## Battlefield robotics make test debut

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. — Three of the latest inventions in battlefield technology made their debut here in a joint Marine Corps-Army robotics demonstration Sept. 15-20.

During the five-day event, senior officers, media representatives and VIP's got a chance to see some of the applications of robots serving as battlefield predators.

Of the three prototypes demonstrated, one or more are expected to be in full use by both services before 1995.

"Their development is a result of a congressional mandate that the services consolidate their efforts in the field of robotic technology, in its development, and ultimately in its acquisition," said Capt. George W. Murray, a joint program test officer. Effort consolidation helps save DoD time and taxpayer money, Murray said.

The Marine Corps-developed teleoperated vehicle (TOV) system will consist of three remote-controlled HMMWVs (high-mobility multipurpose wheeled vehicles) and a fourth multipurpose vehicle used as a control station.

The Army's two versions, prototypes called tactical mobile automated platforms (TMAPs), are smaller (HMMWV transportable) and resemble four-wheeled all-ter-

rain vehicles, with assorted antennae and cameras attached.

All three vehicles are controlled through tiny fiber-optic cables. TMAPs also have RF frequency (radio) back-up in case the cable breaks or is damaged.

All three variants showed their stuff on a three-kilometer-square test range using laser-guided Hellfire missiles fired from a ground launcher and Copperhead artillery rounds fired by Golf Battery, 3rd Bn., 11th Marine Regiment.

During part one of the demonstration, the TOV maneuvered through various types of terrain. As each target was sighted, the operator using the TOV as his eyes, called for pinpointed, conventional artillery fire or a Hellfire missile attack. Additionally, an M-8 chemical alarm mounted to the TOV reported the presence of chemicals (simulated by CS gas) in the environment.

The major difference between the Army and Marine Corps systems was portability; the Army controlled their TMAPs from a fighting hole. Similarly, Army TMAPs located targets for attack, displayed their accuracy and mobility.

The Marine Corps' system uses TOV (s) and the control van.

A platform HMMWV with shelter attached is used for the control van. It houses a control center where a TOV section leader and up to three operators work.

Each operator controls the robotic vehicle through its mission, by watching the monitor and listening to a sound system, providing an audio and visual stereo display of the remote's position. Operators control mission modules, safety features and its laser range finder.

Future concepts of employment for TOV/TMAPs include counter-mine warfare, electronic warfare and provide tactical deception.

Development of Marine Corps robotic vehicles began in 1986. Unmanned Ground Vehicle Program Office Program Manager, Lt. Col. Robert Harper, said robotic vehicles will bring new capabilities and safety to the battlefield.

Harper, who works out of the Marine Corps Research, Development and Acquisition Command, Quantico, Va., said unmanned ground vehicles will help keep humans out of the line of fire. "It will move the Marine (or soldier) out of harm's way and provide reconnaissance, surveillance and target acquisition, supporting arms and laser designation of targets," explained Harper.

## Spanish pride is America's gain

CAMP H. M. SMITH—Not very many years ago, America annually celebrated its discovery by Christopher Columbus on Oct. 12. Fittingly, this year, Marines at Camp Smith chose that day to conclude the nation's month-long tribute to Hispanic American's with the theme of "500 Years of Hispanic Heritage 1492-1992, The Continuing Adventure."

The ceremony, which was also attended by members of the staff of the U. S. Commander-in-Chief, Pacific, was highlighted by Hispanic musical selections performed by the Fleet Marine Force, Pacific Band and the guest speaker, Maj. Joseph R. Ayala, United States Marine Corps.

Ayala, a second-generation Hispanic-American, who is currently assigned as assistant operations/exercise officer, G-3 Division, FMFPac, spoke proudly to more than 200 of his fellow Marines and servicemembers about his ethnic heritage and that special pride of being an American.

"My maternal grandfather was Doroteo Arrango. He

went on to be known in the history books as Gen. Ponce de Villa. I value my identity as his grandson. . . but, first and foremost, I am an American."

The New Orleans native mused about preparing his thoughts for the speech. "I dug into my history books and found many facts and figures about Hispanics," he said. As the list of their contributions grew, Ayala said he began wondering where his research was leading.

