Postal service at MCBH

Effective Oct. 1 the post office located at building 835 will no longer have over-the-counter purchases, and personal pack-ages and items will not be mailed out of the existing facility. Marine rifle qualification course to change Oct. 1

The new fiscal year brings many changes to the rifle range qualification course.

Marines will no longer qualify knowing only the fundamentals of shooting, such as they learned on the known distance range. In October they will show their proficiency with the elements of combat.

The focus was changed to optimally train Marines in marksmanship and in what they might encounter in combat, explained CWO-3 Paul E. Malsbury, Base Rifle Range officer in charge.

Approximately two years ago, Marine officials gathered in Quantico, Va., to discuss different methods for improving marksmanship training.

Commanders were what marksmanship skills were necessary for Marines. As a result of this research, 11 training standards were developed, Malsbury

1 Haiti's police headquarters is occupied by U.S. troops.

Entering Haiti's most feared police station, U.S. troops made another significant step in the downfall of Col. Michel-Joseph Francos, the country's most feared policeman.

The appearance of Haiti's military power was eliminated when American troops abolished the Haitian army's most important unit, the Heavy Weapons Company.


Another major goal of the U.S., officials say, is to identify and register the more than 1,500 policemen as a precursor to the removal of the police force from the army's ranks.

Thousands of Haitians gathered around the 59-year-old station and cheered when they witnessed two armored U.S. military vehicles arrive. Haitian police looked sullen as American troops with M-16 assault rifles slung over their shoulders walked through the structure while others stood guard outside.

To the Haitians, the police station located on the Le Gran Rue is a monstrosity because of what it represents. Thousands of Haitians have died or disappeared after they were taken to the building.

Sitting in his new Japanese fourwheel-drive and surrounded by interrogators, Capt. Yvon Jean-Jacques of the Haitian military was bombarded with questions from the local civilians.

"Why can we demonstrate now when before we would be beaten?" one man asked Jean-Jacques

"Because everything is different now," Jean-Jacques said. But he warned them, "Do not think the Americans are here to let you do bad things. You can only do good things. You can demonstrate, but you must be peaceful."

Many Haitian civilians in the town thought the Haitian military might disappear overnight.

"We don't want violence," a young man said. "But we hate them and they hate us, and we know the Marines took their guns away."

3 More nuclear arms

cuts urged by Yeltsin
Russian President Boris Yeltsin,
during his speech at the U.N. general assembly in New York, called for all five major nuclear nations to sign a treaty that would cut-remaining arsenals, stop the pro-duction of warhead materials and ban the re-use of charges from dismantled missiles.

"There is an urgent need for all nuclear states to participate in the process of reducing and limiting nuclear weapons," said Yeltsin.

Though the proposal was somewhat vague, it was the first Russian arms initiative since the 1993 signing of the START 2 treaty, which cut the Russian and American arsenals by two-thirds to about 3,000 nuclear warheads each.

The proposal was aimed at calming recent fears of the West which have stemmed from German arrests of would-be plutonium smugglers and the fear of Russian nuclear materials falling into terrorist hands. Yeltsin also stated that Moscow is responsible for stability of the newly formed states in Russia,

Although Madeleine Albright, U.S. ambassador to the U.N., said Yeltsin's ideas would be carefully examined, Yeltsin and President Clinton are expected to sign on improving control over nuclear stockpiles.



Marines share knowledge with Tongans

rom A-1 The unit CFC Keyperson is responsible for contacting the individual Marine, Sailor and civilian employee. They are required to give the potential donator objective information to better allow the individual to

make a conscious decision.

When giving to the CFC, be aware of the different charities available to choose from. An approved charitable agency listing can be obtained from the unit keyperson. If you decide you want to give to the CFC, but do not want to designate a

specific charity, you may designate the donation be distributed evenly amongst local, national, international or all of the charities listed.

You may give to the CFC by either cash, check or payroll deduction. If contributing by payroll deduction, the deduction will begin to take effect in January '95.

Contributions are voluntary. Any improper influence of a federal or military member to contribute is strictly prohibited, and anyone trying to coerce a decision to give should be immediately reported to the chain-of-command.



JEC can help Marines further education Exercise your right to vote

When Marines or sailors ask might have

their family members by either a one-on-one consultation or an Edu-These 30-minute briefs are held Wednesdays from 12:15 to 12:45 p.m. at the JEC, building 219. Monetary educational assistance, however, is provided only to active duty personnel.

With a current enrollment of more than 1,500 students, the JEC is constantly increasing its number of students

"I think the reason that student enrollment has increased is the downsizing of our military force. If the Marine or sailor has some sort of college background, he becomes more marketable in the civilian community," explains GySgt. Donald Ratliff, the staff noncommissioned officer in charge of the base JEC.

