed we will have representatives of every type of tactical helicopter the Marine Corps flies," said Thiry.

"The capabilities of the squadron are expanded with these aircraft. We are capable of troop transport as well as heavy lift

"There is no standard table of organization when we're on deployment," explained Thiry. "The squadron is organized to meet the strength necessary to fulfill the mission. Our sole mission is the support of the Battalion Landing Team 3/3 and all our training preparations are devoted to that end. The deployment is the culmination of the total Marine Corps air-ground



Headquarters selects three Regimental Marines for broadened opportunities

Three Marines from the 1st Marine Brigade, have been selected for the Broadened Opportunity for Officer Selection and Training Program.

Sgt Danny Barnes and Cpl William Malone of 1st Battalion, 3d Marines and Sgt Barry McAndrew of 3d Battalion, 3d Marines, plus 29 other Leathernecks from around the Corps, were chosen by this year's BOOST selection board.

THE SELECTIONS were based on overall professional performance and potential for completion of a fouryear college program leading to a commission in the Marine Corps, and evidence of deprivation.

The BOOST Program provides an opportunity for selected people to compete more equitably for selection to the Marine Corps Enlisted Commissioning Education Program, the Naval Academy or Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps. BOOST supplies an educational program to prepare selected Marines to compete for these programs.

THE PROGRAM is open to all active duty enlisted Marines who meet these requirements: Marines must be lance corporals or above and between 19 and 25 years old, with a high school education or have passed the GED with a minimum of 45 percentile in each

Applicants must also possess a minimum GCT of 110 and agree to enlist, reenlist or extend as necessary to

of the five areas.

incur three years active obligated service upon assignment to the BOOST Program. MCO 1560.24B outlines the complete eligibility requirements.

BOOST selectees are assigned to the program in their current grade with full pay, allowances (excluding proficiency pay), promotional opportunities and normal leave.

PARTICIPANTS concentrate on improving their skills in the areas of mathematics, physical science and the communication skills of reading, writing, listening and speaking. Included in the program are educational and personal counseling, develop-

ment of study skills and

and opportunities for participation in social and cultural events.

Since BOOST only prepares Marines who are educationally deprived or of culturally differentiated backgrounds, to be competitive with other Marines applying for commissioning programs, participants do not receive automatic commissions. They still must apply and be accepted into officer programs.

WHILE IN THE BOOST Program, a joint decision is made by the individual, BOOST officials and Headquarters Marine Corps as to which commissioning program the Marine is best qualified.





"... Back to basics and mastering the profession of arms is our goal and we have an opportunity to show the commandant via the IG, just how good we are . . .

Increasing air crew training time and proficiency will be a constant goal for the brigade's air arm. To accomplish this many crews will participate in air-to-air and air-to-ground training during Top Gun and Red Flag evolutions at MCAS Yuma, Ariz. and Nellis Air Force Base, Nev.

Air support of infantry operations will be continuous both in Hawaii and on deployment. Marine Medium Helicopter Squadrons-165 and-262 will link up with BLTs 1/3 and 2/3 respectively to train together before departing for the Western Pacific. For HMM-265, 1981 means a return home in the late spring and a return to the Western Pacific in the late fall with BLT 3/3.

THE FIXED WING community will continue their cycle of deployments to MCAS Iwakuni, Japan. The Lancers of VMFA-212 will be next in the barrel replacing VMFA-235 during March. The Red Devils of VMFA -232 deploy to Iwakuni in October and the Death Angels of VMFA-235 are scheduled to journey to MCAS Yuma in November.

Back on solid ground, Marine Air Control Squadron - 2 will continue to support air operations and send detachments on training exercises. Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron - 24 and Marine Air Base Squadron-24 will be putting in the long hours required to operate the group and keep the jets and helicopters in the air. Administrative and operational support are only part of the package. The ground bound MABS-24 Marines and sailors can plan on wearing out some boots as that unit continues the 10-to-12mile conditioning hikes which began last fall. They are also planning two weeks of field late in February when they will establish a base camp at Bellows

AFS. Everything in the brigade revolves around deployment cycles and this fact is probably most evident to Brigade Service Support Group which fields Marine Amphibious Unit Service Support Groups, handles transportation to and from Pearl Harbor, repairs worn out and damaged equipment, and manages the life supporting supply lines.

