"Air traffic control is a great Air Station, Pensacola, Fla., where

students learn water survival and flight physiology and must qualify in swimming, the altitude chamber, dunker training (simulating a crash in water) and ejection training.

Afterwards, students either go to NAS Whiting Field, in Milton, Fla., or NAS Corpus Christi, Texas, for 20 weeks to fly T-34C trainers and learn radio procedure and navigation. At this point, the Navy determines the pipeline selection for each student: whether they will fly jets, C-130 cargo planes, or helicopters.

The kind of aircraft students are selected to learn to fly determines how long it will take to earn aviator's wings (had weather can also extend training). For Deal it can be up to two years if she is selected to fly jets, or 14 to 18 months to fly helicopters. Though just heim sale to fly

Station C.O. tells NQLB future of K-Bay

The station commanding officer, Col. R.R. Crawford, answered many questions about the future of the air station at the Neighborhood Quality of Life Board meeting July 29.

He spoke about the current and planned projects at Kaneohe Bay and the effect of the base realignment on the air station.

For the past 18 months the base has been fighting for its existence, Col. Crawford explained. Because of Base Closure and Realignment Committee's recommendations, the base is going to have significant growth through 1996.

If the current base closure and realignment recommendations are allowed to become law, Naval Air Station Barbers Point will close and Kaneohe Bay will receive many of Barbers Point's assets. Although there will be some Marine assets leaving the base, Kaneohe will grow significantly.

"The base is going to have significant growth — and it all has to take place from now up through '96. In '97 we are planning on having the Navy, planning on having the Navy, and a good possibility the Coast Guard here." Col. Crawford explained. "Most of the growth will take place in the MAG-24 area and also on the other side of the runway as you are heading to Hale Koa and Pyramid Rock Beach."

Although it is unknown at this time exactly how many military and civilian personnel will be working on the base in 1997, the station is planning for an increase of about 2,000 personnel — which doesn't include families. There are about 10,000 military and civilian personnel working on base

The station commanding officer gave the audience an idea of how big the station is now. He said there are about 23,000 people that use the base at any given time during the day.

In order to meet the needs of a larger air station community and the new mission requirements, a large amount of construction will take place during the next few years.

"We are moving a multi-billion dollar base from Barbers Point," Col. Crawford explained. "The bottom line is it will cost \$215 million with the Coast Guard. In addition there are another \$100 million worth of initiatives on top of that; so you are talking about going into other areas.

\$315 million of growth."

Although there is still a lot of planning to do - right now the air station staff is in the detailed planning phase — there are some projects which were already planned and are going to be built.

New housing will be built around the base of Kansas Tower where Moffett Road currently is. There will be 300 units built there, Col. Crawford explained, at a cost of \$44 million. Construction should begin on the three-story units in early 1994.

Other projects which were already planned include 215,000 square feet of warehouses here to replace the \$30 million worth of replace the \$30 million worth of warehouse space the station currently has in Pearl City. Building of the warehouses shouldn't cost the station any money. A \$3 million hazardous waste site will also be built.

A six-story Bachelor Officer's Quarters will be built across from the Officer's Club. A new six-story Bachelor Enlisted Quarter will also be built near the track.

Morale, Welfare and Recreation activities will receive a lot of attention in the next few years

The colonel explained that a The colonel explained that a new exchange, which will be about the size of the new commissary, and a new child care center will be built in fiscal year 1995. Two ball fields will also be built next to the gym. In addition, the bowling alley will be increased from 24 to 36 lanes.

In order to accommodate the Navy and Coast Guard squadrons, there will be new hangars built and new facilities will be needed to maintain the aircraft.

While the colonel talked about other issues involving the transferring of units here and the possibility of some units leaving, he took some time at the end of presentation to comment on the current concerns he has.

"The Cochran area we are "The Cochran area we are repainting right now and we are also going to put some new windows in," Col. Crawford explained. "The buildings are in bad shape and in '97 all of that will be torn down to put in midrises, so we were very reluctant to put money into those houses."

"On 1 October we are going to take a very significant amount of money and put it into BEQ's," Col. Crawford said. "I think that's where our biggest shortfall is so you will see a lot of money going into there and not much money

Marines join NATO's Operation Deny Flight enforcing no-fly zone

Eight Marine F/A-18D Hornets of VMFA(AW)-533 out of MCAS Beaufort, S.C., arrived at Aviano Air Base, Italy, on July 22 to participate in an operation that is an extension of Deny Flight, the enforcement of the no-fly zone over Bosnia-Herzegovina launched by NATO officials in conjunction with

the United Nations April 12.
Secretary of Defense Les Aspin
approved an order July 14
directing U.S. aircraft to deploy and join NATO's planned air

support to the United Nations protection force in Bosnia. The deployment order authorizes a deployment order authorizes a phased deployment of 30 ground-attack-capable aircraft and 10 support aircraft, and involves about 1,500 personnel. They will assist other NATO forces in implementing U.N. security council resolution 836. France, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom have also announced their participation in this mission.

