PTA 1-97 continues

POHAKULOA TRAINING AREA, Hawaii – Law enforcement and security for exercise PTA 1-97 is the job of a 12-Marine detachment of military policemen from Kaneohe Bay.

The Department of Defense police at PTA are typically augmented by Marine MPs during this bi-annual deployment the Big Island.

"Most of my detachment volunteered and want to be here," said SSgt. John P. Salvetti, staff noncommissioned officer in charge, MP detachment, PTA, Military Police Department. "The motivation is really high and most consider this a break from their routine in K-Bay. They'll work in 12-hour shifts of three MPs performing driving and walking patrols to enforce traffic safety, which is our primary concern."

Because of past accidents at PTA, vehicle safety is paramount. The MPs enforce speed limits and the use of chock blocks to prevent parked vehicles from moving, said Salvetti

"The mixture of military and civilian personnel and the proximity of Saddle Road to the training areas makes for a large number of accidents," said Salvetti, a 12-year Marine. "This is particularly why we brought an accident investigator with the detachment."

DoD hospital changes

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Starting Oct. 1, parents will have to pay for newborn care at Department of Defense hospitals from the time of birth whether or not they carry health insurance.

DoD currently charges the standard family member rate for the mother and nothing for the baby, provided both are DoD-eligible beneficiaries and go home together. The same rate is charged for DoD-eligible babies requiring hospitalization after the mother is discharged.

If the family has health insurance, DoD currently bills the insurer to recover full costs from the time of birth. Beginning Oct. 1, however, DoD will bill parents without health insurance for all newborn care from the

Corps returns Marine's salute after 28 years

MARINE CORPS AIR STATION, El Toro, Calif. - Lance Cpl. Marvin L. McDonald Jr. was halfway through his first tour in Vietnam in 1968 when, to his surprise, he was told to get on a truck and go home.

He was processed out of the Marine Corps, he would later find out, because his father was dying of cancer, making him a "sole surviving son." According to military regulation at the time, the last male child in a bloodline couldn't be stationed in a combat

demilitarized zone in Camp Carrol, Vietnam. At the same time, he was called into a reserve base and handed a Navy Achievement Medal, with combat "V."

For 28 years McDonald was resentful of how he received the award, and harbored a feeling of loneliness without his brothers-in-arms.

That is, until mid-summer, when the 49year-old husband and father stood before his former commanding officer, Col. Jack B. Zimmermann, and former battery crew chief, retired and retired MSgt. Al R. Rivera, to receive the award in a "fitting manner," at Marine Fighter Attack Training Squadron 101's hangar here.

"I was talking to Rivera and he told me how McDonald still felt. They both lived around here, so I said 'Hey, let's do this right," Zimmermann said.

Zimmermann's son, 1stLt. David B. Zimmermann, is an aviator with VMFAT-101 here. Zimmermann approached his son and the squadron's commanding officer, LtCol. Thomas A. Benes, with the idea to award

> McDonald at a VMFAT-101 formation.

"This is really about each other. We saw something very wrong had happened to LCpl. McDonald and decided to take care of our own." said Zimmermann, who flew from Houston to present the award. "It's amazing how the unit can maintain bonds that go

back a quarter of a century," he added. "I was called back from Vietnam in 1968 because my father was dying; all the time I felt like I was leaving my family behind," said McDonald, who also said seeing Rivera again was like "finding a missing part of myself."

McDonald was an assistant gunner with one of the battery's six self-propelled 155mm howitzers. The Marines were directly behind the DMZ, Zimmermann said, because the enemy's 152mm artillery had longer range.

"We endured tremendous amounts of casualties and took a great beating," Rivera said. "But we also returned a lot of fire. Believe me, the NVA hated Kilo in more ways than one. We were right along with the infantry - we fought and we did it proudly. It still gives me chills knowing this tradition continues to march," he told Marines and Sailors at the formation

McDonald's citation was for exemplary performance of duties. It cited McDonald working "tirelessly and with meticulous attention to detail," to provide timely and accurate fire support for maneuvering infantry units.

"As a result of his diligence and seemingly unlimited resourcefulness," the citation reads, "he gained the respect and admiration of all who observed him and contributed significantly to the accomplishment of his unit's mission." McDonald doesn't tell many war stories

about his time in Vietnam, said his wife, Andi. who described him as a "very private and lowkey person." McDonald maintained a tightlipped, solemn look throughout the ceremony.

