Electronics improved

Battlefield decisions simplified

Fort Derussy, Hawaii, - A new system combining computers and communications gear will dramatically enhance a commander's battlefield proficiency and options, according to First Lieutenant T.S. Henry, Brigade Information Systems Management Office.

"The command and control system is an advanced technique of hooking communications equipment and computers to speed up message traffic on the battlefield," said Henry, who was project officer for a display of the system, here, April 10-11. "It eliminates the long, tedious amount of communications traffic and brings information to the tactical commander much quicker than before.'

High-ranking officers,

including Lieutenant General C.G. Cooper, Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, and Brigadier General O.K. Steele, Commanding General, 1st Marine Brigade, watched as Marines from throughout the Brigade demonstrated how the system would work in a field environment.

Demonstrations were as realistic as possible, with Marines acting out their parts in what LtGen. Cooper described as "Oscar-winning performances."

"We wanted to make it as realistic as possible so that commanders would know exactly what's in store for them," Henry said.

Part of what's in store is an instant ability to call up, by computer, statistics on everything from troop strength to histories of enemy units. "Instead of taking four

hours to determine if you should take a certain hill, you can now get the same amount of information in minutes," Henry commented.

"You can determine how much ammunition, men and trucks you have, and whether you have enough medication to handle any casualities. All the information a commander needs before deciding whether to assault a beach or take a hill is available to him."

The system, developed by the First Marine Amphibious Force, is not only informa-tional, it will also increase message speed and help eliminate garbling. "It speeds communications on the battlefield by slamming through a burst transmission with tremendous amounts of data," Henry commented. Before, some reports might have been garbled; this way, the commander has true, complete information with no falsities.

The system has been successfully tested by I MAF during several major exercises. "Since they originated the whole concept, they've been 'blessed' by Headquarters Marine Corps to handle training," Henry

"But when we were preparing for our display, BGen. Steele directed that a composite platoon be formed, comprised of Marines from Marine Aircraft Group-24, 3d Marines, communicators, and 'data dinks," Henry commented.

"It was especially important that the comm folks and data processors understand this system because they'll be the most affected," Henry continued. "They, perhaps more than anyone, have to know what's in store.'

Child restraint law soon to be enforced by local police . . .

Last year in Hawaii, 306 children, aged four and under, were killed or injured in motor vehicle accidents. Many of them were not wearing seat belts or in a child restraint seat and might be alive today or uninjured had their parents properly protected them.

Beginning May 1, the Honolulu Police Department is going to crack down on parents whose young children are not wearing seat belts or are in a child restraint seat while in a

In accordance with the Hawaii Child Passenger Restraint Law, "children under three years, riding in a motor vehicle, must be in a federally approved child safety seat. Children three to

four years must use a federally approved child safety seat or be secured by the vehicle's seat belts.

"If there are more people riding in the motor vehicle than there are seat belts, and all belts are being used, children without a safety seat or seat belts must ride in the back seat.

"Exemptions to this law are if the child is a passenger in an emergency vehicle, commercial vehicle, vehicle for hire, mass transit vehicle or 'type one' school bus."

The penalties for noncompliance are first offense, up to \$100; second offense, up to \$200 within one year of the first offense; and three offenses or more, up to \$500within one year of the first offense.

PMO will follow suit

Military policemen at Kaneohe Bay are making sure that small children are well protected from death or injury while they're passengers in vehicles.

Since mid-1983, the Hawaii Child Passenger Restraint Law has been in effect. This law commands parents to provide seat belts or a child safety seat, depending on the child's age, for their children when they are riding in a vehicle.

However, because of past shortages in safety seats, state police have not actively enforced the law. But effective May 1, citations will be issued to parents who violate the law.

Although there hasn't been much enforcement in the civilian community, Military

Policemen here have been carrying out all provisions of the law since it was passed, according to Gunnery Sergeant Steven Jensen, NCOIC of the Traffic Section, Provost Marshal's Office.

When a Military Policeman notices, .through incoming vehicles at the Station's gates or through routine traffic stops, that a child is not properly strapped in a vehicle, the policeman will direct parents to buckle the child up immediately. No citation will be issued, but a warning will be given.