The Marine planes joined 12 U.S. Air Force A-10 and OA-10 aircraft, deployed July 13 from Spangdahlem Air Base in

Germany, six U.S. Navy A-6s and Marine F/A-18s of VMFA-312 operating from the USS Theodore Roosevelt and four U.S. Air Force C-130 aircraft from Hurlburt Field, Fla. In addition, five U.S. Air Force KC-135 aerial refueling aircraft from Fairchild Air Force Base, Wash., and five U.S. Air Force EC-130 airborne command, control and communication support aircraft from Keesler Air Force Base, Miss., deployed to support this mission.

The crews of '533 spent their first few days flying familiarization missions in

preparation for the air support of U.N ground forces that are assigned to guard havens for Muslim civilians in Bosnia and Herzegovina. All the Marines are being housed in a tent city near

being housed in a tent city near the air base flight line. The F/A-18 was developed to serve as both a fighter and an attack aircraft and is capable of attack aircraft and is capable of both air-to-air and air-to-ground combat. The "D" model crew consists of a pilot and a weapons officer. Hornets can carry as much as 17,000 pounds of armament, including sidewinder and sparrow missiles, and HARMS (high-speed anti-radar missiles).

NATO planning for air strikes

☐ The United States diplomats have convinced NATO members to plan for air strikes in Bosnia-Herzegovina if the Serbs fail to stop their attacks on Sarajevo, as well as other Bosnian cities, and if they didn't stop blocking aid

Although the statement by NATO Secretary-General Manfred Woerner did not actually order the air strikes, it was the strongest statement made by the alliance

after more than two years of civil war in the former Yugoslavia. The action was taken after the Serbs seized key terrain overlooking Sarajevo: As a result the city may fall into Serb hands. Although an agreement he abeen

Although an agreement has been reached to plan for air strikes, Britain and France have continued their opposition to it for fear their troops on the ground in Bosnia would face reprisals for the attacks.

If attacks are ordered, the United States, Dutch, British and French have aircraft already staged in Italy to carry out the attacks.

The 3rd Anniversary of the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait passed with what has become the typical dogma from the Iraqi government.

While Iraq was showing its usual defiance, the United States reaffirmed its commitment to protect Kuwait and maintain sanctions and an end to the air



The final summer fitness session between the Marines and the school took place July 26 when members of Surveillance, Target, Acquisition Platoon visited.







96 aluminum pads for helicopters to land on and ran refueling pits for the helicopters. It was the

for the helicopters. It was the first time since the Persian Gulf war that the padshad been used. In addition, a five-man detachment from Marine Air Tactical Control Squadron-18 set up a TRC-195 portable air traffic control facility and provided air traffic control for the expeditionary airfield.

"The tower can go on the back of a HMMWV and can be set up in about 15 minutes with all the radios you would need," explained Sgt. Russell Sinclair, MATCS-18. "We don't use [the tower] too often, but people want to use it more." While the airfield was being made operational, other MWSS Marines were setting up a chow hall, purifying water from the ocean, transporting equipment and supplies, and providing rear area security.

The MAG-24 helicopter

supplies, and providing rear area security.

The MAG-24 helicopter squadrons used the airfield extensively once it was operational. Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron-463, Marine Medium Helicopter Squadrons 165 and 364 all used the airfield while it was in operation.

"For some this was the first time they had operated in an expeditionary environment — especially our station people," Driver said.

With the exception of a small rear party, Driver said the entire squadron deployed for the exercise — to include many of their "fapped" personnel working for station. In addition, a dental detachment from Brigade Service Support Group-1 deployed with the squadron.

In garrison, everyone in the squadron is divided up working in their section or working for the air station, but while in the field, MWSS was able to put everything together.

"We did a lot of back breaking work and then stood eight hours in the hole. We got only about three or four hours of sleep," Sisk said.

After the

After the airfield was operational, one of the major projects the engineers were involved in was the construction of a clam shell hangar. The hangar had not been put up since the Persian Gulf war.

The Marines also simulated bomb damage on the airfield and practiced rapid runway repair to get the airfield operational again.

"Most Marines really enjoyed this because it gave them a chance to do things we only talk about in the rear," Driver added.

