

# New opportunities for Marine officers at K-Bay

In a continuing effort to enhance professional military education for officers, the Marine Corps University's College of Continuing Education has added a Phase I Amphibious Warfare School seminar program to its list of enhanced distance education opportunities at Marine Corps Base Hawaii.

Professional military education has always been vital to professional development for Marines. General Jones, Commandant of the Marine Corps, has recently reiterated the importance of PME and is encouraging a

renewed commitment among our officers in particular to get engaged and complete their PME. In consonance with this rejuvenated focus, the CCE is taking the opportunities for completion of officer PME one step higher by increasing onsite course offerings around the Corps.

Serving to bridge the gap between resident and distance PME experiences, the CCE satellite campus seminar programs offer expanded opportunities for officers to complete their PME obligation, improve their core competency skills, and increase their competitiveness for promotion.

The AWSDEP Phase I seminars at MCB Hawaii will begin Nov. 3 and will finish 22 weeks later on April 19.

According to the MCBH satellite campus regional coordinator, retired Col. Bill Peoples, only 15 to 20 percent of our officers are afforded the opportunity to go to the resident PME schools in Quantico, Va., each year. In the past, the other 80% were left only with the non-resident correspondence option. The PME completion rate under that program was dismal at roughly 20 percent," said Peoples. "The success rate for non-resident PME dramatically improved when we began offering on-sight seminars for the CSCDEP in 1998 at satellite campuses around the Corps.

"Now that we are offering the on-sight seminar program for Phases I and II of the AWSWDEP also, we would expect to see similar improvements in the PME

completion rates of our company grade officers as well. This means officers who are better equipped to perform their duties, and officers who are more competitive before selection boards," he added.

The distance education idea is by no means a new one, but the CCE has made the task of completing PME much less daunting. No longer are officers left on their own when they enroll in a course and receive their 35-pound box of books. The months of solitary reading ended with the advent of the satellite campus seminar program. Seminars, peer support and instant access to advice and counseling from experienced, knowledgeable instruc-

> tors are just a few of the benefits officers enjoy while participating in the CCE seminar pro-

The Marine officers who serve as the professors and mentors during the seminars offer a wealth of knowledge, said Peoples. All of them have already completed their own requisite PME, many at the resident school, most are combat veterans, and all are experts in the topics they lead during the course. This experience and expertise are resources normally not available to officers

Additionally, the CCE offers immediate feedback when a student has questions, can customize a program if a student is being deployed, and acts as an effective conduit between the student and Marine Corps Institute for administrative issues.

According to ALMAR 206/97, all officers selected to the grade of captain and major are required to enroll in the PME Distance Education Program appropriate to their grade. For captains, the appropriate PME is the AWS course, phases one and two. As of now both are available in Hawaii via the CCE seminar enhanced DEP. Phase I starts Nov. 1; Phase II starts Oct. 1.

Access to the AWSDEP courses is not limited to captains. Lieutenants may enroll as well, even though there is no current PME requirement until they are selected for

# Ground is broken for OSCAR's arrival

Tuesday was ground-breaking day for the Outside Cable Plant Rehabilitation project (OSCAR) at MCB Hawaii Kaneohe, where new fiber optic cables will stretch from 4th Force Reconnaissance Company to the Range

Training Facility and all points in between. Although some of the wires that carry information for the base computers and communications were installed as recently as last year, some have been in service since the 1950's, according to MCB Hawaii Commanding General Brig. Gen. R.E. Parker.

"The system has carried us to the turn of the 20th Century, but is woefully inadequate for the current emerging technologies that the warfighters of the 21st Century require. We are currently trying to pump a river of data through a straw," said Brig. Gen. Parker, moments before hopping into a piece of heavy equipment

to break the first ground for the OSCAR pro-

The entire project, installing a total of 174,792 feet of fiber cable, will connect 153 buildings on base, explained Maj. Patrick Scholes, assistant chief of staff for communications, G-6.

