

Marines institute tougher combat swim qualifications

A new swim qualification program, soon to be implemented, will require all Marines to undergo intense combat-oriented water survival training which will affect some Marines eligibility for promotion.

In keeping with the Corps' emphasis on warrior training, the Marine Corps is diving into a new water survival program that will commence Jan. 1, affecting all swim qualification requirements. According to Marine Corps Order 1510.29B, the new qualifications will be classified as Combat Survivial, 3rd through 1st Class (CS3-CS1), with Water Survival Qualified being the ultimate water survival goal for Marines. These qualifications must be met for promotions. CS2 will be required for promotion to corporal, and CS1 will be required for promotion to staff NCO. A Marine must qualify every year until qualified one level higher than MOS/rank requirement.

The nature of Marine Corps operations and training demands that Marines be able to perform in water. Marine units in particular, the components of Marine Air-Ground Task Forces, have a very close working relationship with the sea. Water

various strokes, and a 40meter swim in deep water will also be tested.

CS2 will develop the skills of assisting a wounded Marine to safety-as in a river crossing. With utilities, boots, flak jacket/H harness and full canteens, the Marine will be required to use a collar tow to assist a weak or injured Marine wearing the same equipment for 25 meters. With that same equipment, the Marine will then move 25 meters to retrieve two ALICE packs and two weapons and return 25 meters to where a partner is waiting. A noise discipline drill in full gear involving a silent entry, silent 50-meter swim and silent climb from the pool is also required.

CS1 will require the Marine to demonstrate ability to rescue himself and assist a distressed swimmer to safety under adverse situations. This includes properly demonstrated; strokes (breast stroke, side stroke and backstroke); escapes (a dry land drill, water demonstration and practice of all three methods-wrist escape, front head hold escape and rear head hold escape); carries (cross chest, wrist tow and collar tow), survival floats using blouse and trouser inflation, and an underwater swim in a simulated oil burning situation while wearing utilities. CS1 also requires a 225-meter swim with flak jacket and H-harness, full canteens, boots, utilities, helmet on head, and weapon. Noise discipline will also be stressed. Coinciding with the new swim quals is a revision of the Water Safety/Survival Instructor (WSSI) course. This will now be known as the Military Aquatic Survival Instructor (MASI) course. "Basically, the Marine Corps is breaking away from the Red Cross to implement more combat oriented training," said Cpl. Paul Holz, MASI and Station lifeguard. MASI

Marines are responsible for training units to meet their swim qualifications. They also serve as lifeguards for swimming pools and beaches.

Since July 1988, the Air Station's lifeguards have recorded 111 saves, mostly at the beaches. "The pool is a more controlled environment, so potentially dangerous situations can be taken care of before someone gets into trouble," said Holz. "At the beach there is so much space and so many people it's often not possible to prevent. someone from endangering themselves, so it's usually not until a person is actually in peril that we are able to come to their rescue."

The MASI course is grueling training, covering 20 days-from 7:30 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.-of in and out of the water instruction. Approximately half the Marines who start the course never finish. There is a lot of room for failure between the intense physical exertion, intimidating training, such as swimming and diving with hands and feet tied, and the extensive book knowledge that must be mastered.

Besides basic water survival techniques and strokes, Marines study personal flotation devices and waterproofing of combat gear, cold water survival, surf survival, CPR, and first-aid. "This class is excellent physical and mental conditioning," said Holz. "By the time you finish the course, you're as comfortable in the water as a fish." Beginning in January, the regular Survival in Water Instruction for Marines (SWIM) will take effect, according to Station Water Survival Training NCOIC Sgt. Michael Natale. These training sessions, conducted by the Station's MASIs, will qualify Marines for their Combat Survival classification. Units cah arrange to get their Marines qualified through their training sections.

