K-Max debuts at MCB Hawaii

A new, external-lift helicopter made its debut at MCB Hawaii Aug. 17-26 in an experiment conducted by the Marine Corps Warfighting Lab's Urban Warrior.

Urban Warrior tests new ideas and equipment that may one day become part of Marine Corps inventory.

Built by Kaman Aerospace, the K-Max spent the week demonstrating its capability to resupply land and sea-based units set far apart from each other.

The K-Max is currently used commercially for carrying heavy loads from place to place, mainly for the logging and construction industries, according to Grant Sparks, a senior consultant for seabasing with MCWL.

Landing Support Company Marines worked with MCWL specialists and representatives from Kaman to test the heli-

copter's ability to get supplies to Marines in the field, said Capt. Jim Washburn, commanding officer of LSC.

"It's very exciting for our unit to be part of something that might change the way we do business," said Washburn. "It's not very often that you can be involved in something like this."

Marines of LSC claim the K-Max is something they would like to see in the future, according to Cpl. Luke Drew, a landing support specialist with Combat Service Support Group 3.

"It's faster, smaller and compact," Drew said of the helicopter. "One man can load this easily where a bigger helo would require more landing support specialists to load the helo. Its rotor doesn't produce a heavy downwind like the CH-53 and this makes it easier for the Marines on the ground to operate and communicate."

The four-point hook system used by the helo allows it to carry four different loads, such as ammunition or medical supplies.

Each hook has an individual release the pilot controls, making it easy to touch down and release specific supplies and quickly move on to the next supply point. This makes it easier to unload because there isn't a need to dig through a cargo bay of a CH-53 or CH-46 for specific supplies before taking off again.

Urban Warrior testing of the K-Max also involved the resupply of relatively small, 80-foot vessels at sea travelling at speeds near 30 knots, a test the helo performed well.

Most ship resupply drops are done by CH-53 and CH-46s at 10-12 knots on ships much bigger than those used during the exercise, said Doug Steffanson, a K-Max field service representative.

The K-Max's most obvious difference from Marine helos is its intermeshing, torque-cancelling rotors.

"In a conventional helicopter, a tail rotor

Anthrax vaccine date set

All military servicemembers here are slated to receive anthrax vaccinations in September to protect them in the event of a biological conflict.

Marines from 1st Radio Battalion, Combat Service Support Group 3 and 3d Marine Regiment scheduled for exercises in Asia in the coming months will start receiving the shots next week, said Navy Lt. Jim Herbst, the Preventive Medicine Department head at the Naval Medical Clinic, Naval Station Pearl Harbor.

The arm-administered vaccination is part of a DoD-wide directive to get all U.S. military servicemembers protected against the threat of anthrax, according to SSgt. Robert Andrews Jr., the nuclear, biological and chemical warfare specialist at Headquarters Battalion here.

Servicemembers with more than 18 months of active-duty service left will receive the shots.

Anthrax, which can be inhaled or lodged into the skin, is a spore commonly found in cattle, Andrews said. It only takes six spores to kill a human. The spores can remain active for as long as 50 years.

After spores settle in the body, their host will become ill with flu-like symptoms for seven to 10 days, later begin to feel much better, and then die within 12 to 36 hours, he added.

Six shots must be administered per person to complete the vaccination, said Andrews. The cycle consists of an initial shot, a shot two weeks later, another at four weeks, then shots at six, 12 and 18 months after the first shot was given.

E Company platoon defends beach assault

BELLOWS AIR FORCE STATION, Oahu- Vicious war cries broke the morning silence Aug. 19 as Marines of 1st Platoon, E Company, 2nd Battalion, 3d Marines, repelled a beach assault with simulated firepower.

Marines from G Co., 2/3, hit the beach to overrun 1st platoon's defenses, accord-

ing to Cpl. Derek Leader, the machine gun squad leader, 1st Plt., E Co. In the aggressive role, 1st Plt., dressed in desert cammies, were outnumbered by G Co. and over-exhausted from lack of sleep.

"We were only a platoon reinforced with machine guns," said Leader. "Basically we were going up against a whole company."

For E Co., the exercise included constant movement and reconnaissance, this

meant the Marines had to deal with lack of sleep, according to 2ndLt. Louis Bush, platoon commander of 1st Platoon, E Co. This made the training a little more realistic and allowed the Marines to see what it was like to be aggressors.

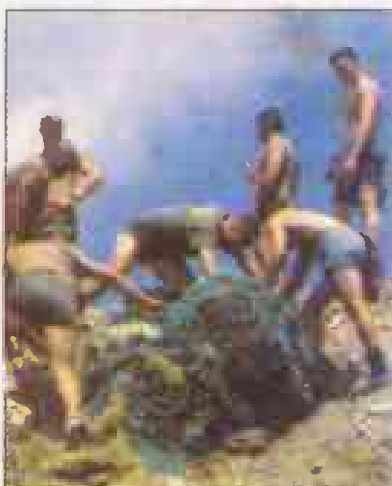
The platoon had to increase their attentiveness more so than normal due to exhaustion, according to Cpl. Jeremy McEntarfer, 1st squad leader, with 1st Plt., E Co. "We really didn't know when we

were going to get hit."

"We can still cover a lot because we can see a lot," Leader said, speaking of the platoon's ability to create a "wall of lead" with its firepower. "The machine gun teams just have to set up the fields of fire so the other guys in the platoon can do their jobs."

By the end of the morning, 2/3's objective had been secured. Even though E Co.'s defenses were conquered, the training was productive, said Bush.

Ulupa'u Crater beach gets face lift by Marines

Nearly a dozen Marines put hours of sweat and strain into spiffing up one of Hawaii's most valued resources Aug. 20-21 — its environment.

A litter-strewn beach cradled beside Uluupa'u Crater was in dire need of a good field day when leathernecks from 3d Marine Regiment, Explosive Ordnance Disposal, and the Rifle Range came to the rescue.

Surprising to some, the trash, which ranged from household detergent bottles and nets to vehicle tires, comes from the island itself, according to Dr. Diane

Drigot, the senior natural resource management specialist with the Environmental Department here.

"In Hawaii, it's been shown that as much as 80 percent of all this trash comes from our own back yards," Drigot said. The other 20 percent comes from illegal sea dumping off ships, she added.

It may seem unlikely to some that the garbage-strewn beach could have become littered because of the trash in homes far from the sea, but according to Drigot, it's very possible.

"People don't realize that garbage lying around can be washed away by rains or wind and eventually into streams and the ocean," Drigot warned.

The shoreline at the base of the crater is off limits to the public because of possible unexploded ordnance from the range. However, wildlife still thrives there.

"It's important to keep this place clean because of the creatures that live here," said SSgt. Nathan Bell, the pistol line NCOIC at the range here and beach clean-up volunteer. "You don't want to have the place so dirty that animals won't be able to live there."

Though maintenance of the beaches occurs every few months, trash still builds up. Anyone interested in volunteering to help clean-up on this and other environmental projects can contact Environmental at 257-6920, ext. 224.

Base Legal wins award

The first-ever CMC Award for Excellence in Legal Assistance was awarded to MCB Hawaii Legal Service Center earlier this month.

The award was given to Base Legal because of their outstanding initiative and overall ingenuity in providing fast, effective legal service, read the award.

One initiative that MCB Hawaii implemented, which the award highlighted, was the Command Financial Specialist certification program. The CFS program provides comprehensive training in consumer law, according to the award.