After reading the story about Lt. Cmdr. Everet Aiveres, the first American pilot to be shot down over North Vietnam, Ayala said, "It hit me. What was really significant is that Aiveres was identified as an American pilot."

Ayala concluded that it's easy to miss the message of observances that honor Hispanics, Blacks, Pacific Islanders, Asians, American Indians, etc. "All along I was trying to research what Hispanics have done for this country when the true significance of what I was looking for is that these people were Americans of Hispanic extraction," he said.

# Battle of the Bay

## As Honolulu police blocked the entrance to Hanauma Bay early the morning of Oct. 6, 82 volunteers, mostly

Marines from Maintenance Co., Brigade Service Support Group 1, managed to beat the rush of tourists down to the water.

The Marines were about to wage their own "Battle of the Bay" — not against Athletics or Giants, but against litter in one of Hawaii's top tourist attractions.

Visitors were delayed from entering the park for about an hour as scuba and skin divers swept the bay for rubbish.

Many of the snorkelers were equipped with gear supplied by MWR.

For the organizer, Cpl. Kenneth Stanton, of Maintenance Company's Electronics Platoon, the effort was the business end of a month's worth of planning.

When Stanton picked up the Sept. 4 Sunday edition of the *Honolulu Advertiser-Star Bulletin*, he was dis-

mayed to find an article about the increasing pollution being caused by overcrowding in the bay — the state's most popular site for snorkeling; and one of its leading tourist attractions.

The next day, Stanton and a friend decided to see for themselves what had become of the bay. They snaked through a Labor Day crowd of well over 10,000 for an investigative scuba dive of its expansive reefs.

They didn't like what they found — lost diving equipment and plastic trash adrift in the water. They also discovered that a lot of the bay's coral had been looted by visitors. "I dove there two years ago around the 'key-hole,' and there was coral there. When I went back, there was no coral at all," Stanton said.

"Though he's never led an environmental crusade before, Stanton, who took up scuba diving three years ago, de-

ecided to do something about the litter in and around the bay. He rounded up 18 scuba divers, 27 snorkelers and 37 other volunteers and obtained permission from the Marine Corps and from the city and county to help clean the place up.

"That guy's something else," said Robin C. Bond, the Supplemental Work Force coordinator for the city and county's Department of Parks and Recreation. "I give Cpl. Stanton a lot of 'Aloha' for doing this. He just said, 'I'm tired of this,' and took steps to get it cleaned up."

But, Stanton said, he didn't expect to get the kind of response he did — actually having to turn volunteers

away in order to ease supervision and maximize safety.

Volunteers like Cpl. Anthony Pollard, of Motor Transportation Platoon, Maintenance Co., BSSG-1, said they were happy to help in the effort. "As long as people keep it clean and don't leave it up to someone else to do, this bay is really a nice place," Pollard said. With only four maintenance personnel responsible for the upkeep of the bay, overcrowding has indeed had a negative ecological impact,

according to Bond.

Bond explained that plastic left in the water grows algae after an extended time. Fish then mistake the plastic for food and get sick or die as a result of eating, or trying to eat it. Most of the plastic is in the form of frozen pea packages left in the water by fish-feeding visitors.

The Supplemental Work Force Program, which also had a hand in the state-wide "Get the Drift and Bag It" cleanup, matches people who want to volunteer to improve

the environment with a project where they can do the most good.

Bond said the Hanauma Bay cleanup was the first one he's seen that has gone underwater as well as on the shore to pick up litter. "I was amazed at how little came out of the water," he said. "There's not that much trash in the water, but they did get important stuff — there were things out there that were potentially dangerous to wildlife. And they really picked the beach clean."

## Marines show Aloha during Molokai parade

MOLOKAI — Fourteen Kaneohe Bay Marines participated in a parade here Oct. 7 as part of the Aloha Week festivities, which included more than 35 parade entrants and featured dining, dancing and various contests.

