Housing board meets

The Family Housing Advisory Council meets the third Friday of the month in the Family Service Center here to address issues which affect the majority of family housing occupants.

The council is mainly concerned with services provided, future service implementations, and policies and practices which affect services.

The council makes recommendations to the Commanding Officer, but does not make policy. The staff representatives on the council are the Commanding Officer, the director of the Family Service Center, the Area Family Housing manager, the Facilities Department maintenance officer, the Station Inspector and the Provost Marshal.

There are 13 representatives on the council: one for senior field grade quarters: two for company grade officer quarters; five for senior enlisted quarters; and five for junior enlisted

Nominations for representatives are made by the director of the Family Service Center and the chairperson of the council and then forwarded to the commanding officer.

The chairperson is elected by majority of occupant advisors and remains in office until moving from the Kaneohe Bay government quarters or until replaced by the Commanding Officer.

MCSF guidelines set for '86 school year

Marine Corps News -The Marine Corps Scholarship Foundation (MCSF) will award \$425 thousand in cholarships for academic 1986-87.

Since 1962, MCSF has given out 2,954 scholarships, ranging in value from \$600 to \$1,500. About nine of every 10 applicants receive some financial aid, according to MCSF officials. In 1985, scholarships were awarded to

362 applicants from 45 states. To be eligible for a MCSF scholarship, applicants must come from families with a combined gross family income of not more than \$25,000 in the 1985 taxable year. They must be the children of active duty or reserve Marines in good standing, or the children of Marines honorably or medically discharged, or

Academic requirements include being a high school senior or a graduate, or being registered as an undergraduate student in an accredited college or post high school vocational/ technical institution. Scholarships are not available for graduate study

Nov 15 pay raise

3% increase retroactive to Oct 1

Marines will notice an increase in their Nov. 15 paychecks, which comes from the Department of Defense-wide 3 percent pay raise retroactive to Oct. 1.

"A determination was made at Headquarters Marine Corps to authorize payment of scheduled increases in base pay, Basic Allowance for Quarters, and Basic Allowance for Subsistance in the Nov. 15 payday, said Chief Warrant Officer-4 C.D. De La Rosa, Disbursing Quality Assurance Officer, here. "Pay increases have been computed, retroactive to Oct. 1, and will be reflected as projected amounts on the October Leave and Earnings Statements.'

According to De La Rosa the October LES should be distributed by this payday and will indicate the exact increases to the basic allowances.

Other changes to the pay system will not be implemented until the President signs the Defense Authorization Act, which includes the scheduled change to the Variable Housing Allowance system from the present Overseas Housing Allowance, formerly known as Rent-Plus.

"The day the President signs the Act is when the VHA entitlement for Hawaii will go into effect," said De La Rosa. "Those people who report in or after that date will draw VHA. Everyone else will be 'grandfathered' if tney are drawing OHA or on Temporary Lodging Allowance. Those who are in government housing and move out in town after the



effective date of VHA will draw VHA.

"From what information we have been able to gather here, the 'grandfathering' will apply until an individual executes Permanent Change of Station Orders out of the state, or four years from the date the President signs the Act, which ever comes first, even if the individual is deployed. 'Grandfathered' individuals will not have a choice of electing VHA over OHA."

Marines in deployable units who are splitting housing costs with other service members will still draw their allowances when deployed.

"From what we understand right now, deployed individuals will draw their allowances in order to maintain their quarters while deployed," said De La Rosa. Under our old system of deployment, going on 'floats. gunnery sergeants and above received their allowances for only 90 days of the deployment. Now, under the Unit Deployment Program, we do not have that 90-day limit and Marines will draw their allowance the entire time they're gone.

The VHA payment system is presently a flat rate system and doesn't include the same requirement of rent-splitting that OHA does. However, the VHA payment system itself is scheduled to undergo a massive change.

"Each service has been directed to conduct a survey or everybody who is drawing an allowance for off-base housing," said De La Rosa. "We are expecting to receive our survey implementation directions within the next three weeks." In the survey, according to De La Rosa, the exact expenses for rent and utilities must be certified. From this, by rank ceiling rates will be established for different geographical areas.