By the end of the exercise, By the end of the exercise, virtually every aspect of the squadron's mission was tested. It gave the Marines and sailors of MWSS-174 confidence that they could operate an expeditionary airfield and also showed the air wing units they would support what they are capable of doing



Taking the mystery out of the federal job hunt

a vacancy announcement for a civil service position and wondered how you could get one of those jobe?

The information in this article applies only to the Federal civil service. Positions in the Morale, welfare, and Recreation (MWR) system are called Nonappropriated Fund (NAF) positions, and do not follow the rules described below. For information about MWR positions, call 254-4179.

When an activity, like MCAS Kaneohe Bay, or a federal agency, like the Internal Revenue Service, needs to fill a position they have many different options. They can announce the position through the merit promotion system, hire a flon-competitive candidate, or hire someone who has never worked for the federal government.

The merit promotion system vides a promotional opportunity provides a promotional opportunity for employees currently in civil service. Non-competitive candidates can be former civil service employees who have

"status," which means they have held a federal position. The "Area of Consideration" on a vacancy announcement will indicate if you can apply for that particular position. Some people think that active duty military members meet the definition of "federal employee," but they do not but they do not.

If you have never held a permanent position in the federal government and, therefore, do not government and, therefore, do not have civil service status, there are many different ways to apply—it all depends on the position. Many positions require a test while others simply require the completion of a Federal Application, SF-171, with supplemental forms. Most clerical positions require a test. The clerical exam is administered by clerical exam is administered by the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) twice a month (usually the first and third Monday of each month) and covers positions at the GS-2 through GS-4 grade levels.

The Administrative Careers with America (ACWA) exam covers six occupational groups: Health, safety and environmental, writing public information, business, and management, personnel, administration and

computers, benefits review, tax and legal, and law enforcement and investigation. The entry level is usually GS-5 or GS-7 and the positions usually have promotion potential to the GS-9 or GS-11 levels.

In Hawaii, the ACWA is given approximately twice a year and is based on supply and demand. In

state maintains the same register. A Federal Job Opportunity Candidates, are used more frequently than in Hawaii.

Separated military members within (before or after) 120 days of date of separation can reopen registers. This means that military members can take a test or apply for a position which is currently closed to the general public. Some of the registers that may be reopened include: Deputy U.S. Marshal, GS-5/7: Border Patrol or the registers that may be reopened include: Deputy U.S. Marshal, GS-5/7: Border Patrol Agency, GS-5/7: Air Traffic Controller, GS-7: Trades Helper, WG-5 (Oahu only): and Treasury Enforcement Agency, GS-5/7.

After you have taken a test or if a test is not required, you will receive a "Notice of Results" and your name and numerical score will be added to the appropriate register. An additional five or 10

for veterans preference.

When an activity or agency decides to hire from outside their current workforce they will request a register from OPM. The rating you receive from OPM can be transferred to other states if that state maintains the same register.

Not all positions being recruited

for are vacant. OPM often uses the FJOL, clerical and ACWA exams to build an inventory of candidates for future vacancies. An activity or agency may have authority, granted by OPM, to act on OPM's behalf to recruit, accept applications, and hire. Usually only a federal application and a few other forms are required few other forms are required—there is no test. Activities and

agencies can also hire temporary employees without going through OPM. You should inquire at each activity of federal agency to determine what positions you can apply for.

For the past several years the epartment of Defense (DoD) has Department of Defense (DoD) has had a hiring freeze. Some individual activities have more severe freezes. Depending on the position and the mission or need of the activity, some waivers have been obtained which allow an activity to fill a position with an applicant who is not a current DoD employee. Unfortunately, this hiring freeze makes it more bol employee. Unfortunately, this hiring freeze makes it more difficult to obtain a civil service position at an activity, but it is not impossible. The vacancy announcement will indicate if you are eligible to apply. Retiring military members cannot be hired by a Dol activity within 180 days from date of retirement unless a waiver is obtained.

At MCAS Kaneohe Bay, most positions are filled with current DoD employees using the merit promotion announcement. However, the commissary does hire many people with no civil service status, primarily sales store checkers and store workers, but

also meat cutters and clerical/ also meat cutters and clerical/
accounting personnel. Although
most positions at the commissary
are filled on a temporary or parttime basis, there may be
opportunities for conversion to
permanent or full-time positions.
The commissary provides an
excellent way toget into the federal
civil service system. These
positions are announced on a
separate vacancy announcement eparate vacancy announcement rom the merit promotion

positions are announced on a separate vacancy announcement from the merit promotion opportunities.

