2/3 emerges victorious in Super Squad competition

In the end, their hard work paid off. The infantrymen representing Company G, 2d Battalion, 3d Marines, were named the 3d Marine Regiment's Super Squad Friday after three weeks of squad competition which covered three Hawaiian islands.

The infantrymen were notified of their award in a ceremony where Col. Chris Cortez, 3d Marines commanding officer, congratulated both the winning squad and their competition from Co. A, 1/3, for a job well done, but hardearned. The 2/3 squad leader is Sgt. Reginald Engram; Sgt. John Prejean leads the 1/3 Marines.

Rifle squads from around the Corps compete in the Super Squad competition, beginning at the battalion level. The squads are tested in a number of combat skills, and the best rifle squad from each division travels to the final competition at Quantico. where one is chosen as the best. The 2/3 Marines will travel to Okinawa in July to determine the best squad of the 3d Marine Division

The squads are composed of 13 Marines and one Navy corpsman with one Marine and corpsman ready to fill in as alternates in case of injury.

The regimental competition began here April 22 and included a land

navigation exercise and a physical readiness test. Travelling to Molokai, the squads completed security patrols, night attacks and ambushes. From there, the Marines' next stop was the Pohakaloa Training Area on the Big Island where the competition included a live-fire with the squad automatic weapon and a 60mm call-for-fire exercise. Returning to Kaneohe, the Marines showed their dexterity and speed during the PRC-77 radio, SAW, M16A2 assembly/disassembly and a HMMWV pull. The last competition was a night-fire exercise at the base range with their M16s mounted with Starlight scopes.

CWO3 Marshall Wright, regimental weapons officer and competition coordinator, summed up the purpose of the Super Squad competition in a conversation with both squad leaders after the award ceremony.

"There are no losers in this competition," he said. "We can train and train and train; there is no such thing as over-training. competition is great, but remember the real competition is with the enemy.

"You didn't lose anybody in this competition," Wright continued. "And that's the ultimate goal. To be trained as well as you can be and bring everybody home."

Exercise Agile Provider D-Day **Operations**

Camp Lejeune, N.C.— The Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard team demonstrated power projection May 2 as Exercise Agile Provider '94 swung into high gear on D-Day.

The combat phase of the exercise kicked off during the late night and early morning hours with assaults by amphibious, airborne, heliborne and naval forces taking place at installations in North Carolina and Arkansas.

Elements of II Marine Expeditionary Force came ashore at Camp Lejeune's Onslow Beach in a synchronized attack by a Marine Air-Ground Task Force. The task force included a Marine regimental landing team and

fixed and rotary-wing aviation from the 2d Marine Aircraft Wing. As part of the initial assault, Navy aircushioned vehicles also delivered heavy equipment to Onslow Beach.

An airborne infantry brigade task force from the 82nd Airborne Division seized key objectives near Fort Bragg, N.C., in a parachute assault emphasizing the strategic force projection capabilities of the XVIII Airborne Corps. The paratroopers were delivered by Air Force C-141 and C-130 aircraft supported in the assault by Air Force A-10 Thunderbolt IIs and F-16 Fighting Falcons; Marine AV-8B Harriers and F/A-18 Hornets; and Army AH-58D Kiowa Warrior, and AH-64 Apache attack helicopters.

An air assault task force from the 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault) of Fort Campbell, Ky., conducted an airmobile assault into Fort Chaffee, Ark., using Army UH-60 Blackhawk and CH-47 Chinook helicopters. Once

on the ground, the air assault soldiers linked up with units from the 2nd Armored Calvary Regiment (Light) of Fort Polk, La., taking advantage of the unique capabilities provided by the Army's HMMWV-mounted scouts.

The joint/combined exercise sponsored by U.S. Atlantic Command began April 21 and continued through May 11. It was designed to prepare CONUS-based forces to respond to the requirements of the geographic commanders in chief.

