MP Marine earns top law enforcement honor in Hawaii

It should be a comfort to know that servicemembers, family members and employees aboard MCB Hawaii, are protected by a military policeman recognized by the Hawaii State Law Enforcement Officers Association as the Military Law Enforcement Officer of the Year.

For the past 47 years, the HSLEOA has recognized the best officer from around the Hawaiian Islands, presenting awards to the best officer from Honolulu Police Department, Maui Police Department, Kauai Police Department, customs service and military police from all services.

At this year's award banquet, the Military Law Enforcement Officer of the Year, Sgt. Gunnar A. Spafford, a 26-year-old native of Chester, Vt., and an MP with military police company, Headquarters Battalion, MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, was not

present to receive his award. Furthermore, Spafford was house hunting in California and did not know he had won the award. He did not even know he was entered in the competition. He returned to from his fellow MPs, yet he had no idea why.

It was the recommendation of Capt. Davis R. Christy, 29, of Ransomville, N.Y., training officer with MP Co., that placed Spafford in contention for the award.

"He's a stellar sergeant," said Christy. "He is one of the best sergeants in the department and one of the best sergeants I have had an opportunity to work with."

Spafford contributes a lot to the department, said Christy. He is a member of the special reaction team, qualified as a

Hawaii with congratulations marksman observer, and participates in numerous extracurricular activities including the Special Olympics and many community outreach and policing programs.

Spafford distinguished himself particularly well during operation Golden Spear, a deployment to Kenya, said Christy. The way he organized a convoy and coordinated with the Kenyan police really facilitated the security and safe passage of more than 400 dignitaries and Marine support staff through Africa.

"He (Spafford) is a very unselfish military professional who, throughout his tenure at MCB Hawaii has constantly sought out ways to contribute to and improve the Military Police Department," said Christy.

Spaffords name will be added to the "perpetual trophy," which displays the names of past winners of the award and is presented to the winner's unit, The "perpetual trophy" is kept for one year then presented to the following year's winner.

Personnel aboard MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, can rest a little easier with the knowledge that Marines like Sgt. Spafford are safeguarding our lives, property and well-being.

Marines temporarily suspend flights for three types of aircraft

WASHINGTON — Flight operations for three models of Marine Corps aircraft were temporarily suspended by the Naval Aviation Systems Command this weekend after officials discovered unrelated problems with each type

The suspension orders were issued late Friday for the CH-53E Super Stallion transport helicopter, AH-1W Cobra attack helicopter and the MV-22 Osprey tilt rotor aircraft. A portion of the Corps' AV-8B Harrier jet fleet remains grounded, following a July 11 order suspending flights due to concerns about engine bearing problems.

Most significant is the grounding of 165 of the Corps' heavy-lift CH-53E helicopters, eight of which are currently deployed. The decision to suspend operations is based on the preliminary findings of the crash of a Navy MH-53E mine-sweeping helicopter off the

coast of Corpus Christi, Texas, Aug. 10. Officials suspended AH-1W Cobra flight operations after it was discovered this week that some older rotor blades may be susceptible to cracking. Each of the Corps' 198 helicopters will undergo a one-time inspection to identify and replace, if necessary, the suspect blades before being returned to flight status. Eight of the Cobras are currently deployed.

Officials also suspended flight operations for the MV-22 tilt rotor aircraft after one of the Corps' 11 Ospreys made a precautionary landing Thursday at Camp Lejeune, N.C. The MV-22's backup systems worked flawlessly and the pilot landed safely, but a subsequent maintenance inspection revealed that a coupling on the aircraft's interconnect drive shaft failed.

The coupling was repaired, and the aircraft later returned to Marine Corps Air Station, New River, N.C., where it is based.

Engineers will examine the other 10 MV-22s to ensure the failure was isolated. The Osprey, which can fly like a plane and take off and land like a helicopter, completed operational evaluation in July and is awaiting the goahead to proceed with full-rate production. The Osprey is planned to replace the Corps' aging fleet of CH-46 and CH53D model helicopters.

Meanwhile, the Marine Corps continues efforts to inspect and test all of its F402-RR-408A/B engines for the AV-8B Harrier jet before returning the aircraft to flying status. Since July 11, about 30 of the Corps' 106 Harriers powered by that engine have returned to flying status. About 10 other engines have been inspected and await installation. The remaining engines are due to undergo vibration-scan testing and, if necessary, be repaired before returning to service.