If the automobile does not have a safety seat for a child under the age of four, the person will be directed to the Provost Marshal's Office to show proof of ownership.

If a person violates the law

WII Guadalcanal Marine laid to rest




Honolulu, Hawaii - An unidentified World War II Marine, killed during the battle for Guadalcanal, was buried with full military honors at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, the Punchbowl, April 11.

The remains, found near the area where Henderson Airfield used to be, were covered by construction workers in

Lieutenant General Charles G. Cooper, commanding general, Fleet Marine Force Pacific, identified the remains as those of a Marine who died defending the airfield. "We know not when he died," the general said, "we know he was a Marine . . . a large lad, a tall one. He represents countless hundreds we know not . . . we are a band of brothers . . . God rest his soul.'

The flag which drapped the casket was presented to LtGen. Cooper as members of 17 veteran associations paid final respects. The flag will be housed at HQMC's History and Museums Division, located at the Navy Shipyard, Washington, D.C.

The Central Identification Laboratory of Hawaii tried, unsuccessfully, to identify the remains. It was determined, however, that the Marine served with the 1st Marine Division and was probably killed during August, September or October 1942.



Sergeant Major Wilson Edwards Jr., a member of Brigade Service Support Group, died April 4, as a result of intracranial bleeding suffered during a PFT.

A memorial service was held April 9 at the Station Chapel, and was attended by fellow Marines and friends. Edwards' remains were transferred to North Carolina for

Edwards joined the Marine Corps in June 1966 and served with engineer units in Vietnam. He saw duty with a Marine Air Control Squadron; MSSG-37; Maintenance Company BSSG; and Headquarters and Service Company, BSSG. Other assignments included Marine Barracks and drill instructor duty.

He was a graduate of the Staff NCO Academy, Tactical Air Defense Controller School, and the First Sergeant's Administrative Course. His personal decorations include the Navy Achievement Medal, Combat Action ribbon, and the Good Conduct Medal.

He is survived by his wife, Marvis, and a 2-year-old daughter, Shata.

H&HS admin clerk named 'Federal Employee of the Year'

When Lynn Docktor, a military personnel clerk here, won the prestigious award of "Federal Employee of the Year" (Clerical and Assistant) at the Federal Day Awards Luncheon held in Aonolulu, April 11, she celebrated in a way most would consider unusual.

There was no champagne, no party, not even a phone call to her husband. She quietly celebrated her achievement in her own way, by simply going back to work at Headquarters Squadron and, taking care of her Marines as she has been doing for the past 18 years.

It was the fourth time the Hawaii-born civil service employee, of Japanese ancestry, was nominated for the top award, which is only given to one person out of more than 20,000 federal employees in the Pacific Docktor was one of seven finalists vying for the honor.

Winning the award was the highlight of Docktor's long career at H&HS, a job she has held since she graduated from business college with an associate of arts degree in 1967.

"This award means I've attained the highest possible honor you could get. It means that all the hard work, all the overtime, and all the frustrations associated with this job, were well worth it," said the 37-year old unit diary

Her accurate and timely unit diary submissions, which has continuously placed the squadron in the top 10 percent of reporting units throughout the Marine Corps, are just one of the many reasons Docktor captured the award.

She is also responsible for more than 600 service record books, ensuring that their pay, promotions, physicals and leave papers are well taken care of.

According to Gunnery Sergeant Michael Eslinger, squadron administrative chief, Docktor did more than just earn the award. "It is about time she received it," he said.

"In the 14 years I've been in the Marine Corps, Lynn is the best unit diary clerk I've seen. She is easy to work with and goes out of her way to help the Marines in the squadron. She knows how to work under pressure and because of that, she makes things easier for everyone else here," he said.

What has kept the 4-foot-8, energetic mother of a young son, at the same job for so long?

She says it is definitely not the pay as she can't go higher than the GS-4 level she reached long ago; and there are no more promotions in her job here. Had she left the squadron for another position, she thinks she might have been a GS-11 by now, like her counterparts.

For her, it has been a goal just to say, "I'v, been with Headquarters and Headquarters Squadron for 20 years.