Heavy machine gun platoon, Weapons Co., 3rd Bn., 3rd Marines provided two gun crews (MK-19 and M-2 .50 caliber) and two HMMWVs. A Tube-launched, Optically-tracked, Wire-guided missile system (TOW) crew, and one HMMWV was provided by TOW platoon, Headquarters Co., 3/3.

The Marines, weapons and equipment were air-lifted to Molokai by CH-53 helicopters from HMH-463 the day before to prepare for the pa-

rade. Vehicles were washed, hoods shined and uniforms pressed.

The three HMMWVs were scheduled as number 34 out

of 38 entries in the parade. The HMMWV with the .50 caliber came first, followed by the MK-19. The TOW launcher brought up the rear

of the Marine procession. Several hundred local people lined the streets, applauding and waving as the Marines passed by.

After rolling through town, the Marines parked in a softball field and welcomed the public to examine the armament and ask questions.

The curious local children spent the better part of the morning climbing on the vehicles, and sitting behind the mounted guns.

Lance Cpl. Jeffery Doss, driver of one of the HMMWVs, enjoyed talking about the weapons and vehicles with the children.

"I've always worked with kids one way or another," said Doss, who is a scoutmaster in his spare time. "This way, kids are learning what the Marines are about." "Most of the kids wanted to know if I had dog-tags like on Top Gun," Doss said with a laugh.

Many Molokai residents expressed their appreciation for the Marines' presence, with more than one local commenting, "You were the hit of the parade."

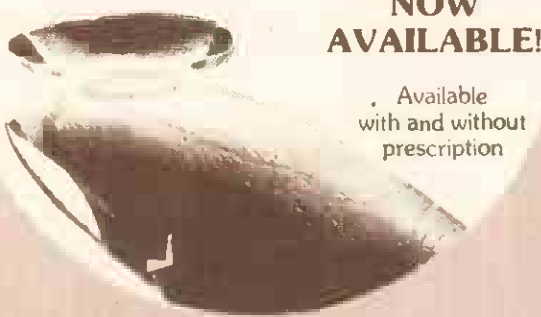

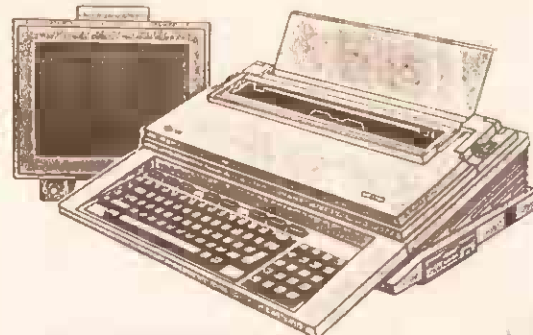

# Rules define the parameters for runners and joggers

From time to time I have had many people, who live aboard MCAS Kaneohe Bay, approach me with complaints about joggers and unit formation runs. Many of the complaints are valid, some however, are not. I hope this article clarifies some perceptions we all have had at one time or another.

Let me begin by saying, I enjoy running, and do it quite frequently. Although I no longer get from point A to point B as quickly as I used to, I still do it weekly. I guess you could say I am a jogger more than a runner.

Jogging is defined as recreational physical condition-

ing, involving individuals or small groups, with no one in a formation and no individuals in charge, and usually no chanting or cadence counting involved. I have been observed murmuring or singing to myself from time to time, and I know that when people see my legs, they say, "I have

seen better looking legs on a kitchen table!" I have been verbally abused about my singing; such comments as "he sings with his heart and soul, but he should try it with his voice sometime" or, "he really has an original voice. It's like arthura set to music." That really bothers me — right? Wrong! Not in the least.

Unit conditioning runs are defined as organized physical conditioning runs involving units in formation, under command.

Jogging is authorized at any time along all roadways, paths, bike lanes, streets, and lanes other than those areas that are considered restricted (i.e., areas that are physically defined and subject to control, for the safeguard of classified material and items that are inherently dangerous, such as ordnance).

Examples of security areas off-limits to joggers or unit conditioning runs are: Ulupou Magazine, all runways and taxiways, the golf course (including Moffett Road to the beach), ranges, the perimeter fence road, Naval Oceanic Systems Center compounds and areas, family housing, and the Nuihia Ponds area. Joggers should comply with all existing Air Station traffic regulations.

