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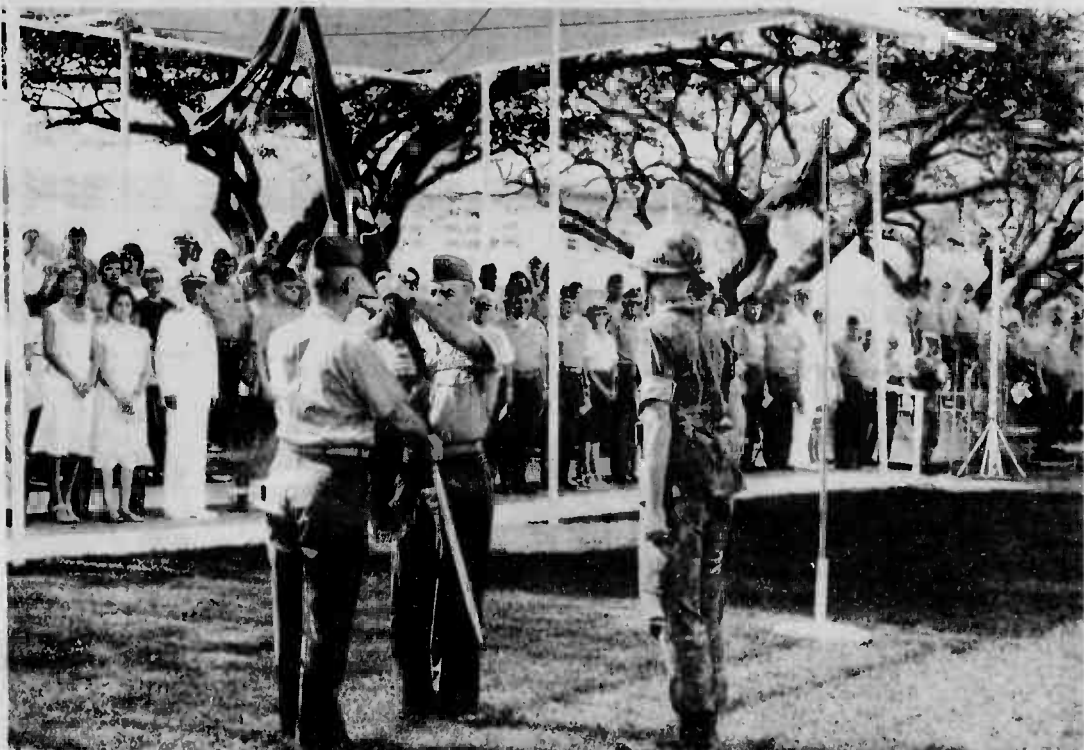

Parade plans march ahead

Kailua, Hawaii — The 34th Kailua 4th of July Parade is currently in the planning stage with upcoming committee meetings scheduled.

Among those organizations planning the parade are the Kailua Jaycees, American Legion, Windward Kiwanis, Exchange Club of Kailua, Koolau Poles Lions, National Association of Retired Federal Employees, Corvette Club of Hawaii, Kailua Chamber of Commerce and Marine Corps Air Station, Kaneohe Bay.

"Patriotism; one nation indivisible" is the theme for this year's parade and festivities that will culminate in a fireworks display on Flat Island off Kailua Beach. The fireworks display will begin at 8 p.m. and is scheduled to last about an hour.

Monetary donations as well as donations of time and labor are being solicited at this time. In addition, several 11- to 18-foot boats are needed to transport the Kailua Jaycees out to Flat Island to set up the fireworks display. Anyone interested in donating to the 4th of July campaign should contact Kathy Rhodes at the Kailua Chamber of Commerce, 261-2727.

Parade entries, including floats, marching units and bands, choral units and novelty acts from schools, churches, businesses, military services and other organizations, are also being solicited. Groups interested in participating in the Kailua 4th of July Parade should contact Kathy Rhodes or Jack Richardson, parade chairman, at 262-1211.

The parade is scheduled to begin at 1 p.m. Starting at O'ahu Road in Kailua, the parade will travel a

little more than a mile down North Kainalu Drive, ending at the Kailua Intermediate School on South Kainalu Drive. The reviewing stand for the parade will be located at St. Christopher's Church.

According to Richardson, approximately 2,900 people and 120 entries participated in the 1981 Kailua 4th of July Parade.

An Arts and Crafts Fair is also planned for the 4th of July. The fair will be held in the parking lots of the Kailua Elementary School and the Kailua Library, at a time to be announced. In addition to the arts and crafts, refreshments will also be for sale. According to Richardson, entertainment is also planned at the Arts and Crafts Fair.

A Renaissance Festival, sponsored by the Hawaii Loa College, is scheduled to be held during the 4th of July weekend.

The festival will be held in the meadows and forest of the lower campus of Hawaii Loa College June 26 and 27, July 3 and 4 and July 10 and 11.

Admission to the Renaissance Festival will be \$7 for adults. The price for children has not yet been determined. According to John Leonard, coordinator for the festival, tickets should become available through all HITS locations about a month before the festival.

A cast of hundreds, dressed in costumes of the Renaissance period, will present period entertainment throughout the day. There will also be game booths and vendors selling arts and crafts of the period and refreshments including turkey legs and "toad in the hole." Fast food items will not be sold at the Renaissance Festival according to Leonard.

Women injured in car crash

Marines aid accident victims

CAMP H.M. SMITH, Hawaii — If it weren't for two Camp Smith Marines who stopped and assisted Catherine Burcham and Audrey Park, the women might not be alive today.

Ms. Burcham, the 25-year-old daughter of Mrs. Park, was driving their car toward Honolulu March 13 when she apparently decided to overtake and pass a vehicle in front of them. However, as she started to pass the other vehicle, their car went out of control, hit a guard rail and slammed into a concrete abutment.