De La Rosa stated that. present information indicate that, like OHA, the amount of VHA received by an individual Marine will eventually be determined by the exact amount of their outof-pocket rental expenses, up to the specific ceiling. This method of VHA payment would apply throughout the Dol) community and not be restricted to Hawaii.

"Once the proposed system is in effect," said De La Rosa, "it is possible that an individual will not draw, VHA if there is no additional cost for housing over their BAQ. This will eliminate the 'windfall profit' of the present VHA system and will save the services money for use in other areas."

Other changes included inthe Defense Authorization-Act are increases in enlisted Hazardous Duty Pay, from \$83 to \$110 per month; Dislocation Allowance from one month BAQ to two; Family Separations Allowance (Type 11), from \$30 to \$60 per month: and Hostile; Fire Pay, from \$65 to \$110 per

Also included in the Act areincreases in mileage rates: dependent Per Diem rates: Household Goods weight. allowance increases: Overseas; Tour Extentions: and Flight Pay for those who are required to fly because of their jobs but are not necessarily crewmembers.

A new entitlement called Temporary Lodging Expenses: could ease some of the costs. incurred with certain types of PCS orders.

"TLE would pay as much; as \$110 a day for up to four; days of a PCS move to the mainland, and up to two days for a PCS move involving an overseas transfer, such as from the mainland to here" said De La Rosa. "All of these programs have been approved; however, the funding hasn't been established yet. We have a situation now where it is up. to the individual services to find where the funding for the programs will come from.

DoD eyes credit card use for military exchange patrons

sing credit cards in military ex-changes would be a great conve would add nearly \$20 million a year to exchange coffers. Furthermore, half of that money would be "rebated" to patrons through contributions to morale, welfare and recreation activities, a DoD

Defense officials are asking Congress to permit the use of nationally recognized credit cards in military exchanges around the world. Earlier this year, the

chiefs of staff of the Army and Air Force, the Chief of Naval Operations and the Commandant of the Marine Corps wrote letters to the committee in support of the proposal. Senior enlisted advisors for the four services testified in support of the measure during quality of life hearings last February.

'We believe that our patrons should have the opportunity to shop in the exchanges with the same convenience they have elsewhere," Jerry Calhoun, acting Assistant Secretary of Defense for Force Management and Personnel, told the committee.

"Acceptance of credit

cards will reduce the need of our patrons to carry or keep large amounts of cash on their person or in their quarters," Calhoun said. "It will permit immediate possession and use of some items currently placed in layaway. And it will incrementally increase both exchange sales and earnings used to support morale, welfare and recreation activities," he

said "Using credit cards in exchanges won't raise prices, replace or eliminate the layaway or overseas deferred payment program," Calhoun said. "And it won't involve the exchanges in determining the credit worthiness of their patrons."

If Congress agrees, DoD would decide which

nationally recognized credit cards to accept through competitive bidding by such major companies as Master Charge, Diners Club, Visa, American Express and Carte Blanch.

Customers would not be allowed to buy food or make purchases at convenience stores or vending operations with credit cards.

The deferred payment plan overseas and layaway program will remain intact with a 12 percent annual interest rate. Credit card companies normally charge 18 percent. Military uniforms and accessories will continue to be sold on credit without interest


The Army and Air Force Exchunge Service contributed \$118.2 million.to morale, welfare and recreation coffers in 1984 recreation collers in 1984 and expects to donate about \$111 million this year. "Thut equates to about an \$88 'rehate' for every person in the Army and Air Force," suid an AAFES spokesman. "Our yearly earnings are. "Our yearly earnings are split in half — 50 percent for us to run the business and 50 percent for and 50 percent for morale, welfare and recreation.

Some \$74 million was contributed to morale, welfare and recreation funds by the Navy Exchange Service in 1984 -\$51 million from retail stores, \$20 million from ships stores and \$3 million from Navy lodges. Navy exchange officials project a total contribution of more than \$80 million for 1985.

The Marine Corps Exchange Service contributed \$17 million to morale, welfare and recreation funds in 1984 and expects to contribute about the same amount in 1985.

All four services use the contributions for major construction and renovation of morale, welfare and recreation facilities. The Air Force, Navy and Marine Corps also send some of the money back to major commands and installations for use as commanders deem necessary

The crew arrived at the Air Station before dawn Oct. 24 to tape members of CommSpt. conducting physical training. Following their PT session, they went to Anderson Hall to tape Marines having breakfast, then a morning formation at Engr. Co., 3rd Marines.

