

Marines must maintain initial issue

WASHINGTON, D.C. Officals at Headquarters Marine Corps report that large numbers of former active duty Marines are reporting to duty with Marine Corps Reserve units with less than

the required uniform items. Marine Corps Order P10120. 28D, paragraph 01040, requires that personnel leaving active duty prior to completion of a six-year obligation, must retain their initial issue of uniform items.

who return to active duty within three months of separation must bring with them all uniform clothing items that they had when they got out. Only clothing that was either recovered by the Marine Corps or not issued during the previous enlistment may be issued to the Marine at no expense.

It points out that individuals

Reporting to duty with a reserve unit has similar requirements.

Persons must check in with all the uniform items they were required to have at the time of release from active duty. That is why minimum clothing requirements must be retained by persons still under service obligation as part of the inactive reserve. If called back to active duty or the reserves, the clothing items must be on hand. The order directs commanding

officers to ensure that Marines leaving active duty before

completing their initial six-year obligation possess all the required uniform items. All the items must be serviceable at the time of separation.

ALMAR 103/81 reminds commanders at all levels to make sure their personnel are aware of the contents of clothing retention portions of the order. Persons with questions concerning what items must be kept and by whom, should

Raise reimburses service members Travel allowances and rates increase

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Congress has approved an increase in the Monetary Allowance in Lieu of Transporta-tion and Per Diem rates for military members with permilitary members with per-manent change of station orders. The change was announced in NAVOP 093/81 of July 2. The raise is from seven to 13 cents per mile for MALT and from \$35 to \$50 for per dism. for per diem

ACCORDING TO the message, the rates are in effect for all personnel whose PCS orders have an effective date of July 1 or later. It also says that persons transferring PCS are entitled to both the MALT and per diem allowances and that receipts are not required to substantiate the

\$50 per diem rate. Because the new rates are based on the effective date of orders, many people who detached from their old commands before July 1 may still be authorized the higher rates. The effective date of orders is defined as the date a member is required to commence travel from the old permanent or last temporary duty station, which-ever is applicable in order to arrive at the new duty station by the data at the new duty station by the date indicated by using the mode of travel authorized.

FOR EXAMPLE, a Marine was ordered to a new duty station and detached from his old station June 1. He was authorized lödays leavs, four days proceed, 24 days

temporary duty en route, and seven days travel time from there seven days travel time from there to his new station. He was required to report to the new permanent station July 21. The effective date of his orders would be July 15, thus authorizing payment of the higher rates. This is because the effective date is determined by subtracting only travel time from the actual

reporting date. Leave, proceed and temporary duty en route serve to delay the reporting date and therefore the effective date of

orders. The approved increase in rates is a significant step toward adequate reimbursement for PCS moves. These increases, along with rates of seven cents per mile for dependents 12 years or older

and three and one half cents per mile for dependents ages 2 through 11, is believed will help defer most on-the-road expenses incurred during PCS travel Additional PCS travel reim bursement initiatives are under

active consideration by Congress and, if enacted, will further reimburse service members for costs associated with PCS orders

Official delegates awarding authority to 13 Marine commanding generals

WASHINGTON, D.C., - The WASHINGTON, D.C., — The Secretary of the Navy has granted approval for the Commandant of the Marine Corps to sub-delegate authority for awarding the Navy Achievement Medal to 13 additional Marine Corps commanding generals,

According to ALMAR 114/81

According to ALMAR 114/81, the move came about "to provide more timely recognition to junior officers and enlisted Marines." The 13 commande receiving awarding authority for the medal are MCRDs, Parris Island and San Diego; MCB s, Camp LeJeune and Camp Pendleton; MCLBs, Albany and Barstow; MCAS, Cherry Point and El Toro; MCAGCC, 29 Paims; LFTCPAC and LFTCLANT; and 4th MarDiv and 4th MAW.

"A most effective means of enhancing morale is prompt and appropriate recognition exceptional performance," stated a personnel services official here.

"It is also essential to pres the character and meaning of all awards: therefore, recommen-dations must he carefully and thoroughly prepared and documented."

Awards recognizing specific accomplishments or acts should be made as soon as possible after

be made as soon as possible after the event occurs. A maximum of 30 days from submission should be the target goal of delivery. An official in the Personnel Services Division explained that sustained superior performance is more appropriately recognized at

the completion of an assigned

duty. However, he added, "In no instance is it to be considered outine to recognize Marines at the end of a tour."

Recommendations for the Navy Achievement Medal are to be prepared on the current award recommendation form and forwarded to the commanding general who has jurisdiction over the individual being recommend ed. Award recommendations for members of personal staffs are to be forwarded to CMC for appropriate action