MOMENTS AFTER the accident occurred, Staff Sergeant Thomas Linton Jr. and Corporal Guy Moore, members of Service Company, Headquarters and Service Battalion, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, drove by.

"After seeing what had happened, we turned our car around and got out to see what assistance we could render," Linton said. "Both of the women in the car were pinned in and they appeared to be hurt seriously."

Knowing that they were most likely seriously injured and there

did not seem to be any danger of fire, the two Marines decided to aid the women right in the vehicle. "Cpl Moore crawled into the vehicle and began to aid the passenger," Linton said. "The passenger had her abdominal area slashed open and her intestines were hanging out so he took her hands and placed them next to her abdominal area in order that she could hold her own intestines in."

At the same time Moore was aiding Mrs. Park, Linton was trying to keep her daughter calm. "I saw that the driver's arm was fractured; her bone was sticking out of it and it appeared that she had knocked most of her teeth out," Linton said. "The woman kept leaning her head back as if she was going into shock and passing out, making it a good possibility that she might choke to death on her own blood that was streaming from her mouth."

KNOWING THERE wasn't much he could do for Ms. Burcham, Linton just talked with her so she would keep calm and not go into shock. Meanwhile, Moore finished helping Mrs. Park, got out of the car and directed traffic.

After what seemed to be 15

minutes, according to Linton and Moore, the ambulance arrived and took the two accident victims to Tripler Army Medical Center.

"You hear a lot about blood and

guts, but when you actually see an accident that thought sticks with you for a long time," Linton said. "I'm just glad we were able to help."

Vehicles

New decals issued unit by unit

The Department of Defense vehicle stickers have arrived here, but don't rush to Pass and Registration — the decals will be issued on a unit-by-unit basis.

Temporary passes that expired March 31 have been extended to the end of April to give drivers a chance to obtain a decal. Other installations on Oahu have been notified to prevent any inconvenience.

Units scheduled to deploy will receive first priority, followed by other commands, civilian employees and retired military.

Vehicles will be registered at the unit's work section, where all necessary paperwork will be handled. Individuals need a military ID card (or dependent/civilian employee card), title, registration, proof of no-fault

insurance, driver's license and safety inspection sticker. Motorcyclists will also have to have a motorcycle safety course certificate from here — others won't be accepted. All documents must be current to be acceptable.

Working spouses of deployed Marines may register their vehicles during special sessions planned for various Saturdays.

The decals will be placed on the driver's side front bumper, or affixed to a permanently attached metal plate (provided by the owner) on the driver's side front bumper.

Officers and noncommissioned officers in charge may obtain additional information by calling Sergeant Mike Dahms at 257-2047.

Bad checks tie up exchange systems' cash

"We're like trustees holding money for the Marines' recreation fund. Writing bad checks is like stealing that money from another Marine," commented Major Thomas Loughlin, exchange officer.

The major was discussing the impact dishonored checks have on the exchange system, and most important, its patrons. "Bad checks tie up cash, and we can't buy merchandise," he explained. Although the problem is constant, he said, it is improving.

"In 1980 we wrote off more checks than in '81, so it's getting better," Loughlin credited command emphasis and support for the uplift.

LAST YEAR THE exchange did almost \$29 million in business. It cashed 430,095 checks, which represented more than \$16 million. Of the number of checks cashed, 3,474 were returned, totaling \$141,339, and 98 were written off for a loss of \$3,992. \$32,196 were collected in service charges. According to the major, in spite of these figures, the exchange has a 98 percent reimbursement rate.

Loughlin views the bad check problem philosophically. He says that the majority of people who write checks, do so honestly without intent to defraud the government. He believes they have every intention of redeeming their checks, if one should be returned.

Winnie Chrimer, the exchange's

dishonored check clerk, attributes a primary cause to mismanagement of funds. "Most young Marines don't know how to balance checkbooks," she commented. According to her statistics, of the young Marine who write checks, most of the offenders are corporals through staff sergeants.

In November last year, a check verification system was installed in the exchange facilities. This computer hook-up costs \$15,000 per month to rent. Since its installation, Loughlin said it has been an immeasurable convenience.

WITH THIS ADDITION it is almost impossible to pass a worthless check. At the touch of a few buttons, checking

information about the customer is provided in seconds. The coded information could loosely be interpreted as "yes," "no," and "absolutely not."

Although the check verification system requires that the exchange operate with a slight overhead, Loughlin said it is worth it, considering the quick service customers will receive.

Bogus checks are not only plaguing the exchange, but the commissary as well. Captain James Morris, commissary officer, calls the matter, "a definite headache. It's very time consuming because 10 percent of an employee's time is spent calling people."

Like the exchange, the commissary's reimbursement rate is extremely high at 99 percent. But unlike the exchange, the

commissary does not levy a service charge for dishonored checks. Morris said it would be an "administrative nightmare" to do so.

In fiscal year '80, 258 checks were returned to the commissary for insufficient funds. They tallied \$13,613, and three of those checks had to be written off. But in FY '81, there was a marked increase in bad check activity at the commissary: 303 returned, totaling \$24,190. According to the captain, none have been written off.

"We try for a year to get a check redeemed. If we can't, then we write it off," explained Morris. He added, "We will exhaust every means of doing it."

Courts-Martial Report

EDITOR'S NOTE: The information contained in Courts-Martial Report is compiled by the Joint Legal Services Center and is published as a source of information for all Marines.

Private First Class Ene Saipua, Marine Air Base Squadron-24, 1st Marine Brigade, was convicted at trial by general court-martial of rape and sodomy. He was sentenced to 20 years confinement at hard labor, total forfeiture of all pay and allowances, reduction to private and a dishonorable discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

Corporal Earl R. Harris, Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron-24, 1st Marine Brigade, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of unauthorized absence from Feb. 1 to July 15, 1981; from Dec. 3 to Dec. 8, 1981; and of disrespectful language toward a gunnery sergeant and

willfully disobeying an order of the same gunnery sergeant.