A-76 team ensures efficient, effective study for MCBH

The progress of the Congressional A-76 Study was the topic of discussion at an allhands brief aboard Marine Corps Base Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, Aug. 16 when more than 200 civilian base employees gathered to hear briefs from the Commercial Activities A-76 Team, as well as ask questions.

Many questions from the base's workforce revolved around the A-76 timeline that was outlined during the brief.

The timeline, which is comprised of 15 steps, begins with the Commercial Activities Action Plan and concludes with the Announcement of the Tentative Decision, or

rather the selected best offer. The duration of the study and the timeline is scheduled for 24

The study will begin its Performance Work Statement development shortly. This is part of Step 2, one of the most critical steps in the timeline. Those departments that perform the announced functions to be studied will make decisions and provide input to the teams that write the PWS.

The PWS is a comprehensive document that describes the work that needs to be performed to accomplish the mission, and not necessarily the methods or ways that work is performed.

SOUTH KOREA — The 26th annual Ulchi Focus Lens exercise (UFL 00), a training command post exercise combining Korean and U.S. forces, commenced with a ceremony here Aug. 28 at the headquarters for the Republic of Korea Marine Corps.

During the ceremony, the colors and command - of the Combined Marine Forces Command (CMFC) passed from Lt. Gen. Kim Myung-Hwan, Commandant of the Republic of Korea Marine Corps (ROKMC), to Lt. Gen. Frank Libutti, Commander, Marine Forces Pacific.

Upon the passing of command, Lt. Gen. Kim assumed responsibility as the CMFC deputy commander. The passing of the colors symbolized the merging of U.S. and R.O.K. Marine forces into a

single, unified, Marine command. UFL 00 is one in a series of exercises involving forces from the

U.S. and the Republic of Korea. This year's exercise involves approximately 13,000 American service members, 3,800 of which come from various commands in the U.S., Japan, and Guam. Approximately 56,000 R.O.K. troops are participating.

The mission of the exercise is to analyze and enhance organization, procedures, and performance for contingency operations between U.S. and R.O.K. Marine forces.

UFL 00 is just one in a number of regularly scheduled exercises held annually in the Pacific theater. In his opening comments and Commander, speaking as Combined Marines Forces Command, Lt. Gen. Libutti high-

lighted the significance of coming

together as a unified command; the

Marine Forces Pacific staff, the

Marine Forces Korea staff and the

R.O.K. Marine Corps staff.

"We must think and act as a fully integrated team," said Lt. command's role as the component Gen. Libutti. "This is the first time we have integrated the MarForK and MarForPac staff here in Palan. We expect challenges as we work through the exercise, but this integration affords us a great opportunity to move ahead in our planning and execution."

He also emphasized the impor-

tance of maintaining situation awareness and focusing on the headquarters.

"We are not here to fight a tactical fight. Rather, we must think and act as a component command," explained the commander. "We need to keep our head in the game and learn to fight as a component," he added.

Wear your uniform on leave to reconnect with America

CAMP H.M. SMITH - While I was at the Sergeant Majors' Symposium this year, a bunch of us were brainstorming ideas on how to re-connect the Marine Corps better with society and

"show the flag." I brought up the topic of wearing our uniforms more while traveling in the Continental United States and while on leave. It is this topic, and my reasons for bringing it up, that I would like to talk about this

I remember when I first came in the Marine Corps in 1971 not travelling in uniform was not an option anyone considered. To my knowledge, because of the existing travel regulations at the time, all members of the

Armed Forces were required to travel in uniform. Besides that, as I recall, all of the airlines at the time gave some really great discounts to service members traveling in uniform. "Military standby tickets," as they were called, would get you anywhere in the United States just as quick as a first class reservation does

Unfortunately, due to a variety of reasons, not the least of which were the advent of the all-volunteer force and terrorist attacks on airlines, the policy was changed in the mid 1970s. With the changing of those regulations, fewer and fewer service people opted to wear their uniforms in public places and during travel. The down side of this, in my opinion, was the ability for our countrymen to see service members in uniform in the airports and on the streets of our nation as much as they used to.