The newsteam went to the Brigade/Station headquarters where they taped military policemen conducting morning colors. Bellows Air Force Station was the next stop for the crew, where they taped Marines of Co. "B". 1/3, in an amphibious assault aboard LVTP-7s from Company A, Assault Amphibian Vehicle Detach-

Once back at the Air Station, they stopped at a "snapping-in circle" where rifle coaches and shooters were preparing to go to the Rifle Range. Then they went to MAG-24's Intermediate Maintenance Activity where they taped Marines working on aircraft components.

During lunchtime, they taped some joggers on the Air Station and then visited Company A, 3d Recon. Bn., where Marines were practicing close order drill in preparation for an upcoming inspection.

The following day, Jones and Campbell taped helicopter flightline activities here, and flew aboard aCH-53 from Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron-463 on a routine resupply mission to PTA. At PTA, they visited air controllers and taped ist MAB Marines directing artillery and air strikes on a live-fire range.

The newsteam visited NAS Barbers Point Oct. 29, to tape. VMFA-232 and VMFA-235 preflight activities and F-4 "Phantom" takeoffs. Radar emissions on the runway shut down Robert Campbell's video camera, so he returned to Barbers Point on Oct. 31 to retape F-4 takeoffs.

Vehicle Safety month announced

The Military Police Department here has designated November as Vehicle Safety Month.

The program is designed to educate the Kaneohe Bay community on the safe operating procedures of vehicles. While covering all aspects of safety, the program has two

The first is to reduce the number of thefts of property from parked vehicles. To achieve this, Military Policemen who see a parked vehicle with unlocked doors, or with packages and other valuables left inside, will place a yellow "Reminder Slip" on the windshield. The slip is not a ticket, but a way of informing owners that they failed to take preventive meanies to protect their property.

The second goal is to increase the use of safety restraints, which will also prepare everyone to conform to the upcoming Hawaii Seat Belt Law which goes into effect Dec. 16.

In conjunction with the "All American Buckle Up," a national program aimed at the increased use of safety restraints, the Military Police will be distributing literature concerning the use of seat belts and child restraints.

License renewal policies vary from state to state

"Some states don't grant automatic extensions on expired drivers licenses to military members," said Sgt. Michael Noss, the Court Baliff at the Provost Marshal's Office, here.

Renewals or extensions are required in some states, but some states don't grant automatic extensions. They

Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Maine, Mississippi, Missouri, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, Wisconsin, Wyoming and the District of Columbia.

Citations for driving with an expired license fall under the jurisdiction of the federal magistrate, and fines range from \$25 to \$100.

"Many states have special conditions for licenses held by military members," said Noss. "Some require an extension card to be attached to their licenses. If a license was issued before a certain date, in some states it does not need an extension.'

"I was late getting to the run and started with the last unit formation," said Dipman. "I feel good that I was able to come from that far behind to capture first place for the second year in a row."



Station wins top DoD environm

'Thousands of actions by hundreds of peo

hrough diligent tection and enhance-ment efforts on the Mokapu Peninsula, the Marine Corps Air Station received the 1984 Secretary of Defense Environmental Quality Award and earned the distinction of being the "runner up" installations for the 1984 National Resources Conservation Award within the Department of Defense.

Both titles were preceded by victories in similar competitions at a lower level. Chosen as the Marine Corps' best installation for Environmental Quality and Natural Resources Conservation, the Air Station was the best in the same categories of the Secretary of the Navy level.

During ceremonies held in Washington, D.C., Sept. 5, the Air Station's commanding officer, Col. Robert P. Rogers and Dr. Diane Drigot, the Air station's environmental protection specialist, accepted several awards for the Air Station's achieve-

tradition of winning awards in Kaneohe Bay," said Dr. Diane Drigot. "Concern for the environment has become a part of Marine Corps tradition."

The Environmental Quali-ty Award is the result of thousands of actions by hundreds of people," said Col. Rogers. Those actions Rogers. Those actions ranged from improving used oil collection and recycling

program, to supporting scientists of the Bishop and the Smithsonian the Smithsonian Museums in research resulting in the discovery of fossilized bird bones, more than 120,000 years old, near Human Centers. Ulùpau Crater.