"Without their (G-6) support, it would have taken longer than a year to get this project underway," said Mark Beach, lead engineer for the OSCAR project.

Although this \$12 million dallar project will span the entire base, there is not a lot of construction that base residents and employees need to be concerned with, according to Scholes, and Sgt. Antonio Ramirez Jr., commu-

This project is scheduled to take a minimum of nine months, said Scholes. Much of the digging will take place near and under roads and the flightline.

"One good thing about this base is there are the project unfolds.

alternate routes to anyplace," said Scholes.

Two areas that may appear to be challenging are the construction at the flightline and the front gate. Due to modern technology though, crews will be able to bore holes under the flightline and G Street heading out the front gate, explained Scholes, and drag the lines under those high-traffic areas.

The company that is constructing the mass amount of trenches around base is General Dynamics, who has worked on many of the military bases on Oahu, to include Pearl Harbor Naval Base and Fort Shafter, said 1st Lt. Frank Calvillo, information systems management officer for G-6.

Although there are no roads that are scheduled to be closed due to the construction, once the project starts moving, some roads or parts of roads could be closed.

HEADQUARTERS, MARINE CORPS, WASHING-TON — A report released by Marine Corps officials July 27 confirms that a combination of "human factors" caused the April 8 crash of an MV-22 Osprey tilt-rotor aircraft that killed 19 Marines near Marana, Ariz.

The report, based on extensive engineering investigations, information retrieved from onboard flight data recorders and interviews with witnesses, found that deviations from the scheduled flight plan, an unexpected tailwind and the pilot's extremely rapid rate of descent into the landing zone created the conditions that led to the accident.

Although the report stops short of specifying pilot error as a cause, it notes that the pilot of the ill-fated aircraft significantly exceeded the rate of descent established by regulations for safe flight.

The mishap aircraft was one of two Ospreys taking part in a night training exercise as part of the MV-22's operational evaluation. Both aircraft departed Marine Corps Air Station, Yuma, Ariz., and were to have landed at the Marana regional airport to drop off Marines conducting a non-combatant evacuation exercise. Both aircrews were using night vision devices during the mission.

According to the report, both Ospreys arrived at their final approach coordinates 2,000 feet higher than had been briefed for the mission. Rather than aborting the approach and going around for another approach, the section lead aircraft attempted a rapid descent into the landing zone, followed by the mishap

Unknown to the pilots of both aircraft, a 10-15 knot tailwind was pushing them forward, requiring them to reduce forward airspeed to avoid over-shooting their intended landing zone. Apparently neither

pilot recognized the danger presented craft's forward speed in an attempt to flight control inputs induced "vortex by their high rate of descent and low forward airspeed. # America's battalion vets reunite at K-Bay

Warriors from 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment returned to MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, July 27-30, but they weren't coming back from Unit Deployment Program training in Okinawa, Japan.

These members of 3/3, nicknamed "America's Battalion," were Vietnam combat veterans and were here to participate in the 3/3 Vietnam Veterans Reunion.

The reunion, hosted by 3rd Marine Regiment while the active 3/3 Marines are deployed to Okinawa, was the seventh such reunion designed to give the retired servicemembers the opportunity to reflect about their time in the Corps and the chance to reunite with Marines of the past and meet the current leathernecks.

"It's important to recognize the sacrifice and commit-

ment they gave us years ago. What Marines do now is (a result) of the sacrifices they made; without them the Marine Corps would not be here today," said Sgt. Maj. Leon L. Harris, 3rd Marine Regiment sergeant major.

"America's Battalion" was one of the first units in Vietnam, changing venue from training in Okinawa to protecting the airfield at Chu Lai. They were one of three battalions to take part in Operation Starlite, the first major operation of the war.