No matter if a test is required or not, you will have to complete a federal application, SF-171. This is a very important document and it is time well spent to produce a good application. The SF-171 is used to determine if you are basically qualified for the position you are applying for and what your score or rating would be; it is the first impression you will make to a prospective employer. There are many books, handouts, and courses that can assist you in/completing an SF-171. The Family Service Center regularly offers classes on completing the federal application.



From the cheap seats: A sports commentary

☐ Was Reggls Lewis¹ death preventable?

The sports world has been rocked with tragedy this year with accidents and mysterious deaths. The Cleveland Indians lost two players, Steve Olin and Tim Crews, to a boating accident. Car crashes claimed the lives of Drazen Petrovic of the New Jersey Nete and Chris Street of the University of Iowa. A plane crash claimed the life of the reigning NASCAR champion Alan Kuwicki and a helicopter crash took NASCAR driver Davey Allison just three weeks ago. The most recent death occurred this past week when Boston Celtic star Reggie Lewis died during basketball practice.

The death of these athletes is untimely and tragic but everyone at some point in time must face death. I observed that each of the these athletes died doing something other than their profession except one, Reggie Lewis the captain and leading scorer of the Boston Celtics.

Lewis, while shooting baskets at the Celtics practice facility, collapsed July 27 and stopped breathing. When paramedics arrived they found

two and a hair nours later at waitham-wester. Hospital.

I am having a hard time understanding Lewis' death. Who is to blame for the 27-year-old's death. Lewis, the Celtics, the doctors, or was it just Lewis' time to go?

The visible medical problem for Lewis began on April 29. The Celtics were playing the Charlotte Hornets in the first game of the opening-round playoff series when he collapsed midway through the first period. He was experiencing some dizziness. He attempted to return to the game two different times but was unable to play more than a few minutes each time.

A team of cardiologists examined Lewis on May 2 and concluded that Lewis suffered from a heart disease called cardiomyopathy. The disease is caused by the abnormal thickening of the muscles between the chambers in the heart. This causes an irregular heartbeat and is accompanied by fatigue and seizures; and even

This was a difficult prognosis for the 27-year-old star. The fact of the matter was that his career was over. Lewis was considered by many who knew him as, "special, sincere, honest, kind caring and humble." Fellow players regarded him as a role model and leader by example.

The one thing no one heard from Lewis was complaints. Lewis was regarded as somewhat quiet and never talked "trash", complained about officials' calls or displayed unsportsmanlike conduct. He worked hard when he played and never complained if he hurt... was it this drive that cost him his life?

Upon receiving the prognosis, he and Boston officials sought a second opinion. The second team of doctors gave a much less serious prognosis of neurocardiogenic syncope, which is a fainting condition. The solution is; take some medication and slowly progress back to a full-playing level. If Lewis had listened to the first team of doctors he would probably still be alive, unfortunately he opted for the second team with the opposite diagnosis.

I tried putting myself in Lewis' shoes and imagined what my decision would be. Though it no longer makes a difference, perhaps Lewis

him to be in "complete cardiac arrest." He had no pulse and was revived with CPR but died two and a half hours later at Waltham-Weston Hospital.

I am having a hard time understanding Lewis death. Who is to blame for the 27-year-old's death. Lewis, the Celtics, the doctors, or was it just Lewis' time to go?

The decision of love of life or love of sport was perhaps the deciding factor for Lewis, but perhaps one could not exist without the other. The questions will be asked and some answered in the next few weeks and months in regards to his untimely death. Was he pushed by the struggling Boston organization? How could two medical teams have such very different prognosis of Lewis? How much pain had Lewis endured and never spoke about to anyone?

The accusations will fly and perhaps lawsuits will be filed but in the end it will not bring the rising young star back.

The NBA All-Star player left behind an expectent wife and small son and many fans who respected him as a player and a man. In the tragic and untimely death of Reggie Lewis, one point should be made amid all the controversy: He died doing what he did best playing basketball.

On June 29 there were only 6 of 16 cash registers open at the commissary. Dear Disgruntled,
Interesting question. I talked to the commissary about it and here's the answer I got. DECA (a separate government entity) controls all the commissaries. There is a federal rule that says that DECA must be self-supporting. Therefore, the commissary has to prove that it can support new cashiers before it can have them. There is a three month delay in effect, until the commissary has improved its sales figures to about \$2.4 million per month. The good news is that the commissary has been given the goahead to hire nine new people just this week. If sales continue to increase, more people will be hired.

Just like all new things, there are some kinks that have to be worked out in the system. The commissary has been working on carrying more items now. Frankly, I just like to go down there and visit the place! Now, if we could get them to put up some tables near the deli and serve lunch....