By paying 75 percent of the cost of the course, the Department of the Navy helps provide active duty personnel with an affordable col-lege education. Only lab fees and books are not covered by tuition assistance. If, however, the Marine or sailors fails to maintain a "C" average or better in a course, or can

not complete it, he or she is required to pay back the 75 percent covered by tuition assistance

For the Marine or sailor without How can I get a college education? the money or time to devote to a they need not look far to find the regular class schedule, the JEC answers. At the Joint Education provides alternatives. It offers vari-Center, a small and knowledgeable ous tests, such as the CLEP, which staff can answer any question they allows students the opportunity to earn college credits in different The JEC's mission is to provide subjects they are knowledgeable in. information to Marines, sailors and Tests are free to Marines and sailors on active duty.

Many Marines may have earned cational Opportunities Assistance credits they are unaware of. Some brief. from their Service Record Book.

The JEC can also help Marines and sailors enroll in the Apprenticeship Program. The program gives those personnel in certain vocations the chance to take advantage of practical experience already gained in their present job. Simply by contacting the JEC, documenting their work over a designated period of time and having it verified, active duty personnel can receive a certificate from the Department Of Labor. Having this certificate can increase the amount of pay earned in a civilian job.

For those Marines and sailors who are currently enrolled in college courses and planning to transfer in the near future, they should inquire into our Servicemen's Op-portunities College program," advises Ratliff, who while on active duty, earned a master's degree in administration. "It's basically a contract between the student and their school. The SOC program allows the student to seek his degree with a school by receiving college credits from schools other than his own," he explains.

Many Marines may not think they have the time or finances to attend college. However, according to Cpl. Marc Hudzinski, an infantryman in 1st Battalion, 3d Marines, and a psychology major at Chaminade University, "Taking advantage of tuition assistance gives the Marine who plans on separating from the Corps a head start on an education, and it helps defer the cost of attending a university by stretching out your G.I. Bill funds."

Exercise your right to vote today and help shape your future for tomorrow. This might sound like a slogan but it's advice that should be taken into consideration when polls open in your state

The Federal Voting Assistance Program, which has been helping absentee voters since 1942, allows citizens of the United States living out-of-state or overseas the opportunity to vote by mail.

In assisting the voter, the Voters Information Center, a non-partisan, federally-run distributes organization, information on upcoming elections via fact sheets, news releases and messages to the Senior Service Voting Assistance Officer. That information is then disseminated to all unit Voting Assistance Officers.

In the case of an individual residing out of their home state who has yet to register to vote, he or she merely has to contact their unit VAO. Since each state has it's own requirements, the VAO will determine if the individual is eligible to vote by using the Voting Assistance

Generally, persons convicted of treason or a felony (unless restored to civil rights), found incompetent guardianship are disqualified from registering or voting.

Citizens who exercise their ight to vote must fill out Standard Form 76, the Post Card Registration and Absentee Ballot Request, and mail it to their respective state voter registration

"The form is definitely user friendly and your unit VAO will be more than happy to assist you," said 1stLt. Maureen Murphy, Marine Corps Base Hawaii voting officer.

Upon receiving confirmation of registration, the same standard form can be used to request absentee ballots and information on candidates.

Voters should mail in their request and submit their ballot in a timely manner because each state has it's own cut-off times and dates for voter registration, primary and general elections.

If the voter would like immediate information on candidates, the VAO can refer the individual to the 1-800 telephone number that provides updated information.

"Qualified family members can also contact their sponsor's unit VAO to receive any assistance as an absentee voter," explained Murphy, whose primary mission is MCB Hawaii base adjutant:

Those voters who have changed their state residency and wish to register to vote in their new state have but to contact their VAO and fill out the Post Card Registration, Form 76.

Have you considered Recycling instead of throwing away?

Webster's Dictionary describes trash as worthless discarded material.

Yet people throw away some items which can be of value, if recycled.

"It just doesn't make sense to throw something away that can still have a useful life," said Suzanne Jones, recycling coordinator for the city and county of Honolulu,

On the average, the island of Oahu generates approximately 1.5 million tons of trash annually. According Jones, household waste could be reduced by 10 to 15 percent if consumers would make an effort and participate in recycling.

Marine Corps Base Hawaii has an active recycling clothing, car seats or drain program which makes it pipes. simple for base family residents to participate.