The battalion faced the challenge of fighting the North Vietnamese Army all along the demilitarized zone for three years between 1966 and 1969. Before pulling out of Vietnam in 1969, and after fighting in such places as Cam Lo, Khe Sanh and Con Thien, 3/3 lost more than

# Asking for help is the sign of a smart Marine

**CAMP H.M. SMITH, Hawaii** – A few years ago I was in Washington listening to a brief from Headquarters Marine Corps when I realized that I did not recognize several of the acronyms an officer was using during his presentation. Now this should not have surprised me all that much. You know as well as I do, all of us in the military are really bad when it comes to using acronyms when we talk to each other. The chances of someone knowing what each and every one of them means is about as good as the Chicago Cubs' chance of winning the World Series this year – or any year for that matter – but that's another story. (Sorry, I always get this way about the Cubs in August.) That being said, as a Marine sergeant major, I do pride myself in

knowing a lot of them. And here I was – lost as a private aboard ship for the first time. In short, the main points of the presentation were passing me by because I was not familiar with the acronyms being used and my unwillingness to raise my hand and ask for help.

Why? Well, as I looked around the room, I had convinced myself that everyone else in the class understood everything that was being said. Believe me when I tell you I was really starting to feel uncomfortable,

but my ego was getting in the way of me asking the instructor to explain some of the acronyms he was using. I thought everyone in the room knew exactly what was being said except me, and frankly that was beginning to tick me off. I was frustrated and getting mad. But as mad as I was getting, I still would not ask for help because I was letting my ego get the best of me.

I had reached a point where I had two options. I could pretend I understood everything being said and fake my way through the rest of the class, or I could put my ego aside and raise my hand and tell the instructor I was lost and risk being laughed at. Option one did not look particularly attractive to me. The Marine Corps was sending me to this class to learn something to hopefully help my Marines out, and not getting anything out of it would be a disservice. But option two still came at a cost - my ego.

I had settled on option two, but I was having a hard time

stand it any longer and I leaned over to the sergeant major sitting next to me and asked him if he understood what was being said. He looked at me and said he didn't have a clue. Well, that did it and I put my hand up in the air and told the officer I was lost, and the whole class broke up laughing. Now I really felt whatever is on your mind. All you have to do is raise your hand self-conscious until I realized that the reason everyone was and ask for help. Semper Fi laughing was because just about everyone else was as

What's the point to this little trip down memory lane? Well my point is simply to remind you that everyone needs some help from time to time but sometimes ,because of egos, we fail to ask for that help.

lost as I was, but all of us were just too hung up on our

own egos to admit it.

All of us are going to be faced with situations we need help with. For some, it might be acronyms with which they are unfamiliar. For others, it might be more serious such as problems with alcohol, drugs or personal relationships with spouses or children. And, yes, sometimes we are going to need to ask for someone else's help. If you need to do so, never feel you are less than a man or a woman Marine or Sailor because, believe me, all of us need help at some time in our lives. Maybe that help can come in the form of a friend or shipmate with whom you just need to blow off some steam or as advice from your platoon sergeant or officer-in-charge might do the trick. Others might need to seek the aid of a trained professional. In any case, asking and getting help for your problems is far better than pretending they don't exist at

In my case, I was afraid to ask a question because I did not want my peers to think any less of me. In someone else's case it might be a fear that they cannot handle a given situation or crisis. Asking for help is never a sign of weakness that you are not a good Marine, Sailor, husband, wife or leader. It just means you need a helping hand. Believe it or not, those people you ask for help will not think any less of you and might even be flattered that you would come to them and ask their opinions or to clarify something for you. If you do run into the occasional meathead who laughs at you for asking for help, consider the source and move on – his or her opinion of you should not concern you anyhow.

Marines, never let your ego get in the way of asking for help. It's not worth it. Ask questions when you don't

working up the courage to raise my hand. Finally, I couldn't understand something. Ask for help when you need it, and you will find yourselves in much better shape in both your careers and in your personal lives. # African exercise concludes with improved awareness

NANYUKI, Kenya - Golden Spear 2000 officially concluded today as Kenyan Vice President Professor George Saitoti and U.S. Army General Tommy Franks, Commander in Chief of the U.S. Central Command, made remarks during the closing ceremony at the Mount Kenya Safari Club here today.