Why do I think that is unfortunate? Look at it this way. For most Americans - unless they have a son or daughter serving in the Armed Forces – their only contact with the military is what they read in the newspapers or see in the movies or on television. Now while "Saving Private Ryan" and "Rules of

Engagement" are very entertaining, do you think they should be the only examples our nation sees of the men and women who are entrusted with their common defense and safety? Do you really think this country should judge the men and women who so faithfully serve this nation by a movie or a television show? Granted those shows might fulfill an entertainment need for our society, but as far as showing our the real faces of the men and women who serve and protect them, I think they come up a bit short. Don't you?

As good as any actor might be in portraying us on the silver screen, when the director says, "Cut," or at closing time, those actors take off their costumes and go back to being Tom Cruise or Tom Hanks. Real Marines, Sailors, airmen and soldiers live this lifestyle day in and day out. For us, it is not an acting job; it is a way of life. And I, for one, think, "Who better to show our country the real face of its Armed Forces and what's good about our country and its young people than real live U.S. Marines?"

Our country is sort of fickle when it comes to making up its

mind on many things. I would rather them formulate their opinion based on the real thing than about three actors looking for gold in the deserts of Kuwait. I would rather they hear from a young Marine who has flown off the deck of a Naval vessel in the South China Sea in harm's way than some actor who got a joy ride in the back seat of an F-14 and now feels fully qualified to speak about national defense.

By "showing the flag," if you will, by traveling more in uniform and wearing your uniforms more on leave, you would be showing our citizens that the real-life Armed Forces really do exist and have a face. You would be re-connecting with the citizens we serve and at the same time you would be a force multiplier for our Recruiting Service. And you know what? If nothing else, you would meet a lot of really great people who just would like to meet you and thank you for what you do for our nation.

As a side note while we were discussing this issue, one sergeant major asked me if I thought by telling our Marines to wear their uniforms while traveling or on leave, we would be "harassing" them. Marines, I've got to tell you this comment threw me for a loop. If someone thinks that wearing the uniform of their country is "harassment," they've got problems. They don't even deserve to wear it in the first place and certainly have no business being in the Marine Corps. "Harassment?" You've got to be kidding? If you think wearing your uniform is harassment, stop by my office. We will have a nice little one-on-one

I have said this many times and I will go on saying it until I am in the "Dirt Box Motel." It is an honor to be a U.S. Marine, serve this country and wear this uniform. There are people who would cut off their right arm to be U.S. Marines but, because of physical problems, will never have that honor. There are kids like Sam Ardito whose only wish is to be a Marine but may never even get the chance to try. I hardly think that asking our Marines to put their uniforms on a bit more could be considered

> anything more than being proud to belong to this elite fighting force. But then again, wearing my uniform is never taken lightly.

When I stopped in Chicago on the way back from the Symposium to see my Dad, I took him and my brothers and sister to dinner. I wore my uniform. Why? Because I am proud to be a U.S. Marine,

God only gives you so much time to wear this uniform on

active duty. Take advantage of it as much as you can; believe me, the time you have to wear it passes by much too quickly.

that's why.

Our country deserves to see the real deal, not a bunch of actors playing a part. Serving your country is not a part time job. The stakes are far too high. Show our country the real face of those who protect her. I think you will be glad you did. I know they will.





People who drive Mokapu Road out the back gate of MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, and do not slow down to 25 miles per hour may have a rude awakening in the form of speeding tickets, points against their licenses and the potential revocation of their base driving privileges.

The increased enforcement of the speed limit in this particular area is due to concerns from our Kailua neighbors about speeding on the half-mile stretch of road from the gate to the traffic signal on Kaneohe Bay Drive according to Lt. Col. Steven Cameron, the MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, provost mar-

Cameron said drivers on base should be careful and aware that they are being monitored going out the back gate and that there is going to be strict enforcement of the 25 mph speed limit by the Honolulu Police Department.

Earlier this year, officials and residents, as part of an effort to slow traffic through the area, created and implemented the Community Traffic Awareness Program.

The CTAP had three phases; raise awareness with signs posted along the street by residents, then HPD issued warnings to

Visiting staff delegates notice needs

A group of staff delegates from Washington D.C. visited MCB Hawaii and the Military Operations in Urban Terrain facility at Schofield Barracks last week.

The 12 delegates, representatives of Senators from around the nation, go to military bases to assess how the bases are doing and make recommendations for future legislation relating to the military:

"I think the major purpose of the staff delegation trips is to get this information back to people in the Senate," said John M. Kennedy, deputy staff director for the senate subcommittee on youth violence. "This information helps them to appreciate the needs of the military. Whether it's the training needs, housing needs, salary needs, equipment needs or procurement needs, it helps to hammer home the point that there are deficiencies in these areas."