Cadets hone skills during Hawaii visit


Many male cadets had taken the initiative to get a "high and tight" haircut before arriving. They stood tall in their uniforms as they listened to the "welcome aboard" speeches. There was excitement among them as they realized the training they were going to experience.

During a regular school year, the cadets receive 55 minutes a day, five days a week, of MCJROTC training. The time is devoted to classroom instruction, drill periods and physical training. It is only on scheduled visits, such as these, that the cadets get the chance to experience actual Marine Corps training.

Their days began at 5 with a morning jog. Their weeks' itinerary was planned so they would be able to observe as much as

The cadets spent a portion of one day at Brigade Service Support Group, where they toured the Maintenance and Engineers' companies, and also the Motor Transport Unit.

They rappelled off a 50foot rappelling tower with

Marines from the 3d Marine Regiment. Rappelling was a favorite of both the male . and female cadets, as they all volunteered to rappel when asked how many wanted to do it.

The cadets also observed a simulated fire demonstration at the Crash Fire and Rescue Unit; visited a helicopter squadron; toured one of the fixed-wing squadrons now at Naval Air Station Barbers Point; rode in amphibious assault vehicles; and finally got "gassed" at the Gas Chamber, which was an experience that most said they would not forget.

Although it's not a requirement to enlist upon graduation, many of the cadets said they planned to

Cadet Private Kevin Williams, 14, explained his plans to join the Marine Corps after he graduates from high school. "I'm learning responsibility for myself and others," said Kevin. "I'm proud to be in the MCJROTC and will be

even more proud to be a Marine." Kevin said that he especially enjoyed living in the barracks.

Cadet Private Stephanie Land, 18, has plans to join the Police Cadets upon graduation, and eventually become a police officer. She believes that the MCJROTC program is a very good one.

There is a lot of pride in the students who belong to the MCJROTC," said Stephanie. "Every high school should have a program like this. I wish my old school did, I would have joined sooner."

This week was just about over, and everyone agreed that they had a great time. "We feel very welcome here," said retired Marine Lieutenant Colonel W. Dale Shuman, senior military instructor in charge of the cadets from California. "This is a one in a million shot for these youngsters," explained LtCol. Shuman, "I just wish we could extend our stay here, there is so

much to see and do. "But one thing is for sure;

the kids will be talking about their stay here long after we get back to California. And the talk will filter down to younger classmembers about how great the program really is. Their stay here made quite an impression on the cadets." Shuman conclude

Retired Marine Captain Ken Pitcher, senior military instructor for the cadets from Idaho, had the same good words to say about the program.

"It was a great week of training," said Pitcher. "We came here as a tight, compact unit, but now we are even closer. The cadets learned the Marine Corps way of working together, and they learned to work with a new kind of spirit."

Seven days end quickly when you are kept busy and everything you do is new. But the cadets' visit to Hawaii would not have been complete if they had not seen Waikiki; where they spent their last day of training.

Marines taking care of our own

The motto, "Marines take care of their own," continues to be proven by the Marines and sailors of Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron here.

Since Staff Sergeant Antonio Oliva's 6-year-old son, Matthew, was diagnosed with neuroblastoma cancer last year, SOMS's personnel and their families, and personal friends, have given an enormous amount of time, energy and spiritual assistance to the family; including more than \$1,700 in financial support.

Neuroblastoma cancer is primarily found in young children and forms a malignant tumor on the central nervous system. Matthew was diagnosed as being anemic last summer, but after being seen by various doctors, the tumor was discovered during an examination at St. Francis Hospital in Honolulu.

A Computerized Axiel Tomography Scan (CAT Scan), which displays computerized cross-sectional images from within the body, was done at Kapiolani Women's and Children's Medical Center last October and confirmed the tumor was located on the adrenal gland above the kidneys. It was diagnosed as cancer at that time. The tumor has since

spread to the bone and bone marrow.

"It was just a little baby that started growing inside me," said Matthew, who seems fully aware of his condition. "I think the tumor is dumb. I lost all my hair because the medicine makes it fall out. All of the other kids laugh at me because they don't understand."