Joggers will normally run facing the traffic flow. Exceptions to this prudent rule may be made when there is a bike lane, a sidewalk, or off-street path on which the joggers may safely run. Unit conditioning runs are restricted to those routes previously mentioned. Additionally, the following regulations apply to unit runs:

1. Runs of company/battery size unit or larger shall be conducted so as to have minimum interference with traffic. When and where available, sidewalks and grass areas along the road will be utilized.

2. Runs shall follow designated bike lanes when available. Runs shall remain close to the side of the road, and none in the direction of traffic, unless a bike lane is available.

Let me emphasize a point.

When units are running toward the back gate, usually in the early morning hours, they are not using the bike lanes, grass areas, or side of the road correctly. The platoon sergeants outside the formation, are impeding traffic. I would agree that we don't have enough room in the base for training, but we don't need to shoot ourselves in the foot. Many of our spouses work, and they catch,

or by to catch the bus at Aikahi Park. When the platoon sergeants impede traffic, they can't catch the bus on time and have to wait for Inter buses. It's tough enough on spouses as it is—let's not be the cause of See SGTMAJ/A-6

# On the Blotter

## Alcohol Incidents

•The California Highway Patrol arrested a Kaneohe Marine for DWI in Calexico, Calif., after he was stopped for making a wide turn. 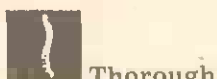

3. Road guards shall be used at all intersections. Road guards shall neither perform any type of exercise while posted, nor will they delay traffic once the unit has passed.

4. Chanting/cadence counting is prohibited in housing areas along the road from the intersection at the gas station complex to the Mokapu Gate, or anywhere in the Nuupia Pond Complex (except the assault armored vehicle access roads).

5. Reflective vests will be worn by leading and following road guards.

6. Physical fitness test runs are not required to have road guards consisting of testing participants. Unit commanders are required to provide for adequate traffic safety at intersections crossed by units taking the PFT.

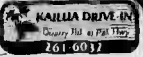

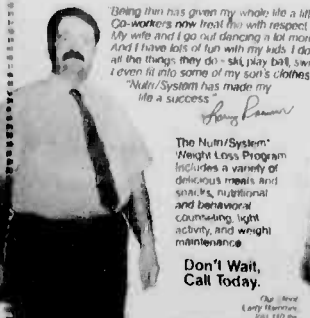

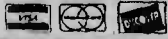

# Legally Speaking

## DIVORCE

The Legal Services Center has successfully implemented an uncontested divorce service, whereby a Hawaii-licensed Marine legal assistance attorney will represent eligible military personnel or their spouses in obtaining an uncontested divorce through the Family Court, First Circuit Court, State of Hawaii.

Eligible military personnel are those in pay grades E-4 and below, as well as their spouses. Military personnel in pay grades E-5 and above may request this service if they are experiencing substantial financial hardship. Such hardship must be satisfactorily documented.

This service is only available where the parties' divorce is "uncontested." If the matter is "contested," the service is not available and the parties will, in most cases, need to hire a civilian attorney.

An uncontested divorce case is, by definition, a case where the parties themselves are able to agree to the issues which must be resolved prior to the marriage being terminated.

A contested divorce is a case where the parties cannot agree upon these issues or terms of the divorce, and it becomes necessary for the court to resolve the issues.

The issues which must be resolved by the parties in order to make the matter uncontested are property division, debt division and spousal support.

If the parties have children of the marriage, the parties will need to resolve the additional issues of child support and child custody.

In other words, the parties would need to reach a mutual agreement as to what portion of the property or assets of the marriage each party would receive; what debt(s) of the marriage each party would be responsible for; what amount, if any, one spouse would pay to the other for spousal support; which party would be awarded custody of the child/children; and what an appropriated amount of child support would be.

If the matter is reduced to an uncontested divorce, a legal assistance attorney from the Legal Services Center will represent one of the parties from the initial filings through the uncontested divorce hearing itself, and the issuance of the divorce decree.

