Accident rates rise drastically

The Navy has experienced a drastic increase in motorcycle accidents this year. Commander Naval Base, Pearl Harbor reported 16 deaths have occurred since Jan. 1, five of which have been in the Oahu area. This is 2½ times the number experienced during the same period in 1981.

Ninety-nine motorcycle accidents have resulted in injuries. This represents a 37 percent increase in injuries over the same period in 1981.

The majority of accidents have happened in fair weather areas, which are more conducive to motorcycle usage this time of the year. The West Const/Pacific area has accounted for seven of the 16 fatalities, and 80 of the 99 injuries.

The most common causes of

The most common causes of these accidents are alcohol, excessive speed, lack of operator experience, failure by others to see motorcycle riders, and other drivers violating the right of way. At MCAS Kaneohe Bay, there

has also been an increase— although slight. Staff Sergeunt Don Young, chief of accidents investigation, said that since Jan. 1, three motorcycle accidents have

occurred, with one resulting in death. During the same period in 1981, two accidents were reported, neither resulting in death.

The Air Force has also gotten off to a bad start. As of mid-March, there were eight motorcycle fatilities ys. three for the same period last year. period last year.

Air Force Brigadier General Leland K. Lukens, director of aerospace safety, listed some motorcycle driving tips in the April issue of Driver. These tips include wearing a belmet, wearing eye protection, wearing durable clothing, staying alert, watching the road surface and traffic, using both brakes, checking mirrors frequently, and accepting the fact that you are not being seen.

All commands are encouraged to emphasize safe motorcycle operation through motorcycle training programs. This training can be obtained through the Traffic Safety Training Division, Naval Base Police Department, Pearl Harbor, 474-1237; Naval Air Station, Barbers Point, 684-3245; or MCAS Kaneobe Bay Station or MCAS Kaneohe Bay Station Training, 257-2068.

First quarter motorcycle statistics reveal 7 Marines died in accidents

HQMC — In the first three months of this year, seven Marines died as a result of motorcycle accidents. This has

coursed some serious concern here.
Last year, 13 Marines were claimed as motorcycle accident fatalities. "If the current rate continues," said a safety official in ALMAR 78/82, "we will lose two squads of Marines in a meaningless way."

The majority of fatal accidents involved Marines on off-duty time. In the last two years 238 Marines died in private motor vehicle or

recreational mishaps.
- Safety officials also point out an

II percent increase in the number of lost workdays during 1981. Alcohol involvement plays a significant roll in all off-duty deaths and injuries.

deaths and injuries.

Training mishaps claimed 10
Marines' lives last year, twice as
many as in 1980. Another area
where fatalities doubled was in military homes where four Marines died in 1981. Safety covers a wide range of

Safety covers a wide range of areas involving motor vehicle, equipment and work procedures. Marines should follow the safety instruction provided for either the equipment they are working on/with, or instructions for safe working procedures.

Statistics compiled recently
by the Provost Marshal's
Office revealed that during
calendar year 1981, the value
of personal property and
money reported stolen totalled
\$156,694. Of that amount,
only a small portion has been only a small portion has been recovered by the Criminal Investigation Division, because the victim cannot provide positive identifica-tion of the stolen articles.

During the first quarter of calendar year 1982, personal property and money stolen totaled \$71,970.

The major target of crime prevention efforts is larceny of private property or money.
This problem can be largely
reduced if members of
the military community
take the time to record serial numbers of their valuables, such as stereos, TV sets, radiois, bicycles, and cameras. Valuables should also be secured.

To help military personnel

mark valuable items and to offer tips on larceny prevention, a crime prevention workshop will be set up at the Marine Corps Exchange

Monday through Thursday, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Highlights of the workshop will include Operation 1D. Members of the Crime Prevention Division will engrave social security numbers on valuables for easy identification.

Appointments can also be made on an individual basis

Precautions prevent problems

Batteries hold explosive gas

A motorist with a stalled car and 10 minutes to get to work or pick up a date has only one thought on his mind — to get his car started. Usually safety precautions are taken lightly — if taken at all. When the cause of the stalled car has to do with the hattery, serious problems can

According to Ed Mueller, safety technician aboard MCAS Kancohe Bay, a car battery contains sulfuric acid which is released into the battery water when the battery is charging

Electricity surges through the acid which in turn generates hydrogen gas. This hydrogen gas escapes through the vents in the battery caps, and is highly explosion. explosive.