He was sentenced to reduction to lance corporal and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

Lance Corporal Thomas J. Broughton, 1st Battalion, 12th Marines, 1st Marine Brigade, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of disobeying a lawful order; and of the sale, possession and transfer of 6.88 grams of marijuana.

He was sentenced to six months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$366 pay per month for six months, reduction to private and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

Staff Sergeant Edward T. Savage, Marine Air Control Squadron-2, 1st Marine Brigade, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of unlawfully

striking a female in the face and body with his fist and feet; and on a second date, unlawfully striking the same female about the face and stomach with his fists and kicking her head and body with his feet.

He was sentenced to two months confinement at hard labor and reduction to sergeant.

Private Robert S. Frison, Brigade Service Support Group, 1st Marine Brigade, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of unauthorized absence from 7 a.m., Nov. 2 to 7:01 a.m., Nov. 3, 1981; of twice negligently failing to prepare for inspections; of disobeying orders of noncommissioned officers on three occasions, and of staff noncommissioned officers on three occasions; of failing to go to an inspection; and of failing to go to work.

He was sentenced to five months confinement at hard

labor, forfeiture of \$200 pay per month for five months and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

Lance Corporal William P. Benoit Jr., Battalion Landing Team 3d Battalion, 3d Marines, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of the wrongful possession and transfer of 3.18 grams of marijuana.

He was sentenced to two months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$300 pay per month for two months and reduction to private first class.

LCpl Paul R. Lovier Jr., BLT 3/3, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of the wrongful possession and transfer of 2.5 grams of marijuana.

He was sentenced to 45 days confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$300 pay per month for two months and reduction to private first class.

State litter control campaign sets goals

The military community of Hawaii has been asked to join with the civilian communities to support and participate in a statewide litter control campaign during the month of April.

Goals of the campaign include the cleanup of 300 litter sites; soliciting volunteer groups and organizations to adopt all parks and help keep them clean for one year; the development of 20 neighborhood beautification committees; raising \$10,000 for

county beautification funds; collecting \$100,000 anti-litter pledges; obtaining 1,600 participating groups and organizations with 300,000 persons participating; and winning the 1982 Keep America Beautiful National Award.

Significant events taking place during the campaign include a Weepul Walk during April which is a door to door canvas to collect anti-litter pledges; and beautification projects.

An awards presentation will be held May 25. Groups will be awarded cash prizes ranging from \$100 to \$5,000.

Individuals, groups and organizations willing to

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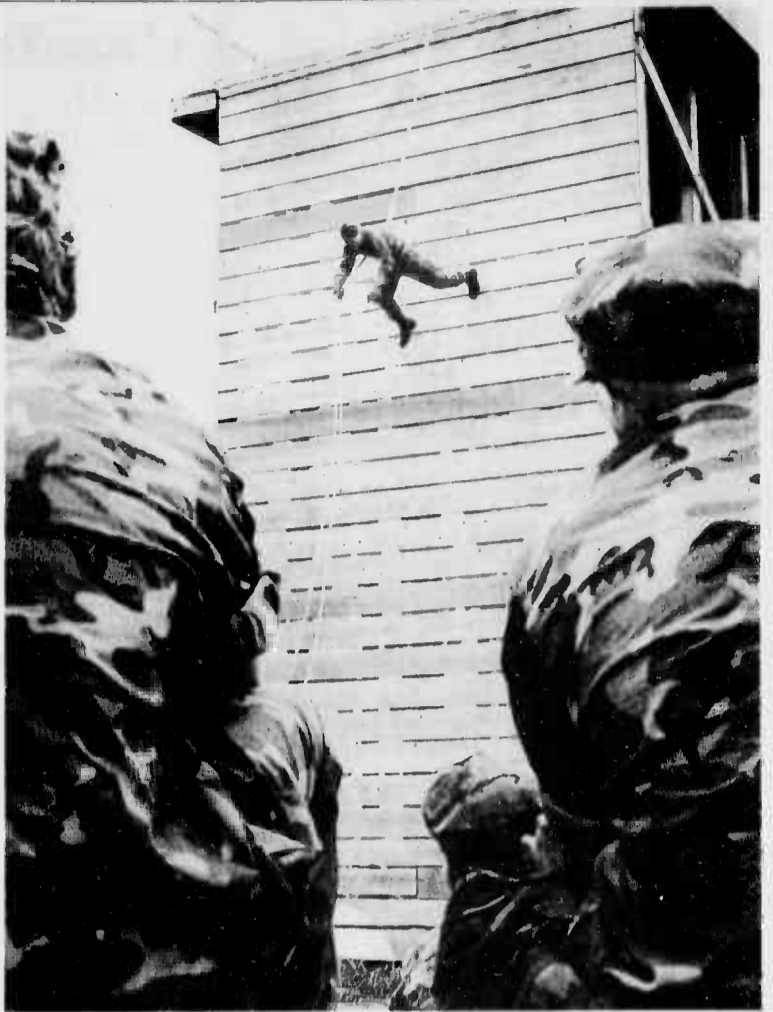

Young military students enjoy orientation training and Hawaiian paradise

They look like Marines — in a way. They wear camouflaged utilities, but their rank insignia is different, their hair is long and they look too young to be Marines.

They're Junior ROTC students from Snohomish, Wash.

THIRTY JROTC STUDENTS, accompanied by 12 Royal Canadian Army Cadets from British Columbia, spent 10 days of orientation training here. Demonstrations by 3d Reconnaissance Battalion, Detachment, Company A, 3d Assault Amphibious Battalion; familiarization firing with the M-16 and other classes took most of their time.