The other party may consult an independent lawyer at the Legal Services Center. Total cost of this service is \$30, payable to the First

Circuit Court for filing fees. The case will normally be resolved within two months. Civilian attorneys often charge in excess of \$500 for this same service. If the matter is contested and a civilian attorney is retained, the case will not be resolved for an extended period of time and the cost involved will be substantial.

Servicemen and women may inquire about this service before contacting the Legal Assistance Office at the Legal Services Center aboard the Air Station by calling 257-2160, 2168 or 2169.

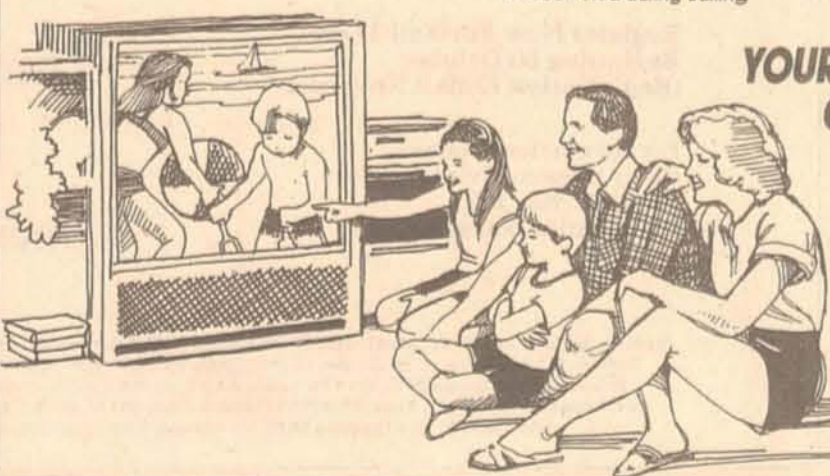

## Cross country team competes in 10K

The Hawaii Marine Cross Country Track Team finished third in the 1989 Hawaii Armed Services Athletic Council Cross Country Championship (HASAC). The meet was held at the Communication Naval Base in Wahiawa Oct. 6.

The race began in the early Hawaiian morning and covered 6.2 miles of hilly terrain.

The Kaneohe-based team had a total of 20 runners enter into the three divisions: the open, which consisted of 10 men, with the top seven finishers of each team scoring points the masters, five men 35-years-old or older, with the top three finishers of each

team scoring points; and the women's division, five women, with the top three winners of each team scoring points.

Silvin Striplin, one of the first female Marines to cross the finish line, commented on the race.

"The course was pretty difficult," she said. "There was no kick anywhere."

"I think the long inclines were probably the toughest thing about the race," said Larry Grayson, a runner in the Marines' masters division. "Considering the caliber of the other runners, we fared pretty well."

The track team's next race will be the 30-mile relay race in Honolulu Oct. 27.