Within the last month, three Marines working on a car battery have experienced eye injuries.

"One guy was working on his car and had a cigarette in his mouth," said Mueller. "He was learning over the engine with the cigarette still in his mouth and the battery exploded."

"Another guy touched the negative cable on a car battery. The cable was loose and it sparked, causing the gas to explode and injuring himself and a nearby friend."

a nearby friend."

Mueller explained that
motorists are not taking the
proper safety precautions when
working on car batteries. One
mistake being made is trying to work on the battery the minute the

hood is opened.
"The battery has to ventilate at least three to four minutes before touching it," added Mueller. "It's a good idea to lay a damp cloth over the battery before touching the


Hydrogen gas can be set off by a natch or cigarette lighter,

incorrect connection of battery booster cables, careless use of tools around the battery, smoking, and incorrect connection of the

battery charger.
Problems also arise with the use Problems also arise with the use of hooster cables to give a stalled car a jump. Most jumps are not given according to the rules. According to the Fall 1981 issue of "Family Safety," the two most important safety points when using hooster cables are to wear eye protection and to keep sparks away from the explosive gases.

If everyone would observe the necessary safety precautions, injuries from working on car batteries can be greatly reduced.

Battleship modernized

WASHINGTON — The Iowa (BB 61), leader of the four member Iowa Class of Battleships, was moved from its moorings at the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard April 22, in

lowa will be the second of four planned battleship reactivations, each will have significantly improved offense combat capability, provided by a battery of "Harpoon" and "Tomahawk" cruise missiles. sharp-eyed customs officials.

High value items such as color televisions, furs, stereo components and ideo recorders are particularly desired on the Korean black market, and as such are targets for close inspection.

Personal property shipments are scrutinized by Republic of Korea customs officials for possible black market goods. Shipment of items for resale may result in fines, confiscation of goods, charges for transportation costs and disciplinary action in accordance with the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

The opportunity for profit may exist, but there's an even greater chance of being cought.



Coping with stress overload



wASHINGTON — Does your office suffer from high absentee-ism, low morale, low productivity, poor staff communication, staff conflicts, employee fear of making decisions or incompleted tasks? If so, your workplace has become a victim of employee stress

overload, usually created by improper management. Dr. Melvin Nizny, a Cincinnati psychiatrist, defines stress as an perience that induces a sense of helplessness or being over

"It is an emotional reaction to a situation caused by our perception of a threat to our ego, self-esteem and sense of emotional security,' said Dr. Frank C. Richardson associate professor of educational psychology at the University of Texas.

Without any stress in life, you're without any suressin life, you re hardly living. Besides, what's one person's stress may well be another person's stimulus, so relieving the sources of stress depends on knowing yourself and

what bothers you.

Stress is a prime source of illness, causing anything from the common cold to heart attacks, say medical experts. Bodily tension also shows up as sweaty palms, tense muscles, inability to sleep or marked increases in drinking, smoking and other such symptoms. To help rid your life of

· To avoid needless stress, forget about the past and the future. Live mostly in the present. Give up the belief that worry prevents mistakes and misfor-tunes or gives you added control

• Stop setting impossibly high standards for yourself. Many people are stressed by trying to people are stressed by trying we convince themselves and others that they always have the right answer or can control the world around them;

standards. People tend to live by their own ethics, not yours. Adopt a "live and let live" approach to

life;
• Don't depend on anyone but yourself for happiness. When you expect others to make you happy, · Stop judging people by your to love you, to entertain you, you

will suffer many frustrations and anxieties. It's up to you to find interesting things to do, so you won'thave time to waste worrying about your dependence on others; and

· Above all, learn to accept

WASHINGTON - "Son, we used to smoke that stuff while standing on the street corner singing, so, I know what you're talking about," said the old man. "But, I had this best friend who couldn't

"But, I had this best friend who couldn't stop like the rest of us, and today he's out in that city sanitarium. The man just can't think for himself any more."