Representatives from 11 African countries and several organizations met here for Golden Spear 2000 July 25-27. The symposium, co-hosted by the Kenyan government and the U.S. Central Command, consisted of briefings, panel discussions and guest speakers. It emphasized humanitarian assistance issues and response to trans-national threats and crises in the Horn and East Africa.

Marines from Marine Forces Central Command, acting as the U.S. Central Command's executive agent, coordinated the event with their Kenyan counterparts in order to make the event a success.

Commander of Marine Forces Pacific Lieutenant General Frank Libutti, acting

Marine Forces Central Command, attended the symposium which sought to help enhance international interoperability and the formulation of regional level strategic responses to natural disasters and humanitarian crises.

"I personally have a vastly improved and expanded awareness of the threats to the region and the magnitude of the efforts required to address the challenges these threats present," said Gen. Franks during his closing statement. "I believe we all know that these issues must be addressed collectively, since even individually they easily overwhelm the resources of any one sovereign nation."

"There was an explicit purpose in the symposium - to discuss regional cooperation in matters of humanitarian assistance and disaster relief and that was amply achieved," said retired Ambassador Lannon Walker, who also served as the moderator. "But equally important was that military and civilian leaders, some of whom had a certain amount of conflict with one another, were able to meet and create personal contacts and friendships."

A unique aspect of the symposium was that it brought together, not just governmental and military decision-makers, but also representatives from non-governmental organizations (NGOs).

"There were only a few NGOs here. The next step is to bring together all the operators and expand on this beginning," Walker said.

Participating countries were Burundi, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Djibouti, Egypt, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Kenya, Rwanda, Seychelles, Tanzania, and Uganda. Observers from the United Kingdom and France also attended.

African Regional Organizations that attended included the Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa, and the East African Co-operation.

Representatives from the United Nations World Food Program were represented as well as the relief agencies, ADRA and AMREF.

"We didn't leave the symposium with just a report. There is a path," Walker

Bucy said that before a vehicle is towed, a notice is put on the windshield telling the owner to move in five days. Then after those five days, a 24-hour notice is placed on the vehicle, and then it is towed if still not removed from the lot.

Just because a person is not on the island, doesn't mean they can't solve this problem.

If someone has a delayed flight back to Hickam and can't be back on time, there are two ways to avoid being towed, according to Bucy.

One is the person can call the PSC and ask for an extension. The other is that each permit will have a contact number for the owner. Bucy


said he will attempt to call the person and make them aware of the situation.


He added that at least once a week, someone from PSC will walk around the lot to insure that all vehicles are registered and have permits.












As the Marine frantically searches over every inch of his fallen buddy, he is perplexed by the lack of an entry wound. He is beginning to give up hope of finding his fellow devil-dog's injury and trying the save his life. This is when he sees the unusual backward curve of the wounded man's lower leg and the growing stain of red on the man's trousers.

"What do I do?" he thinks to himself.

ticipated in their medical emergency response course last week, he would have A Marine lays under the known that those are the symptoms of a compound fracture of the leg. He would also know how to treat it.

treat an injury without questioning themselves thanks to five days of lot. The classes classes last week on first aid and medical care.

The classes included providing intravenous therapy, splinting injured limbs, stopping bleeding and treating shock.

The medical courses, which are crucial to the preparedness and effectiveness of a unit in a hostile situation, were taught by Sgt. Scott D. Batastini, a former emergency medical technician, now an Arabic Linguist with Bravo Co., 1st Radio Bn.

Each day of class covered a range of related subjects. The periods of instruction began in the morning with lecture-style classes, videotapes and class participation.

It was in the afternoon that the fun began. The students retreated to the outside of the classroom for the practical

application portion of the course. Marines could be seen rolling on the ground, screaming, moaning and wincing their feigned injuries.

Other students were equipped with the bare necessities of medical rescue and told were things such as, "he has a bro-

ken femur, fix him so we can move him to cover."

