· 2/3 Marines depart for Okinawa

The leathernecks of 2nd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment departed MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, Dec. 10 and 11 for a seven month deployment to Okinawa, Japan, and the Western Pacific as a part of the Unit

Deployment Program.

The Marines of 2/3, who recently completed their Marine Corps Combat Readiness Evaluation in preparation for the deployment, will be absent from the K-Bay way of life until June 2001, said Maj. Keith H. Ragsdell, assistant operations officer for 3rd Marine Regiment.

participate in exercises in many different Pacific countries with foreign militaries and other United States Armed Forces.

One of the major exercises 2/3 will participate in will be Tandem Thrust 01', a bilateral, joint-service exercise in Australia, said Ragsdell.

The exercise will be conducted in During their deployment, 2/3 will conjunction with the Australian mili-

tary and the United States Navy.

The Marines will also conduct training at Camp Fuji, Japan, the Jungle Warfare Training Center on Okinawa, and other training areas in the region, said Ragsdell.

"The UDP, on a strategic level, is the Marine Corps' force projection throughout the Pacific theatre," said Ragsdell. "Having Marines forward

deployed in the Pacific for long periods of time helps to promote and maintain peace in the unstable area."

The deployment of 2/3 to the Pacific Rim will not only help to promote peace in their area of operations, it will also help continue to maintain the Marine Corps' role as the nation's premier "total force in readiness."

Defense Secretary investigates MV-22s

Secretary of Defense William S. Cohen announced the appointment of an independent high-level review panel for the MV-22 program in wake of the second tilt-rotor aircraft crash since early April.

Cohen asked retired Marine Gen. John R. Dailey to chair the panel. Retired Air Force Gen. James B. Davis and Norman R. Augustine will join Dailey on the panel.

In his tasking to the panel members, Colien wrote, "The V-22 accident history and other testing issues neccessitate that we undertake an independent, high level review of the program. You are hereby appointed to conduct this review, to include safety of the aircraft, and to recommend any proposed corrective actions."

Specific factors to be addressed in the review, as they affect safety and combat effectiveness, are training, engineering and design, production and quality control, suitability to satisfy operational requirements, performance and safety of flight.

Four Marines died Dec. 11 when their Osprey crashed near Jacksonville, N.C.

Killed were Lt. Col. Keith M. Sweaney, 42, of

Richmond, Va., Marine Helicopter Squadron 1. MCB Quantico, Va.; and Maj. Michael Murphy, 38, of Blauvelt, N.Y., Staff Sgt. Avely W. Runnels, 25, of Morven, Ga., and Sgt. Jason A. Buyck, 24, of Sodus, N.Y., all of Marine Medium Tilt-rotor Training Squadron 204, MCAS New River, N.C.

The crash was the fourth accident involving the tilt-rotor aircraft since 1991. The Navy and Marine Corps have grounded all MV-22 Osprey flights until further notice. Military officials recovered the aircraft's "black box" in good shape. An aviation mishap board will investigate.

The aircraft was about three minutes out from MCAS New River when the crew sent a distress call, according to Lt. Gen. Fred McCorkle, Marine Corps.deputy commandant for aviation. He said the Osprey went down about five miles north of Jacksonville in a remote area accessible only by a four-wheel-drive vehicle.

"I don't think there's anything that we can say that would ... make this easier for the families," the general said, "except to say that the Marine Corps is going to do everything that it can do to find out what caused the accident, to take care of these families and to take care of our Marines."

In an earlier accident, all 19 Marines aboard an Osprey died April 8 when their aircraft

Marines attracting 'Great Americans'

WASHINGTON — The Marines believe they aren't experiencing the recruiting woes of the other services because they work harder to sell the "Intangibles of service life," their senior officer said.

"That's one of the keys to our success," Gen. James Jones said in an American Forces Press Service interview. "We work hard to appeal to potential recruits' sense of patriotism and the desire to work for the common good."

He said the Marine Corps' core values — honor, courage and commitment — appeal to the type of people the military wants.

His senior enlisted adviser agreed. "We don't grow little boys and girls to be Marines," Sgt. Maj. of the Marine Corps Alford L. McMichael said. "These are great Americans before we get them. We're just giving them the opportunity to do extraordinary things."

General Jones said that once they convince potential Marines of the merit of those values, all Marines must live them or retention would suffer. "At the end of four years (a typical enlistment), we have to have convinced them those things are real or we would experience a mass exodus," he said. "Well, that hasn't happened, so we must be doing our

"We're challenging them to accept responsibility," McMichael said. "Then it's up to our leadership to inspire, motivate and keep them on track."