Sightseeing excursions to the Polynesian Culture Center, Pearl Harbor Naval Base and other sites were included to give the youngsters a break from the military routine.

"It's been really first class," said Captain William Fowler of the Royal Canadian Forces. This was the first trip to Hawaii for Fowler and his

charges. In fact, this was the first time for cadet Irene Jolicœur to step foot anywhere in the United States.

"Your slang is weird," Jolicœur commented. "But everyone seems nice." The 17-year-old "senior" enjoyed seeing the bends treatment recovery room at Pearl Harbor (she plans to become a medic) and was impressed with the population of the station, which is twice as large as her home town of Revelstoke, British Columbia, she said. Jolicœur also explained she wasn't a senior, but in the year 12 graduation year, at her high school.

FOR THE JROTC sponsor, Major Bob Adams, the station wasn't new — just different. The retired Marine spent three tours here: 1958-60, 1964-65, and 1967-68. "It's still fairly easy to find your way around here," Adams said. "There have been several changes — like the exchange system, which is considerable better now. One thing that hasn't changed is the quality of the Marines. They were good then, and they're good now."

Adams explained that the JROTC program is designed to develop leadership ability in high school students. The retired major teaches leadership classes at Snohomish High School with another retired Marine, Master Sergeant Dick Daly.

The biggest difference between JROTC and its Canadian counterpart is school. JROTC is part of the school curriculum, while the Canadians have their meetings and training after school, Adams explained.

The RCAC and JROTC students are not strangers. The two groups work together with exchange programs, banquets and other outings throughout the year.

One thing both groups agreed on was that the weather here is better than back home. Kurt McGowan, a freshman at Snohomish High School, said the weather he left behind wasn't too bad, but it sure is better here.

McGowan spent a lot of time filming their activities with a video camera, and by the time he headed back to Washington, April 3, he had used more than six hours of tape.

Drug education guide increases awareness

WASHINGTON (NES) ... Drug abuse has many faces. It is the chain smoker who can't quit. It is the woman who starts her day with a diet pill for a pickup and who ends it with a sedative to get to sleep. It is the man who can only unwind with the help of several drinks. It is the 12-year-old who sniffs glue, or the addict who shoots heroin. Above all, it is a person retreating from reality. To increase your awareness about drugs, the following information is offered:

Amphetamines

Proper names — Benzadrine, Desoxyn, Dexedrine, Biphetamine.
Slang names — Uppers, Pep Pills, Bennies, Meth, Speed or Hearts.
Classification — Stimulant.
Medical uses — Hyperactive children, narcolepsy (frequent and uncontrollable desire for sleep) and weight reduction.
Symptoms of abusers — Excitability, restlessness, tremors, insomnia, sweating, dry mouth and lips, bad breath, dilated pupils, increased pulse rate/blood pressure and psychoses.

Barbiturates

Proper names — Nembutal, Seconal.
Slang names — Downers, Goof Balls, Barbs or Reds.
Classification — Depressant.
Medical uses — Sedatives, treatment of high blood pressure, epilepsy and insomnia.
Symptoms of abusers — Similar to alcohol intoxication without its odor. Drowsiness, confusion, incoordination, tremors, depressed pulse rate and blood pressure, and respiratory depression.

Cocaine

Proper Names — Cocaine.
Slang name — Snow, Dust, C or Coke.

Classification — Narcotic.
Medical use — Local anesthetic for mucous membranes.
Symptoms of abusers — Excitability, anxiety, increased pulse rate, nausea, hallucinations, dilated pupils and possible violent behavior. Also often combined with heroin.

Ethyl Alcohol

Proper names — Alcoholic beverages.
Slang names — Booze, Liquor, Cocktail, Moonshine, White Lightning or Fire Water.
Classification — Intoxicant.
Medical uses — None.
Symptoms of abusers — Poor judgment, incoordination, slurred speech, staggering, coma, odor of alcohol on breath.

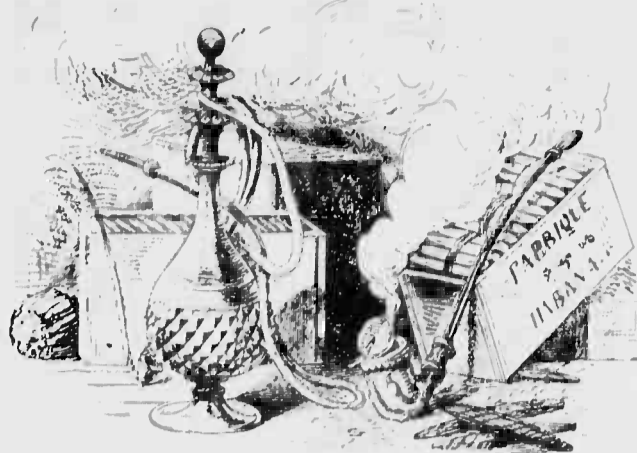
Hallucinogens

Proper names — Psilocybin, Mescaline, Lysergic Acid Diethylamide and Dimethyltryptamine.
Slang names — LSI, STP, DMT, Acid, Cubes, Sugar or Zen.
Classification — Hallucinogen.
Medical uses — None. Some experimental use.

Symptoms of abusers — Trance-like state, confusion, tremors, hallucinations, euphoria, depression, increased pulse rate, dilated pupils and psychoses.

Heroin

Proper name — Heroin.
Slang names — Horse, H, Smack, Junk, Joy Powder or Dupe.
Classification — Narcotic.
Medical Uses — None.
Symptoms of abusers — Euphoria, lethargy, drowsiness, slurred speech, flushing of skin on face, neck and chest, chronic constipation, nausea, constricted pupils, needle scars on arms and legs and coma.