There is approximately a 10 percent chance of him surviving two years without the bone marrow transplant he's scheduled to receive in March at the University of California Los Angeles Medical Center. Matthew will have to stay in the center for three month while his progress is monitored.

His mother Sharon contacted the Ronald McDonald House in Los Angeles and was told there'd be no problem staying there for the three months at \$5 a day - which will amount to more than \$400. In addition, the house, which is located 45 minutes from the medical center, doesn't provide transportation, adding to the expense.

The transplant will cost from \$150,000 to \$200,000, according to Oliva. Health insurance will pick up 80 percent of that amount, while the family will have to pay the remaining balance.

In an effort to help the family with medical expen-



Training for the day they hope will never come CFR:

As any yard-sale shopper knows, one man's junk is another's treasure. This is evident at the Crash, Fire and Rescue unit, here.

The "crash-crew" Marines from Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron take junk and reap hours of valuable training from it by using abandoned cars to simulate crash-damaged aircraft. Since most aircraft involved in accidents end up either totally destroyed or repaired, CFR units are not afforded the opportunity to train with aircraft.

The junk that becomes CFR's training treasure is provided by the Provost Marshall's Office and the Accident Investigation Unit. Abandoned vehicles are prime candidates for use by the Marines, who "cut 'em and rip 'em" for training. According to Gunnery

Sergeant Steven Jensen, noncommissioned officerincharge of the Traffic Management and Investigan Section, the vehicles are turned over to crash-crew after a thorough investigation and inspection.

"Most of the owners sign over the title for us to destroy the vehicle," said Jensen. "There are cases, however,

when we can't locate the owner. Then, we must wait a reasonable period of time before we remove it from the Air Station.

Useable junk

"When the vehicle is tagged for removal, we usually have it destroyed," Jensen added. "But we saw the way they could serve the crash-crew Marines. I think the program has assisted the Marines in maintaining proficency with their metal cutting tools," Jensen said.

Training and preparation are the keys to saving the life of a Marine aviator. According to Gunnery Sergeant Hank Nothen, CFR training NCOIC, thousands of hours are spent training for that one five-second incident.

"Because we spend more than 70,000 man-hours a year training for what we hope will never happen," said Nothen, "we use every tool available to us, including the use of abandoned vehicles. The cars allow us to tear, rip and burn metal structures similar to an aircraft cockpit, providing a kind of heads-up training that is a perfect partner to our fire suppression and first-aid practice.'

The abandoned car program was started February at the request of Nothen, who knew the junked cars were destroyed on a regular basis. He agreed to make the disposal arrangements for use of the vehicles for burning, cutting and entry practice. So far, the arrangement has proved invaluable to the Marines who look forward to every Wednesday for training.

Tools of the trade

"To use the cars to their fullest potential, we practice with our forceable entry tools such as pneumatic jaws, crimpers and metal-cutting circular saws," said Nothen. "These are what I like to call our 'glad to have' items. We could do our job without them, but they make it a lot quicker and safer to save a crash victim.

"The abandoned vehicles give my Marines good practice entering cockpit-like structures at their own pace,' Nothen continued. "It's better to have them make mistakes while we are training than while we are actually performing a rescue. We're also able to make a decision on rescue techniques while we are practicing rather than during an actual incident."

Gunnery Sergeant Nothen stresses that his Marines can't get enough training. At the same time, they can't make forced entries into aircraft or even damaged ones since they are sent to be repaired. The abandoned vehicles represent an area of training normally performed in the classroom.

"There's absolutely no substitute for actual destruction," commented Nothen as he demonstrated on a mock-up of a cockpit. "We can learn how to quickly cut and rip the right places to free the victim as fast as possible. We study the hiding places of fire and problems we may find when we cut into unknown material.

"Their primary mission, according to Nothen, is to save lives, then property. "We don't want an 'I told you so' situation to occur because of our lack of preparation," he said." We will have no regrets

because we are prepared for any emergency. This effort has not been wasted.'

The tougher, the better

The Marines in the Crash, Fire and Rescue unit take their training seriously. Using materials and property found around the airfield, they create scenarios from their collective imagination. The

tougher, the better. In addition to their practice with fires and cars bodies, they regularly train with the Branch Medical Clinic by conducting mass casualty drills and evacuation procedures. Each drill is videotaped to evaluate and critique the crew's perfor-

Aside from regular training hours, the crashcrew Marines also protect the airfield with several crews which rotate during the day.