The CFS is a three-day course involving students from MCB Hawaii units. This pre-

ventative law course informs students on basic legal issues such as purchasing a car, divorce/separation, bankruptcy, credit reports and debt management, according to Capt. Ian Brasure, defense officer for Base Legal.

Presently, MCB Hawaii is the only legal office in the Marine Corps that has a program like the CFS. However, it is one of the legal initiatives that can be implemented throughout the Marine Corps, according to the award.

"We recommend this type of course Marine Corps wide," said Brasure.

The CMC Award for Excellence in Legal Assistance is the second award that Base Legal has received this year. The 1998 Legal Assistance for Military Personnel Distinguished Service Award was presented to Base Legal in April.

Operational Readiness Inspection tests 3/3

CENTRAL TRAINING AREA, Okinawa, Japan — Marines from K Company, 3d Battalion, 3d Marine Regiment, executed a helo-borne assault on Combat Town here Aug. 11, passing their initial Operational Readiness Inspection.

They successfully achieved the mission and took control of the town under the watchful scrutiny of evaluators from 4th Marine Regiment.

"This evolution is one of the things each battalion does within the first month of its arrival on Okinawa," said Maj. Billy Bob Brown, 4th Marines operations officer and inspection evaluator. "It gives the battalion commander the opportunity to watch his company commanders lead an operation in the field."

In addition to helping battalion commanders assess the strengths and weaknesses of each company, Brown said this initial evaluation gave the company commanders a chance to work through a combat scenario with their companies.

Before the actual exercise, Capt. Robert A. Baird, company commander of K Co., was given a combat scenario and had limited time to come up with a plan of action.

Baird's plan, which evaluators said was unique and highly effective, was to attack Combat Town from both sides, seize key terrain and use his unit's superior combat power, as well as close-air-support from AH-1W Cobra helicopters, to overtake the enemy.

After spending the previous day war gaming through the battle plan and implementing an effective signal system, K

Co. Marines boarded CH-53E Super Stallion and CH-46 Sea Knight helos and headed for a landing zone near Combat Town.

Upon landing, the Marines quickly secured the landing zone and, with the acumen of seasoned professionals, moved through the jungle toward their objective.

The first unit to arrive in the town, 1st Platoon with a weapons reinforcement, encountered heavy enemy resistance, but was able to gain a foothold in the first building. With that stronghold secured, and with the close air support of the Cobras, the rest of the company moved in and systematically cleared the enemy from the remaining buildings.

One important factor in the success of the mission, according to Baird, was the presence of a forward observer in one of the attack helicopters, facilitating easy call for fire artillery missions and the ability to adjust the fire from above.

"The attack was very intense," said LCpl. Dennis C. Nelson, a rifleman with 1st Platoon. "Instead of slowly going through the motions, we got to experience what an actual assault would be like with rounds going off all around us."

"This exercise is only one block in the three-block war concept," said Brown. "It consists of simultaneously handling humanitarian operations, a peace-keeping mission and actual combat."

While on Okinawa, K Co. will also have the chance to practice the other two.

"This company has really strong leadership, especially at the squad leader and platoon sergeant level," said Brown after the evolution. "The company now has six months to work out the kinks and develop a training plan to maintain its combat readiness."

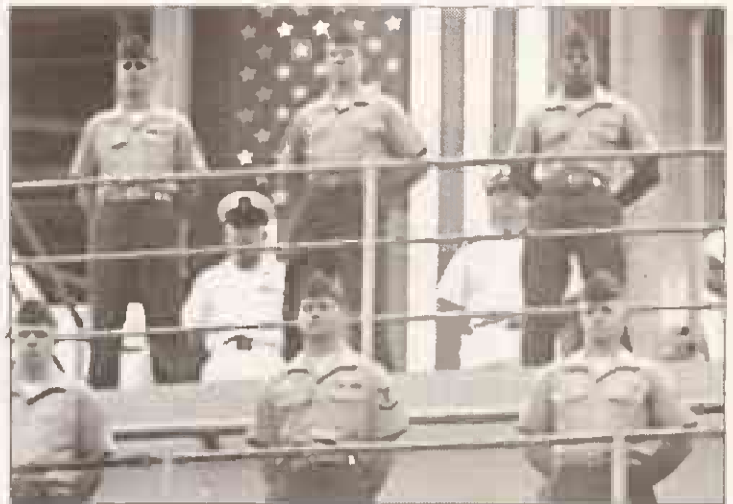

Cooperation from the Sea ends

VLADIVOSTOK, Russia — A slight breeze ruffled the draping colors representing both the United States and Russia. Both ensigns, though distinctly different, flew in unison, side-by-side.

Melancholy glances were passed back and forth between Marines and Sailors on the USS Germantown and the Russian BDK 011 as the rails were manned for Cooperation From the Sea '98's closing ceremony.

An utter contrast from the cautiously-curious demeanor experienced during the opening ceremony only six days earlier, the day's air was filled with the sentiments of an enduring integration between two nations, two forces and two peoples.

"The two biggest Navies in the world are making steps toward progress and development," said Russian Federation Navy Rear Adm. N. Temerev, deputy commander of the 10th Eskadra of Surface Ships. "Exercises like this bring people closer together."

The humanitarian assistance/disaster relief portion of the exercise, conducted Aug. 7-8 near Vladivostok, Russia, was based on an earthquake scenario that hit a small town, collapsing buildings, causing fires and trapping victims.

Marines and Sailors from the 31st Marine Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable) and various attachments from Okinawa combined their forces ashore with a company from the 55th Division of the Russian Naval Infantry (RNI) to render complete and immediate aid. All traces of a language barrier seemed to disappear as vehicles were directed, convoys led, troops dispatched, stretchers carried, first aid administered, transport organized, and final care given.

The two days in port following the field exercise involved multiple levels of interaction through ship tours, static displays, basketball and volleyball games, city tours and time for shopping, eating and exploring the town. As toasted by one Russian dignitary, "To two great states providing good cooperation and friendship ... Let this be a good example to act in a proper way for peace ..."