Each home is provided with recycling containers. A large yellow container is provided new glass containers. for glass, aluminum cans and

plastic bottles. A smaller can be mixed with asphalt. black bin is also provided for This creates a product called

Residents must separate the pave Hawaii roads. recyclable items in trash or plastic bags. It is important difficult remove their labels. Glossy recycled plastic containers inserts and magazines are not into products such as ski recyclable, explained Eddie jackets and stuffing for Kerr, base housing office, pillows, sleeping bags and car construction supervisor inspector.

After the recyclable items are placed curb-side, they are sorted by the refuse collectors. Once sorted, the contractor may stockpile them until he has a large enough quantity to take to a local recycler.

There, the items compacted and processed. The recycler either sends them to local recycling markets or ships them to the mainland or to the Far East, where they encounter their last and most important step: reuse.

What was once thought of as trash is returned back to their original condition or turned into items such as pipes.

For example, glass is 100 percent recyclable. Every pound of recycled glass bottles or jars can make a pound of

Although plastics are more to recycle, to clean all items and to manufacturers can now turn seats.

Many of these products can be readily manufactured without recycling. However, the world's most precious resources are not as abundant as they were 50 years ago.

"Some people criticize recycling because they say it takes more time and money than throwing it in the trash," said Julie Mansur, Base "But Environmental. recycling prevents waste of

earth's precious resources One of Hawaii's most valuable resources is also

being wasted away: the landfills, explained Jones. "We know land is precious in Hawaii. Do we want it

wasted away by landfills?" she said. "People must be aware that rubbish doesn't magically disappear," Jones said, "Recycling greatly reduces the amount of waste sent to landfills."

Base housing residents can help reduce this problem by regularly participating in the family housing recycling program. Recycling containers should be placed on the curb-side and will be picked up on Thursday or Friday, depending on the housing area.







Others that may be considered are Eric Dickerson, Earl Campbell and Tony Dorsett.



Risk of running Marathon minimal to healthy people

Headlines of sudden death during exercise grab our attention, Whether it is a celebrity like running author James Fixx or a local Marine, tragedy causes self-reflection and doubt. Therefore can running more miles in preparation for the Honolulu. Marathon kill you?

According to a 1982 study by cardiologist Paul Thompson, M.D., the incidence of sudden death is unusual in healthy athletes. He found that the benefits from regular aerobic exercise outweigh the low risks of sudden cardiac arrest.

But what if you have unknown heart problems? Luckily warning signs exist when something isn't right. Published in the September 1992 issue of the Physician and Sports Medicine an article by Phillip Ades, M.D. the following 12 questions identify increased risk of sudden death during exercise:

1. Have you experienced any pain or discomfort in the chest or surexercise?

2. Do you develop any chest pain or discomfort that radiates down your arm during exercise and goes away after your workout?

5. Do you become nauseated during by Tom Doherty.

6. Have you been told by your physician that you have a heart murmur?

7. Has any member of your family died before the age of 35?

8. Has any physician ever recommended that you not participate in vigorous exercise or sports?

9. Is there a history of coronary heart disease in your immediate family?

10. Do you smoke or have high blood pressure, high cholesterol or diabetes?

11. Do you use cocaine?

12. Has it been more than two years since you had a physical examination?

If you answered yes to any of the above questions, consult your doctor. Two conditions can also make healthy hearts more susceptible to problems. One is heat stroke caused by dehydration. The second is myocarditis (heart muscle inflammation) caused by viral illness such as the flu. Be sure to drink plenty of water and use common sense in rounding area, particularly during the heat of Hawaii. Rest if you are sick with a virus.

Family Service Center

One can look at many of the day-to-day interactions that we have with our coworkers, supervisors, partners and children and analyze them as being assertive, aggressive or nonassertive. However, often people think they are being assertive, when they are actually being aggressive. How do we know what the differences are?

When someone is being aggressive they express their opinions, thoughts and feelings, but they do it in such a way that they don't respect the other person's right to be treated with respect and dignity. In other words, they may approach situations with an attitude of, "It's my way or the highway." Aggressive people sometimes get a great deal accomplished, but oftentimes it is at the expense relationship.

In contrast, someone who is being nonassertive does not express their thoughts, feelings and opinions for fear that they may be seen as aggressive. The payoff is that it avoids a conflict. Sometimes this is a good choice and at other times it has negative consequences, as the individual can build up which resentments stockpile until he or she explodes with aggression. Someone who is nonassertive generally overlooks their rights in a situation.

Being assertive is yet another behaviorial In these option. situations, an individual respects their rights as well as others, and holds others in high regard. They express their They thoughts, feelings and opinions in a manner that respects and listens to the other person. Depending upon the situation, it is appropriate to choose any one of the three ways of interacting. Most often, however, it is useful to be more assertive . 88 problems and issues are resolved with assertiveness, leaving the relationship intact and oftentimes improved.