After a base command brief held at Kansas Tower, Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron HMH-366 flew the staff members from Marine Corps Air Facility to the MOUT facility, at Schofield Barracks the morning of Aug. 23.

Arriving at the MOUT facility, the delegates were surprised to learn they would not be merely watching the training, they would be participating

Donned in flak jackets, and Kevlar helmets, and carrying rubber rifle models the delegates followed closely behind Marines in the simulated attack on an enemy stronghold to rescue a Marine hostage.

"I really enjoyed having the chance to run and do the tactical mission with the Marines here," said Kennedy, a resident of Montgomery, Ala. "The ability to get down to the troop's level and experience what they go through in a real

life situation is really impressive."

The rescue by the coalition was successful and a Meal Ready to Eat lunch was arranged for the guests and Marines to enjoy together. The delegates took time during lunch to talk to the Marines about concerns ranging from military income to quality of life issues.

After finishing the meals, the delegates were flown to the Boondocker Training Area, on MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, for demonstrations of the obstacle course and rappel tower.

Roughly 40 Marines from Combat Service Support

Group 3 were so motivating while running through course that several of the guests were inspired to run the course and test their physical abilities to see if they could stack up to the Marine standard.

Once the obstacle course exhibition was complete, a short demonstration of rappelling and fast-roping at the Boondocker tower was conducted by Helicopter Rope Suspension Training masters from 3rd Marines Regimental Schools.

"Our job was to get a first hand look at what the Marines and Sailors do here and assess their needs," said Libby Wood, legislative director for Sen. Fred Thompson of Tennessee. "Many of our bosses sit on committees that play a part in funding or authorizing different activities that military does."

For a few of the delegates it was their first time witnessing Marine Corps training first-hand, and the delegates said the experience left a lasting impression that they will likely not soon forget.

"I think that the Marines here are doing some incredible things with the equipment and facilities they have," said Wood. "Some people in Washington are saying that there is not enough appreciation for what the Marines are doing for us. We need to do more for the Marines and Sailors so they can continue to do those things."

All of the delegates had positive responses to what they had seen and experienced that day, and one went as far to say that he never realized the depth of the training that Marines go through on a continued basis.

Mark Esper, a Springfield, Va. resident and foreign defense policy advisor for Sen. Fred Thompson, had these remarks before leaving that day. "In talking with some of the Marines, we need to continue with the pay raises and improving the benefits of Marines, Sailors and all servicemembers, but also provide them with the money and the resources needed to do their job."





Get a Military Clause in your lease

If you just came to Hawaii or are thinking about moving, it is important to be careful with your lease agreement. A lease is the binding contract between the landlord and the tenant. A tenant must pay the landlord every month for the term of the lease, usually for one year. It is difficult to get out of a lease once you sign, so it is important to protect yourself by reading through the lease agreement and taking your lease to your legal assistance attorney at the Legal Services Center.

One of the most important terms of the lease is the military clause. A military clause allows the service member to get out of the lease when they have orders to move. Without a military clause, a tenant would still be liable for rent, even if they are not living on the island or are not receiving Basic Allowance for Housing.

If a lease has a military clause, it is usually found in the small print on a page titled "Standard Terms." The standard military clause usually states that if you receive orders requiring you to be off island for more than 60 days, you must give 28 days prior notice to your landlord and provide the landlord with a copy of the orders. You will find that military clauses come in all shapes and sizes, and it is important to remember they are written by the landlord or included in a lease agreeable to the land-



do not let your guard down. Most Marines and Sailors don't realize that terms in a lease, like a military clause, can be negotiated and modified, like any contract. If you negotiate, landlords are often willing to modify a lease to include a military clause, or change an existing military clause to better fit your needs.

A well negotiated military clause can even allow early termination of the lease if base housing becomes available. Standard military clauses a landlord uses do not permit termination of the lease if base housing becomes available, but if you negotiate with the landlord, you may be able to get a base housing exception.


Another effective military clause includes language permitting you to terminate the lease early if you are released from active duty. Many Marines every year receive medical and administrative separations, which under the standard military clause would not permit you to terminate your lease.