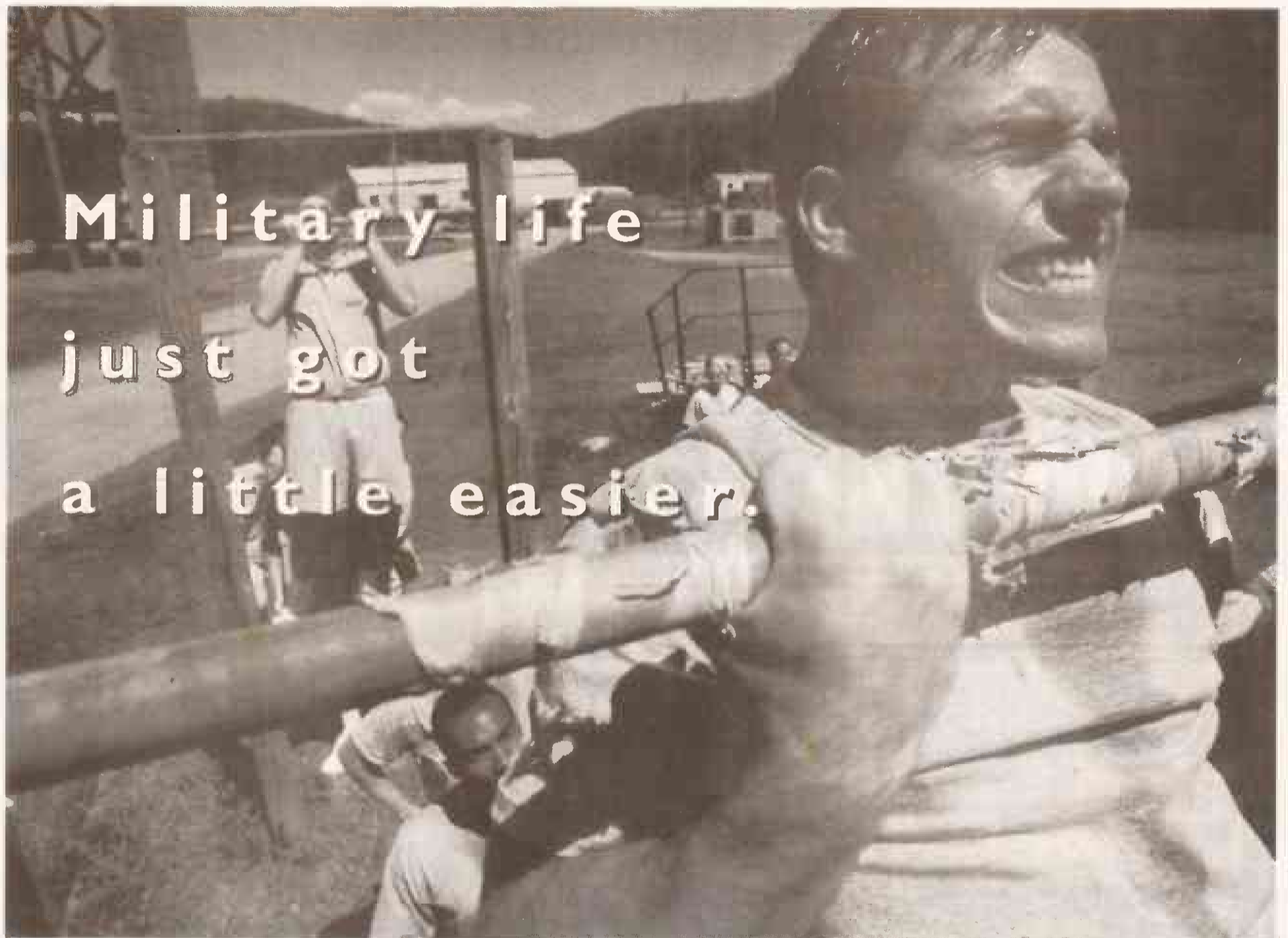

(used to counteract torque, the circulatory force created by the main engine) produces a 25 to 30 percent power loss," Steffanson said. "The K-Max's counter-rotating blades allow the torque to be cancelled in the transmission."

The advantage to this main rotor design is it eliminates the need for a tail rotor and allows the K-Max to use all its power to lift cargo. This added power allows the K-Max to lift nearly a thousand pounds more than it weighs.

"It's nearly unheard of for any other type of helicopter to be able to lift more than its own weight," Steffanson said of the bird's 6,000-pound lifting capability.

Some people may think the design difference would make the K-Max a little unusual to fly, but that isn't the case according to John Liston, Kaman Aerospace's K-Max pilot.

"We spent about a week going through normal and emergency operating procedures with the pilots," Liston said. "It flies conventionally so any helicopter pilot can get in and fly it. It's just a matter of how much finesse the pilots will have."

New Marine commercial will air

SAN DIEGO — The Marine Corps' latest television commercial, "Rite of Passage — Transformation Plus," is scheduled to air Sept. 19 or 20, according to representatives from J. Walter Thompson, the Marine Corps' paid advertising agency.

JWT said the commercial is the latest in an ongoing series showing America's youth how the Corps is the toughest, smartest and also the most elite of today's armed forces.

"Rite of Passage" shows a young man in a fight for his life.

In the commercial, Capt. Michael S. Burks, an intelligence officer with Camp Pendleton's 1st Marine Expeditionary Force, battles forces far beyond the realms of reality. He runs, jumps, dives and ducks in order to save himself from saw blades and throwing stars, represent-

ing the physical and mental obstacles a person faces when becoming a Marine. In the end, Burks takes a sword out of stone and slays a fiery monster. Instantly, he transforms from a young man to a Marine.

"Transformation Plus" takes this vision one step further, according to David White, a JWT account representative.

The biggest difference between "Rite of Passage" and other Marine commercials is the amount of graphic imagery, explained White. He said 90 percent of the piece was done on computer. The remaining 10 percent was shot in a studio in front of a "green screen." This new look was done to attract today's high tech youth and was directed by Mikael Salmon, the director of the 1998 Hollywood Blockbuster "Hard Rain."

During a random survey in early August, JWT interviewed several Atlanta youth who had viewed the

commercial. The interviews produced comments ranging from, "It has the year 2000 look," to "It would make me stop (while flipping with the remote) and keep it on the channel."

These responses are important, however there's one even more important; According to one Atlanta youth, "It kind of makes me think about joining the Marine Corps." This response meets the "three-fold" goal (public awareness, enlisted lead generation and officer procurement) of Marine Corps advertising, according to Capt. David Kramer, the deputy assistant chief of staff for advertising, Marine Corps Recruiting Command.

The commercial will be released in 60-, 30- and 20-second paid spots. There are plans to highlight the commercial on "Entertainment Tonight," "Access Hollywood" and various magazines, newspapers and other publications.

Tripler celebrates 50th

Tripler Army Medical Center celebrates its 50th Anniversary at its current location on Moanalua Ridge Sept. 10.

The open-to-the-public ceremony is scheduled for 11:30 a.m. on the fourth floor.

In 1948, Tripler was the tallest skyscraper in the Pacific. The 365-acre site on the lower slopes of the Koolau Mountain Range was purchased from the Damon Estate in the late 1930s.

The facility was originally built as a 1,500-bed hospital. Currently, it operates with approximately 250 inpatient beds because the practice of medicine has changed and wellness and prevention is now the healthcare emphasis.

Today, Tripler is the largest military medical facility in the Pacific and serves more than 750,000 eligible beneficiaries in the region.

Tripler has been a welcoming haven to patients for all the years it has stood on Moanalua Ridge, and the staff continues the historical tradition of honoring its distinctive past.

Base legal provides services for Marines

Whether a Marine is looking to ward off problems before they occur, or trouble is already at the door, Legal Assistance has the tools to help with most legal questions.

From automobile registration to wills to separations and divorces, Legal Assistance can counsel servicemembers and their dependents, and often solve any legal problem they might have.

"We try to make servicemembers feel at ease," said Sgt. Lillian McLaughlin, a legal specialist with the Legal Assistance office here. "They often come in distressed, but we calm them down and let them know we can help."

The best way to use the services offered by Legal Assistance is to take action to prevent trouble before it occurs. The Preventive Law Guide, available at Base Legal, Building 215, is a helpful tool for servicemembers in Hawaii to use regarding all legal matters they might require help with.

A visit to the office during walk-in hours (Monday through Friday, 8:30-11 am) and meeting with an attorney can also help advice-seekers make the right decisions with any personal legal matter.

"Essentially, it's always a good idea to consult a lawyer if you have any legal questions," said Maj. Laurie Powell, a Legal Assistance attorney here. "If we can't answer the ques-

tions, we can do research to find a solution."