Air, water and noise pollution control; toxic and hazardous materials management; as well as environmental research assessment and enhancement were all areas of achievement for the Air Station.

In the 1984 Environmental Quality Report, Drigot noted the Air Station has passed every air quality inspection by a state with "some of the most stringent ambient air quality standards in the

Having eliminated the dumping of sewage into Kaneohe Bay by constucting a new Wastewater Treatment Plant in the 1970's, the Air Station now focuses its water pollution program on the

pollution program on the maintenance of the plant. According to the Air Station's Hazardous Waste Coordinator, and former Wastewater Treatment Plant manager, Jim Whaley, the plant's performance has greatly improved with the recent installation of new pumps, mixing arms and pumps, mixing arms and filter assemblies.



"The plant is performing in full compliance with the regulations," said Whaley. "We were inspected by the Marine Corps: Inspector General team, the Environmental, Protection Agency

mental, Protection Agency and the Hawaii Department of Health in 1984. No deficiencies were found."

Installation of a new chlorination system helped the Air Station earn the right to continue using effluent water (flowing from the treatment plant) for grounds irrigation. According to Drigot, this has resulted in an average savings of 300,000 gallons of water a day, and \$96,000 in expenses

per year.
"Instead of buying more water from the Board of Water Supply," said Wholey, "we treat what we already" have and use it again. The new chlorination system helped us meet the state's strict criterion for the reuse of

The Air Station's environ-mental specialists arranged mental specialists arranged for the proper disposal of outdated medical supplies and used oil, which had fermerly found their way into the sewer system. Used oil collection facilities and oil/water separators were placed at problem areas.

Noise pollution, a problem common to installations with common to installations with aircraft operations was greatly reduced by the Air Station's close adherence to its "Air Installations Compatible Use Zones (AICUZ) plan.

"After noise measurements were made," said former SOMS Commanding Officer LtCol: Bill Frizell, "we were able to determine what measures we could take to least disturb the residents of Kaneohe and Kailua, while still accomplishing our

Rerouting flight paths away from residential areas

and limiting airfield operations cut down noise pollution levels, according to Frizell and former Noise Complaint Officer, CWO-2 Frank Perocchi.

"We restricted the altitudes of aircraft flying over residential areas on the inner shoreline of Kancohe Bay," said Perocchi He also said that restricting "high power turn-ups" (revving of aircraft engines) to 80 per cent also significantly reduced noise pollution levels.

"Flight-hour agreements were made with the two city councils." said Frizell, "We met our goals and currently have a very good relation-ship with the civilian community."

Through constant vigi-lance of hazardous material hundling practices, the Air Station has been able to maintain compliance with

strict environmention laws.

"A regular procedure has been developed," said Whaley, "whereby hazardous waste can be transported off-Station for recycling or disposal on a monthly

The specialists here implemented in aggressive implemented an aggressive education program designed to inform Air Station personnel and residents of the proper procedures for the proper procedures for disposing of hazardous waste and materials solvents and industrial chemicals.

"We want them to know," said Whaley, "that the Air Station is under a 90-day

Awards presented in local ceremony olonel Robert P. Rogers, Air Station commanding officer; presented the Facilities Department here with the Environmental Quality and Natural Conservation Award during a remony, Nov.

"I was lucky enough to go to Washington, D.C., and get the awards," said Col. Rogers. "The real winners of all these prizes are all of you."

The first award presented was the 1984 ceretary of the Navy Environmental unity Award, a painting of a Frigate bird spring above North Beach. The award was resented to the Air Station for preserving a environment while carrying out the daily issues.

A plaque and citation for the 1984 Secretary of the Navy Natural Resources Conservation Award was presented to the Air Station for "significant accomplishment in endandered species protection, community involvement, and coordination and compatibility with mission requirements."

A first place citation and a silver punch blowl were presented to the Station for the Secretary of Defense Environmental Quality Award, A plaque and citation were received for being "runner up" for the 1984 Secretary of Defense Natural Resources Conservation Award.

The little laward presented was a resolution from the City and County of Honolulu, congratulating the Air Station for winning the awards.