"He had the same look today that I saw when he was sitting on that truck as it pulled away so long ago," said Rivera. -"I guess today probably brings back a lot of memories for all of

However, despite an opportunity many would consider fortunate, McDonald never once laughed or joked when he found out he was going home. Nor did he display a "short timer's" attitude, Rivera said.

"When he was ordered onto the truck, he looked down the firing line and gave a slow salute," said Rivera. "I looked to see who he was saluting, but no one was there. He was saluting the guns.

"Now, 28 years late," continued Rivera, "I guess the Corps is saluting him back."

We were taught as young Marines that when in doubt as to whether to salute, do it. It seems now that it is just the opposite. I don't think you can ever be wrong by saluting. I truly feel it shows a total lack of professionalism when you see Marines acting like they belong to some other organization by crossing the street, turning directions or just saying "Sorry sir, I didn't see you."

If this sounds a little sorry, it's because it is.

Marines tackle environment:

Environmental department gives leathernecks a heads-up about its concerns on 'Big Island'

POHAKULOA TRAINING AREA. Hawaii - Even during an exercise such as PTA 1-97, environmental awareness is paramount. Marines deployed here are encouraged to use designated training areas and established roads for training.

With the respect and protection these

'endangered plants' receives, habitat cohabitation between the fragile ecosystem and hard training warriors here will be a continued success.

"The number one mission of the environmental department here is to ensure we effectively

manage the natural and cultural resources and simultaneously allow for the continuation of military training," said former MCB Hawaii environmental specialist Scott Environmental chief, Henderson, Department, here. "The protection of these resources is outlined in our detailed standard operating procedures manual.

Henderson

"Our standard operating procedures have all the do's and don'ts to inform everybody of any environmentally unsound practices,"

added Henderson. "Some of the simpler guidelines are don't cut or remove vegetation, no open fires of any kind, stay out of the lava tubes and use only established roads. Don't take shortcuts cross-country."

"The most abused rule is keeping tactical vehicles on established roads," said Henderson. "A vehicle will smash not only endangered plants but others that protect the land from erosion. There is already a lot of dust here and denuding the topography would only encourage a bigger problem."

The plant species at PTA are 90 percent native to Hawaii, with few introduced plants present, giving PTA one of the highest concentrations of indigenous plants in the the islands, Henderson said.

"The eco-system here is the sub-alpine tropical dryland, the rarest type of eco-system on the planet," Henderson said. "It does take some overall knowledge of the big picture to realize we have an abundant amount of rare plants and animals. Many of the species we know very little about.

"Due to our location near the volcanic areas of Mauna Kea and especially Mauna Loa,. evolution takes place at an accelerated rate," Henderson added. "All of Mauna Loa's surface is covered by 'new' lava flows every 10,000 years. Not all areas in a flow are covered in lava, leaving a small pocket of life to evolve independently from others. These little islands of life are called Kipuka.' The vegetated Kipuka's are a relatively tight radius of a small pool of species where mutation occurs frequently, especially among the

"The only mammals native to Hawaii are the monk seal and the Hawaiian bat, so all ungulates - animals with hooves - are introduced animals which have a drastic impact on our fragile environment," said Henderson. "To protect the plants, eradicating the ungulates and fencing off critical plant habitat areas have proven to be a notable success towards preservation of our native species."

The Environmental Department at PTA wants to fence in 2,400 acres of PTA's 108,000 acres, which accounts for only 2.2 percent of PTA's total acreage, said Henderson.

"A lot of hunters have access to the training areas when they are deserted," Henderson said. "Gaining their support is hard because of our fencing efforts, but through orientations and tours we can give them a feel for our

preservation efforts. With a basic understanding of our mission they become more supportive and compliant with our SOP."

The training areas also contain cultural resources which have not been thoroughly inventoried as of vet, said Henderson.

"We have only surveyed 15 percent of our land for potential cultural resources," Henderson said. "Ancient Hawaiians used the saddle between the two volcanoes as a base camp for mining operations on top of Mauna Kea. Their sites are typically located in lava tubes and blisters.

"From artifacts and remnants at these sites we know these natives harvested many numbers of ground nesting seabirds and eggs," Henderson added. "The birds were a good food source in this arid environment and the feathers were used for the feather capes they wore to stay warm."

Many of the bone fragments found are from extinct species of birds. Over-hunting and the introduction of rats, cats and mongoose contributed to extinction of these species, Henderson said.