Services available range from legal documents, like non-resident registration needed for lower automobile insurance rates in Hawaii, to resolving debt problems with creditors.

Command Financial Specialist training is also a service Legal Assistance offers. The course provides Marines preventative law classes including debt management and car purchasing advice.

"I'm taking this class so I'll have the knowledge to answer financial questions Marines might have," said Sgt. Shawn Nicholson, military policeman and CFS student.

Two services commonly used are setting up powers of attorney and wills, according to LCpl. Pervis Williams, a legal specialist at Legal Assistance.

"Power of Attorney helps when Marines go on deployment and they want someone they trust to take care of their personal business," said Williams. "It's also important for them to specify in a will to whom they want to leave their property in case of an accident. But wills can be complicated, so it's best for people to take the wills classes we offer."

Also, the legal office here is the only military law office on Oahu with a civilian paralegal available to file uncontested divorce and uncontested adoption cases. Other bases on island send their servicemembers here for those cases, according to Powell.

"We pretty much carry our own work load here, with nearly the same number of staff as the other military services on Oahu," said McLaughlin. "They often send their soldiers and airmen here, so we handle their cases, too."

Whatever the problem, though, the sooner it is taken care of, the better the resolution of the trouble.

"What Marines need to realize is that their personal legal issue discussions with an attorney here are strictly confidential," Powell said. "They should come to us before a problem snowballs to become unmanageable."

FFD offers home fire safety tips

Federal Fire Department

A little prior planning could save lives in the event of a home fire.

Out of more than 1,700 home fires daily in this country, 14 people die. Nationally, 25 percent of all fires, 82 percent of all fire deaths and 63 percent of all fire injuries occur in homes.

Most people believe fire won't happen to them and they don't plan ahead. Since fires usually give only three to four minutes to escape safely, not knowing what to

do can be deadly.

To prevent this from happening, individuals should prepare a home fire escape plan and have the entire family practice it.

- Plan two ways out of every room. The normal exit may be blocked.
- Test emergency exits. Make sure you can open windows and remove screens and storm windows.
- Practice using emergency exits in the dark. Keep a flashlight next to every bed. Most fatal home fires start at night while we are asleep and least likely to respond

quickly.

- Install and maintain smoke detectors on every level of your home. Test them monthly and change batteries yearly.
- Teach the family to stay low in smoke to avoid poisonous gases. Crawl to exits. Eight out of ten fire deaths are due to smoke inhalation.
- Arrange a meeting place outside the home. Make sure everyone knows to get out quickly and go to the meeting place.
- Call the fire department from a neighbor's house. Do not wait in a burning building to use a phone.

Residents can help cut base utilities cost

Base Facilities

Without utilities, people couldn't perform daily routines.

A family of four, per day, uses about 100 gallons of water flushing toilets, 80 gallons showering and bathing and 70 gallons for laundry, dish washing, bathroom sinks and other utilities. Imagine how many people live on base and one can only assume how much water is used each day.

Many times, people ignore how much water and electricity is used daily. If they paid attention, they could cut down on utility bills.

The average usage of electricity here is 242,200 kilowatt hours per day, which equals about \$19,200 per day. Water costs approximately \$5,692 per day. The total water/electricity bill adds up to about \$24,892 per day.

These estimates are based on our daily average for June 1998.

If the base community works together to support the energy conservation program, then it can meet its goals and keep utility costs down. Each person can make a difference.

As the dog days of summer wear down and the leaves on the trees ache to change color (OK, pretend you're not in Hawaii for a second), one thought creeps into this sports fan's mind.

Football is the biggest sport in the world. Here the nearest gridiron of consequence is Aloha Stadium, where the University of Hawaii plays their college contests. I know I'll be there for the season's first game, Sept. 5, against my alma mater, the University of Arizona, ranked 24th in the preseason Associated Press poll.

Honolulu is now the host to two college bowl games, as the Oahu Bowl joins the Aloha Bowl as one of the first post season NCAA contests.

Aloha Stadium is also the site of the National Football League's version of an All-Star game, the Pro Bowl. The contest is a matchup of the biggest, fastest and best NFL players, who get a week of fun in the sun after the Super Bowl is decided. Needless to say, I'll make sure to be in the stands for that one, too.

Certainly some folks may contend that soccer is a more global sport, or that basketball or baseball have more worldwide popularity than good old American football, and I would not dispute their claims.

But size for size, pound for pound, and man for man, football dwarfs the other sports.

Let's first look at the size of the teams. Football has 22 players on a field at a time, plus practically a platoon of black-and-white striped officials to keep an eye on the players. Soccer and baseball have nine men per team, and basketball teams don't even field a half dozen.

The entire football squad has 45 men on the roster, from star quarterback to scrub benchwarmer. Baseball maxes out at 25, including bullpen pitchers with ERAs over 6.00, and hoopsters lace up 17 sets of overpriced sneakers per team.

Presenting almost as obvious a difference as team size is the girth of the individual players. It's not uncommon to find a fellow strapping pads over his 320-pound frame in football. In basketball, the only 300 pounder I know of is Shaquille O'Neal, and he is an aberration in a sport dominated by height rather than bulk.

As "America's Pastime," baseball can field smaller players and get by, but even their power heroes are small by comparison. Mark McGwire is considered a monster by diamond standards, but at 6'5" and 265 pounds, would he be able to break through the Dallas Cowboys' offensive line, which averages roughly 310 pounds per man, on the way to a sack? The answer, in two words: pancake batter.

Just as important to consider is the quality of the respective seasons and playoffs. While professional hockey and basketball drag out regular seasons of more than 80 games, and baseball has a marathon 162 game season, football gets the job done in just 16 contests. Each match draws the most out of every player, and injuries abound, justifying the recuperating time of a week.

Football's championship, the Super Bowl, concludes with one of the most watched contests worldwide, while a more globally coined championship, the World Series, lasts up to seven games. How many people watch one of those games? Combine the gate and television draw for the series, and I'd wager the number still doesn't approach the Super Bowl's audience.

Plus, who could deny that Denver's hotly contested victory over Green Bay in Super Bowl XXXII in January was one of the more exciting sporting events this century. Ok, maybe that's an exaggeration. It was the most exciting sporting event this decade.

As I think about it, intercollegiate sports have the same relative interest between football and the other sports; they just have larger stadiums to fill.

I won't say that football is better than any other sport, or that their players are better athletes. That sort of conversation is best suited to a debate over a pitcher or two at a sports bar.

In Hawaii you can't be at a game every weekend, so I've got my Saturdays and Sundays planned out for the next five months. I'll have my pizza and soda ready by the armchair, the ringer on my phone will be off, and my Denver Broncos hat sitting proudly on my head.