Fimit for removal of bazardous waste and materials off-Station, and that prompt action is required in order to comply with that limit."

Rich in natural resources, protected wildlife and properties listed on the State and National Rogister of Historical Sites, the Mokapu Peninsula presents varied environmental challenges to the Air Station.

"We have supported a number of basic research projects over the years," said Drigot, "knowing that such support leads to improved knowledge and decision-making about environmental impacts."

The Air Station's endangered Hawaiian stifts and protected red-footed booby birds are also benefiting from the Air Station's environ-mental research, protection and enhancement efforts. In an effort to improve feeding conditions for an

estimated 82 Hawaiian stilts, the Air Station Facilities Department dredged a sandclogged channel between Nuupia Ponds and the ocean. between

According to Eric Guinther, president of AECOS Incorporated, the need for the dredging of the channel became apparent when, at the request of the Air Station,

his company conducted tests

on the water of the eastern portion of Nunpia Ponds.

"Basically," said Guinther,
"sakinity levels were measured at five times that of seawater. The salinity level in the eastern ponds was so high that there was almost nothing living there to serve as a food source for the stilts."

as a food source for the stills.
Guinther said that before, and after monitoring by his company indicated that the dredging, plus an increase in ruinfall, helped reduce the salinity level in the ponds and restore food sources for the stills.

The stilts.

The habitat of the Hawaiian stilts was improved when organized working groups from the Air Station, the 1st MAB and the inclination of the state of the still and the state of the state of

civilian community cleared away feeding and nesting.

With a breeding season of 10 months a year, and a gestation period of seven weeks, the mongoose is one predictor, which prayers a predator which proves a constant threat to the chicks and eggs of the Hawaiian stilts and red-footed boobies.

"To catch and remove mongoose," said the Air Station's Game Warden, Sgt. Frederick Stukel, "we' set traps throughout Nuupia Ponds and the areas around the Booby colony."

Active community related programs, such as ecology camps, elementary school visits and college zoology classes also contributed to the Air Station's selection as the nation's best military installation for Environmen-



Employment assistance available

Marine Corps News -The Marine Corps has established Employment Résources Centers to assist spouses of service members, and separating and retired Marines, in finding suitable employment in local communities throughout the Marine Corps; and will assist spouses during relocation to a new area.

Five ERCs, colocated with existing Marine Corps Family Service Centers, began operating Oct. 1. Eleven other centers will open within the next two years.

The first five centers are located at MCDEC Quantico; Va.; MCAS Cherry Point, N.C.; MCAS El Toro/MCAS Tustin, Calif.; Camp Pendleton, Calif.; Camp Lejeune, and MCAS New River, N.C.

The remaining 11 will serve MCRD Parris Island and MCAS Beaufort, S.C.; MCAGCC 29 Palms, Calif.; MCAS Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii; Henderson Hall, Arlington, Va.; Camp Butler, Okinawa; MCAS Iwakuni, Japan; MCLB Albany, Ga.; MCLB Barstow, Calif.; MCAS Yuma, Ariz.; MCRD San Diego, Calif.; and MCFC Kansas City, Mo.

The fully-automated network of ERCs will eventually interface with a similar Navy system sharing valuable information on available job opportunities at each command.

Although this employment program is not a new military concept, automation separates the Department of the Navy's approach from the other services. With this capability, local ERCs can advise relocating families about career options available at their next duty station.

"The primary goal of the ERC program is to emphasize career potential and career progression - not just to find a person a job," said Maj. Linda R. Boone, Family

Programs officer at HQMC. Employment assistance included workshops, counseling and job referrals. Workshop topics include how to enter the federal government, dressing for success, career decision making, interviewing skills and resume preparation.

ERCs on the continental U.S. offer the same services, but those located at Camp Butler and Iwakuni will only offer assistance in finding jobs readily available on the military installation. ERC counselors in overseas areas will conduct workshops that emphasize education, goalsetting and reentering the job market after returning to Con US.

"Developing transferrable skills and transportable careers is the survival for military spouses. There are a wide vareity of transportable careers that more military families should be aware of when considering a secondary family income, said Nancy Hamilton, ERC Program Manager at HQMC.