An example of an endangered plant and an endangered bird it supports is the mamane tree, which supports the palila bird, said Henderson.

"The mamane tree and palila bird are both federally endangered species. The palila bird depends on this particular tree for food," said Henderson. "Without the tree the bird would go extinct, which is a perfect example of how fragile the eco-system is here and what precautions are suitable for its stewardship.

"There are only 1,500 to 2,000 palila birds left," Henderson added. "The Army is cooperating in a project to reintroduce palila birds to areas where mamane trees don't have a bird population, but it's difficult reintroducing a bird which is so sedentary to one area."

Another plant which is endangered and at near the top for preservation is the Hawaiian mint plant," said Henderson. Only 20,000 plants remain and they are only found at

"Critically endangered is the lanceleaf catchfly plant which is only found at PTA," Henderson said. "We have only inventoried 2,500 to exist here.

Without the stewardship of the Environmental Department valuable flora and fauna could be lost, causing PTA to be put under a "glass dome" no one can enter except select personnel.





Animal Care Clinic helps pets

The Animal Care Clinic is a wellkept secret. Tucked behind Self-Help, the clinic has not enjoyed wide-spread popularity.

"Many people on base don't even know we are here," said Capt. Chris Kohnen, Animal Care Clinic OIC. "We offer almost all of the same services as other veterinarians at a lower rate."

The clinic is located in building 455 adjacent to the Housing Office, and the only service they can't perform on animals is surgery.

"A lot of what we provide is preventive medicine," said Kohnen.

Changes

"We give yearly vaccinations, flea and heartworm prevention, deworming and minor sick call."

The Animal Care Clinic also handles the registration of pets aboard MCB Hawaii. Yearly vaccinations and rabies shots must be up to date, and only two pets are allowed for each household.

"We also sell the same pet supplies found in a pet shop or a veterinarian's office," said Kohnen. "Most of the products are cheaper than what you would pay out in

The clinic is open from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. and closed on weekends and holidays. To schedule an appointment, call 257-3643.

information that will prevent widespread consumer victimization. LAO is happy to comply, providing preventative law briefs about specific deception practices and consumer rights.

However, there are a few common sense rules that will help reduce the victimization if people would take the time and effort to follow them. Here are the "secrets" of avoiding consumer scams:

• Take your time. Make a promise to yourself not to sign anything immediately after hearing the salesman's pitch. Think about it. Come back later if you want to, but be sure to walk out of the door.

· Shop around. There are plenty of car dealerships, department stores and furniture warehouses around the fabulous island of Oahu.

• Remember that the salesman's puffing means nothing. In case after case, Marines and Sailors get into trouble when they fail to read the contract.

• Don't sign anything you don't understand. The kinds of contracts hardest to understand are the ones most likely to cause trou-

• Get advice from a lawyer. Go to a real lawyer who has been to law school, not your salty sea lawyer buddy who thinks, but has no idea, what he or she is talking about.

• Remember, if it's too good to be true, don't buy it. Many people who are ripped off realize inside their minds there's something fishy going on, but sign up anyway for the "free" vacation, "guaranteed" gold card or the car financing rate of 24 percent because "you're young and have no credit or bad credit." Nothing could be further from the truth. These are common sense rules which, if followed, will dramatically reduce the amount of consumer victimization.

If you bring an unsigned contract to the LAO, within 20 minutes of meeting your legal assistance attorney, he can explain the terms and conditions, point out problems and discuss financing with you. The 20minute contact review is the most efficient way on the island to make sure you are not about to make a grave mistake. Remember, if the seller will not let you walk away with the unsigned contract, just walk away and find a legitimate businessperson who will.

financial impact. Medical treatment facilities charge just \$9.90 a day for babies eligible for DoD health care, the same it charges new mothers.

The charges will be significantly higher, however, for newborns not normally eligible for care. They will be billed for all costs the treatment facility incurs in delivering the baby, officials said. For normal deliveries of healthy babies, the charges will total \$600 to \$800.

In fiscal year 1995, newborn care cost DoD \$140 million.







Thirteen Marines of Hispanic heritage have earned the nation's highest military honor, the Medal of Honor. This is the first in a three-part series commemorating Medal of Honor recipients during Hispanic Heritage Month from Sept. 15 through Oct. 15.