Mandela takes leadership reins of South Africa

Nelson Mandela brought three centuries of bitter white rule to a dramatic close Monday in Cape Town, South Africa. In the colonial city where it all began, he was unanimously elected South Africa's first black president by its first all-race

The historic day, which was followed on Tuesday by the formal inauguration in Pretoria, began with an emotional swearing-in ceremony for the 400 new legislators. They convened in what was once the inner sanctum of apartheid: the great hall of Parliament, where a handful of whites enshrined racism into law.

The outgoing President Frederik de Klerk, showed Mandela to his old green leather seat in the government front bench. It was from there that De Klerk rose in February 1990 to Iv repudiate apartheid and announce at reforms that freed Mandela and legalized his African National Congress and other black opposition

Then came the oath of office. Mandela, his estranged wife, Winnie, and seven other senior members of the ANC were in the first group called to raise their right hands and swear allegiance to what seemed an impossible dream: a democratic South Africa.

Foreign ministers to pressure Serbs

A fresh display of international resolve to end the fighting in Bosnia is set for Friday in Geneve, as Western European and Russian foreign ministers join Secretary of State Warren Christopher in calling for a negotiated settlement.

But Clinton administration officials aren't optimistic about accomplishing much at the meeting. The gathering stems from a proposal for a high-level conference by Russian President Boris Yeltsin, who has asserted an activist role in the crisis.

The Serbs, in control of more than 70 percent of the former Yugoslav republic and permitted by U.N. authorities to infiltrate off-limit zones with tanks and "policemen," are showing no interest in talking to the Muslim-led government about U.S. ideas for a confederation of ethnic

3 Azeris fight on despite cease-fire

Azerbaijan signed a Russianbrokered truce with Armenia to halt six years of fighting over Nagorno-Karabakh, but Azerbaijani forces fought on Monday in the disputed enclave.

The truce, which was to begin Monday, was worked out last week in Bishkek, the capital of Kyrgyzstan, and signed by Armenia and Nagorno-Karabakh.

But Azerbaijan balked at signing

the agreement last week, complaining Armenian troops would be allowed to

remain on Azerbaijani territory

Vladimir Kazimirov, President Boris Yeltsin's envoy to end the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict, confirmed that Azerbaijan signed the cease-fire agreement.

Azerbaijani forces continued fighting, trying to break through Armenian positions in northeastern Nagorno-Karabakh.

Protestant gunmen kills elderly woman

A Protestant paramilitary group shot killed a 76-year-old Roman Catholic woman in the latest upsurge of killings in Belfast, a British province in Northern Ireland.

The Ulster Volunteer Force claimed esponsibility for killing Roseanne Mallon, Sunday night, as she watched television at the home of her 60-yearold sister-in-law near Dungannon, 31 miles west of Belfast. Mallon's sister-

in-law wasn't injured.

The paramilitary group, in a brief

statement to a Belfast television station Monday night, claimed responsibility.

Japan plant can't find plutonium

Enough plutonium for at least nine nuclear bombs is unaccounted for in a Japanese plant that should be closed until the "astounding" discrepancy is resolved, a private research group told Secretary of State Warren Christopher.

Operators of the Tokai-mura plutonium fuel production facility suspect 154 pounds are stuck somewhere in the process, Paul Leventhal, president of the Nuclear Control Institute, told Christopher in May 4 letter. But he said Washington should compel Japan to close the plant temporarily until the plutonium is located.

Leventhal said he was not accusing Japan of diverting the plutonium, virtually all of which was provided of an Israeli milby the United States. But he said Palestinians.

the International Atomic Energy Agency should be as tough with Japan as it is with North Korea.

Filipinos picking village leaders

Filipinos went to the polls Monday to choose village leaders in the first grass-roots election under the presidency of Fidel Ramos.