Marijuana

Proper name — Cannabis sativa.
Slang names — Pot, Grass, Weed, Acapulco Gold, Smoke, loco Weed or Reefer.
Classification — Intoxicant.
Medical uses — Used experimentally in reducing eye pressure in glaucoma patients and in controlling side effects in treatment of cancer patients.
Symptoms of abusers — Odor of burned rope on breath, euphoria, mood swings, increased appetite, confusion and drunkenness.

Methadone

Proper name — Dolphine.
Slang names — Dollies, Dolls.
Classification — Narcotic.
Medical uses — Relieves pain resulting from withdrawal from other narcotics.
Symptoms of abusers — Euphoria,

lethargy, drowsiness, slurred speech, flushing of skin on face, neck and chest, chronic constipation, nausea, constricted pupils and coma.

Morphine

Proper name — Morphine.
Slang names — Morpho, M, Hocus, Miss Emma, White Stuff or Dope.
Classification — Narcotic.
Medical use — Relieves pain.
Symptoms of abusers — Euphoria, lethargy, drowsiness, slurred speech, flushing of skin on face, neck and chest, chronic constipation, nausea, constricted pupils, needle scars on arms and legs and coma.

Non-Barbiturate Depressants

Proper names — Noctec, Equanil, Miltown, Noludar, Doriden, Placidyl, Quaalude, Valium and Librium.

Slang names — Tranquilizers, muscle relaxants or sleeping pills.
Classification — Depressant.
Medical uses — Sedation, tranquilization and relief of muscle spasms.

Symptoms of abusers — Similar to alcohol intoxication without its odor. Drowsiness, confusion, incoordination, tremors, depressed pulse rate/blood pressure and respiratory depression.

Organic Solvents

Proper names — Aerosols, Airplane glue, Gasoline, Thinner and the like.
Slang names — Sniffing or Glue Sniffing.
Classification — Intoxicant.
Medical uses — None.

Symptoms of abusers — Similar to alcohol intoxication without its odor. Nausea, vomiting, liver, nerve and blood damage, hallucinations and psychoses.

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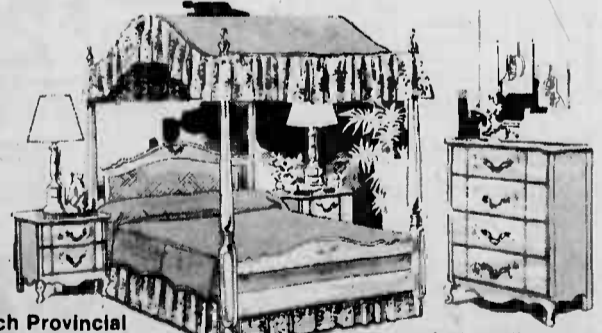

Cable car

Workers dismantle abandoned ferry system atop Ulupau Crater

Workers from the Facilities Department aboard the air station began to dismantle history March 19. In this case, history was in the form of an abandoned cable car.

"The cable car was constructed in 1942 by Naval Air Station, Kaneohe," explained Thomas Tam, Facilities inventory clerk. "The system was designed to ferry personnel to the top of Ulupau

Crater." The height of the crater is 683 feet.

Marine Air Control Squadron-2 used the cable car system extensively during their tenure atop the crater. "The Eyes of the First Marine Brigade" stood guard high above the rest of the station.

"MACS-2 used the system from early 1960 until late 1970, before we moved to our present location

near Pyramid Rock," said 1st Lieutenant Ed Lewis, MACS-2 communications officer.

Workers used a cutting torch to slice through the years of rust and neglect. The overgrown foliage, which had served as a living tomb,

was quickly stripped away by a machete. The cable car now sits in quiet resignation, awaiting its final voyage to the scrap yard.

As Thomas Fuller once said, "Welcome death, quoth the rat, when the trap fell."