Col Edward Mockler, BSSG commanding officer, cited external and internal goals for 1981. "I think that if you check with the unit commanders you will find they are pleased with the support they receive from us. Our external goal is to maintain that level of support and make improvements where necessary.

"IMPROVING THE HAbitability of some of the quarters for our own Marines is our internal goal. The engineers are the only ones in the group still living in everything from new five-ton trucks to tactical table top photocopying machines. The administrative, supply and maintenance procedures associated with this process are rather dry business but it is doubtful whether the combat units will complain about receiving the new lightweight comouflage screening which will make time consuming burlap-stringing parties a thing of the past.

THE BOTTOM LINE for the BSSG in 1981 is to provide top notch service. "Commanders are concentrating on combat readiness and it's our job to support them. We have the experts who can solve problems and it's fun trying to anticipate the requirements of the units to give them what they need. When you put the Marine who needs support together with the Marine who provides it you keep the brigade on the move," concluded Mockler.

At Communication Support Company, the new year is starting off with a test of the unit's communicative skills. "The brigade CPX is going to be a big challenge. We're going to run the entire 'comm' system in the field. The exercise will be the culmination of all our training," stated 1stLt Al Turk, the unit's executive officer.

If all goes well with the introduction of the new AN/TGCcommunication center phase of the exercise should be much easier and more exciting. The huge, selfcontained teletype van replaces hundreds of components which were previously strung together in tents, utility vans, and at times in the backs of Gama Goats.

of ground electronic warfare support for I Marine Amphibious Force, III MAF, and the 1st Marine Brigade. During 1981 they will continue to maintain their traditional detachments in Korea and Japan.

At home in Hawaii, the unit will be upgrading working spaces and participating in the Marine Corps product improvement program, which takes existing communications shelters and upgrades them by installing state-of-the-art electronic equipment.

If all goes well the battalion should receive some new electronic jamming and portable direction finding equipment. If the anticipated support and new equipment materialize, the battalion's goal of winning the Association of Old Crows electronic warfare award for the second consecutive year should be a cinch to attain.

FOR THE 1ST MARINE Brigade and 1st Radio Battalion 1981 means concentration on combat readiness. The General's personal philosophy sets the course, "Combat readiness embodies the total Marine. it is a state of mind, a state of physical being, a mastering of certain skills which is embodied into the fire team or shop. It has to be a constant effort on everyone's part, not something you turn on and off. You are not combat ready for six days a week. Total dedication by all hands is required and that is what the hallmark of the Marines and specifically the 1st Marine Brigade has always been. They. have been ready, willing and capable of performing any mission. Crises are never scheduled. They can happen at any time and our job is to be ready to meet those crises, when called. It is up to each and every Marine to put forth 110 percent effort at all

While brigade units are movin' and shootin', the garrison tenders of the air station will continue to strive to attain the highest possible quality of life for fleet Marines, sailors and their families. During 1980 many support projects such as the new addition to the enlisted club, consolidation of exchange activities under one roof, repainting many buildings, remodeling of 12 bachelor enlisted quarters, Pless Hall Dining Facility improvements, and the upgrading of numerous recreational facilities were completed.

ON THE SERVICE SIDE, Special Services opened a BASS 37, communications central, the ticket outlet, the Armed Services YMCA Outreach program picked up steam, an Aloha Welcoming Committee was formed, and the family housing, medical and consumers councils continued

Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron has a full calendar starting off with support for squadrons transiting between the Mainland and WestPac in February. Repairs to the runway and taxi ways are expected to continue until March. Hopes were high for commencement of a tower improvement project and installation of a radar operational facility, but those programs have been delayed until at least Fiscal Year 1982. As in the past, heavy emphasis will be placed upon maintaining high quality Search and Rescue training and support.

THE STATION DEPARTment to really watch is Personal Services. Established last fall under the direction of LtCol Pete Pistelli, the new department includes the Marine Corp Exchange, Command Club Management System, Special Services, Family Services Center; and the Counseling and Assistance Center. More, high quality service is expected with emphasis on family, women's youth and recreational programs.