McMichael said another boon to the Marine Corps' recruiting efforts is the enthusiasm of its recruiters. He said sergeants major are volunteering in record numbers to extend on recruiting duty.

"Never before have we had so many sergeants major raising their hands and volunteering to stay on recruiting duty," he said. "But they believe in the message they're giving, and they're asking to stay on and continue that mission."

McMichael and Jones both said the good economy hasn't necessarily hurt Marine recruiting because people who become Marines are looking for something other than financial wealth. They want to serve their country as United States Marines.

"You don't see Marine Corps commercials that say, 'Join the Marines for college money or a high quality of life," Gen. Jones said. "Our commercials say, 'Become one of the few, the proud.' You have to want to be a Marine. That's our ethos; that's what we sell."

But that's not to say benefits are any less important to Marines, he said. "You don't take a vow of poverty to serve your country, but it is more akin to having a calling than just getting a job," he added.

SERGEANT MAJOR'S CORNER Improving the Corps with your suggestions

CAMP H.M. SMITH Every August the Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps hosts a 10-day Sergeants Major Symposium

for those of us who work for a general offic e r . Collectively, we discuss critical issues and concerns may that

particularly affect Marines in specific geographical areas, bases or stations, duty assignments and Marines as a whole.

An added bonus for us is that we get to renew old friendships and swap "sea stories" with fellow sergeants major we haven't seen for awhile. There's not a topic too big or small for discussion at this symposium so long as the intent of an agenda item is to better the Corps, Marines and/or their families.

For each agenda item discussed there's normally a lively exchange of expressed professional views. And I can tell you from experience that the likelihood of 40 crusty sergeants major totally agreeing on any given agenda topic (or anything else for that matter) is virtually non-existent.

Understanding that fact, it takes a majority in agreement for a given agenda item to "stay on the table." On the last day of the symposium, the selected agenda items are presented to the commandant as recommended changes.

Some recommendations pertain to internal Marine Corps policies and need nothing more than the commandant's blessing

to change that specific policy. However, many of our recommendations to the commandant require more than his approval for them to take affect.

Many recommendations may require additional funds not budgeted for previously. And some may involve joint-service support, Department of Defense policy changes or they may need approval, and backing, by the Congress. Bottom line is that some items could, if approved by all organizations concerned, take years to be implemented.

Where do the agenda items come from that are presented and discussed at these symposiums? Any Marine may submit his or her recommendation(s) up the chain to their respective command sergeant major. The command sergeants major review and select which agenda items (from their command) will be forwarded to the symposium for consideration.

Unfortunately, most generated agenda items are from us old guys, the sergeants major, and not from more junior Marines from around the Corps. No matter how much we fossils feel that we always know the best way to huild the mousetrap, the fact of the matter is, we do not! I'm a firm believer in the old saying, "Necessity is the mother of invention." And that, to me, equates to Marines who perform the work or run the equipment are the "duty experts" best qualified to make recommendations to improve how they do things.

In any discussion between two or more Marines, they might talk for hours about things they would like changed in the Marine Corps. However most of them seem content just to talk about it and not to do something

I would like to see all of you put your thoughts and suggesand pass them on to your sergeant major for the annual symposium. Collectively, we need to take an active roll in Innovative thinking. - thinking outside the box, as they say, to find ways to work smarter, not harder. Where would we be if men such as Thomas Edison or Henry Ford stopped short of acting on their ideas?

As I speak with Marines (all enlisted ranks) throughout the Corps, I'm amazed at their keen insight on matters far above their pay grade of concern. There isn't a Marine on active duty that isn't capable of generating positive suggestions to improve one thing or another within our great Corps. A thought kept to oneself is a waste of energy between the

Here's an example of how one Marine's suggestion affected change for all Marines. About five years ago a Marine who was 72 1/2 " tall weighed in at 207 pounds. At that time, the weight control order dealt with exact inches in determining everyone's height/weight standard. It left it up to the discretion of the command to address degrees of inches and how to deal with Marines who were unfortunate enough not to end their growing years in exact inches. This created a problem for every command having to make their own policy on dealing with Marines whose height was not in exact inches and very close to their max weight. In this case, if the command policy were to hold this Marine to the 72" maximum authorized weight of 203 pounds, he would be considered overweight four pounds and placed on weight control. A different command, that had a little more touchyfeely policy, would deal with

tions on paper as agenda items this same Marine by considering his height to be 73" and within weight standards by two pounds. In both cases, each command was right in what it did.