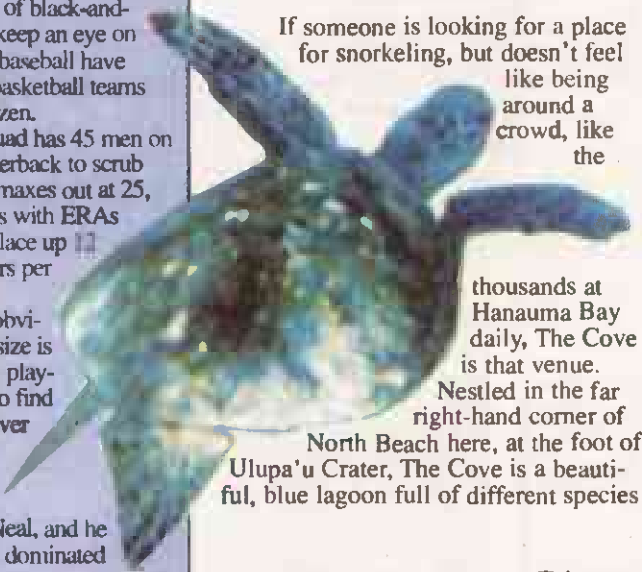

Color, wildlife abound for snorklers at North Beach's Cove

If someone is looking for a place for snorkeling, but doesn't feel like being around a crowd, like the



thousands at Hanauma Bay daily, The Cove is that venue. Nestled in the far right-hand corner of North Beach here, at the foot of Ulupa'u Crater, The Cove is a beautiful, blue lagoon full of different species

of fish, breath-taking underwater rock formations and calm, crystal clear water.

"This is a really great place to snorkel," said Mark Miller, an Army nurse at Tripler Army Medical Center and avid snorkeler. "It's a lot cleaner than Hanauma Bay, less crowded and there's a wider variety of fish here."

Summer is the best season to visit The Cove because the waters are more calm than in the winter, said Miller. Due to winter swells here, the water is too rough for snorkeling.

"This place is also home of one of the best views on the island on a clear day," Miller said, pointing toward the Ko'olau mountains, the towering backdrop of Windward Oahu. "This is the place to be."

Along with snorkeling, The Cove is also a great place for spear fishing, according to Adam Shewey, a resident here who snorkels and spear fishes regularly at The Cove.

"Spear fishing is really good here because it's not as rough as Ft. Hase beach," said Shewey. "If you go out past the outer ring of rocks, the water is deep, but there's plenty of fish out there."

Shewey also recommended only experienced snorkelers venture outside the lagoon. However, he added, for the novice, there is plenty of action inside the lagoon. So, the next time sometime

someone asks, "Hey, wanna go to Hanauma Bay?," tell them, forget about it. Instead of wasting gas driving down the coast, the best place to go is only a short walk away at The Cove.

Getting 'Semper Fit'

With the Commandant of the Marine Corps' Semper Fit Program in mind, a wide spectrum of people to tailor to and a base full of workout-hungry Marines, a fitness arena has stepped up to the plate — the Semper Fit Center.

Dozens of free weights and weight machines, 24 aerobics programs, 60 cardiovascular machines, free personal trainers and fitness assessments, a basketball gymnasium, three racquetball courts, two saunas and two locker rooms, the puzzle pieces came together earlier this year for an ultimate physical training palace.

"The reason this place is so great is because there is so much variation that it appeals to all users," said Lynn Sanchez, the fitness coordinator at the center. "I've had a lot of people tell me this is one of the nicest facilities in the Marine Corps now."

The center came about when BGen. David F. Bice, the commanding general of the base at the time, wanted to create a Semper Fit facility that would be a model for the entire Marine Corps to follow.

Patrons here said "mission accomplished."
"It's the nicest I've seen in the Marine Corps," said Richard A. Hepburn, a platoon guide with B Company, 1st Battalion, 3d Marine Regiment, who has pumped iron in several other facilities.

"It's great," said Jasen Cunningham, an instructor at the Corporal's Course, catching his breath as he pumped out reps on a rowing machine.

"They've made a lot of improvements," he continued. "And it's a good alternative for Marines besides the normal, everyday running."

Patrons can run and catch the latest episode of their favorite sitcoms thanks to an eight-television cardio-theater. Four 35-inch television sets flank the cardiovascular area, airing everything from sports to news programs.

"I like the huge selection of weights and machines," said Joe A. Kennedy, a field wireman with A Battery, 1st Battalion, 12th Marine Regiment. "You can knock out a lot of different exercises."

"A good thing with having a variety of machines and a lot of weights is you can get a quick workout," said Hepburn. "If you have to wait on an exercise, your body cools down."

A unique attribute to the center is it offers free personal trainers, fitness assessments and blood pressure readings, unlike other Hawaii facilities. Personal trainers can cost anywhere from \$50 to \$75 at civilian facilities and \$25 at other military facilities, according to Sanchez.

"The staff is really knowledgeable and that really helps," said Cunningham. "They help you focus."

There are several other qualities that attract hundreds of PTers everyday; however, there is one thing Sanchez said the center needed to complete its focus on Semper fit — classrooms for Semper Fit-related classes like nutrition education and smoking cessation.

"The Branch Medical Clinic already has these classes," Sanchez said, "but it would be nice if we were the focal point for all Semper Fit programs."

An item sure to be in the center's future however, is cholesterol screening. Sanchez said it's only a matter of time before it's implemented.

The center is still growing and may continue to expand in the future, according to Sanchez. But at its current level, many said it's a perfect resource for pursuing Semper Fit goals.

Have a taste of Polynesia

WAIKIKI, Oahu — Ahh, the good ole' days...

Sometimes, it's nice to think about the days when a cola only cost a nickel, the streets were quaint and friendly and tourism in the South Pacific was beginning to bloom.

Although most MCB Hawaii residents weren't on island to recall the 1930's, 40's and 50's, it doesn't mean the times can't be revived. The Hale Koa Hotel here takes hundreds of people back to the glory days of Polynesia with Tama's Polynesian Revue at 6 p.m. every Wednesday.

The Polynesian Revue features dancers and songs unique to each of the islands of the South Pacific, including New Zealand, Tahiti, Guam and Hawaii.

"We sing the songs you would expect to hear at a

show like this," said Keakola Paishon, the show's master of ceremonies who takes guests all over the Pacific with humorous anecdotes and popular songs.

Paishon, who has been with the show for nearly 25 years, sings tunes like "Tiny Bubbles" and "Blue Hawaii." All songs are complemented with native dances performed by hula dancers.

Some might say the best part of the evening is before the show even begins.

Since the show doesn't start until 7:45 p.m., the guests have more than an hour to dig in to an all-you-can-eat buffet. The Hale Koa serves up roast beef, fish and chicken, along with salad,

vegetables, breads and desserts.

Guests can complement their meals with just about any soda or drink imaginable, including tea, coffee and tropical mixed drinks.

The buffet is included with the admission price, but drinks are not.

After dinner is through, the tables are cleared and as guests settle back in, the stage curtains whip open to reveal a four-person band, fronted by Kinau Hicks singing island favorites with her angelic voice.

As the show progresses, dancers come out with precision staccato on stage, featuring different costumes and dances from each respective island while Paishon sings. A few numbers even feature the dancers singing while they perform their routines.

If the singing and dancing isn't enough to keep crowds content, some guests are invited on stage to show off

their dancing feet.

This mixture of crowd participation, good food and talented performers make the show hard to beat.

"I loved it," said Chuck Ealy, a Sailor from the visiting USS John C. Stennis, who not only attended the show, but was called up front to hula dance on stage. "It was really great — one of the best shows I've ever seen. Being on stage was a little scary, but it was fun."

"We've been to this show about 20 times," said Bob Dale, who was visiting from Lusby, Md. Dale retired from the Marine Corps in 1966 and frequents the island, bringing a different grandchild to the show each year.

"We used to see this show before the Hale Koa was even built," Dale said. "They had it down on the beach in a little hut back in the 1960s."