The minimum skill level required of all Marines (CS3) will emphasize personal survival under exercise and combat situations: Qualification requirements will include jumping from the low diving board (three feet) and swimming with full combat gear (excluding gas mask and helmet) and weapon, and jumping from the high board (ten feet) using the abandon ship technique with boots and utilities. Split Pay Option for Marines Overseas

Marines permanently stationed or deployed outside the 50 United States will be eligible to enroll in the split pay option starting Dec. 1. To qualify, Marines must have a Marine Corps or Navy disbursing officer providing pay service.

Hawaii-based Marines are eligible for the option when they are deployed to a location outside the U.S.

The option allows Marines to receive a fixed amount of their pay at their locality, while the remainder is deposited at their financial institution.

Marines excel in charity drive





As part of Brigade Service Support Group (BSSG)-1's annual Eagle Provider exercise, 1st Landing Support Platoon of Landing Support Co. prepared two tactical vehicles for external helicopter lifts Nov. 5.

This year's Eagle Provider gave BSSG's Marines the opportunity to practice air inserts at Bellows Air Force Station. Marines also set up field operations at Schofield Barracks where they honed their accuracy with grenades, fired M2 and M60 machineguns, and worked to improve their land navigation skills.

The mission of Landing Support Co. is to prepare and provide security for landing areas, such as beaches, airfields, or ports. They coordinate the supplies, ammunition, fuel, food and water for

the area. "We're there to bring some organization to the operation," said landing support specialist Sgt. Neil Hagen. "We're like a middleman. We facilitate the movement of personnel, equipment and supplies, and make sure everything runs smoothly."

On the day of the external lift, 1st Landing Support Platoon prepared two tactical vehicles for the arriving helicopter.

Marine cited in joint command

A Marine has been named Enlisted Person of the Quarter for the headquarters of the senior command in the Pacific.

Sergeant Michael G. Kritenbrink, Operational Electronic Intelligence (ELINT), Intelligence Center Pacific, was selected for the honor from among eligible E-1s through E-6s of all services assigned to the joint-service headquarters of the U.S. Pacific Command at Camp H.M. Smith.

Kritenbrink, the assistant non-commissioned officer-incharge of the ELINT Exploitation section here, is responsible for assembling, analyzing and summarizing information gathered by electronic-intelligence sources.

His selection is attributed to his outstanding initiative and contributions to the intelligence community, according to Navy Capt. Robert W.B. Stoddert, Commander, Intelligence Center Pacific.

Kritenbrink, according to Stoddert's letter of nomination, taught himself to use a prototype software package 'to track weapons systems. He was able to expertly summarize significant military activity in a volatile area of the world, and provide valuable information to more than 40 theater commanders and national agencies. Through his initiative, Kritenbrink learned the most intricate elements of his job, and can perform all analytical tasks within two ELINT sections.

"Sergeant Kritenbrink is an extremely professional Marine," said MGySgt. Michel Zangerle, senior enlisted adviser of the Intelligence Center Pacific. "He is very well-versed in his job, "

Military people required to enroll in computerized medical care program

Registration forms are being passed out to enroll military people and their families into a computerized, all-service medical information bank.

In an effort to improve the quality and speed of receiving health care in military facilities, a new computer system is being brought on line, to put patient records at doctors' fingertips.

The new system, Composite Health Care System (CHCS), is a network that will contain medical histories of all people on the island who are serviced by military facilities. This information also includes results from labratory tests and other things of interest to doctors diagnosing cases. In the future it has the capability of being tied into military hospitals around the world.

Tripler Army Medical Center began bringing the system on line last April in the pharmacy department. Eventually every department will be interfaced, eliminating the need for sending records around the hospitals—and thus eliminating the potential for lost records.

Once people are in the system, their health history can be called up when they visit any clinic on the island—be it Army, Navy or Air Force.

Of critical importance in making the system work, is getting eligible people enrolled in the system. People who have not filled out a registration form should see their unit administrative office or stop by one of the clinics.





It was the first morning of 1987. The sun still wasn't out, but Brigade Marines were. Marines in boots and utilities, with mud and water up to their necks, were wading through the streets of Waimanalo.