It is important to remember a military clause is an important part of the lease. Make sure when you review a lease that a military clause is present. Also make sure that it is the military clause for you. You can take your lease to the legal assistance office for the attorney to review during walk-in hours, Tuesday and Thursday, 7:30 a.m. to 10 a.m. You can also pick up our own military clause at any time we are open, 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, which you can negotiate with the landlord to sign and attach to the lease agreement. Don't become the victim of an unfair landlord.

Weapons Company live fires, experiences real world training

SCHOFIELD BARRACKS — Silence rested on an open field, interrupted only by the sounds of chirping birds, early Friday morning.

Suddenly, the bursts of two M240G machine guns placed on hilltops shattered the serenity, followed by a squad of Marines charging through the field while firing at pop up targets.

Once the line was secured, the machine guns displaced and followed down the hill to join the squad engaging targets. As they approached an area of trenches, a small team detached and cleared them with grenades.

Weapons Co., 1st Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment, field-fired many of their weapon systems last week, from the basic M-16A2 service rifle to the M-47 Dragon.

"Every few months we get to shoot live rounds," said 1st Lt. Andy Lynch, anti-armor platoon commander, Weapons Co., 1/3. "It allows the Marines to see how the weapon systems work and (how their capabilities and limitations) compliment each other."

Marines rushed the field while the machine guns provided cover. Once in position, Marine squads were able to eliminate enemy threats with their rifles. The Dragon was tasked to disable an enemy tank.

The final Dragon round fired by 1/3 at Schofield Barracks went out with a bang, scoring a direct hit that would have immobilized an

Lance Cpl. Aaron McNeal, a 20-year-old Lake Charles, La., native, and a Dragon gunner for the platoon, fired the final shot.


"An individual person is responsible for his or her own health care, too. We want them to be in a partnership with their doctor."

Defense budget increase includes pay raise

WASHINGTON. - President Clinton signed the fiscal 2001 Defense Appropriations Act, paving the way for a 3.7 percent pay raise for service members Jan. 1.

The budget of \$288 billion is an increase of \$18 billion over fiscal 2000 and about \$3.5 billion more than the president requested.

The act provides \$75.8 billion to pay a total of 1.382 million active duty personnel and 866,934 members of the reserve components.

The act also provides money for DoD to begin eliminating out-of-pocket housing costs. Currently, the Basic Allowance for Housing covers only about 81 percent of service members' housing costs if they live off base.

DoD seeks to cut this 19 percent out-ofpocket expense to 15 percent in fiscal 2001 and to zero by 2005.

The Defense Health Program is funded at \$12.1 billion. That share includes money Gen. Eric Shinseki called for the creation of on this bill when Congress meets in September.

Congress added to support changes to the military pharmacy benefit. Members of Congress said the legislation also would provide a blueprint for implementing permanent health care for retirees.

Congress matched the administration in funding operations and maintenance. Operations and maintenance funding is set at \$96.9 billion in fiscal 2001. This is up from \$92.2 billion in fiscal 2000.

The funding covers contingencies in Southwest Asia and in Bosnia and Kosovo. Military modernization also got a boost from

Procurement for fiscal 2001 is set at \$59.2 billion. Major

Army projects funded include \$729 million for Apache Longbow modifications, \$637 million for medium armored vehicle family and \$294 million for Abrams tank upgrades.

In addition, the Army will receive \$1.6 billion to transform itself. Army Chief of Staff 4,000-member quick strike brigades that can be deployed anywhere in the world in 96 hours. The appropriations act fully funds one such brigade and will equip a second brigade in 2001. The Army also received money to develop a lightweight future combat system vehicle.

Navy and Marine Corps procurement actions include \$4.2 billion for 42 F/A-18E/F fighters, \$1.1 billion for V-22 Osprey tilt-rotor aircraft, \$4 billion for the CVN-77 aircraft carrier and \$2.7 billion for three DDG-51 destroy-

Air Force procurement includes \$2.1 billion for 10 F-22 fighters, \$400 million for five F-15 fighters, \$2.8 billion for C-17 airlifters and \$380 million for C-135 modifications.

The Fiscal 2001 Defense Authorization Bill is still being worked on.

The authorization bill allows DoD to spend money. The appropriation act actually provides the funds.





Research Center places new rocket system on display

MARINE CORPS BASE QUANTICO, Va. — More than 60 Marines, soldiers and civilians gathered Quantico's Marine Corps Research Center Aug. 9 to discuss and view the High-Mobility Artillery Rocket System.

Marine Corps Systems Command hosted the meeting in an effort to get everyone involved with HIMARS working together.