Private First Class Harold Gonsalves, World War II

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his own life above and beyond the call of duty while serving as acting scout sergeant with 4th Battalion, 15th Marines, 6th Marine Division, during action against Japanese forces on Okinawa Shima in Ryukyu Chain April 15, 1945. Undaunted by the powerfully-organized opposition encountered on Motobu Peninsula during the fierce assault waged by his battalion against the Japanese stronghold at Mount Yaetake, Gonsalves repeatedly braved the

his forward observation team in directing well-placed artillery fire.

When his commanding officer determined to move into the front lines in order to register a more effective bombardment in the defensive position, enemy's Gonsalves unhesitatingly advanced uphill with the officer and another Marine despite a slashing barrage of enemy mortar and rifle fire. As they reached the front and a Japanese grenade fell close within the group, Gonsalves instantly dived on the

terrific enemy bombardment to aid deadly missile, absorbing the exploding charge in his own body and thereby protecting the others from serious and perhaps fatal

> Stouthearted and indomitable, Gonsalves readily yielded his own chances of survival so that his fellow Marines might carry on the relentless battle against a fanatic enemy. His cool decision, prompt action and valiant spirit of self-sacrifice in the face of certain death reflect the highest credit upon himself and upon the U.S. Naval Service.

Private First Class Edward Gomez, Korean Conflict

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty while serving as an ammunition bearer in Company E, 2d Battalion, 1st Marines, 1st Marine Division on Korea Hill 749, Sept. 14, 1951. Boldly advancing with his squad in support of a group of riflemen assaulting a series of strongly fortified and bitterly defended hostile positions on Hill 749, Gomez consistently exposed himself to the withering barrage to keep his machine gun supplied with ammunition during the drive forward to seize the objective. As his squad deployed to meet an imminent counterattack, he voluntarily moved down an abandoned trench to search for a new location for lantly gave his life for his country.

the gun, and when a hostile grenade landed between himself and his weapon, he shouted a warning to those around his as he grasped the activated charge in his hand. Determined to save his comrades, he unhesitatingly chose to sacrifice himself and, diving into the ditch with the deadly missile, absorbed the shattering violence of the explosion in his body. By his stouthearted courage, incomparable valor and decisive spirit of selfsacrifice, Gomez inspired the others to heroic efforts in subsequently repelling the outnumbering foe. His valiant conduct throughout sustained and enhanced the finest traditions of the U.S. Naval Service. He gal-

Private First Class Fernando Luis Garcia, **Korean Conflict**

Private First Class Fernando Luis Garcia was born Oct. 14, 1929, in Utuado, Puerto Rico. For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life and above and beyond the call of duty while serving as a member of Company I, 3d Battalion, 5th Marines, 1st Marine Division in action against enemy aggressor forces Sept. 5, 1952. While participating in the defense of a combat outpost located more than one mile forward of the main line of resistance during a savage night attack by a fanatical enemy force employing grenades, mortars and artillery, Garcia, although suffering painful wounds, moved through the intense hail of hostile fire to a supply point to secure more hand grenades. Quick to act when a hostile grenade landed nearby, endangering the life of another Marine as well as his own, he unhesitatingly chose to sacrifice himself and immediately threw his body upon the deadly missile, receiving the full impact of the explosion. His great personal valor and cool decision in the face of almost certain death, sustain and enhance the fine traditions of the U.S. Naval Service. He gallantly gave his life for his country.

Private France Silva, **Boxer Rebellion**

May 8, 1876 in Hayward, Calif. In the presence of the enemy during the action at Peking, China June 28 to Aug. 17, 1900, Silva outrages against all "foreign devdistinguished himself by meritorious conduct. Our interests in the Far East, which dated back to the Revolution, were intensified by acquisition of Pacific possessions in 1898 and 1899. During this period of our occupation with the Spanish-American War, European nations had inaugurated policies in China jeopardizing the freedom of trade in the Orient and threatening to lead to dismemberment of China itself.







Training Management is the course providing and overview of unit training management, oral communication and instruction techniques and managing an MCI training program.

Battle Skills covers the basic fundamentals and techniques of conducting combat operations at a squad level.

Weapons provides technical and detailed instruction on the characteristics of some of the most common small arms found in the Marine Corps' arsenal.

The courses include machine-graded multiple choice examinations. The exams are closed-book. MCI mails our Marines have been exposed to grammar and punctuathe test and examinations package to the student upon enrollment. Each package has detailed administrative instructions inside.

MCI worked hand-in-hand with the Staff NCO Academy at Quantico to develop the curriculum at the Sergeants' Course. The new 8000 will soon be a prerequisite for all Marines attending the Sergeants' Course.