The Marines, from Brigade Service Support Group-1 and Marine Wing Support Squadron-173 (now MWSS-174). had been recalled in the middle of the night to help Windward communities through a heavy rainstorm by pulling debris out of flooded streams and helping to evacuate residents.

It wasn't a traditional new

year's morning, but Uncle Sam never promised them a rose parade.

As was the case before that flood in 1987, Marines were up to their necks again recently cleaning out the Waimanalo Stream at Bellows Air Force Station. The 66 Marines were from Alpha Co., **3rd Combat Engineer Bn.**

The work was accomplished from Nov. 1-8 as preventative maintenance for the stream. Its water flow had been cut down by an almost infectious growth of mangrove trees. The stream is


one of two major streams in the Waimanalo area that drain rainwater from local mountains and help prevent flooding during heavy rain storms.

Bellows' commander, Air Force Capt. Charles Carr. figured it was better to do the work now than wait until the next major rain storm and end up doing the dirty work on the streets again.

But the Air Force was already pouring \$4 million into the Bellows storm recovery system, reinforcing its stream banks and bridges, among

CLEAN/from previous page other things. And the engineers who normally support Bellows, from the 15th Air Bases Wing at Hickam AFB, were busy clearing out a stream at their own base.

Running out of options, Carr and some staff members fired up their own chainsaws, but soon realized the project was too big for them to handle. A few chainsaws weren't going to cut it.

So they called in the Marines.

The last time the Marine engineers came out to work on the stream, they worked with the Air Force engineers and cleared-off one bank. That was shortly before the 1987 New Year's flooding of Windward Oahu, when rainstorms were pelting the island with 11-to-17 inches of water and 45-mph winds.

"The work the Marines did on the stream at that time probably minimized the damage to the local community," said Carr.

"That stream was prettywell choked out," added Carr. "And since this is the rainy season, we knew we had to get to it."

When the engineers arrived Nov. 1, they saw that the stream was narrowed by the mangroves to an opening of 25 feet. When they finished eight days later, they had moved the tree line on the bank back five feet and had cleared the waterway's opening from 25 feet wide to almost 100 feet wide. The engineers estimated that they removed more than 100 mangrove trees.

"When we first started, it looked like it was going to be a never-ending evolution," said SSgt. R.J. Jones, the engineer company gunnery sergeant.

"I'm glad you guys are over there," Carr said. There are only 4,000 of us and 10,000 of you, and the Marine Corps always responds positively to anything we ask for especially BSSG. They're always asking if there's anything they can do for us.'

But all this work is not without its returns. Bellows' beaches are ideal for the MEB's amphibious training. and its beach recreation areas are popular places for Marine "amphibious non-training." Located near the city of Waimanalo, Bellows' main mission is to maintain communications networks for the government. Providing 586 acres for Marines to train on is the Station's second mission. In 1988, 1st MEB Marines completed 36,122 man-days of training there. This year, Carr expects the total to go over 45,000. It's that kind of training intensity, which the engineers are familiar with, that made the stream project seem easy to them, they said. "This is like a break for us." said Cpl. Howard Spencer of 2nd Platoon. "When we get something to do like this, we work real hard, but we're used to constantly going to the field. This kind of work takes some of the stress off the troops." "This group was amazing," Carr said. "They finished in eight days what I thought would take three weeks. The mangroves look like they have fingers and fingernails on them — that's how they got their name. The branches grow out and back into the ground. They're hard to control, and if you don't get them out of a stream, they'll eventually choke it out.' "I read about these trees in National Geographic," said LCpl. Rick Vaught of 1st Platoon after he spent a week uprooting the mangroves. He reached into the stream and pulled out a piece of vegetation that looked like a dart. "This is what their seeds look like," he said. "When they fall off the branches, they stick in the soft mud and take root. That's why the trees grow so close together." The engineers pulled out the trees, roots, branches and

other vegetation by hand and with winches Once the vegetation was on the bank, heavy equipment operators from BSSG-1, who augment the engineer company, bulldozed the vegetation out of the way.