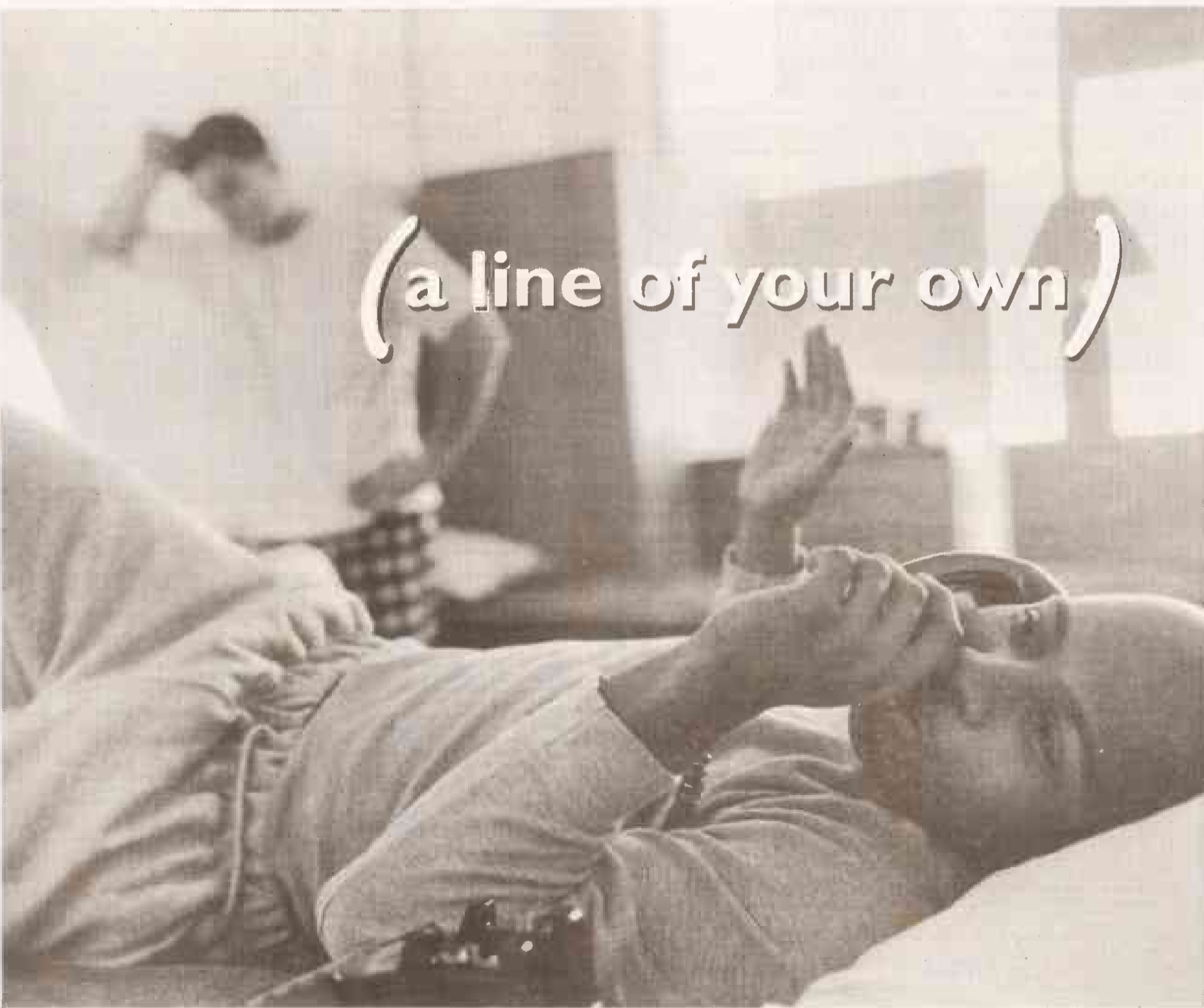

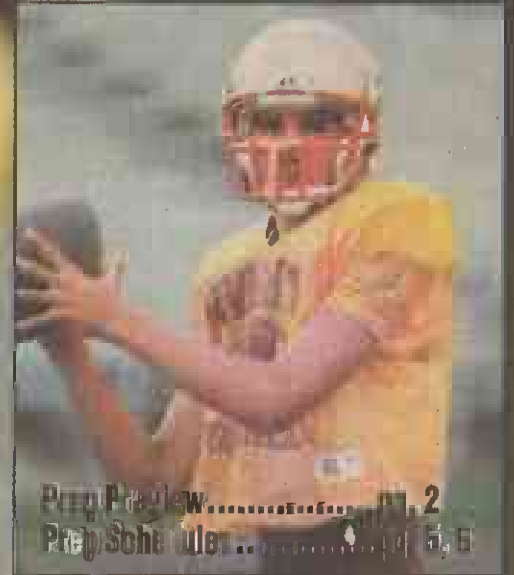
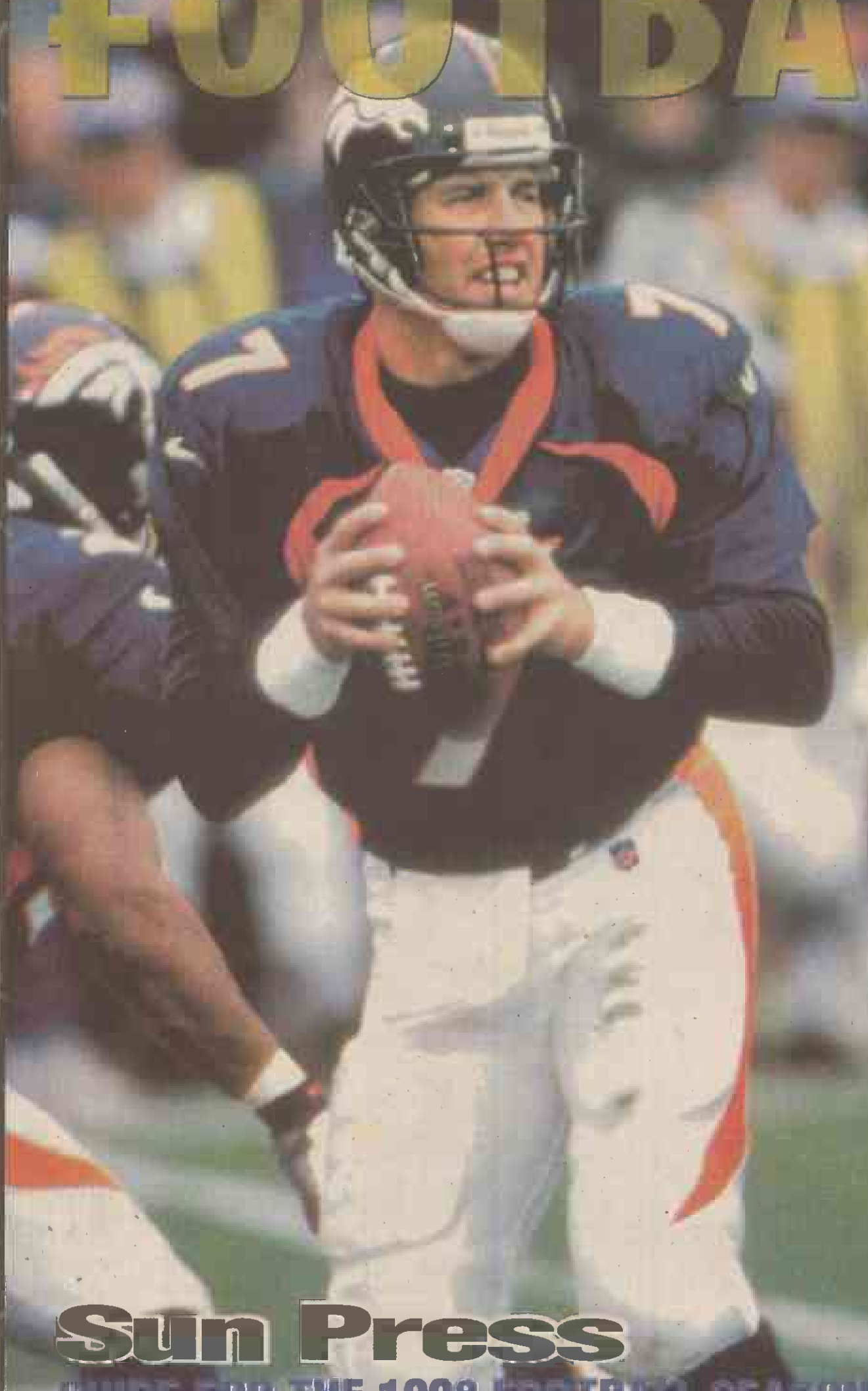

