School routes set

Thursday, another school year begins and it's up to the children to study hard enough to make it to the next year. But, it's up to everyone to provide these children safe passage to and from school so that they have a chance to make it to the next year.

Whether or not they have school-age children, it is the responsibility of all motorists and parents to be aware of the additional precautions necessary in school zones.

Parents play a key role in advising their children on the safest routes to take to school, and according to Master Sergeant Thomas Bishop, Non-commissioned Officer-in-Charge of Safety, the safest and only routes to be taken are along MacLachlan Street.

"There are only three school crossings on base," said Bishop, "and none of them are on Mokapu Road." The school crossings are located at the intersections of MacLachlan Street and Harris Avenue, Cushman and Harris avenues, and Lawrence Road and G Street.

THE SPEED LIMIT on Mokapu Road is 30 mph and there are no school speed zones.

Bishop also claims there is a

problem with children riding their bicycles to school and not paying attention to safe biking rules. "Everyone, not just the kids, is supposed to stop at intersections and walk his bike across the street," stated Bishop. "But these kids are racing down MacLachlan Street, and when they get to the intersections, they just keep going." He also explained that there are signs at the intersections on MacLachlan Street cautioning bicycle riders to dismount and walk across the street.

TO FURTHER INFORM children of the rules governing safe bicycling, the Office of the Provost Marshal is planning a 'bicycle rodeo' for the first or second week of school. "We will be registering bikes and teaching the kids biking rules," explained Master Sergeant Philip Johnson, Crime Prevention Officer with PMO.

In addition, there are plans to reorganize the Junior Police Officers at the school which allows the older children to assist the younger children at school crossings. JPOs are identified by their yellow hats, safety vests and hand-held traffic control signs.

"For the first week or so of school the MPs will be assisting at the crosswalks," said Johnson. "MPs will also be making periodic checks during the school year, mainly on Cushman and Harris avenues."

THE HELPING HANDS Program, which began last year, will continue again this year, according to Carol Meridieth, president of the Parent Teacher Student Association.


Households volunteering to participate in the Helping Hands Program are identified by a red cardboard hand placed in a window or door. Should a child need help or assistance in any way, while walking to and from school, they can stop at any house displaying the red hand.

According to Meridieth, if a child becomes lost, tired, hurt or has to use the restroom, he knows where to turn for help.

ONCE AGAIN THIS year, volunteers are needed to assist in the Helping Hands Program. Anyone, male or female, who lives on a school route and is home before and after school should contact the school's vice principal.

Only through the cooperation of everyone who lives and works at the air station can tragic accidents be avoided. If a traffic violation is noticed people are urged to call the Military Police Desk Sergeant at 257-2123.

Slow down when children are seen in the area and use caution when passing a child on a bike. And remember, it is against the law to drive past a school bus, from either direction, when the bus' red lights are flashing.

Automatic reduction rule adopted

Enlisted members sentenced by special or general court-martial to more than 90 days confinement at hard labor or punitive discharges (bad conduct or dishonorable) will now receive automatic reductions to E-1, according to a change in the Manual of the Judge Advocate

General.

This new rule applies to all cases in which the convening authority or supervisory authority's action is taken after June 11.

"This provision has always been in the Uniform Code of Military Justice, Article 58a(a), but it's been discretionary with the service," said Lieutenant Colonel Gerald L. Miller, staff

judge advocate, Legal Services Center.

"The Army and Air Force already permit automatic reduction. Now the Secretary of the Navy is effecting this pre-existing rule for Navy and Marine Corps enlisted personnel."

The JAG Manual states that reduction will be automatic unless the convening authority, such as a

battalion commander; or supervisory authority, such as a commanding general, decide not to reduce the member.

These authorities may retain the accused in the pay grade held at the time of the sentence or an intermediate pay grade.

They may also direct that the accused serve in pay grade E-1 while in confinement but be

returned to the pay grade held at the time of sentence or an intermediate pay grade upon release from confinement.