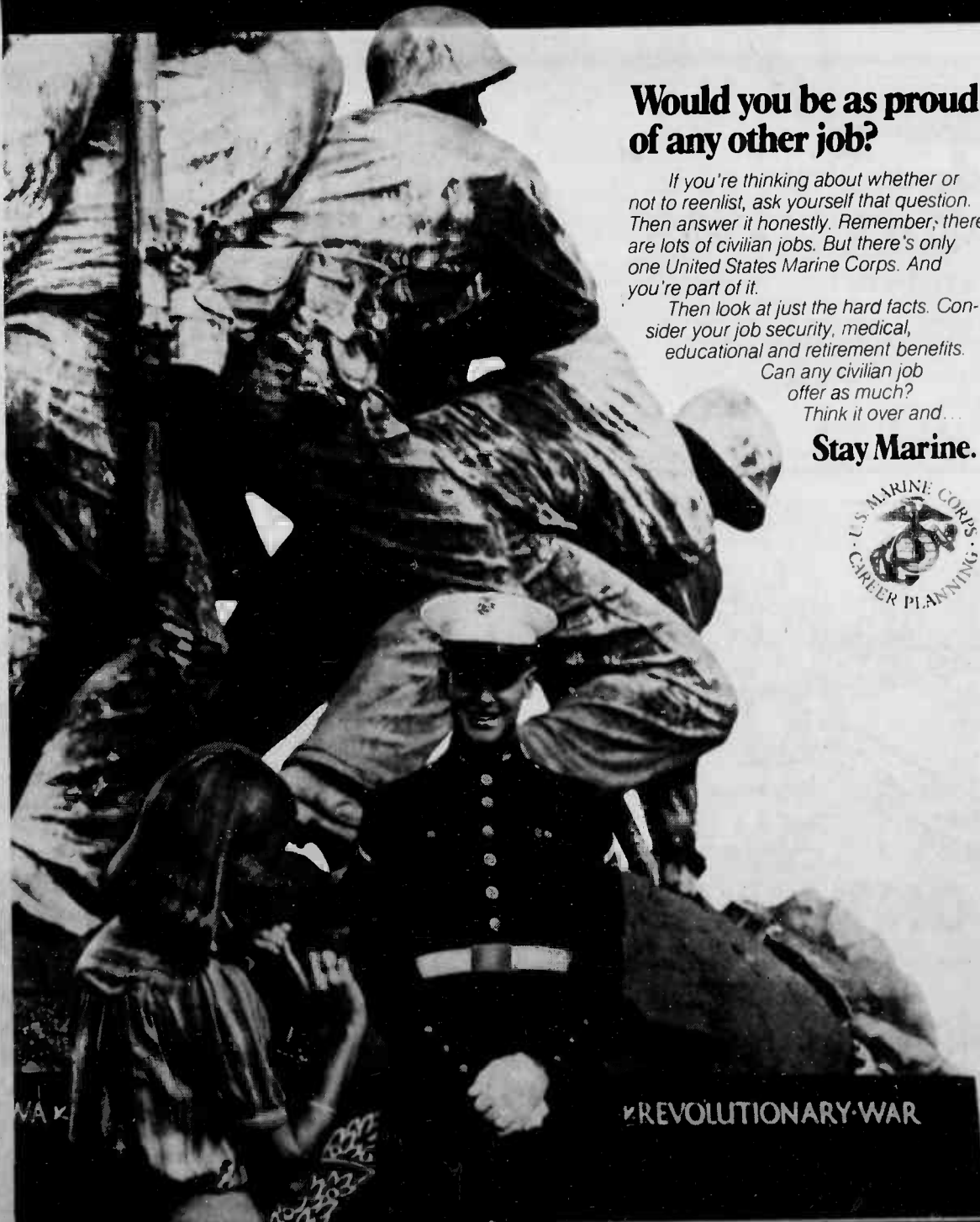

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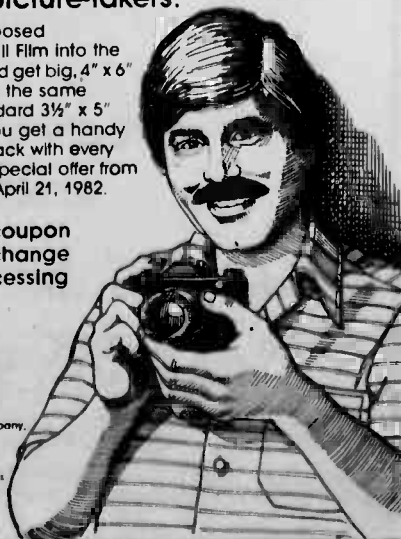
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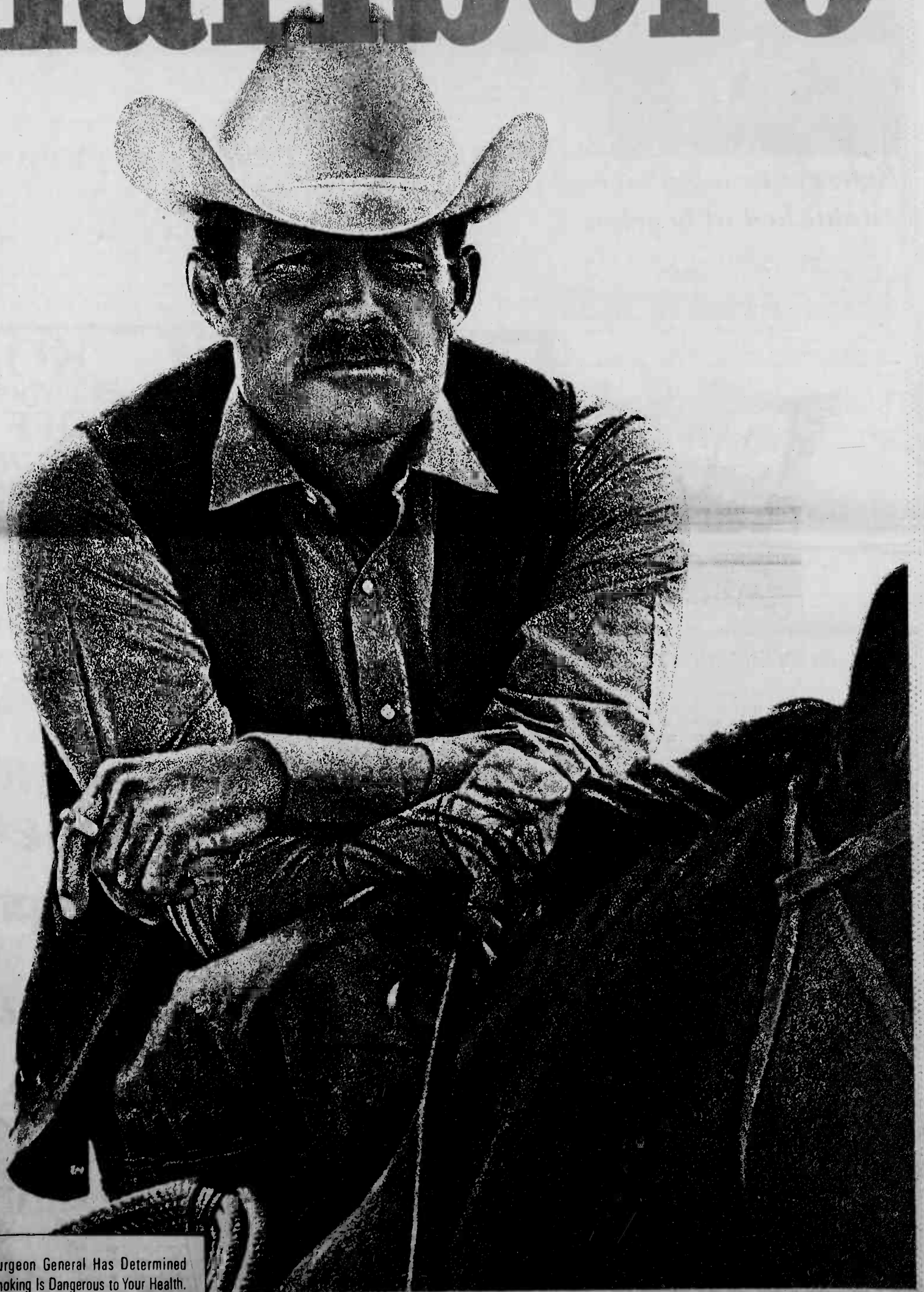
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Marine grapplers capture four trophies

FORT SHAFTER, Hawaii — Private First Class Wayne Hall, wrestling in the 163-pound class, captured the first place trophy Saturday at the Army Open Invitational Wrestling tournament here. Marines also placed in three other weight divisions.