High hopes for OIA teams in '98

Excitement and optimism are running high on campus fields around the island as prep football gets ready for another banner season.

The OIA kicks off its 1998 campaign Sept. 4, while the ILH begins play Sept. 12.

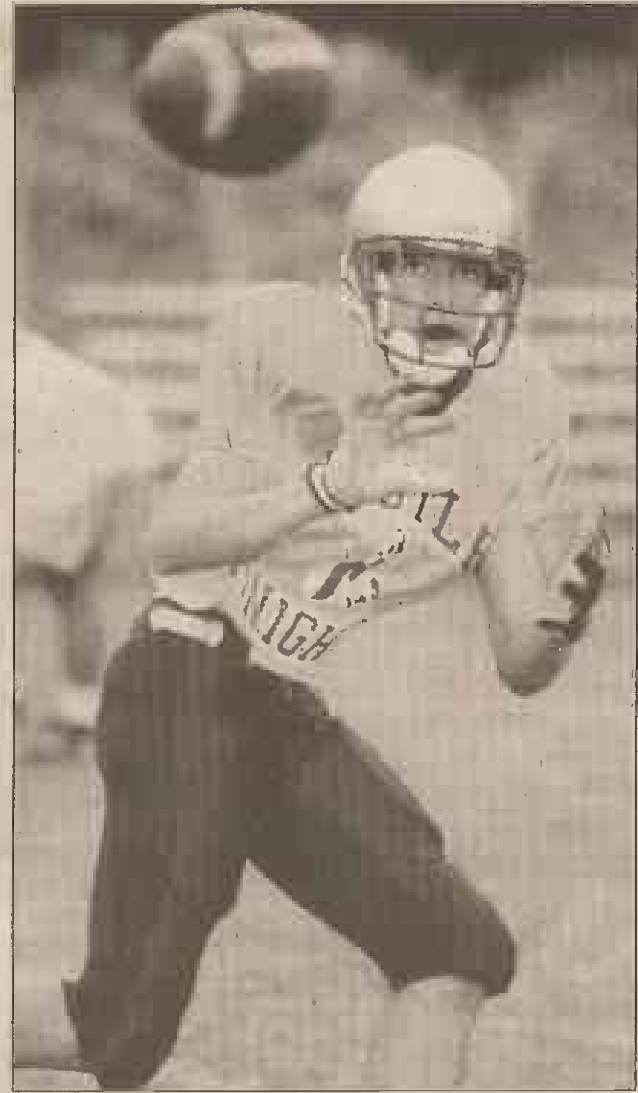
ibility and should prevent the players from wearing down, especially late in games.

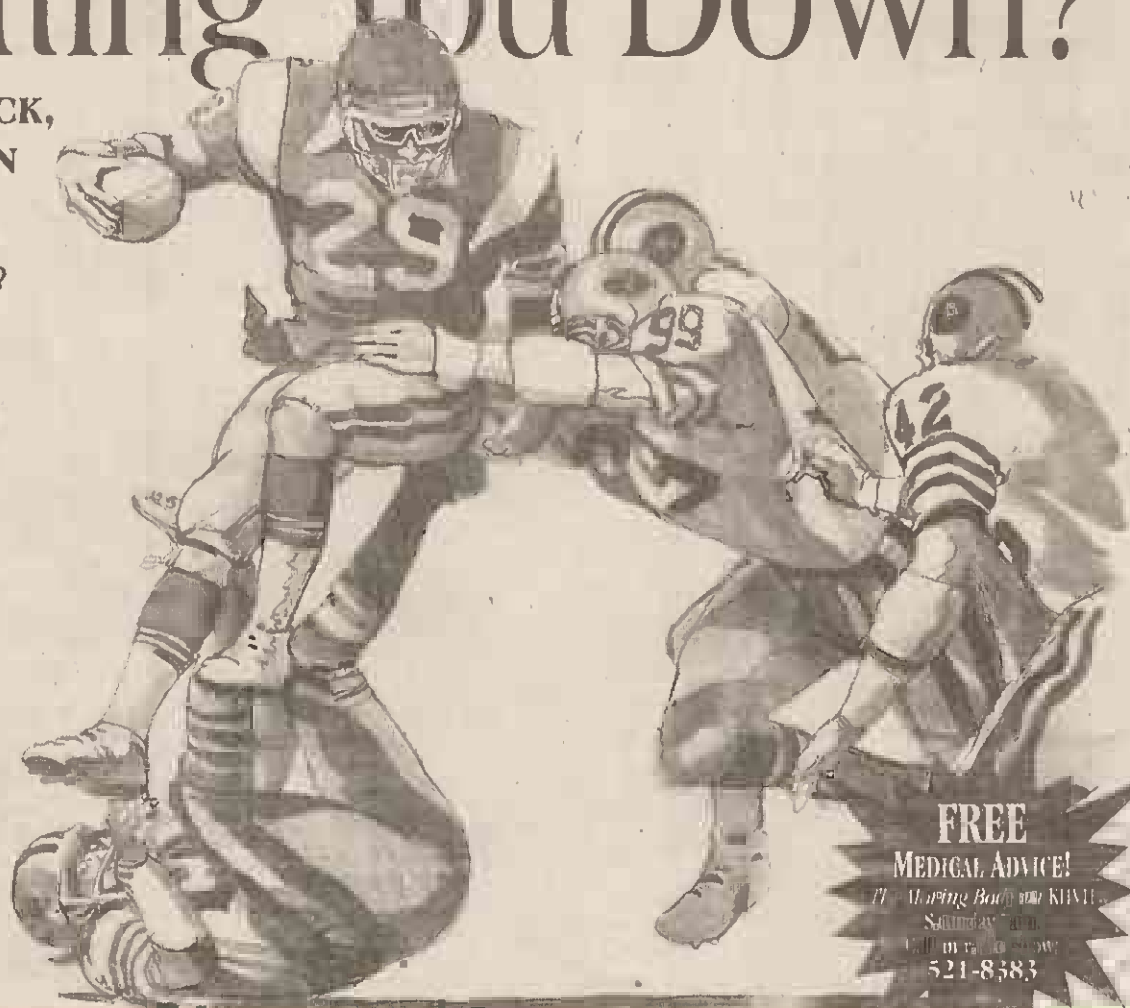

'Bows shoot for return to glory

Deja vu, 1992? This may be stretching things just a little, but there is reason to believe the University of Hawaii football team

could recapture some of the magic of its Western Athletic Conference title season six years ago.