Miller, who said that more than one-third of the courts-martial per year result in punitive discharge, is in favor of the new rule but anticipates some problems.

"It (the new rule) may cause problems because judges and

members will know the rule and may tailor their sentences by not giving bad conduct discharges where appropriate, or not giving more confinement because they know the impact of automatic reduction," he explained.

"But I would say that it's probably a good rule to make improvisation of punishment relative to rank more uniform."

Air station runway closes for renovations

The air station runway will be closed approximately six weeks for renovation, according to Captain Glenn Cox, systems operations officer, Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron.

The renovation, began today and will be divided into two phases. Phase I consists of upgrading the lighting system, installing a new emergency generator, and restriping the ends of the runway.

According to Lieutenant Commander Robert Evans, resident officer in charge of construction, Facilities Department, a contract for Phase I was awarded to the Small Business Administration May 17 by the Office

in Charge of Construction Mid-Pacific, Pearl Harbor. SBA sub-contracted the work to N&N Electric Co., Inc., who'll do the renovations at an estimated cost of \$465,000.

"The money (to pay for the renovation), will come from two sources," said Evans. They are Headquarters Marine Corps and the Naval Air System Command, both from Washington, D.C.

"While the runway is closed, helicopter operations will still be conducted here," said Cox. The fixed-

wing squadrons will hold routine flight operations at Naval Air Station Barber's Point until Oct. 15.

"That's when the runway will be re-opened," Cox said, "yet Phase I renovations will still be going on."

Phase II of the renovations will incorporate additional visual landing aids to provide safe and efficient night operations and will cost about the same, according to Evans. That would bring the total cost of renovating the runway to approximately \$1 million.

According to Evans, the contract to begin Phase II hasn't been awarded at this time.

Automated system determines Marines' paycheck amounts

HQMC — As of the first of next year, Marines will be paid exclusively through the Joint Uniform Military Pay System/Manpower Management System (JUMPS/MMS) instead of the old manual system, and the Commandant warns that administrative specialists will have to take special care to ensure the system works properly.

In a recent White Letter (4-82), General Robert H. Barrow, Commandant of the Marine Corps, told all Marine commanders, "The new pay system will work if we make it work."

When introduced in 1973, JUMPS/MMS was heralded as a nearly error-free pay system. But the Marine Corps never fully trusted the system and continued to maintain a

manual pay record, as well as an automated record, for each Marine.

Beginning next year, Marines will be paid according to the amount forecast on their automated record. There will be no manual back-up system.

The Commandant stressed the need for accurate and timely unit diary entries to make the system work. Eighty percent of all pay related transactions are entered on the unit diary. Seventy percent of the delay between the time an event occurs and the time it posts at the Marine Corps Finance Center in Kansas City is usually the delay in getting it on the diary.

"Though all transactions should be reported in a timely manner," the Commandant told commanders,

"ensure your administrative personnel pay particular attention to those that put money in your Marines' pockets."

The Deputy Fiscal Director of the Marine Corps, Brigadier General William R. Etnyre, added that individual Marines are well advised to pay especially close attention to their Leave and Earning Statements (LES) under the new pay system. "If a Marine feels that he is not being paid his proper entitlement, he should take appropriate steps to correct the situation."

"The Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps has been urging Staff NCOs around the Corps to make sure their troops know how to read their LESs. This is going to be especially important under JUMPS/MMS," BrigGen Etnyre added.

Holiday honors laborers

Workers of the world enjoy a holiday set aside especially in honor of labor. They owe that day mainly to one man — Peter J. McGuire.

One hundred years ago, McGuire suggested setting apart one day in the year in recognition of labor. He was the president of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, and was an active leader in the Knights of Labor.

McGuire submitted a proposal to the Central Labor Union in New York that a day be set aside to show the strength and esprit de corps of the trade and labor organizations. He suggested a parade and picnic or festival, with

the proceeds divided among participating organizations. McGuire selected the first Monday in September since it came approximately halfway between Independence Day and Thanksgiving Day.