Hot spots, such as the fuel pits, hangar areas and the air strip are covered by crews who continuously watch for danger. They must also protect landing zones away from the field.


They are required to man areas behind the 3d Marines training facility, Platt Field, Headquarters building and Bellows Air Force Station. Although the runway is officially closed, helicopter operations continue, keeping the Marines at Crash, Fire and Rescue on their toes.

Saving lives "The stress involved with fixed-wing operations may be gone temporarily, but the protection requirement hasn't," Nothen said. "We still have areas to cover on the runway; our schedule has not changed since they left. In fact, our job has increased because we are doing more for the helicopter crews by placing our vehicles where they are most likely to fly."

Although the Marines from Crash, Fire and Rescue don't want to make an actual rescue, if the time arises, they'll be more prepared using an otherwise wasted resource; turning it into a great treasure . . . a saved human life.

A sport "ideally suited to the Marine Corps" is growing in popularity, according to a local rugby enthusiast.

"Rugby is a natural sport for the Marine Corps," said Captain Bob Destafney, supply officer for the 1st Radio Battalion.

"It's growing in popularity in the United States, especially in the military. Military installations from all of the services are taking a look at the sport, but it's not the commanding officers who are pushing it; it's the troops who want to play the game," he said.

Destafney plays for the Hawaii Harlequins, one of 12 teams in the Hawaii Rugby Union. "I'd like to play for a military team, but I've played with the Harlequins for three years, and I'm sort of tied in

with them," Destafney said. The Wheeler Sunbirds is now the only military team in Hawaii, and are in their first year with the Union, so they play on a probationary basis, according to Destafney.

Increasing Corps-wide awareness, Destafney believes, will eventually find a team at Kaneohe Bay. "Rugby is not yet sanctioned by the Department of Defense," he commented, "but I'm told that it will be within a year or two. When that happens, Kaneohe Bay will probably try to field a team.

Recognition would mean that teams would be sponsored by DoD. Players would be eligible to compete for All-Star teams, the All-Marine team, and the All-Service team.

Destafney is confident that Marines will want to play

rugby, especially after it's officially recognized.

"Rugby encompasses all of those things that we like to say about Marines," he remarked. "You have to be physically fit and able to make a decision on the spot. In rugby, you can tell who's a leader and who's not.

According to Destafney, it doesn't cost a lot to play. "All you need is shorts, shoes, and a jersey," he said. "There are no shoulder pads or helmets, so it's a rugged sport. It's not for the timid, the fragile, or the unfit."

Many people compare

rugby with American football. But, Destafney said, such comparisons are illfounded. "The only similarity between rugby and football is that the balls are similarly shaped and you kick for points," he commented.


"Rugby is a much different game and is not as hazardous as football. It's true that you play rugby without protection, but you realize that and play accordingly," he said. There's no blocking in rugby, and contact with another player is not made unless he's





Cont. from B-3 got the ball and you're trying to tackle him.

According to Destafney, spectators like to watch rugby because of its fast pace. "It's very exciting for spectators," he remarked. "There are no timeouts. A regulation match is two, 40minute halves with a 5minute halftime. The clock runs constantly, unless there's an injury. Once the ball's in play, it stays in play. If it goes out of bounds, they just throw it back in.'

Although rugby is widely played in England, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa, it's not popular in the United States. "More people would probably go see fencing than would go to see a rugby game," Destafney said. "But people who have played rugby for awhile have come to love it.

"America was once a fairly well-respected rugby power," Destafney continued. "Years ago, rugby was an Olympic sport. The last time it was in the Olympics was 1924, and the United States won. Unfortunately, our power has since declined.'

Efforts have been made to halt that decline. A group of America's best military rugby players went to England in 1984 to learn from the more-experienced British





Emergency service just moments away

by Sgt. L.C. Brooks Ambulances ready to roll at a moment's notice, with attendants well versed in emergency care, are based on the Air Station.