Hamilton, who is the pioneer of the first institutionalized spouse employment program within DoD, spent four years developing this concept while a Civil Service employee for the Air

According to Hamilton, a transportable career will prove to be an invaluable asset to the military family. "Rather than just having people come in and saying 'here is a job listing, hope you find a job,' our focus is more

towards preparing people with job search strategies for a lifetime of independence," Hamilton explained.

HQMC plans to staff each ERC with a coordinator who has extensive background in family issues, employment opportunities and training. Local commands will be support.

Cisneros also had a good day. At one point, he thread the ball between two Bandits' to hit Clint Byther for a 50-yard gain and SOMS' third touchdown.



Diabetes: not a childhood disease

ave you thought about your pancreas today? If you have, your probably one of the thousands of Americans suffering from diabetes.

If you haven't, the American Diabetes Association wants you to think about your pancreas and the dangers of diabetes during November which

is National Diabetes Month. Contrary to what some people believe, diabetes is not exclusively a childhood disease. For every child diabetic, there are 10 adults who develop the disease later in life. Eighty to 90 percent of people who become diabetic do so after

Diabetes is characterized by an excess of sugar in the blood because the pancreas is not producing enough insulin or is resistant to insulin. Insulin is important because it regulates the natural supply of glucose and converts it to energy.

Without sufficient supplies of insulin, glucose accumulates and bodily functions deteriorate. Left untreated, diabetes can lead to blindness, neurological or kidney problems and even death.

iabetics are not allowed to enter the armed forces, said Navy Captain Peter Flynn, director for professional activities, Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Health Affairs.

"The policy varies for those who become diabetic

while on active duty," pointed out Flynn. Usually, insulin-requiring diabetics are required to meet a medical board and are discharged, except in rare cases.

Non-insulin requiring diabetics whose diabetes can be controlled through diet and exercise usually will be kept in the service. "Each incident," said Fynn, "is handled on a case-bycase basis."

There are actually two types of diabetes, according to LtCmdr. Gary Zaloga, an endocrinologist and director of research for critical care medicine, Naval National Medical



Center, and an assistant professor at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences.

"Type one, referred to in the past as childhood diabetes, is an actual insulin deficiency. It is believed to be caused by an infection that destroys insulin-producing cells.

Type two diabetes is an insulin resistance. Eighty percent of the people with Type-2 diabetes are obese," he said.

iabetes is the leading cause of blindness in the United States. Zaloga explained that diabetes affects nerves. The retina has many of them and is heavily affected by diabetes.

"The people who don't go blind lose some acuity and some can't drive. They tend to have blurred vision that is not correctable. Although they may be able to work, they may not be able to drive," said Zaloga.

Neurological problems also occur. "Victims will have pain in their arms and legs that may evolve into complete numbness," said Zaloga. "This makes it difficult for patients to walk. In some cases, because of the numbness, small cuts or bruises can become infected without the patient's knowledge. It can lead to amputation."

Zaloga pointed out that 40

to 50 percent of diabetics have some degree of neurological problem ranging from mild pain to severe disabilities. He noted that the changes usually take from 10 to 15 years to develop.

"The key is diet," he stressed. "Most diabetics don't have a total lack of insulin. With a proper diet, weight reduction and exercise, the insulin output and sensitivity can be controlled. But it still cannot be controlled as well as the body does it.

For diabetics who do not respond to diet and exercise, there is an oral medication that can be

administered. "When all else fails," said Zaloga, "insulin injections are called for.

What signs should you look for? "The two major signs," said Zaloga, "are frequent urination and a constant thirst."

Excess sugar is released through the urine and takes a lot of water with it. Dr. Zaloga said if you can't normally get through the night without having to urinate, you should see your doctor.

Weakness and fatigue are other signs of diabetes. So is sexual dysfunction impotence in males and difficult menstruation for women.

Is there any hope for the diabetic? "Yes," said Zaloga. "We can't totally reverse any of the complications of diabetes. but we can slow down the process.

Artificial insulin pumps are currently being used, but most diabetics find regular insulin injections are easier.

A new pump, about the size of a pacemaker, that is placed under the skin is being tested. It automatically reads the blood-sugar level in the body and administers insulin as needed. It's been likened to an artificial pancreas.

Zaloga said there is ongoing research on the possibility of pancreatic transplants.