"Some civilians came out here and asked us if this was punishment," Vaught said.

Combat Engineers are trained in building and destroying bridges, mines and barbed-wire, as well as concrete and "strong back" structures.

The engineers are capable of many kinds of outdoor work, but not all of their training is specialized. They say it's sometimes more attitude than skill that gets the job done. Besides, they don't teach stream-cleaning classes at Camp Lejeune's engineer school.

"It's just something you do," Jones said. "Just go out and do it."

Marines sink Navy in first home game

The Hawaii Marine Varsity Basketball Team man. handled the Navy's team 108-88 in their first home game, bringing the Marines to a 5-1 overall record in scheduled basketball action.

Marine selected for national bobsled team

Cpl. Reginald M. Cole Chris Hargett, a Marine with Golf Co., 2nd Bn., 3rd Marines, was recently selected to join the U.S. National Bobsled Team in the upcoming winter competition.

In September and October, Hargett competed in the Military Push Championships at the United States Bobsled and Skeleton Federation's Push Training Facility at Lake Placid, N.Y.

The Kaneohe-based Marine and three other U.S. Marines competed against five other teams from the other branches of the armed services for a chance to represent the U.S. Armed Forces.

The September competition simulated the beginning of a bobsled race and the athlete with the lowest average push times of eight entries was declared the winner. The athlete's quickness off the blocks and sprint time on the

course determined the times.

Hargett was the top Marine in the competition and took third place overall, with a time of 45.43. He was then invited back for the October push trials where he and Chris Green of MCAS Cherry Point, N.C., were selected for the national team.

Hargett previously competed in the pole vault and high jump for the All-Marine Track Team. While training at the All-Marine Track Camp in El Toro, Calif., he was offered a chance to compete for the national bobsled team and made it.

Hargett is now competing with the national team in World Cup racing. The team will be in Europe and will compete against the national teams from West Germany, East Germany, Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia.

The Golf, 2/3 Marine will be in Europe until the second week in December and then return to Lake Placid for continued training. In February they will return to Europe and compete against Norway and Sweden.

The last article that I wrote pertained to customs and courtesies. The last sentence in that article excluded four words, "If in the Navy". The last sentence should have read - In the Marine Corps we address our Warrant Officers as "Warrant Officer so-and-so", or, "Mister" if in the Navy. It is not a custom of ours to refer to Warrant Officers as "Mister".

Marine Corps Swords

The swords carried by Marine officers and non-commissioned officers are a part of the traditions of the Corps, and are among the oldest weapons in continual use in the U.S. Armed Forces.

The sword that an officer carries goes back to the Uniform Regulations of 1826. However, records indicate that swords of this pattern were worn by Marine officers before the War of 1812. The Marine Corps tradition of carrying this type of sword dates from Lieutenant O'Bannon's assault on Derna, Tripoli in 1805, when he is said to have won the sword of the Governor of the town.

The officer's Mameluke sword gets its name from the cross-hilt and ivory grip, both of which were used for centuries by the Moslems of North Africa and Arabia.

The non-commissioned officers' sword is the U.S. Army model sword, which was adopted by the Marine Corps in 1859, and briefly carried by Marine officers as well. When the officers went back to the Mameluke pattern in 1875, the army-type sword was retained as a distinctive model for the Corps of Noncommissioned Officers, and has been carried by Marine NCO's ever since.

We no longer use the sword as a weapon, but use it for drill and ceremonies. We will often see where an individual is presented an NCO sword for being an honor graduate at a school or for other reasons. Many Marines purchase their own sword and others are either given a sword, or they simply never get one. I personally did not purchase a sword, although on two occasions I ordered a sword, and my order was returned unfilled. Because the sword was not a required item, along with the fact that I had other priorities, I never got around to reordering a sword for myself.