Marijuana (alias "grass," "pot," "smoke" or "weed") is a common plant with the botanical name of Cannabis sativa. The main psychoactive (mindaltering) ingredient in marijuana is deltageterahydrocannabinol or THC, although more than 400 other chemicals although more than 400 other chemicals

attnough more than 400 other chemicals are also contained in the plant. A marijuana cigarette (joint) primarily determines its psychoactive potential.

In recent years, the strength of street of marijuana has increased substantially. In 1975, samples exceeding 1 percent THC content were rare; by 1980, samples with 5 percent THC were common. The more potent marijuana increases the physical and mental effects and the possibility of bankla metalers. health problems for the user.

Most users of marijuana experience an increase in heart rate, reddening of the eyes, and dryness in the mouth and throat.

Studies of marijuana's mental effects have revealed that the drug temporarily impairs short-term memory, alters sense of time and reduces the ability to perform tasks requiring concentration, swift reactions and coordination. Many feel that their hearing, vision and skin that their hearing, vision and skin sensitivity are enhanced by the drug, although these reports have not been bejectively confirmed by research. Feelings of euphoria, relaxation, altered

sense of body image and bouts of exaggerated laughter are also commonly reported.

In some users, a single dose of cannabis In some users, a single dose of cannabis can produce adverse reactions ranging from mild anxiety, through panic and paranois, to an acute psychosis characterized by detachment from reality, delusions, hallucinations or illusions and bizarre behavior.

These reactions occur most frequently in individuals who are under stress, anxious, depresed or borderline schizophrenic. But, they an also occur in normal users who inadvertently take much more than their usual dose.

Limited evidence from survey studies suggests, that the mild reactions have been experienced on one or more occasions by more than half of regular users. The severe reactions, which appear to occur in only a small percentage of users, usually respond well to psychiatric treatment and last no longer than one or

two days.

There has been a great deal of controversy about the effects of chronic heavy use of cannabis on brain function. There is evidence that such use can lead to lasting behavioral changes in some users.

Apathy, lack of concern for the future and loss of motivation have been described in some heavy users, and psychotic and paranoid symptoms in others. These symptoms usually disappear gradually when regular use is discontinued and recur when use is resumed.

These reactions are relatively rare, although case studies suggest that certain cannabis users may be particularly susceptible. Many psychiatrists are concerned about such reactions in youthful drug users (11-15 years of age) because of the possibility that regular use may produce adverse affects on psychological, as well as physical, maturation. This concern, of course,

applies to the use of all psychoactive drugs by juveniles. For reasons that are still unclear, a few users experience spontaneous recurrences of the symptoms of acute intoxication ("flashbacks") days or weeks after consuming marijuana

Physical dependence on marijuana has been demonstrated in research subjects who ingested an amount equal to smoking 10 to 20 joints a day.

When the drug was discontinued, subjects experienced withdrawal symptoms — irritability, sleep disturbances, loss of appetite and weight, sweating and stomach upset. Tolerance to marijuana - the need to take more and more of the drug over time to get the original effect — has been proven in animals and humans

animals and humans.

In essence, clinical observations from many parts of the world have long suggested that regular heavy use of cannabis may produce lung damage; impair reproductive and endocrine functions; cause long-lasting disturbances of behavior and brain function; and leave registrost to infection.

md lower resistance to infection.

People especially at risk with even moderate doses of marijuana include anxious, depressed or unrecognized psychotic individuals; heavy users of other drugs (prescription or nonprescription).

diabetics; individuals with marginal fertility; patients with chronic diseases of the heart, lungs or liver.

In addition, adolescents who are undergoing rapid physiological and psychological development may be particularly susceptible to the development of a life-long pattern of use and to the effects of long periods of cannabis intoxication. They may also be more prone to cannabis-related traffic accidents because of their lack of driving experience and may be affected more by experience and may be affected more by possible disruptions of hormone balance.

Drug use

Local programs present hard facts to kids, clears up myths

Drug use in America is a problem - a very big one. Three million American teenagers are confirmed alcoholics. One-third of all grade schoolers have tried marijuana. One in 10 high

of all grade schoolers have tried marjuana. One in 10 migh school seniors smoke pot every day.