Kaneohe Bay offers excellent diving sites

Kaneohe Marine Corps Air
Station provides ample Locker aboard the station offers opportunities for scuba divers practically year-round. When conditions permit, the Mokapu

Pond Road is perhaps the most popular dive site aboard the station. Its easy access and large beach make it one of the most convenient dives around. It is also an excellent dive for heginners; in fact, some training beginners; in fact, some training dives are conducted there by the Scuba Locker.

Some of the finest dMng on Oahu is in the area surrounding the air station.

The entry point is as simple as walking down to the beach. Divers suit up and wade into the cove for a very short swim through a cut in the rocks to the descent point, or walk out to a shelf on the right-hand side of the beach, then step off into the ocean.

then step off into the ocean.

This dive is shallow, no more than twenty feet, and is very susceptible to the winter trade winds and high surf. During these months, the surge can be strong enough to be dangerous, and the visibility is minimal. During the summer months, however, it is an excellent spot to view parrottish, tangs, trigger fish, and an occasional small eel. Flounders also make an appearance every now and then.

The coral heads, while mostly dying or dead, provide interesting underwater formations, including arches and crevices. In some crags, large sea urchins and puffer fish have made the area their

Because of the shallow depth, Pond Road is an excellent dive if time allows only one tank — the average diver can get over 30 minutes underwater on one tank.

Another easy-access dive is Fort Another easy-access dive is Fort Hase Beach, also known as the "Rifle Range." The dive itself follows the shelf along the same path as the Rifle Range Road. Like Pond Road, this is a shallow dive from the shore. There is a fine entry point located in a clump of bushes just past the pavilion at the beach.

Because winds swing around Ulupau Crater, care must be taken here to avoid strong surges. But on calm days, and during lobster season, this area, with its multitude of rock formations and

taken not to investigate a hole with a hand — eels also live in holes. I have seen lobsters along the open sandy bottom in broad daylight in this area, in about 25 feet of water.

The fish life here is not as abundant as Pond Road, probably because the shelf juts out over the ocean making it a favorite fishing spot. This creates another consideration for the diver. Beware of hooks, lead sinkers, and fishing line, all of which can become entangled in scuba gear.

Swimming in the direction of the rifle range, the bottom becomes sandy and opens up into a wide plain punctuated with low coral heads and rocks. Occasionally, the lucky diver can find a seashell or two which has been abandoned by its original owner.

These two dives are easiest, obviously because both are shore dives. For those who prefer boat dives, there are two excellent sites within easy reach of the Station

The first site is the Moku Manu islands, located off the north end of Ulupau Crater. Recommended for advanced divers, this site is seldom dived, and is thus almost pristine. The current and ocean swells are considerations not to be taken lightly. taken lightly.

I dove this site from a small boat anchored between the islands, in the lee of the wind. The view of these rocks at close range is spectacular, it is reminiscent of the villain's hideout in a James Rond movie. Bond movie.

Underwater, the sea opens into a vast expanse of rock formations and skirt-like coral clusters around the bottom of the islands at about

65 feet. Colorful fish abound, and see so few divers they are curious enough to investigate.

The highlight of this dive is an nmense "false" cave — false immense "false" cave – false because the top is open to the sunlight. Entering is like swimming into a huge underwater cathedral, with slick walls of rock rising vertically on either side, then arching gracefully overhead, forming the "sunroof." Light filters down, casting rays of scattered light inside the chamber.

As mentioned above, this dive, although exhilarating, is recommended for experienced divers only.

The final site located in Kailua Bay, is Mokolea Rock. This tiny islet is also known by a more common name best omitted here.

common name best omitted here.

It can be reached easily by boat, but again, care must be taken to avoid swells which frequently buffet the rock. Another site for experienced divers, it is recommended only during the calmest of summer days.

The improvement of the rock is a summer days.

calmest of summer days.

The inshore side of the rock is in about 35 feet of water, with a relatively sandy bottom. The seaward side slopes quickly to 60-70 feet. The walls of the islet are packed with countless holes and cracks, home to an abundance of lobsters. Turtles have been known to cruise by, as have a couple of whitetip sharks.

Because the island is small a

Because the island is small, a diver can quickly swim around its circumference, or swim slowly and investigate each nook and cranny.

Each of these sites offer a unique experience, and unlike many spots around Oahu, do not require extensive transportation or cost. Don't miss these dive opportunities which are right in your own backyard.

Section 13-171-61 Reserves 1.724 million gallons per day of ground water for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands in Honolulu and Leeward Oahu.

Section 13-171-62 Reserves 0.124 million gallons per day of ground water for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands in Windward Oahu.
