Jth crimes result in six families losing base housing

Seven juveniles, ages 12 to 15, were detained for breaking and entering, burglary and various other property crimes committed aboard Marine Corps Base Hawaii recently.

Allegedly aided by one adult who was found in possession and thought to have purchased the property during a three month period, the seven juveniles may have stolen over \$25,000 worth of property from resi-dents throughout the base family housing areas.

During the investigation of the crimes, a member of the MCB Hawaii Criminal Investigation Department noticed one of the juveniles in a base housing area playing with a cellular phone. Thinking that a juvenile in possession of a cellular phone was out of the ordinary, the investigator detained him matched the phone with one that had been stolen earlier. Having been caught, the juvenile admitted taking the phone and described other crimes in which he and the other youths had taken part.

Base Order P5500.6D states that military personnel are responsible for the actions of their dependents. Therefore, the sponsors of the six families involved were ordered to appear before the base magistrate, Mike Monyak, Capt. who recommended several administrative sanctions on those responsible for the crimes and their families, to include removal from base housing. of the move and reloca. tion, to be completed within 30 days of the finding, will not be covered by the government, and the perpetrators are barred from all military facilities on the island of Oahu, except for medical and dental care, for a period of three years.

How to prevent home break-ins

Recently the base has had a number a burglaries and intruder incidents in its residential areas. The vast majority of homes were entered through unsecured doors and windows. These crimes could have been prevented by the simple turning of a lock or placement of a pin. Lock your doors and windows when you are not home and at night.

The home security inspection, conducted by the Military Police Department, Crime Prevention Unit, will help to point out ecurity defects in your quarters. security detects in your quarters. Information is provided on methods available to improve security. Most of the materials needed to improve your home security may be obtained from the Family Housing Self-Help Office Office.

General Carl E. Mundy Jr., Commandant of the Marine Corps, recently announced that the Marine Corps will take an active role in consolidated training for non-service specific military occupational specialties. As a result, more Marines will soon be classmates with members of the Army, Navy and Air Force.

The move results from an allmilitary services review, directed by the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, to eliminate unnecessary duplication and training redundancy by encouraging single site training, to create cost savings despite dwindling DoD resources, and to increase the training efficiency of military schools. The Marine Corps is the executive agent for the 1994 Interservice Training Review Organization, a three-year initiative which is conducting an assessment of the services' training needs.

Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., will see one of the largest influxes of Marine students. By fiscal year 1996, the Marine Corps is expected to send

This week around the world

Casualty free landing at Port-au-Prince

Spearheading the American landing in Haiti and seizing Port-au-Prince airport at 9:45 a.m., Sept. 19, Company C, 2nd Battalion, 22nd Regiment of the Army's 10th Moun-tain Division established the U.S. military's first base of operations.

Being met with no resistance, the only individuals Charlie Company faced after debarking from their 10 UH-60 helicopters were spectators and about 100 journalists covering the event.

The soldiers were armed with various types of weapons and ordered to only take a defensive posture

The soldiers secured the perimeter of the airport in a minimal amount of time and the only shots fired were those of photographers' cameras.

They gained control of the airport terminal by using teams to clear rooms and remove any nonessential personnel. Two men with a special forces squad were even given directions to the control tower by Haitian soldiers. Upon arrival, U.S. commander

LtGen. Henry Shelton departed the airport to meet with Haiti's military ruler.

Outside the airport, crowds waved and cheered at the troops.

While military operations appeared to be going smoothly, questions arose in Washington about the deal negotiated by the delegation





Throughout its history from 1901 to the present, the 1st Marine Expeditionary Brigade has seen war, peace and disaster; has been deactivated and reactivated; named and renamed. Having served its country and Corps with honor and distinction, the 1st MEB command element is preparing for deactivation, while it's major subordinate commands are reorganizing to become III Marine Expeditionary Force, Hawaii.

The 1st Marine Expeditionary Brigade, soon to be III MEF Hawaii, serves as a combat ready force in the central Pacific prepared to provide a hard hitting air/ground team. It is trained and equipped to react on a moment's notice and is the only combat unit in the world in which the air/ground team daily trains and lives together.