The problem exists, and it won't go away.

Next week is filled with events concerning this vital topic, beginning with a drug information program at Mokapu Elementary School Tuesday. A television special airs Tuesday evening and a two-day seminar will he presented May 26-27.

The Counseling and Assistance Center and Family Service Center and Family Service.

The Counseling and Assistance Center and Family Service Center are pooling their resources at 1 p.m. Tuesday to present a no-nonsense program to the six graders here. "I'm going to give them the facts about drugs," said Dr. Tom Ditzler, CAAC director. "It's alright to let kids know they are responsible for their behavior. You can't just tell them not to use drugs. Once they understand what drugs can do, and understand what will happen to them if they use drugs, then you can tell them the price they'll pay for drug abuse."

"Don't use drugs — play softball . . . it doesn't always work that way," said Julia Anderson Aki, Family Service Center. "You can't just substitute an activity for drug use, Kids have to

that way," said Julia Anderson Aki, Family Service Center.
"You can't just substitute an activity for drug use. Kids have to understand themselves to be able to say no. They have to decide based on what they feel is right and wrong, not on what their contents are saving."

The bottom line is facts, the counselors say. Clear away the myths about drug use, present the facts, and hold the kids responsible for their actions. After the program is over and the elementary students go

home, they and their parents can discuss the information passed, and then watch a well-planned television special, "Epidemic! Why Your Kid is on Drugs," presented 7 p.m. on KGMB-TV, Channel 9.

The special takes an inside look at the problem with interviews of children, as well as psychiatrists, teachers, doctors and family courselors to nirroint the research shind the

and family counselors to pinpoint the reasons behind the

epidemic.

The following evening CAAC and FSC team again to present a two-day seminar "Helping Kids Survive the Drug Culture — A Seminar for Parents."

The seminar goes from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. May 26:27 at the Windward Enlisted Club here. The program is free, and the first evening covers topics such as what kinds of drugs parents can expect to see, legal aspects of drug abuse, values in the home, and outward signs of drug use. The second evening will be devoted to practical "hands-on" training on ways to talk — and listen — to children in a healthy way.

Renovations set for medical clinic All 400 Ceiling Fans In Stock, 30 On Display

The best care possible with the least interruption will be the motto for the Kaneohe Branch Clinic, Building 216, from May 25 to

Sept. 30.

"The renovation of the clinic has been in the planning stages since 1979," said Lieutenant Commander Walter Roberson, medical administrative officer.

"This will be the first face lift we have you since the hilling same area. know of since the building came into existence as a 100 bed hospital in 1941."

Since then, it has been a convalescent hospital, an outpatient clinic and the Kaneohe Branch Clinic.

WASHINGTON — The acting Assistant Secretary of Defense (Health Affairs) recently approved the extension of CHAMPUS benefits for outpatient surgery on the basis of the inpatient cost-sharing rates for dependents of active duty service members. ambulatory surgical services. In addition, it removes the beneficiaries' financial disincen-

beneficiaries innancial disincen-tive toward ambulatory surgery and permits the government to take advantage of the generally lower costs associated with surgery performed in outpatient

settings. As a result, the estimated

program savings for surgical services for more than a 4-year period (1982-86) will amount to \$1.3 million.

The intended effect of the

amendment is to encourage beneficiaries to obtain their surgical services in less expensive

outpatient settings by providing a more favorable cost share formula. This amendment is effective retroactively for covered

surgical procedures performed on or after Dec. 19, 1980. There are approximately 800







Showdown: American M-16 rifle vs. Soviet Union's AKM

U.S. M-16 has held its own against the Soviet Union's AKM,

and proven itself more than able.

During a demonstration May 7 at the rifle range here, the impact and accuracy of both rifles were compared.

The demonstration was

coordinated by First Lieutenant Roland Walters, Regimental S-2 Officer, and Gunnery Sergeant Thomas Frazier, S-2 Intelligence Chief for 2d Battalion, 3d

Walters said that one purpose of the demonstration was to build Marines' confidence with the M-16 and to familiarize them with the Soviet's AKM, the weapon they are most likely to be facing in battle. Walters explained that just becoming familiar with the sound of the AKM being fired

"In a war situation, Marines should know the sound of their own rifle from the enemies' rifle,"

One thing discovered at the demonstration was that automatic firing is very inaccurate. "The Soviets only fire semi-automatic once, which is during basic training," Walters added. "The rest of the time they fire automatic."