"The drivers of our six ambulances are Corpsmen, and must attend a two-day defensive driving and emergency driving courses before operating an ambulance," said Hospitalman Chief David Powell, chief master-at-arms at the Branch Medical Clinic, here.

The ambulance crews answer all calls on the Air Station. "We respond because we can't decide whether or not a situation warrants emergency care until we arrive at the scene. So we respond to calls from women in labor, to broken limbs and heart attacks," said the chief.

It usually takes a crew four to five minutes to get to a scene if the correct address is given. "When a call comes in, we need to know the type of injury, location and person's name in order to speed up care when we arrive. Care of the person is the crew's ultimate goal," said Powell.

When attendants are enroute to a scene, they have one thing on their minds - a plan of action. Having a plan when arriving at the scene is important so time is not wasted in administering proper care.


Deciding what is immediately needed is the first priority of the Corpsmen, and although a doctor doesn't go with the crew, one is on radio standby if advice is needed.

If in critical condition, a patient is taken to Castle Medical Center after emergency care is given at the scene. The patient is later transferred to Tripler Army Medical Center when their condition stabilizes. If a patient's condition is not critical, he's transported to the clinic here, where followup treatment is received.

But the transporting of patients would not be possible if the ambulances weren't in peak condition. "Daily fluid levels and oxygen checks, as well as first aid equipment inventories, ensure that ambulances are in prime operating condition," said Powell.

Combining the ambulance crew's efficiency and maintaining the ambulances ensures rapid response to emergency health requests.





SALT Too much can cause problems

Sodium. People have been using it to season or preserve their food for centuries. But current findings indicate that consuming too much may not be good for some people. It is linked to high blood pressure in susceptible groups. How strong this link is remains unclear.

Here are some highlights of current scientific thinking about the proper dietary role and health effects of sodium.

In addition to common table salt, sodium is found in foods, food ingredients, drinking water, medicines and numerous other sources. It's an essential nutrient that helps keep body fluids in proper balance and maintains correct blood volume and pressure within the blood vessels.

About 25 percent of our sodium intake occurs naturally in foods. About 50 percent comes from processed foods contain-

ing salt or other sodium compounds. The remaining 25 percent comes from salt we sprinkle on our food at the table or use in

cooking.

Despite often-expressed concern, only one in five Americans either has hypertension or is vulnerable to it. An individual's blood pressure can be affected by obesity, heredity, smoking, stress and possibly insufficient calcium as well as too much sodium. The more of these risk factors an individual

exhibits, the greater the chances of hypertension.

The National Academy of Sciences believes that a range of 1,100 to 3,300 milligrams of sodium daily is sufficient for normal, healthy people.

Although excess sodium in the diet may be linked to hypertension, this does not mean we should avoid all sodium. If you want to cut back, the easiest way is to decrease the amount added at the table and in cooking.

How to ease pain

Have you ever experienced a sharp pain in your side after running a mile or two? The side stitch, located just below the rib cage, is caused by a lack of blood supply to the peritoneal ligaments, which support your internal organs, including your stomach.

Running regularly will condition those ligaments. Beginning runners can get immediate relief by lying flat on their back, kicking their legs up in the air to assume an upside-down position, and rotating their legs in a bicycle-exercise fashion.

St. Francis has pursued a philosophy of creating a "hospital without walls," and currently has 10 different outreach programs at 13 different locations on all five major islands.

It traces its history in Hawaii more than 100 years to the arrival of a small group of Franciscan nuns who provided care to Hansen's disease patients on Kalaupapa, Molokai. The Sisters continue care there today. However, a multidenominational group of professionals provide services under the St. Francis banner throughout Hawaii.

Some of its other innovative and pioneering programs include Hawaii's only Pain Treatment Center, a unique Lifeline program for the elderly, a Women's Alcohol Treatment Center, Dental Center, Neighborhood Health Center and Ambulatory (outpatient) Services Center

Balance key to health

Kaneohe resident, Dr. Rand J. Pellegrino, has written a book entitled "Balance: Your Key to Health." It is a fresh look at an ago old concern—how to stay healthy.

His premise is that the time to take care of yourself is while you are healthy, instead of after you get sick.