The problem was that there was no consistency from one command to the next, as there was not a Marine Corps wide policy on this. And one thing we Marines like to be is consistent. The idea struck me then that the Marine Corps needed to have a policy that addressed this issue so we could work from the same sheet of music. It took me about 10 minutes to put my thoughts on paper and submit them as an agenda item for that year's Sergeants Major Symposium. The end result was that by the end of that calendar year the weight control order was modified to address Marines whose height was not in exact inches. I suspect a many Marines, since then, who are near their maxweight, appreciate that particular change. Our commandant wants every Marine with a good idea to share it for the betterment of all the Corps.

Within the next few months, we will gear up for this year's Sergeants Major Symposium. To prepare for this, the major command sergeants major will be soliciting agenda items from within their commands on ways to better our Corps. There is no greater feeling of personal pride than to have been part of real change for the benefit of all. It would be nice this year if our biggest problem were sorting through too many great ideas from the Marines within MarForPac.

If you want change, then you have to be willing to exert a little energy and brainpower to influence change. When your sergeants major solicit ideas this year, overwhelm them with your great ideas!

Computer system to ease range scoring

Installation of LOMAH system to eliminate old-fashioned butt-pulling

Ongoing installation of a new electronic scoring system at the range training facility aboard MCB Hawaii, Kancohe Bay, will put the technology in place to give base shooters the opportunity for better riflerange training.

The Installation of the Location of Misses and Hits system, which began Dec. I, is designed to make the range training experience more efficient for both shooters and range personnel.

The range training facility at MCB Hawali will be the first facility in the Marine Corps to use the LOMAH system, said Chief Warrant Officer 4 Randall L. Flarris, range management

"We will be the test ground for the LOMAH system. We'll be passing on lessons learned to see if the LOMAH will be used Marine Corps wide," said Harris.

The LOMAH system will electronically mark where a Marine's round penetrated an electronic field and a plastic target. The information will then be relayed immediately to a small video data screen that will be located with the shooter on the firing line, giving him or her an immediate response regarding the location of where the round hit.

Because the feedback on shot placement is immediate, the "only thing on the Marine's mind is shooting. It will help eliminate frustration and anxiety," said Chief Warrant Officer 2 Vincent S. Pope, range officer.

The system will save the Marine Corps money and manpower, Harris said.

It will save money, for instance, in the cost of replacing targets. The previous wood-frame and cheesecloth or paper targets were not able to absorb high number of rounds hitting the targets or adverse weather conditions. The new plastic targets are much more durable to the onslaught of lead and rain, and because the scoring is determined electronically the plastic targets serve mostly as a visual aid for Marine rillemen.

The higgest advantage of LOMAH, Harris said, is the timesaving hoost it will offer to make efficient use of manpower.

Because there is no need to have a relay of shooters in the target "pit" area, pulling the targets up and down and marking hits and misses, the firing detail will be able to accommodate more Marines and complete a string of tire quicker, Harris said.

"I've seen (LOMAII) in action and I think it's a good system," said Gunnery Sgt. Anthony J. Troche, chief primary marksmanship instructor with the range training facility. "It's

more accurate than having humans marking the shots on target." The efficiency that LOMAH offers also allows the range facility personnel the ability to function better.

"The LOMAH system will make it easier on operations. Range personnel will have more time to spend with the shooters," Troche said.

The completion of the LOMAH system installation is projected for March 2001, Pope said.

"We used to dream about it. Now we can visualize it, and we have almost reached our goal of automating the first range in the Marine Corps," Harris said.

Like a head shot from the 500-yard line, the MCB Hawaii range training personnel say they are enthusiastic that the LOMAH will be a bullseye for Marine marksmen.

MCAS Yuma Marines train on MCB Hawaii turf

Marines from Marine Wing Support Squadron-341 came to Hawaii Nov. 28 to be trained by some of the best regimental instructors in the world: the Marines of 3rd

Marine Regiment. The Marines traveled all the way from Marine Corps Air Station, Yuma, Ariz., and spent two weeks training at and around MCB

Hawaii., Kaneohe Bay. The squadron flew from Ft. Worth, Texas, and began their training the very next day, said Staff Sgt.

Kristian E. Nielson, staff noncommissioned officer in charge of the group. "We basically got an abbreviated version of the squad leaders course the grunts get. The Marines did everything from rappelling and prisoner-of-war handling, to patrolling and land navigation."

of training at Marine Corps Training Area Bellows. The day began with a CH-53D ride to Bellows, where they

rappelled from the helicopters. Once there, they practiced simulated live-fire tactics at the paintball course; first taking part in a forceon-force exercise, then in fire team-

sized units.

"We just don't have this type of training available to us in Yumu," said Nielson. "This was the first time I have ever ridden in a C-130 or a CH-53D."