The Commission on Elections said the voting was generally peaceful, although the presence of armed men blocked voting in 133 villages in the southern Philippines. This brought to 274 the number of villages where voting was suspended,

Ramos, who voted in his northern hometown of Asingan in Pangasinan Province, said the election was very important in making the nation's democracy really functional.

The commission said at least 26 people had been killed in election. related violence.

Arab police get warm welcome

Israeli and PLO officials agreed Monday night on a plan to admit the first contingent of Arab police into the Gaza Strip.

On Tuesday the early optimism that representatives of the new Palestinian authority would soon appear evaporated by the time the desert sun was overhead, prompting battles between rock-throwing youths and soldiers that left at least 10 Palestinians injured.

Led by 1967 Six Day War veterans, 150 former PLO fighters arrived before dawn Wednesday. They represented the advance guard of the 9,000-member Arab police force to implement Palestinian self-rule in the occupied

Israeli army patrols moved out of the way as the huge convoy of police, trucks and cars made their way to their first post - an evacuated Israeli civil administration post in the southern Gaza city of Deir Balah.

This was the first official transfer of an Israeli military compound to the

Marine gunner credits experience for leadership success

History has shown the incredible success of Marines to complete the mission can be directly attributed to the quality of the Corps' leaders, both officer and enlisted.

Unfortunately, the many traits that make excellent Marine leaders are often improved through the horror of combat, or at the very least, put to the ultimate test.

For CWO3 Marshall Wright, 3d Marine Regiment weapons officer, his leadership success story began in the jungles of Vietnam. It evolved during his Marine travels throughout the world and is now helping young infantrymen learn what it takes to both complete the mission and stay alive.

As a youth, the tales of his

three uncles, two of whom served in Korea, and their Marine Corps exploits first ignited Wright's interest in his future calling. His uncles were from the same area of Alabama as black Marine legends SgtMaj. Edgar R. Huff and Gilbert "Hashmark" Johnson. His uncles' friendship with these men and the stories they told made Wright know one day he would be called a Marine.

Upon graduation from high school in 1967, he joined the Corps and the 18-year-old Buffalo, , native soon found himself as a 2d Battalion, 3d Marines, machine gunner attached to the Northern I Corps in Vietnam. He quickly learned being tactically and technically proficient can be the difference between life and death. Promoted to corporal in less than a year, and filling a platoon

sergeant's billet due to attrition, Wright said the entire situation was devastating.

"Here you are, really just out of boot camp, and you have men looking up to you, waiting for you to tell them what to do, with all of your lives on the line," he said. 'Small unit leadership was everything. You had to know how to deliver fire on the enemy, either by calling in arty or air strikes; and do it right."

Wright's first tour in Vietnam lasted the usual 13 months and, incredibly, out of more than 340 patrols, he was never wounded. His second tour, 10 months long, was cut short by malaria and hepatitis. He was part of a special forces intelligence team in the Quang Tri Provence. Now a sergeant, his job included interrogation of prisoners.

After Vietnam, Wright was stationed with 2/6 at Camp Lejeune, N.C., the National Security Agency at Ft. Meade, Md., and completed a tour as a drill instructor at San Diego's recruit depot. He also served in that oldest of Marine billets, sea duty, aboard the USS Oriskany, out of Alameda, Calif. His port calls included Japan, the Republic of the Philippines and Hong Kong during two WestPac tours. As the equivalent of a platoon sergeant, now SSgt. Wright continued teaching and molding young Marines during their time with the

Navy. Wright next spent a large part of his career with East Coast grunts, serving with 1/8, 3/8 and 3/6. As any Lejeune infantryman knows, a sizable part of those tours was on ship. Wright racked

up four Caribbean floats, six Mediterranean pumps and three NATO cruises while homeported in North Carolina.