THE CENTRAL LABOR Union adopted McGuire's proposal and the first Labor Day celebration occurred in New York City Sept. 5, 1882.

The Federation of Organized Trades and Labor Unions of the United States and Canada, later known as the American Federation of Labor, voted Oct. 9, 1884 to make the celebration national.

Feb. 21, 1887, the Legislature of

Oregon set apart the first Monday in September as a state holiday in honor of labor. Within three months, Colorado, Massachusetts, New Jersey and New York followed.

By the middle of 1894, the day

had been made a legal holiday in 30 states. On June 28 of that year, Congress passed an act making it a legal holiday in the District of Columbia and in the territories. Today, Labor Day is observed in every state.





Exercise proves Marine readiness

Marines are trapped at the end of a valley by slow-moving enemy forces. The mission: Evacuate the leather-necks in time for an air strike to surprise and destroy the enemy.

The problem: Marine helicopters must rescue the Marines and clear the area, or risk being caught in the strike.

The outcome: Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-262 rescued approximately 80 Marines of "F" Company, 2d Battalion, 3d Marines.


The mission was accomplished Thursday at the Kahuku Training Area as part of HMM-262's Marine Corps Combat Readiness Evaluation System, which lasted from Aug. 16-27.

The 11-helicopter rescue task force flew to a safe landing zone in the Kahukus, where they were briefed on the location of the trapped leather-necks. They were also informed that the enemy was using a chemical agent against the Marines.

The helicopter crews donned protective gear to fly into a chemically hostile environment and determined the best routes for various helicopters to take.

The mission was accomplished in time, and the Marines were safe.

Safety was paramount throughout

the exercise. The crews wore bulky protective gear while flying above land, and one of the pilots was suited. The other pilot wore regular flight gear.

"This is the first time, to our knowledge, that a wing unit has conducted a fully-suited NBC tactical assault mission," said Major Greg Johnson, coordinator for the MCCRES.

Thursday's sortie culminated the week-long training and proved that '262 could operate in a wartime environment while working with other units. HMM-265, Marine Heavy Helicopter-463, Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron-24, Marine Fighter Attack Squadron-232 and "F" Company, 2d Battalion, 3d Marines supported '262's training.








AFFES initiates layaway program

HONOLULU — Army and Air Force Exchange Service officials have announced a change in the Layaway Program to bring it into line with standard commercial practices.

Effective Aug. 26, a \$1 nonrefundable service charge will be made at the time a layaway transaction is initiated to help defray the paperwork and administrative costs of the program which allows customers to fit purchases into their budget.

A recent study indicated that in-store processing costs for each layaway transaction are \$2.17 from the time the layaway is initiated until customer pick up. When overhead costs and markdowns required are added, the total cost of the layaway program to AAFES is \$17,000,000 a year.

While major retailers such as Sears, J.C. Penney and Montgomery Ward charge their customers a \$2 service fee, AAFES

officials felt this was too much to impose on their customers and elected to absorb the majority of the cost.

Layaways average 1,300 per exchange per month in the continental United States and 1,700 in overseas exchanges and amount to \$420,000,000 per year worldwide. According to the study, 44 percent of all items placed on layaway are clothing, 16 percent home entertainment items, 11 percent household items.

The remaining 29 percent covers all other items sold in exchanges worldwide.

The layaway program benefits customers by offering price protection while guaranteeing availability of the items with a minimum down payment. The AAFES layaway program offers customers another advantage over commercial retailers — either 90 or 180 days to pay off purchases. Major retailers offer 30, 60 and 90 day programs.

Courts-Martial Report

EDITOR'S NOTE: The information contained in *Courts-Martial Report* is compiled by the Joint Legal Services Center and is published as a source of information for all Marines.

Corporal Marvin L. Cowdrey, Service Company, Camp H.M. Smith, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of the wrongful possession, with intent to distribute, and the wrongful introduction, for the purpose of transfer, of 40 milligrams of cocaine.