The organization

The largest tenant command on Marine Corps Base Hawaii, the 1st MEB is a fully operational Marine Air Ground Task Force which consists of a Command Element, an Aviation Combat Element (MAG-24), a Ground Combat Element (3d Marine Regiment (Rein)), and a Combat Service Support Element (BSSG-1)

The MEB supports one of three strategically important Maritime Prepositioning Force Squadrons. The MPF squadrons are heavily mechanized with tanks, self-propelled artillery and other vehicles prepositioned aboard Maritime Prepositioning Squadron vessels. The Marines and sailors of the 1st MEB form the base of MPF-3, with the additional personnel required based on Okinawa, Japan, and in southern California.

The 1st MEB's ground combat element, the 3d Marine Regiment is the second largest infantry regiment in the Marine Corps. It has three infantry battalions, an artillery battalion and a combat support company comprised of an engineer platoon, an assault amphibian vehicle platoon and a special training section.

The MEB's aviation support is provided by Marine Aircraft Group-24, which is comprised of three tactical aircraft squadrons, a support squadron and an aviation logistics squadron. MAG-24 pilots fly brigade. The group also provides its own offensive and defensive air control and air traffic control.

Brigade Service Support Group-1 provides logistical support for the 1st MEB. It is comprised of Headquarters and Service Company, Maintenance Company, Motor Transport Company, Supply Company, Engineer Company, Medical Company and Dental Company.

Brigade administrative support is provided by Headquarters and Service Company, and the communications support is provided by Company B, 7th Communications Battalion.

Its mission

The MEB's role throughout history, at home and abroad, has been as diverse as its capabilities. In one form or another, the MEB has supported a multitude of operations ranging from hostile to humanitarian.

Humanitarian missions are the most recent example of the MEB's capabilities. In December '92 the brigade sent more than 80 Marines to Somalia to help render humanitarian support in operation Restore Hope.

Previously the MEB was put to the test in September of 1992, following the wrath of Hurricane Iniki which slammed the Hawaiian Island chain. In a joint operation of more than 3,000 military personnel, the MEB sent more than 500 Marines and sailors to the hardest hit island of Kauai to support Joint Task Force Garden Isle.

Although the MEB has proven itself during humanitarian operations, it has been its MAGTF flexlands which have won it distinction.

In support of Operation Desert Shield in early August 1990, the 1st MEB began deploying its assets to Saudi Arabia and the island emirate of Bahrain. Displaying its MAGTF flexibility it began to augment the 1st Marine Expeditionary Force and "marry-up" with its MPF equipment as it was off-loaded from its MPF ships.

Desert Storm the 3d Marine Regiment was the closest Marine regiment to the Kuwait border. exchanged "harassment fire" with Iraqi forces and helped fight off the Iragi forces trying to thrust into the border city of Khafji, when joined with the 1st Marine Division in Task. Force Taro.

During the ground assault, the regiment acted as the Division's forward probing force, and infiltrated into Kuwait more than a day before the main attack began. During the attack, the regiment guarded the Division's right flank all the way to the Kuwait International Airport.

MAG-24 deployed 10 of 11 squad-rons to the 3d Marine Aircraft Wing. During Operation Desert Storm, jets from MAG-24 took part in the air war, and were some of the first to strike deep into Iraq, while CH-53s and CH-46s from the MEB were attached to MAG-16 and participated in heavy-lift and supply missions from the Al Jubail Airport.

Its history

Springing up from two rifle regiments and two artillery companies, the lineage of the 1st Marine Expeditionary Brigade dates back to 1901 on the island of Luzon in the Philippines. At that time, called the Marine Brigade, the unit saw its first action when Brigade units took part in the march across the island of Samar in 1901-1902.

Units of the Brigade were sent to China in October 1911, during the hai and other places, remaining on

It was during the "Banana War" campaigns that the Brigade pioneered the close air support concept and dramatically placed the air/ ground team in the forefront of tactical innovation. Its mission completed in 1934, the Brigade returned to Quantico, Va. Between 1939 and 1950, the brigade was activated, redesignated and deactivated several times. In 1941, the Brigade deployed to Iceland; then to Guam in 1944 where it participated in the seizure of Guam




"When she sees something that needs to be done, she doesn't hold back; she'll charge out and ensure it's done right," Murphy added.