Wright, now a master sergeant, with leadership talents that were well-suited for this next assignment, became the operations chief at the 1st MEB's Brigade Schools' Squad Leaders Course. The course is one of the toughest, both mentally and physically, that young infantrymen can attend, and strong leadership is essential. In 1988, Wright was selected for

both master gunnery sergeant and gunner. He was part of the first class of Marine Corps gunners when the rank was reinstated. The importance of strong leadership traits in the gunner selection process can be found in the fact that applicants must be at



least a gunnery sergeant and have a strong infantry weapons background. Their mission is basically to teach weaponry and its vital role in Marine Corps in fantry.

Since gunners must also attend the Infantry Officers Course, Wright was a CWO2 when he reported for his first assignment as an officer with 2/8. While part of 2/8, Wright was involved with Operation Provide Comfort, the 1991 U.N. Kurdish relief effort He has been back at Kaneohe for two years now.
One might think Wright didn't

have the time to start a family during his world travels in the Corps, but nothing could be further from the truth. He and his wife Geraldine have been married 28 years and have six children and three grandchildren. He said the Marine Corps is like family and will always be part of his life

Wright is still serving his military family, keeping his strong leadership role alive. During the recent regimental Super Squad competition, which he supervised, the 46-year-old was able to once again pass on his infantry and leadership knowledge which has been refined throughout his 28 years in the Marine Corps.

"Our weapons and tactics might change over the years," he said. "But the way we react does not, You must continually evaluate vourself and make changes. Wright's view of what is important in the Marine Corps is

straightforward also.
"The infantry is the Marine
Corps," he said. "No where else can such a small group of men devastate the enemy. It's still one shot, one kill, and after the planes and artillery have pounded the enemy from the air, it will still be the Marine rifleman who has to take the ground forces."

the sleepy compound. The Australians quickly pushed their attack forward, clearing every building of enemy aggressors as they went. The charge were placed on the key buildings and in a brilliant flash, each of the buildings was destroyed.

Their objective complete, the raid force quickly withdrew the way they came and disappeared back into the darkness

The late-night raid by Support Company, 1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, on the former Naval Oceanic Systems Command (NOSC) compound was one of the training exercises during the monthlong Exercise Golden Eagle between the Marines and the Australian Army.

During the exchange, a company from the 1st Battalion, 3d Marines traveled to Australia and the Australian company came here to train.

Although the Marine Corps participates in many exchanges, this one is slightly different. The one is slightly different. companies take the place of each other and they work with the other companies in the battalion. Company B, 1st Battalion, 3d Marines, has been the company training with the Australians.

"Our primary objective is to get training that is not normally available to us in Australia," explained Australian Army Maj. Craig Johnston,

officer commanding, Support explained Sgt. Eric Hughes, platoon Company, 1st Battalion, Royal guide, Bravo Company. "We get to Australian Regiment.

One of the training items which was not normally available to the Australians was the amphibious raid.

"Raiding is a concept we don't practice, at least not a waterborne raid," Johnston explained. "It is a completely different style of infantry training.

Trying to keep the training new and challenging has been the job of 1/ and particularly Bravo Company. 1stLt. Ken Tacelli, executive officer, Bravo Company, explained that a training package was set up to include helicopter insertion and extraction techniques, like fast roping, helo a sniper with Support Company. "The casting and SPIE rigging. Some other amphibious and helicopter work we to include the raid; amphibious assaults by AAVs; and live fires.
According to Johnston, virtually all

the training on the schedule was unique, but he felt the live fire training was also crucial since an Australian support company is similar to a weapons company.

"We are not really trying to teach tactics; this is about them becoming familiar with us and us becoming familiar with them," Tacelli explained.
"The training has been really good,

particularly that B Company has been able to take part in all the training," Johnston said.

Besides the training, there are other benefits to the exchange:

"This is also a cultural exchange,"

see what they are about militarily and see what they are about culturally. They are a whole other country, but they are a lot like us.

Johnston said the exchange of military ideas and culture from the Australian Army private to the Marine private was one of the best parts of the exchange.