During the practical application for splinting a fractured limb, Lance Cpl. Aaron E. Dawson, a Russian linguist with Bravo Co., 1st Radio Bn., simulated a broken tibia and fibula. Sgt. Benjamin F. Chapman III and Cpl. Jeffrey D. Fritts, both Arabic linguists with Bravo Co., quickly and carefully attended to their injured comrade.





# Training is a riot for Hawaii Marines

Mobs of protesters gathered in demonstration around Marines from Marine Security Element Platoon, Bravo Co., 1st Battalion, 3rd Regiment, July 26.

As time passed, the mob became unruly and the Marines were forced to hold their ground, armed with nothing more than minor riot control gear and techniques they had learned the day before.

The Marines formed a nearly impenetrable wall with riot shields and their bodies as the protesters advanced on them. The Marines stood still as the demonstrators pressed against the shields and taunted the Marines. Then the crowd turned violent.

Demonstrators who tried taking the shields swiftly felt a four-foot wooden baton against their bodies. Those who managed to break through the lines, soon met the ground as Marines snatched them up and threw them down quicker than they could get through.

This scene was repeated over and over as the MSE practiced riot control measures here. The platoon is a specialpurpose platoon, designed to react to emergencies, whatever and wherever they are, said Staff Sgt. Jerry D Robertson, platoon sergeant. Riot Control is one of the many missions they have to be ready for.

The platoon had spent the day prior in classes, learning

The Marines viciously attacked and defended, depending on the role they were playing. While the flak jackets and Kevlar helmets kept them safe from serious harm, many of them were still roughed up.

While the Marines may

"If they have protesters out there, we go out to make sure they don't get out of hand," said Lance Cpl. Santos Ortiz, a 21-year-old machine gunner from El Campo, Texas. "You want to know your stuff. A crowd of people can really mess you up."

By using proper techniques, Robertson said a small group of Marines can defend themselves against a large and unruly crowd.

"If you do it right, the smaller man can become the bigger the 31-year-old Philadelphia, Miss. native said. "You've got to keep the formation together.
















# Don't let your peach of a car turn into a lemon ?

WASHINGTON — The 20-year-old Marine couldn't resist the deal advertised in his base newspaper: a free bus ticket from his Washington duty station to Virginia Beach, Va., to buy a used car.

the dealership, a salesman informed him he'd have to pay for his own trip home if he didn't buy a car. The salesman pressured the Marine into taking out a loan — at 24 percent interest—to buy both a car and an extended warranty.

On the trip back to Washington, the Marine's "peach" of a car turned into a "lemon." It started sputtering. When the Marine called the dealer for help, he was told simply to top off the water levels and continue on his way. The car survived the trip, but soon after left the Marine stranded on the roadside. The dealer refused to honor the warranty, claiming the Marine had violated its terms by driving the car when it needed repairs.

Major Charles Hale, chief of client services for Marine Corps headquarters legal assistance, said deals involving both new and used cars are among the biggest consumer problems young service members confront. Neither the Defense Department nor the services keep statistics on how many military members buy used cars that turn into lemons as soon as the deal is sealed. But Lt. Col. Walter Skierski, chief of the Air Force Legal Assistance Division, said firsthand experience in Air Force legal assistance offices tells him too many too often.

have major mechanical problems the dealer doesn't reveal and the warranty doesn't cover. Some vehicles have no warranties at all, and the buyers aren't told and sometimes don't think to ask. Service members who buy a car "asis" end up having to pay out of pocket for anything that goes wrong after the sale. Some end up deeply in debt, he said.

these constantly," agreed John Meixelle, an attorney-adviser with the Army Legal Assistance Office. "The most unfortunate thing is that the victims are usually junior enlisted members who have bad credit or are trying to establish credit—and who can least afford to be taken advantage of."