He was sentenced to four months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$200 pay per month for six months, reduction to private and a bad conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

Lance Corporal Vincent Biondillo, Headquarters and

Maintenance Squadron-24, 1st Marine Brigade was convicted at trial by special court-martial of failing to go at 7:30 a.m. March 18, 1982 to his appointed place of duty; of disrespect to a superior commissioned officer; of drunk and disorderly conduct on station; of disrespect to a staff noncommissioned officer; and of willfully disobeying an order of a superior staff noncommissioned officer.

He was sentenced to two months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$350 pay per month for two months and reduction to private first class.

LCpl Douglas W. Badger, H&MS-24, was convicted at trial by general court-martial of attempted sale of LSD; of selling marijuana on two occasions; and of the sale of LSD on another occasion.

He was sentenced to eight years confinement at hard labor, total forfeiture of all pay and allowances, reduction to private and a dishonorable discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

Private First Class Robbie J. Moore, 2d Battalion, 3d Marines, 1st Marine Brigade was convicted at trial by special court-martial of assault on another Marine by poking him in the stomach with a knife; of assault on another Marine by drawing and pointing a knife at him; and of drunk and disorderly conduct at Fort DeRussy, Hawaii.

He was sentenced to 100 days confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$250 pay per month for four months, reduction to private and a bad conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.





EDITOR'S NOTE: The Ironman Triathlon World Championship, the longest and most difficult triathlon in the world, is considered the ultimate test of physical strength and endurance.

More than 850 of the world's best conditioned athletes will assemble at Kailua-Kona on the Big Island Oct. 9 to participate in the sixth running of the tri-phased event. The race includes a 2.4-mile open ocean swim, a 112-mile bicycle race and a 26.2-mile marathon.

This article focuses on a veteran triathlete who refuses to let injuries hamper the possibility of earning the prestigious title-Ironman.



Marine athlete ready to give it another try

"When I found out I was coming to this island about a year and a half ago, I thought it would be the perfect opportunity to run in the Ironman," said Staff Sergeant Ed Steinhauser, "but February was a big disappointment for me after the injury. So, in October I'm going to give it one more try."

The injury the field artillery digital computer technician speaks of is the burst (not pulled) Achilles tendon suffered approximately 80 miles into the bicycle portion of February's triathlon. But pure determination allowed this Maintenance Company Marine not only to complete the cycling, but to dismount and run a marathon under extreme pain.

Now, with the experience of an Ironman under his belt, Steinhauser said he's learned from his mistakes and is anxious to participate in October's event.

"I'm keeping to my usual training schedule, minus a little speed work, but concentrating a lot more on my biking and swimming."

"Running is the very last event, and by the time you get there, you don't really have a lot of excess energy left. You don't try to do a sub three-hour marathon. It's a matter of getting into a good pace and trying to maintain it for the 26-mile period."

Steinhauser has his training schedule down to a science — practicing every event daily. "I run seven days a week, about 70 miles total. Being a firm believer in quality over quantity, I do a lot of high intensity speed work." He runs what he

calls "30/30s." "Running an 8-mile course, I warm up the first two miles. Then I sprint for 30 seconds and then jog for 30 seconds. It creates quite an oxygen debt, but that's what training is all about, getting use to the oxygen debt."

A similar method is used in training with the bicycle, except he tries to incorporate distance with speed. "I use acceleration drills where you sit on the bike as low as possible and try to go as fast as possible for one or two miles. Backing down causes you to relax and then you do it over again for about a 60-mile ride."

Steinhauser practices swimming mostly in fresh water at the station pool, but reserves his saltwater swimming for the weekends at Kailua and Ala Moana beaches.

He prepared himself for the tri-phase event by running the Trinnian Triathlon. He placed ninth out of a field of 750 athletes and had a chance to race his new bike.

"My bike is custom-made, he said. "The components are of the highest quality and it's a lot better than February's bike."