"We wanted to get everyone involved together in one room and build a synergy so we can work together and make this the best system we can, so it satisfies the Marine Corps' needs." said Maj. Roger Gray a HIMARS project officer at MarCorSysCom. "I think we were successful. Many people had very good comments and questions, which tells me that people are on board, and they want to provide assistance to this project. It's very encouraging."

The HIMARS system is currently in its developmental phases and should be in use by the Marine Corps by 2005.

"The HIMARS is a great system that increases the volume of fire available to a commander," said Gray. "It also gives him increased range and lethality across the battlefield. The commander needs the ability to reach out and shape the deep fight."

The Marine Corps has been involved with the program since the beginning of this.

"We were hoping to work a joint program with the Army and make good use of the work they've done so we don't have to duplicate their efforts," said Gray. "We're getting involved with this program early enough that we can jointly influence the design to benefit both the Army and the Marine Corps. We have similar needs, so by working together from our different perspectives, we can build a better product we can all benefit from.

"The HIMARS system will meet the requirements of what the Army is calling their 'transformation' in which the Army is trying to become lighter and more mobile," he added. "It certainly fits into the footprint of what the Marine Corps is all about in terms of being expeditionary."

HIMARS showed off its power during a test fire at Camp Lejeune July 28.

"I had the opportunity to see [it] in action at the test shoot," said Gray. "I'm very impressed with the system. I think it has enormous potential to satisfy the requirements the Commandant has laid out before us. I believe it is something we can bring into the Marine Corps' arsenal within the next few years."



During World War II, tensions were high. Not just on

foreign soil, but right here in the United States. Racial tension was growing in America.

Japanese - Americans were faithful to the United States,

many Americans questioned their loyalty. During WWII, the problem escalated to the point that Japanese-Americans were instructed by executive order

to evacuate coastal cities and move to intermment camps in order to ensure "their own safety." Over 50 years ago, in one of the fiercest wars the world has ever seen, 22 soldiers of Asian descent per-

formed acts of courage and bravery for their country that reached well above and beyond the call of duty. It took over 50 years, though, for these same individ-

uals to receive the recognition and true gratitude they

Friday, Saturday and Sunday, these soldiers were the guests of honor at events held to honor the unsung heroes of the most highly decorated unit of WWII.

The seven survivors of the group of 22, and the families of the soldiers who have now passed, were presented with Medals of Honor by President Bill Clinton on the south lawn of the White House in Washington, June 21.

These surviving heroes of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team, 100th Battalion and their families returned to Hawaii and were treated with a series of events that lasted all weekend.

Friday, a ceremony was held at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific to recognize the survivors and to

pay proper respects to those men who made the supreme sacrifice so that the United States and other countries around the world could live a safe and free existence.

The ceremony included the ceremonial burning of incense to honor the deceased, wreath-laying in tribute to the men who did not return home to their lives after the war, and numerous speakers including keynote speaker, Adm. Dennis C. Blair, commander in chief of the United States Pacific Command, and U.S. Senator Daniel K lnouve, whose gallant efforts while serving with the 442nd, resulted in the loss of his right arm.

Saturday, in the streets of Waikiki, Medal of Honor recipients were again honored with a parade through Waikiki of Medal of Honor recipients, retired servicemembers, active servicemembers and 25 to 30 military

The parade was also highlighted by six bands, which included the Marine Forces Pacific Band, the 25th Infantry Division (light) Band, and the U.S. Air Force Band of the Pacific, lining the sides of the street, showering the honorees with timeless and patriotic music and marches.


Sunday brought about a glorious luncheon for the medal recipients, complete with Medal of Honor citation readings, and introductions to some of the thousands of guests at the banquet.

The banquet was also packed tight with guest speakers and an emotional roller coaster ride of a speech by the chief of staff of the Army, Gen. Eric K. Shinseki.

The ceremonies in honor of Asian-American Medal of Honor recipients is a long overdue tribute to the bravery and valor of these soldiers who gave so much to protect the country they called their home.





Base opens ranges for recreational fire

Staff Sgt. Ioseph Esway Range Control Liaison Chief, G-3

Below is a listing of guidelines for recreational fire at the MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay Range Facility provided by the base operations and training office.

· Recreational Fire occurs every Friday of a firing week from VO a.m. to noon on R-2 (pistol range) and 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. on R-1. (rifle range) provided field firing is complete.