> The military also is taking steps to help educate service members and their families about their consumer rights when buying used cars or other goods and services. The Navy's preventive law program, for example, uses commanders' briefings, brochures and base newspaper articles to inform sailors and their families about frauds they're likely encounter-including fraudulent used car deals, explained Cmdr. Ann DeLaney, deputy assistant judge advocate general for legal assistance.

By law, all dealers must post a buyers guide inside each used vehicle for sale. It spells out in writing what warranty coverage, if any, consumers are getting for their money. It lists the major mechanical and electrical systems on the vehicle, including. some of the major problems consumers should look out for. It also tells them whom to contact at the dealership if

sumers don't know to look for the guide, and an alarming number of dealers don't post them.

The FTC recently inspected used car dealers on Chicago's North Shore, just outside the gates of Great Lakes Naval Training Center, and found that more than one-third of the 14 used car dealers surveyed didn't comply with the law. Almost one-fourth of the cars on their lots had no buyers guides, and many of the posted guides were incomplete or inaccurate. The noncomplying dealers will be fined by the state and could face prosecution by the FTC for future violations.

"But what's particularly disturbing," he says, "is that the dealers are located in an areas where the consumers, such as new military trainees, may not understand their rights to this information." To help protect this population, he said, the FTC plans to conduct more inspections of used car dealers near other major

military bases. Baker said used car dealers who don't display buyers guides send consumers an important message. "Not displaying the Buyers Guide shows a blatant disregard for the law and for their custhere's a problem after they tomers," he said. "If the dealer

He suggested used car shoppers take another important step before shelling out. "Get the vehicle inspected by an independent mechanic that you've hired yourself before you buy," Baker said. "It will cost you a few dollars, but could save you a lot of money in the long run."

Consider using the Internet to research the vehicle's title history. For a small fee, you can use a service to help determine, for example, if the vehicle's odometer was rolled

"There's no way to Baker acknowledged that absolutely guarantee that a servicemember's used car experience is going to be positive," Baker said. "But by taking steps to protect themselves, and getting educated about their rights in the marketplace, young service members can help avoid the potential pitfalls.






# U.S. and Thai Marines conduct live-fire exercise

# Marines test new rocket system

MARINE CORPS BASE CAMP LEJEUNE, N.C — In what is hoped to be a positive step forward, the Marine Corps tested the new High Mobility Artillery Rocket System at Landing Zone Falcon here July 28.

Marines from 3rd Platoon, Charlie Battery, 10th Marine Regiment and Soldiers from 3rd Battalion, 27th Field Artillery and 18th Airborne Corps, Field Artillery out of Fort Bragg, N.C. provided a joint service effort to display the HMARS in front of various Army and Marine dignitaries.

The Marine Corps is still in the test phase as far as using the HMARS but hopes to activate the high-tech artillery into mainstream use in the near future.

"This system can be an important asset Blackwood, assistant fire support coordinator for 2d Marine Division.

Recently, Army artillery units began using the state of the art HMARS, which provides rocket and missile mobility up to 45 kilometers and can be easily transported on Navy and Air Force aircraft. When in production, the six-barrel rocket/missile system will have an estimated cost of \$2.2 million, according to HMARS Product Manager Army Lt. Col. Max Carroll, from Red Stone Arsenal, Ala.

"We are pursuing the mainstream usage of the HMARS because we do not have any artillery system organic to the Marine Corps. It's use should give us a little boost when comes to taking out the enemy," said Blackwood.

Marine artillery units currently use the M-198 howitzer which is heavier and has a smaller range of fire.



The program not only offers chances to see and experience the many wonders the island has to offer, but it also offers many of these chances at reduced discount



"I am glad I called about the trip to Hawaiian Waters. I had a really good time," said Riviera.


"Anybody who is interested in having a good time at a reasonable price, and doesn't know where to find it, should try the Single Marine and Sailor Program.



"It's kind of a family thing," Mrs. Williams said.


During this time, they brush the dogs, clean out their wrinkles, cut their nails and perform other required maintenance to keep the dogs healthy.