"My people will go back to Australia with the mateships and friendships that developed. They will have a lot of good memories and good friendships," Johnston said.

"This has been a good experience," Australian Cpl. Cameron Wainwright, training events included in the did was totally different from what we exchange were: small boat operations, do back in Australia. The amphibious operations we found out are pretty difficult."

The exchange of ideas wasn't limited to the military. During one break in the training, the Australians used the time to show the Marines how to play Australian football. And the Marines have been using the weekends to take the Australians out to some of the tourist attractions on the island.

When the exchange ends May 24, the Marines and Australians will part with a much better understanding of each other and each other's capabilities. If the Marines and Australians ever fight together someday, that understanding could make the critical difference between success and failure.









Fouls cost the NBA too much



I knew the NBA Playoffs were going to be real fiesty, but that thin line between aggressive play and stupidity has been crossed too many times. What's the deal with all of the fighting?

The game of basketball was conceived with the idea that passing and quick movement of the players would make up the core of the game. There was never an intention for physical play to be involved. Setting picks and blocking out for rebounds were the most contact the players were allowed to have.

But as time moved on, the players got smarter, bigger, faster and more athletic. But the rules didn't change. This created a situation where the game was slow paced and every player had a real legitimate shot at fouling out of a game. How many guys foul out of NBA games these days? Not many; and it is usually the big, dorky guys like Jon Koncak or Will Perdue, or the players with "tough-guy" reputations like Dennis Rodman or Charles Oakley. You hardly ever see a marquee player

fouling out of a game. Perhaps it's because the marques players are smart enough to avoid getting into foul trouble, But, I think it's because the NBA knows that games in which the stars get into foul trouble won't be very exciting.

Let's take Michael Jordan for example. After the Bulls rose to the top of the league, I can't recall a game in which Jordan fouled out. I find it rather amazing that a player that spends all of his time flying down the lane, going for blocks, and trying to steal the ball wouldn't get called for fouls.

What makes this so crazy is that Jordan knew he wouldn't get called for fouls. He knew because he was the best player alive he would be on the playing floor. He knew that the NBA knew it needed him playing, not sitting on the bench in foul trouble. So, he became more aggressive, which made him more spectacular to watch.

as he became spectacular and popular he knew even fewer calls would go against him. He knew the league needed him. But it's not just Jordan. It was Dr. J. and Magic, and Bird as well. The league needs these marquee players to make the league and the sport more popular.

This then put the referees in an awkward position. They couldn't blatantly enforce two different sets of rules on the court, one for stars and one for the other guys. So they gradually called less and less fouls. How many of you can remember when a hand-check was a foul? It still is! But when was the last time you saw a foul called

for hand-checking in the NBA?
My point is that the player suspensions and the over \$60,000 worth of fines that were handed out during several recent playoff games, are simply a culmination of years of lenient officiating that was condoned by the NBA.

Fines and suspensions have been handed out in an effort to curb the violence. How about simply having the referees officiate the game as it is meant to be?

Splash and Dash stirs the waters and competition up

Local fishermen may have seen an unusual sight Friday morning as approximately 100 swimmers churned the waters of Kaneohe Bay during the first leg of Marine Aircraft Group-24's Splash and Dash.

The 400-meter swim and five mile run was part of the 1st Marine Expeditionary Brigade Commanding General's Fitness Series. Athletes could participate in both the swim and run, or divide the two events between two people.

Swimmers lined the water's edge next to the Hangar 101 tarmac as lifeguards on their flotation boards lined the swim course. A buoy 200 meters out marked the turnaround point.

Although Marines are known for their marksmanship skills in combat, many enjoy firing weapons during their off-time too.

To meet this demand for recreational marksmanship, Marine Corps Base Hawaii's Morale Welfare and Recreation offers pistol owners a chance to fire their weapons at the MCBH Kaneohe Bay range the first and third Saturday of every month.