Corporal David Boucher, coach of the Hawaii Marine Team, was defeated in the final match and settled for second place in the 198-pound class.

Third place trophies went to 220-pound 1st Lieutenant William Fell of Lualaba's Guard Company and Sergeant Ralph Drake, a 180-pounder assigned to Naval Air Station, Barbers Point.

"Overall, it was a tough tournament," commented

Hall. Talking about the Army's Darryl Mann of Schofield Barracks, Hall continued, "He was very competitive. It was a real workout for my arms. I pinned him last night in the Greco-Roman wrestling matches. He came back tough, but I stayed with him." Hall won the match 8-3. Mann took second place in his weight division in both the freestyle and the Greco-Roman matches.

Hall feels that if the wrestling program had more support, the team would have better results. "The Corps should sponsor tournaments on base so Marines could see what wrestling is all about," he added.

Boucher also found the going tough. In his final match he challenged the 19-year-old Clayton Smith, a senior in Kailua High School.

Smith won the match 8-4, but this was no disgrace to Boucher. Smith was the 1981 national champion in both freestyle and Greco-Roman wrestling and is presently this year's state champion in his weight class.

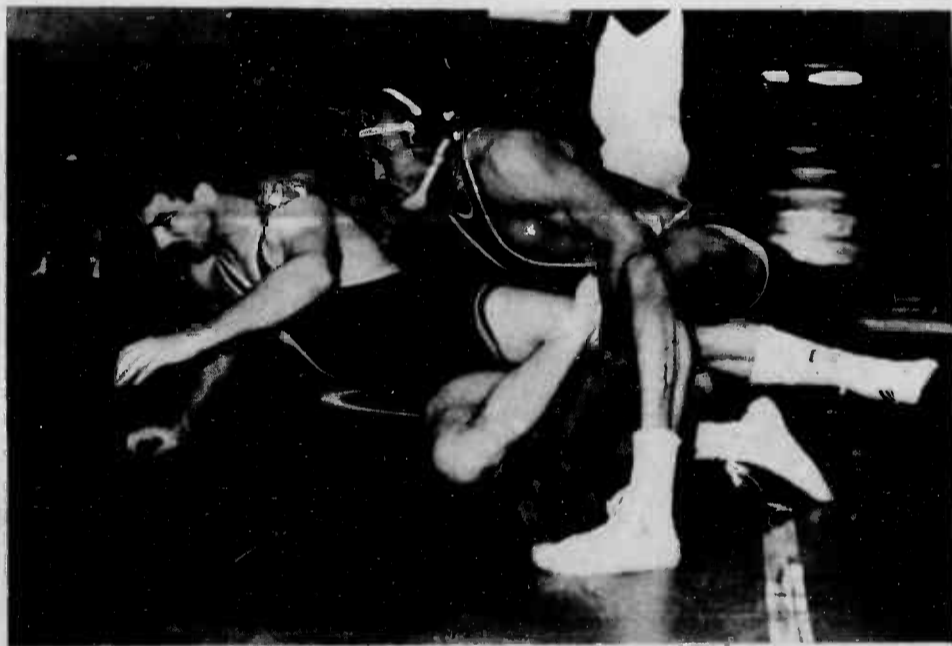

Interservice matches held

Leathernecks dominate wrestling

QUANTICO, Va. — The Marines dominated the 1982 Interservice Freestyle Wrestling Championships held March 24-25 at Larson Gymnasium here.

Marines won eight of 10 gold medals and amassed 97 points to also take the team title. The Army finished second with 59 points while the Navy and Air Force scored 39 and 19 points respectively.

Lou Dorrance was the first Marine to earn a gold medal. The 105-pound champ outpointed a stubborn T.J. Jones of the Navy for first place in the 105-pound weight class.

MARINE ERIC WETZEL rebounded from a close semi-final defeat by Jones and pinned Navy's Wayne Archer to earn a bronze medal in the 105-pound weight class.

Wilfredo Leiva lived up to the Corps' expectations by winning the 114-pound championship. He defeated Shawn Burk of the Army.

In the 136-pound weight class, the Corps' Craig Pollard scored 12 points in 2:42 to overcome teammate Dan Mello, 12-0, for the gold medal.

LOU SONDEROTH OPENED up an early 5-1 lead in the finals of the 149.5-pound division, but Army wrestler Steve Hunt maneuvered to tie the score at 7-7. At the end of the first period, Sonderoth had etched out a 10-7 lead. However, the excitement was shortlived. Sonderoth scored 10 points in 56 seconds of the second period to win the match 20-7.

Marine Larry Kinladius defeated Romey Pelitier, Army, by a 12-0 score after only 2:07 of the first period to

rack up another gold medal for the Marines. This time in the 163-pound weight class.

THE 180-POUND weight class was won by the Army's Eugene Clemons. Steve Campbell of the Air Force took the silver medal. Marine Leonard Hawkins won the bronze medal.