"This program is intended to be a "stepping stone" or "building block" for a sergeant's instruction. This means that once a sergeant reports to the resident school the knowledge would not be foreign to him or her," said GySgt. F.E. Williams, Enlisted Division leader, Professional Military Education Department, MCI.

Often, Marines aren't exposed to these subjects prior to their arrival at the Sergeants' Course. The nonresident program will give them the materials needed to prepare themselves for the resident course.

"I think it's great that Marines from any military occupational specialty will now have the chance to learn the basic skills needed to carry them through the Sergeants' Course before they attend it," said Sgt. Kevin R. Mock, Headquarters and Service Company, Marine Barracks.

"The new 8000 series is directed toward the Marine sergeant," said SSgt. Ronald Chacon, course developer, PME Dept., MCI. "Therefore, much of the curriculum has changed from the 7000 series. For example, there is no squad drill. Sergeants should already be proficient in squad drill, so we went right into platoon drill. Also, the material is updated to current standards and initiatives. Marine Corps Warfighting philosophy is introduced to the student. Communication Skills and Unit Training Management courses are introduced for the first time.

ued. "Uniforms regulations, inspections, Marine Corps history, customs and courtesies and more."

The program is made up of several courses like the 7000 series, but the format will be a bit different. These courses were developed using a format technique called information mapping. This is a shorthand way of presenting information that will make the course easier to read and understand. It will enable the average Marine to learn faster and retain more of the information.

Once major difference from the 7000 series NCOs will notice is the addition of the Written Communications Skills course. This will help sergeants meet the written requirements of the resident school.

"Ideally, we would like to see all Marines gain the ability to express themselves orally as well as in writing. However, we realize that it has been a while since some of

"Of course, the basics are still there," Chacon contin- tion, so we have incorporated a self-paced course that allows a sergeant to work on trouble areas while refreshing the skills he or she may already have," said Williams.

The program began after the directors of the SNCO academies, Marine Corps University and MCI met and discussed the pertinent knowledge that sergeants are required to know. MCU and MCi then separated the tasks that could only be supported by the resident schools from those that could be taught through courses and development began in 1993.

The program then had to undergo various changes, a budget crisis and a host of other commitments. However, the final phase of the validation is now complete and the program is available to the fleet.

"Initially, it prepares Marines for the Sergeants' Course," Williams said. "But once it's combined with the resident school, it prepares the sergeant to take his or her rightful place among the staff NCO ranks."

The cleanup crew picked Pond Road's area of beach and reef for the clean-up site, because of rough surf conditions at Ft. Hase beach, the other proposed cleanup site.

"This the first time we participated in this annual event here," said Kevin L. Fields, manager, Ocean Concepts Scuba Locker. "September 21 was the international date for this event. Different dive coordinators all over the world participated in a beach or dive site cleanup on this day.

The prime reason Ocean Concepts picked Pond Road beach for its Project Aware cleanup is because it's a beach the community uses. Project Aware is not just about getting dive sites cleaned up; it's about the entire aquatic environment, Fields said.

Saturday was a particularly turbulent day in the water, so conditions were not as prime as they could have been. The cleanup went as scheduled, however and the Scuba Locker provided the air and gear for the divers to use, Fields said.

"The cleanup went well," said Steve Clifford, PADI retail manager from Santa Ana, California. "I was surprised to see the area so clean by the types of trash that was brought up. This site doesn't even compare to the cleanup efforts I've seen in California. It was really pleasant to see the site wasn't totally littered.

"The big reason for this cleanup is also to tie divers and nondivers together," added Clifford. The more people become environmentally sensitive, the less likely they would be to throw something in the water from the shore or a boat."

"After the cleanup I log down all the debris found," said Elizabeth A. Westfall, retail manager, Ocean Concepts. "On this cleanup I've logged down tin cans and particularly cigarette butts and golf balls. Smokers need to take a little better care of their debris and we will probably write a letter to the golf course to make them aware of the exorbitant amount of golf balls found.

"Though golf balls may not cause major environmental concern, their decomposition rate is extremely slow and they do not belong in the water," Westfall added. "Nobody wants to see a bunch of golf balls when they are snorkeling or diving."

The inventory sheet of all the debris collected will be sent to the Center For Marine Conservation, Westfall said.

Cleanups such as these help keep beaches here in their relatively pristine state.