An inside look at the world of alcoholism

drinking spree in, the local area with a buddy. The next thing he knew, he was at a bar 450 miles away. He asked his buddy what they were doing and how they had gotten there, "I don't know," the friend responded, "You drove."

That is a true experience related by a recovering alcoholic. Alcoholic blackouts, the numbing and knocking out of the memory part of the brain, are just one indicator that someone. one indicator that someone is having serious problems with alcohol. For many such people, the path to alcoholism began many years before

People drink today for many of the same reasons they always have: poer pressure, stress or the "high" associated with alcohol. Depending on who you are and what situation

you are in, biological. you are in, indiquest, psychological or social and cultural factors could get things rolling on the road to alcoholism. More likely, it will be a combination of all

Some people are born with what appears to be a predisposition to alcoholism." said LtCol. Louis W. Rosato, Jr., senior policy analyst for the Defense Department's Drug and Alcohol Abuse

Rehabilitation Program.
"The psychological factors include things like drinking to feel good, drinking to dance better and drinking to relieve inhibitions."

Rosato, who holds a doctorate in social work," said social and cultural factors exert strong influences, as when an 18year-old serviceman who is away from home for the first time goes drinking

with the gang every Friday night and gets bombed.

But there is a difference-between alcoholism and alcohol abuse. "People around the world tend to talk about anyone who has a drinking problem as an alcoholic. People need to understand the difference between and alcohol abuse and alcoholism," said

"You abuse alcohol when you take in more than your body can metabolize. It's an alcohol overdose," explained Rosato. This means about one drink every hour for the average person. "But that' doesn't mean 24 drinks in 24 hours." hé said.

Alcohol abuse, in whatever form, can lead to alcoholism. Some people are full-blown alcoholics by the time they are 14 years old.

Once people reach the point where they are



drinking, according to Rosato they probably have a problem. "Those who don't have a problem, don't even think about it," he

If you are thinking about your drinking habits, a "yes" answer to one of the following questions should start you thinking much

Somone who makes a conscious effort to get drunk on a Friday night to blot out the day's troubles, but remains in complete control as to when he or she intends to abuse the drug are thought to be an alcohol abuser.

Do you have an increased tolerance to alcohol? Over time, the body builds up a tolerance to alcohol? At first, it will take a six-pack to get a buzz on. Then it's a case, "At this stage, the drug alcoholis not alien to your body,

said Rosato, "It's like the body saying 'We were made for each other.'

Do you have alcoholic blackouts? This is not passing out or falling asleep because of too much alcohol This is where you continue

to function but don't recall what you did.

Have you lost control of when you drink? This is the most important question. "It's not that question. "It's not that someone can't stop drinking or decide to stop at three beers," said Rosato. "It's the inability to predict when you'll stop drinking or when you can't. This week you might drink socially, but next week you won't. You've lost control."

The key, said Rosato: is early intervention.
Friends, coworkers and family members may know about the alcoholic, but for some reason don't intervene

In most instances, military people are not incident as needing help until an incident occurs "We would like to get these people before some incident occurs that would ruin a career," said Rosato.






Kicking around the mule rumor

umor has it that the Army is contemplating the use of mules again. So far, it's just an idea that has been "kicked" around.

"The Army started a staff group to discuss the possible use of mules," said Lieutenant Colonel Craig McNab, an Army public affairs spokesman. "Before the first meeting, we were

swamped with calls and letters. People offered to sell us mules; to give us mules; and someone even sent a sample alfalfa cube we could feed to the mules," he said.

The Army has light divisions in areas with hilly terrain, such as Italy and Germany, where pack animals might be useful, according to McNab. They

may send people to school to learn how to handle mules so they can work with those used by the West German and Italian armies.


Because of their surefootedness, strength and durability, mules have been used by armies throughout history to carry supplies over rough terrain. And until 1975, they were used by the U.S. Army.

During World War I, the Army sent 62,200 mules to Europe for draft and pack work. In World War II, more than 30,000 were used in Italy and the India-Burma theater.

Except for the three mascot mules of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., advanced technology has made the Army mule obsolete with only occasional rumors of reemergence.

"Right now, we're not planning to get mules," said McNab. "We may not do anything at all," he added in response to published reports that the Army was considering bringing them back.