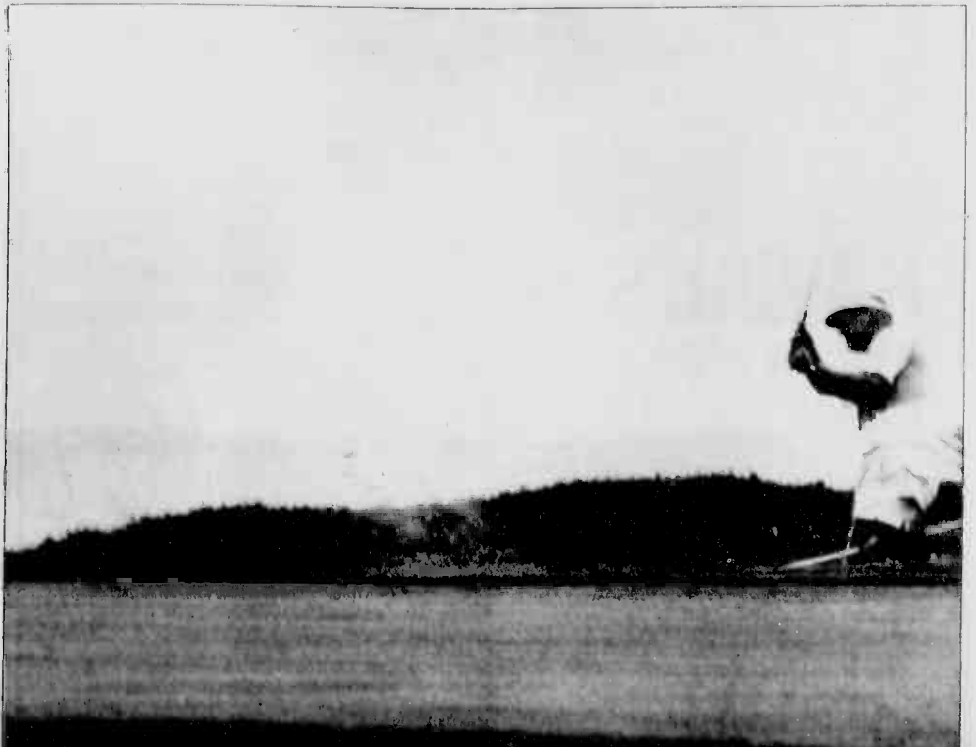

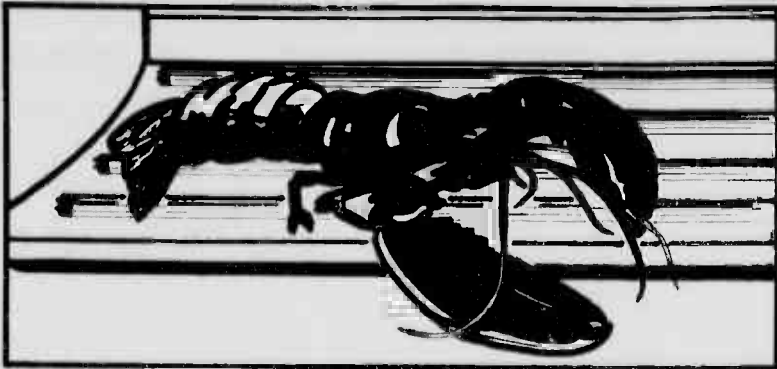


Bud Brown tees off on the 13th hole during a recent Men's Golf Association Club Championship held aboard the Air Station.

# Beware of indoor tanning



AFIS - Medical problems associated with over-exposure to the sun's rays are the same, or magnified, when people go to artificial lighting sources to get a tan.

Dr. William James, chief of dermatology at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, said, "I've seen patients whose skin was damaged by tanning devices. I wouldn't recommend that anyone use a tanning parlor."

The American Academy of Dermatology is concerned about the use of tanning devices for good reason. Negative effects can occur from using them, and dermatologists are making efforts, with some success, to encourage legislation to regulate the tanning industry.

The academy, and other concerned groups, urged the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), to help inform consumers about the risks associated with tanning devices. Last fall, the commission

issued a consumer fact sheet discussing the risks. It explained that shortwave ultraviolet rays called UVB (from natural sunlight) can burn the skin's outer layer, longwave rays called UVA (from tanning devices) penetrate more deeply and can weaken the skin's inner connective tissue.

Long-term exposure to the sun, artificial ultraviolet light, or both, contribute to the risk of skin cancer, including melanoma, one of the most fatal kinds of cancer.

James explained, "Early sunlamps put out UVB rays, resulting in quick burning. They weren't very popular. But for the past 10 years, sunlamps have been putting out UVA rays, which seemed safer. UVB rays, the kind in natural sunlight and older sunlamps, have the most potential for causing skin cancer. But recent research indicates that UVA (sunlamp) exposure may intensify the

concern-causing effects of exposure to sunlight.

"Researchers have also found evidence that excessive exposure to ultraviolet light can weaken the immune system," said James.

"The skin is the first outpost of the immune system. If skin cells are damaged, the body is not as well-protected against infection."

Another problem is that the UVA rays in sunlamps have more potential for making the body allergic to medications than do the UVB rays from natural sunlight. "Some people can tolerate medicines until they're exposed to sun or sunlamps. But once they get under sunlamps, high-time rashes can develop," said James. Increased likelihood of sunburn is another danger.