Most recently, I was asked to be the guest of honor for the Enlisted Ball. I was delighted to accept. Normally at the ball it is customary to present the guest of honor with a small token of appreciation. The enlisted community aboard MCAS Kaneohe Bay presented me with an NCO sword. I was totally surprised and at a loss for words. I probably didn't do a very good job of thanking the enlisted Marines because I was so overwhelmed. I am sure my "thank you" remarks did not do justice for the way I felt and how much I appreciated such a gift.

To be presented such a prestigious gift from the enlisted men and women was more than I had ever considered. As I told them, I will cherish this sword forever, not only because of what it represents, but from whom it came.



Have You Seen This Bird?

The annual solo flights of the local wedge-tailed shear-water sea bird is beginning, and assistance is needed to keep the young birds' first flights from becoming their last. When these birds begin to mature, they head out to sea, not to return to land for a couple of years. But, during the immature fledglings' first flights, they are often disoriented by the city lights of Oahu and crash to the ground. They then have trouble flying again, making them easy prey to cats and dogs or passing cars. The birds are dark brown with a white underside and gray bill. Younger birds have more of a grayish color. If you find one of these birds, please call the Station Game Warden at 257-2123, or call an aid station at the following fire stations: Waimanalo, Kaneohe, Olomana, Kailua, and Kahaluu. These fallen birds can also be taken to Sea Life Park.

Legally Speaking

Editors note: Last week's Legally Speaking" article on home child care reported that Air Station Order 1750.12 authorized family day care home services on the Air Station. The order has been cancelled pending a comprehensive review of the licensing and regulatory requirements for the services, and until the review is completed, such day care is not authorized here.

How many times have you had to ask your landlord to fix something in your rental unit? Of those times, how often was the repair as prompt and complete as you *xpected?

The Hawaii Residential Landlord Tenant Code obligates landlords to perform various types of maintenance within a period of time. l'enants are entitled to healthy premises with facilithis and appliances in working condition. Before you move in, the landlord must inventory the premises, record the condition in writing, and give you a copy.

Your landlord must then keep the premises in a

If you want to agree to perform some of the maintenance, you should first consult a legal assistance attorney for advice. You, as a tenant, are not obligated to repair the premises, but to keep it as clean and safe as possible.

Therefore, the landlord must begin repairs within three business days of receiving oral or written notice. If the landlord fails to perform repairs which effect living conditions, you may immediately do or have done the necessary work, submit a receipt to the landlord, and deduct from your rent a maximum of \$300 per month and instance for actual expenses.

The second situation involves written notification to your landlord by the Department of Health, state or county agencies that the condition of the premises constitutes a health or safety violation.

begin repairs within five business days of written notice. If the landlord fails to perform, once again you may deduct a maximum of \$300 from the rent per month and instance for actual expenses of repair. In the alternative, you can give the landlord written, signed estimates from two qualified workmen at least five business days before having the work done, then proceed to have the work done. You must use the workmen who give you the lower estimate. If you choose this alternative, you may provide the landlord receipts for actual expenses, and deduct \$300

from one month's rent. whichever is greater.

The third situation involves other defective conditions on your premises, that violate your rental agreement or the landlord's previously mentioned obligations to supply and maintain fit premises. In these situations, the landlord must begin repair within 12 business days of written notice. If the landlord fails to eliminate these minor defects, you may once again immediately do or have done the necessary work, submit receipts to the landlord, and deduct from your rent a

maximum of \$300 per month for actual expenses.

In all of these situations, the total amounts chargeable to the landlord during each six-month period cannot exceed the equivalent of three .nonths' rent. You don't qualify for remedies at the landlord's expense if you misuse the premises.

You may have a habit of informally discussing your landlord's maintenance obligations and your repair remedies with him, but the afer practice is to communitate in writing. Keep detailed records of signed and dated receipts and all letters to and from your landlord.

In any case, potentially or actually, involving a landlordtenant dispute, you are advised to consult a legal assistance attorney at the Legal Services Center, Buildag 256, during walk-in hours from 8-9:30 a.m. Monday-Friday.