NORAD: America's eye in the sky

Washington, D.C. -Infrared-sensing satellites detect a launch. Almost instantly, radar systems identify the missile and its course. At communications and radar stations around the world, radar detectors. computer systems and telephones spring into action.

Last year, the men and women of the North American Aerospace Defense Command, or NORAD, went through this real-life exercise more than 500 times. Fortunately, none of these events was an attack; nearly all were determined to be missile tests or space launches - more than 450 of them conducted by the Soviet

After each launch assessment is completed, some 4.000 U.S. service members, in addition to members of the Canadian forces and DoD civilians and contractors, go back to their jobs, operating a worldwide surveillance and attack warning network. This network keeps a watch on aircraft, missiles and space systems that might pose a threat to the United States and Canada.

Chevenne Mountain complex, located near Colorado Springs. Colo., is the nerve center that would sound the first alarm in the case of an attack. Deep within the mountain, where it is shielded from all but a direct hit by a multimegaton warhead, is the compound post of the U.S. Space Command and the North American Aerospace Defense Command.

Computer systems feed information from North America. Greenland, Europe, the Pacific and Middle East to the command post, giving the commander in chief of NORAD, who also is the U.S. Space Command commander



Defense spending

Restoring the public trust in budgeting

"The most important weapon in our arsenal is the trust of the American people . . . (and) unfortunatelý we have placed that trust at risk," said William H. Taft IV, Deputy Secretary of Defense, in a recent speech to members of the National Security and

the National Security and Industrial Association.

Taft told members of the association, "We are partners in protecting our nation. Although the partnership is successful, the public has a generally poor image of the defense industry and are the successful. defense industry, and cuts to the defense budget are

threatening our nation's security," he said. Citing so-called procure-ment horror stories, Taft said he believed those stories were "the result of the Defense Department's own efforts to improve the way we do business."

"However, he added, citing. a poll that showed that the majority of Americans think big defense contracts rip off taxpayers, we can't dismiss public concern as failure to understand the intricacies of our complex business. We must rebuilt public confi-

onfidence-building is vital, according to Taft. The defense budget is being cut to the tune of \$300 hillion over the next five years — cuts that will increase the risks to

national security. But due to non-defense spending, our nation's budget deficit is still not being reduced. "It has turned out that DoD's fair share of deficit reduction was 100 percent of that effort," Taft said.

Positive efforts in the direction of improving Defense's image have already been made, according to Taft, including voluntary refunds by contractors of more than \$2.9 million for over priced spare parts and an automatic refund policy on the part of some contractors for parts DoD believes are overpaid.

He also credited industry with purging its defense work of those otherwise legitimate commercial practices that are improper or illegal in the e market place.

DoD has pursued a threepronged approach to reform. Weapons acquisition growth has been reduced from the 1981 level of 14 percent per year to the current level of less than 1 percent per year. DoD has implemented such free-market strategies as competition senhancements and breaking out spares and components. Oversight and

control have also increased.

According to Taft, such reforms are necessary, but public misconceptions about defense's share of the budget must also be corrected.

While more than half of the respondents to a recent poll believed that defense spending accounted for more than 20 percent of the gross national product (the total



Holiday mailing tips

The U.S. Postal Service has some "dos" and "don'ts" for customers who want to be sure their holiday parcels get

Use the right container — Boxes must be adequate in size for the items being mailed and provide enough space for cushioning material, and be strong enough to hold the weight of their contents. If the box has adequate space for an address, it is not necessary to wrap it in paper. If you use paper, be sure it is the same kind used in grocery bags (60-pound weight). Fiberboard tubes and similar long packages are acceptable if the length does not exceed 10 times their girth.

Use some cushioning — Examples of good cushioning materials are foamed plastics, corrugated cardboard and loose Fill material such as polystyrene, popcorn or shredded newspaper. Loose fill material should completely cover the

items being mailed.

Close parcels up right - Use tape, not string or rope, to close packages. Cellophane and masking tape should not be used. Pressure sensitive, filament-reinforced (packing) tape is recommended and should be wrapped around the parcel at least

Addresses are important — You can spend a fortune on wrapping, but your package will never reach its destination if it is not addressed properly. Print or type the address clearly on one side of the parcel only. It is also a good idea to put the name and address inside the package in case the address label comes off.