The FTC fact sheet listed some false claims that had been made by some tanning device manufacturers and salons. Although the FTC

took action against manufacturers making these claims, an agency spokesperson said that the misconceptions planted in the minds of the public are still thriving. Here are some of the misleading claims:

**Myth - You can achieve a deep, year-round tan with gentle, comfortable and safe UVA light.**

**Truth - Because the skin does not feel hot to the touch under artificial UVA light, it is easy to stay in it too long.**

**Myth - You can tan year-round without harmful side effects often associated with natural sunlight.**

**Truth - Too much exposure to ultraviolet rays thins the skin, making it less able to heal. It also causes premature aging, wrinkled, leathery-looking skin in early middle age.**

# Education

I would like to begin this article with a serious apology to those of you who read this article and to those of you who participated in the Education Survey.

I had said that I would publish the results of the survey and what we, at the Education Center, with the help of the Commanding General and Commanding Officer, are doing to improve matters.

Here are the results and our solutions:

1. There were two academic areas that were asked for more than any other—Computer Science and Criminal Justice/Police Science. We have received Command approval to seek out colleges and begin offering Associate and Bachelor Degrees in these two areas. I would expect to start offering courses at MCAS Kaneohe Bay for these two subjects in January or April.

2. A common complaint was that not enough was being done to publicize our offerings, as well as the availability and sources of

funds. As you may have noticed, we are running articles in the Hawaii Marine with the assistance of the outstanding Marines of this paper. These articles have been used primarily as a source of information on funds and programs that are available. I have not yet come up with an idea of how to best publicize class offerings of each college. We considered the idea of using a mail-out to reach government quarters aboard the Air Station, however we have run into funding problems. I have not given up; If you have an idea call me and let me hear it.

3. Another group of complaints were centered around our facilities, or rather the lack of them. This complaint was directed at one of our colleges holding classes in Mokapu Elementary School. As you might expect, the facilities did not fit the students. This is a very embarrassing point to me. When I arrived here and was told about this situation, I was insulted. I was insulted on behalf of those Marines, sailors and dependents who were forced to use these in-

appropriate facilities. To fix this problem we have put in a request to the Station Facilities Board to have additional facilities targeted for use by the Education Center. The identification and assignment of such facilities will take time, and that is something we don't have. As of January, Mokapu Elementary School will start state supported "After School" Programs and the college will no longer be able to use their facilities. Here is where we can use your help. If you unit has classroom space that is not being used at or on the weekends, please let us know. If you are not in a position to authorize their use, find out who is and let me know. I will call or visit that person. Without additional classrooms, we will have to cut back on the classes that we do offer and that can only end up hurting you or others trying to continue their education.

4. The last major complaint was a lack of command support in the Education Programs. The Commanding Officer of MCAS Kaneohe Bay has already published an "Education Policy Letter." The letter, addressed to leaders at all levels, basically states that every Marine will be given every opportunity to pursue an advanced education. You can't get any more command support than that.

Well, that's it, that's what we got out of the education survey and how we plan to solve the problems. But all of this doesn't mean a thing if you don't get over to see us and see what we can do for you. Also, it would all be worthless if you as Marines and sailors don't do what you can to support the other Marines and sailors of your units. If you can help with any of the above, call me, I'd be glad to hear any sugges-

tions. My number is 254-2901/1703.

One last comment... On Monday, Oct. 2, I had a very special visitor in the Education Center. Gen. A. M. Gray stopped by to say how much he appreciated my last article. I was impressed and felt great that the Commandant would take the time and come by to see me for something that I had done right, for once. You can't imagine how that impressed a simple country boy like me. But, I want you to know that I had what I would consider an even more important visitor shortly after that, he was a young corporal who wanted to talk about a commissioning program. When we were done speaking, he thanked me for my time and help. This meant more to me than anything else. Don't get me wrong, I sincerely respect our Commandant and thrive on his appreciation, but it's for the Marines and sailors of Kaneohe Bay that I do my work. Yes, in this case the appreciation of a young corporal who I've helped means much more to me. That's why I'm here.