"The Soviets believe in area fire, which keeps our heads down until they overrun our positions. We believe in firing well-aimed rounds and hitting a target."

Both rifles have gas-operated, rotated-bolt locking systems. However, the M-16 has a longer distance between the front and rear sights. "The longer the distance between the two sights, the more accurate the weapon will the more accurate the weapon will be," said Walters.

be," said Walters.
The M-16 has a greater practical, effective range than the AKM. The practical effective range is the range at which any infantryman can hit a target 50 percent of the

time. The AKM has a range of 300 meters, and the M-16 has a range of 350 meters.

"Both weapons praved accurate up to 200 meters," said Walters.
"Our bullet travels a lot faster than the Soviets'. Our bullet is 25 percent smaller in diameter and 35 percent faster."

percent faster."

Walters explained that the M-16 is unstable on impact and there is a high probability of incapacitation. "When the round hits you, it will bounce around in your body at a high prize of speed and do a lot of a high rate of speed and do a lot of damage," he stated. "It could go in at the elbow and come out at the

The AKM rounds are bigger. They are also mare stable in flight and tend to make a neat hole in the target coming in and out. "This was verified by our demonstra-tion," said Walters. "The M-16 made a neat entrance, but had a large exit hole — about 10 times larger. The AKM tended to make a sizable entrance hole and the exit hole was about the same."

Walters said that the AKM round is 62 percent heavier than the M-16 round, which means that the U.S. soldier or Marine can carry two and half times as much ammunition as the Soviet soldier. "The Soviets stress dependable;" said Walters. "The United States

said Walters. "The United States stresses accuracy and less ammunition weight and the M-16 is more accurate."

Concerning the Marines who watched the demonstration, Walters said, "Like all Marines, they would rather fire the rifles they would rather fire the rifles themselves than watch, but they cheered when the M-16 impact sounded on the target. It reinforced their belief that the M-16 is a better weapon.

"I personally feel that the M-16 is better, although both weapons are good," Walters concluded.

Half-marathon record set

Marine wins marathon

Lance Corporal James Hall of Brigade Service Support Group, running his desired six-minute mile, took top honors Sunday as he finished the Second Annual Windward Marathon in 2:39:32.5.

The Second Annual Windward Half-Marathon was won by James Gallup, a doctor with the Hawaii Medical Group. Gallup's time, 1:11:17.5, is the fastest for an American, in the 45-49 age group.

Hall, who arrived on the island in March, and he twined for 15 miles.

March, said he trained for 15 miles a day to prepare for the 26-mile 385-yard trek. "This is the second marathon I've

run and I enjoyed it. I felt pretty good

running it and it was a nice course."
Hall took the lead before the runners completed the first mile and he never relinguished it. "I had a good pace going, but I didn't want to burn myself out for my run next week," the modest leatherneck added.

The first woman marathorer to

The first woman marathoner to complete the course was Carmen Amanillas of Makakilo. Her winning time was 3:19:41.4.

On the other (half-) marathon Gallup shared the lead with two other runners. Dewey Cartwright and Mike Tymn. "I didn't expect to win," stated the 46-year-old, "but when we passed the eight- or nine-mile marker, Mike started to fall back. It wasn't too long after when Dewey dropped." Cartwright finished the half-marathon second and two minutes ahead of the third-place finisher, Tymn in a time of 1:11:34.3.

The first woman to finish the half-marathon was a University of Hawaii sophomore, Karen Curtis. She finished in 1:20:12.2. Originally from Michigan, the 20-year-old runs the 3-, 5-and 10-kilometer races for the UH

5-and 10-kilometer races for the UH women's track team. The first Marine to finish was Sergeant Greg Wooley from Marine Barracks, Pearl Harbor. Completing the run fourth overall, Wooley was first in his age group, 20-24, and had a time of 1:14:30.

Both Hall and Gallup shaved more than a minute off last year's times.

and the final evaluation was of a squad leader's and fire team leader's land navigation abilities.