Since then, the Rainbow football program has taken a tumble to the depths of the conference. But with an influx of young talent, a motivated

coaching staff and, perhaps, a smile from the football gods, the 'Bows could begin the arduous climb back to the top this season.

The WAC title appears beyond UH's reach in 1998, but several signs point to the 'Bows return to respectability after four seasons in or near the WAC cellar. Among those omens are several eerie similarities between the start of the 1992 season and the upcoming campaign.

Following is a comparison of the 1992 squad and this year's club in several areas. Whether the 'Bows win the conference title or not, figure on Hawaii making Aloha Stadium the place to be on Saturdays this fall.

Early tests

1992: The season opens with a win over a Pac-10 team (Oregon) followed by an important conference victory on the road (at Air Force).

1998: This year's slate begins with the 'Bows taking on Arizona of the Pac-10, then traveling to

Utah for an all-important WAC game. But even if Hawaii survives September, the remaining schedule is harsh. The 'Bows face San Diego State on the road and have tough home games against Brigham Young, Northwestern and national champ Michigan.

From page 8 the quarterbacking job. Jasper is the opening-day quarterback, but Carter eventually takes the helm and leads the 'Bows to the Holiday Bowl.

1998: Josh Skinner and Dan Robinson are the top contenders for the quarterback position this fall. Skinner started eight games last year, but Robinson (who redshirted in 1997) possesses superior arm strength. With Bronson Liana and Kalaheo grad Shawn Withy-Allen also in contention, two or more signal-callers may see action in any given game.

Welcome back

1992: Bryan Addison, having overcome academic problems, returns to the Rainbow secondary and makes an immediate impact at free safety.

1998: Free Safety Daniel Ho Ching, having overcome lymphoma, returns to the Rainbow secondary and will try to solidify a unit depleted by graduation. Cornerback Donnell Williams is the only returning starter in



the secondary. The other positions will be filled by talented, but relatively inexperienced players in Celnell Bobbit and Anthony Smith.

Rush hour

1992: Running back Travis Sims breaks loose for 1,498 yards. No Rainbow has broken the 1,000-yard barrier since.

1998: As a freshman last season, Charles Tharp established himself as the 'Bows most reliable back since Sims. Tharp isn't a physically imposing back (5-foot-8, 160 pounds), nor does he possess breakaway speed. But just try to tackle him. The sophomore has a knack for finding cracks and crevices to squeeze through for extra

yardage. Tharp, who is a Doak Walker Award candidate, has the best shot of any UH back in six years to rush for 1,000 yards.

Front seven

1992: Maa Tanuvasa, Junior Tagoai and Taase Faumui form a ferocious defensive front, while linebackers Joe Shaw, Walter Santiago, Stewart Williams and Louis Randall provide solid support.

1998: The 'Bows defense

'Tis better to receive

1992: Darrick Branch gives the 'Bows a big-time threat at wide-receiver, while Eddie Kealoha and Brian Gordon prove to be reliable pass catchers at slotback.

1998: The 'Bows don't have a receiver with Branch's combination of size and speed, but they do have a few who could shine. John Kirby has demonstrated he's capa-

valuable as blockers rather than as catchers.

Laying it on the line

1992: A young offensive line executes to perfection as the team tops the WAC in rushing offense. Leading the charge are Doug Violeti, Lene Amosa, Travis Fonseca, Kelly McGill and Peter Pale.

1998: A relatively untested offensive line will build around All-WAC candidate Kaulana Noa. Look for Kailua's

Chris Smith and Kamehameha product Manly Kanoa to contribute as freshmen. Transfer Dustin Owen should make an immediate impact. Adrian Klemm was moved from tackle to tight end to give Lindsey an additional blocker.

Special delivery

1992: Jason Elam caps an All-American career by handling the place-kicking and punting duties admirably.

1998: Last season, Hawaii's special teams were alternately wonderful and awful, often on the same play. Punter Chad Shroul has a powerful leg, but he needs to put more hang time under his punts. Opponents returned six punts for touchdowns last season: three off of Shroul's longer boots and three off of blocked kicks. Place kicker Eric Hannum doesn't possess great range, but has steadily improved in converting extra points and field goals.

The Irish factor

1992: Hawaii ended the 1991 season with a near upset of Notre Dame. The Rainbows' stirring performance on national television helps get the momentum rolling into 1992.

1998: The Rainbows were nine seconds away from knocking off the Irish on national television in December. Last year's game may provide even more reason for hope than it did seven years ago. Unlike the 1991 game when the 'Bows needed a frantic fourth-quarter rally to make it close, Hawaii actually outplayed the Irish for about 58 minutes in last year's game.



Something to prove

1992: The WAC prognosticators pick Hawaii to finish eighth in the 10-member conference. The seniors take the prediction as an insult, and inspire the team to rise above the expectations of the media "experts."

1998: Hawaii is picked by most media polls to finish seventh or eighth in the eight-member WAC Pacific Division. The prediction is plausible considering Hawaii hasn't won more than two conference games in a season since 1993. But there is reason to believe the 'Bows could prove the pundits wrong.

Among the reasons for optimism is the coaching staff. Lindsey took a struggling defense and turned it into a top-20 unit last year. He's now the offensive coordinator. Defensive coordinator Tom Williams is a bright, dynamic young coach who studied his trade under Lindsey.

If Williams can maintain the positive momentum on defense and Lindsey can work his magic with the offense, the 'Bows could surprise a lot of people.

Just like in 1992.

UH TRIVIA

• The Rainbows close the season against defending co-national champion Michigan. Hawaii has played the team that went on to win the national championship three times: Nebraska (1971, lost 45-3), USC (1978, lost 21-5) and Brigham Young (1984, lost 18-13).

Best players: QB Dan Marino, RB Karim Abdul-Jabbar, OT Richmond Webb and LB Zach Thomas.

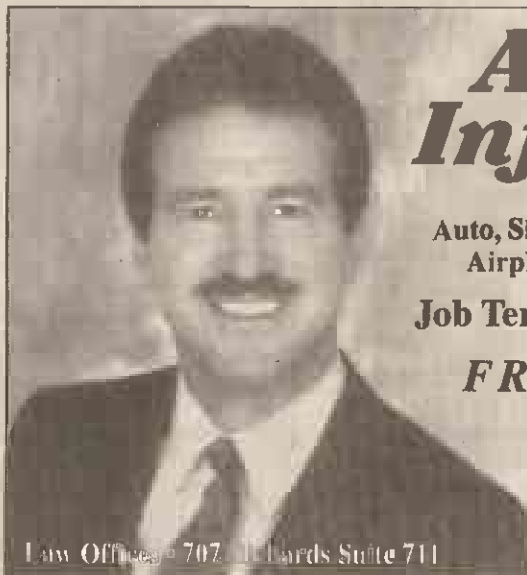
!: Marino may be in the twilight of his career, but he still led the NFL's second best passing attack in 1997. O.J. McDuffie is