Retired Army Lieutenant Colonel Bill McGill, owner of a small sporting goods store, helps with the financial portion of Steinhauser's training.

"Anybody who has run a triathlon certainly knows how expensive it can get and a sponsor certainly helps," said Steinhauser.

Another person instrumental in Steinhauser's training is his wife, Barbara. "She's also a marathoner which comes in quite handy because we train together."

"She is my nutritionist and plans my diet. I'm up to about 8,000 calories a day

and that will increase to 11,000 by the end of September. I try to eat a lot of carbohydrates and low fats," he said.

Now Steinhauser is about to enter his last and toughest phase of training. He is taking leave to train 10 hours a day. "My workouts are designed to peak out a week before the triathlon. When you work out, your body breaks down. The last week, I'll be working out in smaller quantities each day. That allows the body to heal that much more and when it comes to the actual competition my body will become 15 percent to 20 percent stronger."

"On the same line I workout on a hard-

easy schedule. For example I'll have a hard day running and an easy day swimming. That will allow my swimming muscles to recover while I break down my running muscles. The next day the opposite happens."

Steinhauser works out with weights every other day, practices yoga on the odd days and does 500 situps nightly for what he promised his wife to be "his last triathlon."

But when race day comes and gets down to the wire, Steinhauser said, "If I'm close (to the leader) I'll go for it, other than that I'm going to do my best and finish at my best potential."

Pistol tournament begins Sept. 11

The MCAS Range Training Facility, the Hawaii Rifle Association and the K-Bay Rod and Gun Club are sponsoring the "Gus" Anderson Memorial Pistol Tournament — The 1982 Hawaii State Pistol Championship Match Sept. 11 and 12 at the range complex.

The match, to celebrate the 125th anniversary of the founding of the Hawaii Rifle Association, is being held to generate funds to send qualified shooters to the National Shooting Championship at Camp Perry, Ohio. Current NRA conventional pistol rules will govern the tournaments.

The match is open to any NRA member. Teams will consist of four firing members, an alternate and a captain or coach. The coach may be a firing member of the team and will represent either a club affiliated with NRA, a law enforcement agency or a regular service or reserve unit. State association teams may enter the team matches. Pick-up teams are not allowed.

Entries will be limited to 75 competitors and will close at the start of the matches, 8 a.m. Sept. 11. Competitors firing the entire tournament will be given first preference.

Ten matches with the .22 caliber pistol or revolver will be conducted the first day of the tournament and five matches with the .45 caliber will be held the final day.

The winning team will be presented with "Gus" Anderson Memorial Perpetual Trophy, and the match winner will be awarded the Hawaii Rifle Association Trophy.

There must be a minimum of six competitors in a class or category to establish competition, 13 or more for second place and 19 or more for third place. No awards will be given below third place.



Public Health Services

WASHINGTON — Military members, their families and retirees in 10 cities are no longer required to use CHAMPUS for non-emergency inpatient medical health care.

Ten former U.S. Public Health Service hospitals or clinics have been designated as uniformed services medical facilities. Department of Defense health officials explained that using the facilities is the same as using Army, Navy or Air Force hospitals or clinics.

Under this direct-care system the only cost to the user would be \$6.30 per day for inpatient care. The remainder of the cost would be paid by the military services.

The former U.S. Public Health Service hospitals or clinics are located in areas with a concentration of military active-duty members, dependents and retirees. DoD health officials said beneficiaries most normally use one of the facilities if they live in a 40-mile radius of that facility.

The hospitals and locations are: Wyman Park Health System, Baltimore; Brighton Marine Public Health Center, Boston; Hospital of St. John, Nassau Bay, Texas; Seattle Public Health Hospital; and Bayley Seton Hospital, Staten Island, N.Y.

The outpatient clinics are: Lutheran Medical Center, Cleveland; St. Mary's Hospital, Galveston, Texas; St. Joseph Ambulatory Care Center, Houston; Family Practice Center of Port Arthur, Texas; and Coastal Health Services, Portland, Maine.