In the 198-pound weight class, Craig Pittman, the All-Marine champ, staved off a late comeback by the Army's Christifer Pease to win by a tie breaker. Pittman scored first and seemed to be on the way to another relatively easy Marine victory, however, the 3-0 lead was erased when Pease countered with a pair of two-point moves. Pittman answered with his own pair of two-point moves before the period ended.

In the second period, tension mounted as Pittman scored early to make it 9-5. But Pease rallied again to tie the score at 9-9 with just under a minute to go in the match. Pease scored again to edge out a 10-9 lead, but before the match ended, Pittman scored to tie the score at the end of regulation. Pittman was awarded the victory by decision.

Marine Greg Gibson won the interservice championship in the 220-pound division before departing to the World Cup Championships in Toledo, Ohio. Gibson's victim was Paul Tidwell of the Navy. The lithe Marine totaled 12 points in 1:46 to take the title.

Another Marine who dominated his weight class was 240-pound Ron Carlisle. Wrestling in the "unlimited division", Carlisle defeated Air Force champ Mackey Tyndall by a 13-0 score with 1:03 gone in the first period.

The MCRD Men's Varsity Volleyball Team and other teams in the San Diego area will provide competition for the women throughout the camp.

Leatherneck runs for the gold

CAMP H. M. SMITH — Most running enthusiasts spend countless hours practicing their sport and dream of the day when they can reach for the "gold," that one chance of saying they're the fastest.

However, a slender Marine stationed here reached for the "gold" and came away with it more times than most running enthusiasts.

Sergeant Farley Simon's achievements read like an

accolade from a "who's who of runners." Not only has he reached for the "gold" many times, establishing three course records that still stand today, he was the fastest enlisted person in the 1981 Marine Corps Track and Field Trials.

THE 26-YEAR-OLD, originally from Grenada (a small island in the West Indies) hadn't run much before joining the Marine Corps in November 1978. And, his first competitive race wasn't until he was assigned to the Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic, Norfolk, Va., during 1979.

"What really got me started in running was when I found out there was going to be a 5K (3.1 mile) race conducted in Virginia that would benefit some needy children," Simon said. "I thought it would be nice to help someone less fortunate than me and to top it off, the practice would help me run better PFTs." Even though it was Simon's first competitive race, he placed first in his age category with a 16:27.

At that time, the young Marine realized that running was in his blood so he joined the Tide Water Running Club in Norfolk and

practiced what seemed to come natural to him.

ALTHOUGH SIMON HAS only been running competitively since 1979, he has amassed a running record that would make most running enthusiasts envious. His first-place running achievements while stationed in Virginia include: setting a course record at the Navy Norfolk 10K (6.2 mile) race with a 30:22.7 in November 1980, the Coast Guard 10K race in Yorktown, Va., with 31:08, which is another course record; the 9th Annual Shamrock Five-mile Race in March 1981 with a 25:02; the Naval Base 5K Energy Awareness Fun Run in Norfolk during April 1980 with a 15:36; and the Jerry Lewis 10K race held in New York in September 1981 with a 31:36.

During his assignment in Virginia, Simon's achievements weren't all individual efforts. He participated in many road races as part of the Naval Amphibious Base, Norfolk team. The team's first-place accomplishments include: the 1st Annual Coast Guard 10K in December 1979; the Winter Five-mile Race in February 1980; the Shamrock Marathon in March 1980; the Naval Amphibious Base East Coast Military Championship 10K in May 1980; the Elizabeth River 10K (military division) in May 1980; the Petersburg Mid-Atlantic Eight-mile Championships in May 1980; the Fort Story Military 5K in May 1980; and the Newport News 10K "Run for the Arts" also conducted in May 1980.

SIMON HAS RUN three races since he was transferred to Hawaii in November 1981 and assigned to the Fleet Marine Force, Pacific. They include the Diamond Head five-miler in December with a 24:21; the Barbers Point 20K (12.1 mile) in January with a 1:04:13, which is a course record, and the Big Brother, Big Sister 5.2-miler in February with a 25:12.

Although he has won many races Simon sometimes wonders what he could have done if he could turn back the clock. "I sometimes wonder if I started running too late," Simon said. "If I had started back when I was in high school in the early '70s, I wonder what I would be doing today. I could possibly be going to college right now."

SPEAKING OF college, just before Simon reenlisted for four years last year, two colleges in Virginia offered him scholarships to their schools if he would run on their track teams.

"I wasn't ready to go back to school and planned to make the Marine Corps a career," he said. "I joined the Marine Corps because I felt I needed to do something different."

Simon has departed TAD to U. S. Marine Corps Track and Field Trials. He hopes to win a place on the team. If he makes it, Simon will be eligible to represent the Marine Corps during the Interservice Track and Field Championships in Annapolis, Md. June 8 to 11.

marched Olympic style into the gym. Dan Sullivan, Marine Corps League commandant, extended a welcome to the throng of spectators, and the "games" were in session.

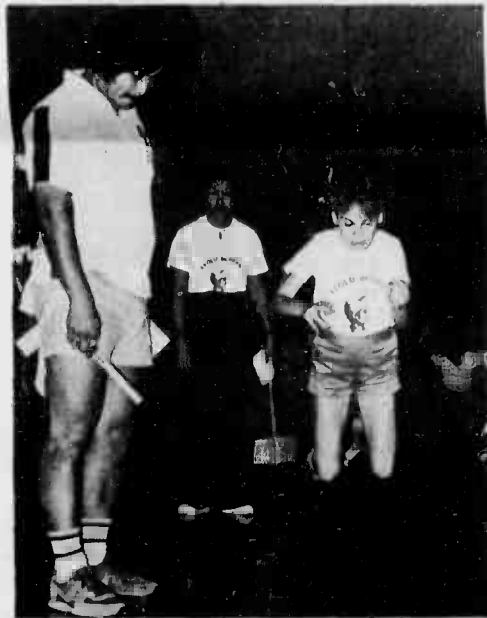