After examining what health really is (not just the absence of disease, but a state of complete physical, emotional and social well-being), Dr. Pellegrino addresses clean air and water, rest, nutrition, exercise, free flow of nerve energy and attitude.

Written in an easy to understand style, the purpose of the book is to make you understand that you really are in control of your own health and that health comes from within, not from a bottle of pills.





Environmental factor has effect on health

Bright lights, job deadlines, noise pollution, poor posture - what do these have in common?

All are environmental stresses that can cause head pain.

These are some of the findings from a unique research project, under-taken by Glenbrook Laboratories.

The research is unique because, unlike hospital-based clinical studies or market surveys at shopping malls, it probed the inner thoughts and feelings of people from all walks of life. The study asked how people experience everyday pain, what are the sources of the pains in today's evolving work, and how have they learned - through practical experience — to cope with these stresses.

From this collective

experience three important steps for an effective lifestyle approach to the management of everyday pain have emerged.

First, realize that you are not alone. Don't isolate vourself. Nearly everyone suffers from some form of daily aches and pains at one time or another.

Second, take steps to adjust your environ-ment. For example, change the lighting at your workplace; organize your work by priorities and ask for help if you need it; study your posture to improve your body mechanics.

At times, a third avenue to pain management responsible self-medication with a non-prescription pain reliever - can be useful. Your choice may be an aspirin product or a non-aspirin pain reliever.

In either case, respon-sible self-medication includes reading label directions to avoid misuse or abuse of the pain reliever of your choice.

Consider all three steps for the management of your everyday pain. And, remember one more point of the dialogue: set aside some quiet time for yourself each day.

DENTAL TIPS Don't be afraid to ask a dentist questions

For many people a visit to the dentist is something to be avoided. Because of fears and ignorance about dental often put off until a serious problem develops and cannot be ignored.

A good dental examination should include the following:

· A complete examination of the mouth including your gums, cheeks, lips and tongue for signs of disease.

• A careful examina-

tion of your teeth, using a special probe.

 X-rays if necessary.
Some dentists believe in taking X-rays every six months, others only once every year. Some dentists believe X-rays are potentially dangerous and may not take them more than once every five years. If your dentist orders an X-ray, ask how it will help with the diagnosis.

 A thorough cleaning including scraping the plaque off the teeth.

If you need to have extensive treatment, such as root canal or capping work, you should ask your dentist for a written summary and an esti-mate of the cost. He may not be able to give you an exact price because unexpected problems may arise during the work.

Ask your dentist to explain the advantages and disadvantages of different types of treatments before your make a decision.

Avoid dentists who Avoid centists who seem overly anxious to pull teeth. An extraction should be done only as a last resort, after all other possibilities have been ruled out. Often root canal therapy or periodontic treatment can save a tooth. These procedures are more costly and timeconsuming than an extraction, but they are

usually worth it.

Extractions leave you more susceptible to other dental problems. Even more important, there is iust no substitute for your own natural teeth.

Children, just like some parents, frequently experience great anxiety when scheduled for dental work.

· First of all, remember that your child's attitudes reflect your own. Don't elaborate on your own personal fears about dentists.

• It is also a good idea to wait until the day of the appointment to tell your child about his trip to the

There are six "dontias" that are a part of dentistry, and each one is a separate dental special-

Pedodontia Children's dentistry. The Pedodontist is in short supply - only about one to two percent of all dentists. He is trained to deal' with the special problems of children and adolescents.

2. Endontia - Root canal therapy. An Endo-dontist deals mostly with the more complicated root canal cases. About 90% of general practitioners also do root canal work.

3. Orthodontia Straightening teeth. The Orthodontist corrects the improper position of the teeth and fits people with

4. Periodontia . Diseases of the gums. The Periodontist treats the gums, bones and support-ing tissues that hold teeth in place.
5. Prosthodontia

Artificial tooth replace ment. A Prosthodontist replaces missing teeth with artificial ones and fits people with dentures.

6. Exodontia — Oral surgery. The Exodontist extracts teeth, removes impacted wisdom teeth, sets implants performs maxillofacial surgery, sometimes called orthodontic cosmetic