• To lock on a target and time for either range, a reservation must be made no later than noon on the Wednesday prior to the Friday in which you wish to shoot. There are no exceptions to this rule - the range must have advance warning in order to support.

· If bringing a personal weapon, you must present a certificate of registration from Honolulu Police Department (firearms division on South Beretania St. in Honolulu) and also a certificate of registration from the Military Police Department. Once you have done this the first time, a folder will be started and kept on you and that particular weapon at range control.

No reloaded ammunition may be used in

personal weapons.

· If bringing a weapon from the armory, you must have a pre-fire inspection sheet from the armory.

· Only issued ammunition can be shot from a military-issued weapon.

• If shooting range 1, you must bring your own target puller. The range will not reface any target for you.

• Targets will be placed in carriages that are convenient to range personnel.

• Range I will support long-barrel rifles to include 7.62 mm, 308 caliber, 5.56 mm, 22

· If shooting range 2, new or refaced targets will be provided to you.

• Range 2 will support 22LR, 357, .45, .40 mm, 9mm, 22 caliber pistol, 12 gauge slug or buck, 20 gauge slug or buck.

· Please bear in mind that you may be sharing the range with other shooters and must remain flexible as to movement from yard line to yard line. All shooters have an equal say in such matters and rank will not be a fac-

 Medical support will be provided by that week's KD corpsman. The corpsman will be required to stay after field fire until recreational fire ends (no later than 3 p.m.) depending on the number of shooters that signed up the previous Wednesday.

• The point of contact for shooting on R-1 is Staff Sgt. Mitchell.

• The point of contact for shooting on R-2 is Gunnery Sgt. Troche.

· CWO4 Harris and Master Sgt. Maloney have final say on any cancellations or decisions made on the complex. For more info, or to reserve a target, call 257-2067.



ust when it appeared the NFL had settled into a comfortable hierarchy, the 1999 season shook the league like a snow-globe and uncovered a group of new contenders.

A class of budding superstars carried Indianapolis and Tampa Bay into the league's elite, while injuries sent perennial powers Denver and San Francisco into freefall

The 2000 season offers an opportunity for the league's rising stars to continue their ascent while giving its aging heroes another shot at glory, with all hoping to end the season in Tampa, site of Super Bowl XXXV.

Following is a synopsis of each of the NFL's 30 teams, covering the squads' strengths (!) and weaknesses (?). The teams are listed in their predicted order of

AFC EAST INDIANAPOLIS COLTS

The Big-Three of Peyton Manning, Marvin Harrison and Edgerrin James (average age on opening day, 24) form a foundation the Colts can build upon for years to come. They led the AFC's most productive offense (358 yards per game) in

'99. ?: An offense as good as the Colts' can mask some defensive flaws. But to take the next step, the team must find more playmakers on defense.

BUFFALO BILLS

!: A group of no-namers form perhaps the best defensive front in the division. DT Ted Washington and linebackers Sam Cowart and John Holecek spearhead the NFL's topranked defense. Eric Moulds is a budding superstar at receiver.

?: Although Rob Johnson has been dubbed the starting QB, expect the debate struggles and Doug Flutie recovers from a preseason

to flare up if the offense injury.

NEW YORK JETS

!: Vinny Testaverde's return from injury boosts the Jets' passing game, but their fate may lie in Curtis Martin's ability to keep the running game churning.

!: New coach Dave Wannstedt's specialty is defense and he has a solid group to work with in Miami. Zach Thomas proves size isn't everything at linebacker and Sam Madison is one of the division's top cover-men.

?: The year 1 A.D. (After

Dan) opens with Damon Huard under center. But the key for the offense will be whether a running back emerges as a workhorse.

AFC CENTRAL TENNESSEE TITANS

!: Super-athletic QB Steve McNair blossomed last year and will only get better. Few can match RB Eddie George's mix of power and speed. If he's done sulking, WR Carl Pickens adds even more explosiveness to the offense.

?: The Titans' defense surrendered almost 231 passing yards per game last season, including 414 in the Super Bowl. Improvement in the sec-

ondary is key to Tennessee's return to the big game.

JACK-SONVILLE **JAGUARS** !: The Jags' offense is ready for prime time, led by QB Mark Brunell, RB Fred Taylor and receivers Keenan McCardell and Jimmy Smith. The addition of LB Hardy Nickerson to an already solid defense could