Plane captains oversee pilots' flight

"We always say the planes are ours when we fly them, but in reality, the aircraft reality, the aircraft belong to the plane captains. Pilots just borrow them," said "Capt Mike Harrington, Marine Fighter Attack Squadron-232 safety

officer responding to the question, "Are plane captains impor-tant?"

SSgt Kenneth Bell, line division chief for VMFA-232 MCAS Kaneohe Bay, feels that not only are plane captains important,

this there are many things they must take into consideration. "Plane captains must be able to examine an aircraft and judge things," stated Bell. "Those 'birds' land at

there is a little cut in a tire it could mean disaster."

IN ADDITION to sound judgement, plane captains must be alert and quick. "These guys must always be on their toes because if a fire starts on the plane. they are usually the first to see it. They must alert the pilot and then put the fire out," explained Harrington.

"The plane captains must also have some knowledge of every shop in the squadron," said Bell. "When they find a problem with the aircraft they must immediately know which shop to call to get the problem fixed.

As plane captains we have the authority to ground the plane if there is something wrong," continued Bell.
"If something can't be fixed right away, we tell fly, and he has to abide by that.'

RECENTLY, LCpl Irvin Archer, a plane captain, and Sgt Jon

non-commissioned officer-in-charge of the flight line, were able to save one of the aircraft from a possible

disaster.
"I had done the preflight check on the plane. During the final check, Archer told me he smelled something burning toward the back of the plane. I felt below the landing flaps. They were hot so that meant something

must have been wrong."
"When we discovered this, we signaled for the pilot to let down the flaps," stated Archer. "After we examined them we cancelled the flight because a valve didn't close properly and there was hot air blowing on bare metal. We would have lost the plane if we had let it fly," he said.

"THIS IS AN example of the trust between the pilot and the plane captain," said Harrington. "I was in that plane and I couldn't tell if anything was wrong. Because our warning light in the

cockpit was burnt out."
"Despite the problems that occur from being a plane captain,
this job is very
rewarding," stated
Archer. "It's great
when I see my plane
'flying and know that it
is there because of me."



After experiencing a crash landing, the pilot of the aircraft regains consciousness. His Vision blurred, he tries to sit up in the back of the ambulance. Then realizes there's something in his hand. He lays back on the tretcher, examining he green card which

"Congratulations, you have just been assisted by the best damn Crash and Fire Rescue section in the United States Marine - Marine Corps Air Station, Kancohe Bay, Hawaii. You crash, We dash."

Fortunately, nobody can recall when the last card was given out.

"THE PRIMARY mission of crash crew is to save lives," stated MSgt David Turpin, crash chief. "Our secondary mission is total extinguishment of all fires and salvage of the wreckage. Since we are rarely called, our weekly schedule consists mainly of maintenance and training."

"There are approxi-mately 24 men assigned to a section plus a complement of day

"Two sections are always on duty," the master sergeant con-tinued. "Each week they work 24 hours on duty and 24 hours off and two of the working-days are strung to-gether so each man has a two-day weekend.

"THIS UNIT is set up like other crash crews in the Marine Corps. The Marines are from two different units, Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron and Marine Air Base Squadron-24. In the event MABS-24 deploys to another location, their personn'el and equipment participating in the fleet assistance pro-

gram would operate a crash unit at the new

Crash crew main-tains a fleet of vehicles from the Marine air group and the air station. Most of the crash trucks have four men assigned to them,

driver/operator, a handline man, a turret man and a rescue man. The command vehi-

cle, a pickup truck with a two man crew, responds to the scene carpying forcible entry gear and first aid equipment. The truck also carries the "jaws of life," a tool capable of 10,000 pounds of power lift. With this piece of rescue: apparatus a

crew can remove persons trapped inside

CRASH CREW also has the MRS tractor for towing crippled aircraft and the 30-ton Osh kosh crane which can be used for lifting inverted aircraft.

MSgt Sam Meridieth explained the pro-cedures the crews cedures the crews practice in case of an emergency. "The first truck on the acene will go straight for the cockpit. Most of the water will be concentrated on the fuselage to cool it and enable the rescue accompanied by a handline man to attempt the removal of

the pilot and copilot. When all personnel are safe, crash crew will extinguish all fires. Then it is our role to remove the burned

Meridieth added, Our men are trained in qualified cardiopulmonary resuscitation instructors.