"We broke down our 30 Marines into fire teams and spent the night at the Marine Air Control Squadron 2 The Marines spent their last day site sitting in the defense waiting for the instructors to attack our post-

tions," he continued. The time spent in Hawaii didn't only include training, Nielsen said. The detachment promoted some Marines, and Nielson even re-enlist-

ed for four more years. The Marines had the opportunity to do their ceremonies on he U.S.S.

Missouri, but not without a fee.

"They gave us a free tour after we worked on it. We busted rust, swabbed decks - anything you could think of that Sailors would normally do on ship," Nielsen said.

Training with Hawaii Marines is recently to better prepare for deploy-

"This whole thing came about when we switched commanding officers," said 29-year-old detachment officer in charge, 1st Lt. Jason Z. Miller of Neptune Beach, F!.

The Marines needed to get some basic skills training, according to Miller.

"We're going to Australia late this spring, and were trying to get into a deployment mindset," Miller said.

The Marines of MWSS-341 weren't the only ones who got to do something different.


"We got the warning order in something the squadron began October that 371 was coming out, It took countless hours to set up, calling the units around the island," said Sgt. Mike A. Drury, 31, a squad leader instructor and Helicopter Rope Suspension Training instructor with Regimental Schools. "It really shows you can get support from the other units here."

> "Our whole objective was to teach them basic skills they can take back, like EPW handling and grenade throwing. It gave them a good taste of being an infantry Marine," Drury added.

"I was really surprised, what with them being from a support wing; not one of them was demotivated, and they all wanted to do more," he said. "I'm really impressed with the caliber of Marines. They pretty much performed like grunts."

NAGA. Japan — In the desire to build upon 55 years of good relations with their host nation of Japan, it is easy for Marines and Sailors on Okinawa to forget "friendship" is the primary reason they continue to take on community relations projects.

On Oct. 27, a new friendship was established with Seishin-Yougoen Orphanage here. Marine Corps Commandant has a 'Chosin' hero

WASHINGTON — Gen, James L. Jones, Marine Corps commandant, has a special tie to the veterans of the Chosin Reservoir campaign of the Korean War. A Medal of Honor recipient from that frozen "trip through hell" has been the now-towering general's mentor since Jones was a boy.

Retired Gen. Raymond Davis is a hero by anybody's definition. He was the 28-year-old commander of the 1st Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment, when Chinese forces attacked on Nov. 27, 1950, Thanksgiving Day. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for personally leading his men over treacherous frozen terrain to rescue a rifle company under intense enemy fire.

According to his Medal of Honor citation, Davis "spearheaded his unit in a fierce attack up the steep, ice-covered slopes in the face of withering fire and, personally leading the assault groups in a hand-to-hand encounter, drove the hostile troops from their positions."

Surrounded by the Chinese and heavily out-

numbered, 10,000 Marines battled their way to safety down 40 miles of winding mountain road in sub-arctic weather. Veterans of the campaign have called themselves the "Chosin Few" ever since

At the time, Jones was six.

Not too many years later, fones' family was living in France, where his father, a former Marine himself, was a businessman.

"My father, being a former Marine, was active in the Marine community and always sought out Marine families in the area," Jones told the Chosin Few association formed after the Korean War. The group was in San Diego for the 50th anniversary reunion of the campaign.

Young Jim Jones and his younger brother and sister were roughly the same age as Davis' children, and the two families became close friends. The relationship was even closer because Jones' uncle, William K. Jones, had also been a lieutenant colonel in Korea with Davis.

"I was the first-base coach on the Little League team (Davis) managed," Jones said. "My kld brother and his younger son were pitchers on that team, and his oldest son was the third-base coach."

on in Vietnam at that time," Davis said in an American Forces Press Service interview.

Jones says now he knew "without a doubt" that he wanted to be a Marine, "what with my father's influence and my uncle's wonderful career, and the shining example of this wonderful family (the Davises)."

Fast-forward a couple of years. Davis was a brigadier general in 1967 when Jones was commissioned and sent to Vietnam. "It was like a Monopoly game." Jones described it. "Do not pass go; go directly to Vietnam."

The following year the young lieutenant was in a firefight on a hill in Khe Sanh when a helicopter flew in low and landed. "I saw this familiar gait walking toward me," he said. It was his division commander, Maj. Gen. Ray Davis.

"I went there to see him," Davis said about that day. "Any time someone had a good firefight going, and Jim was having one that day, I'd hop out there to make sure they won."

Before the two left Vietnam, Jones would be called to the division headquarters to serve as Davis' aide.

"We had kind of an informal rotation going

on in Vietnam at that time," Davis said in an American Forces Press Service interview. "After they'd been in combat for a while we'd try to find them a job back in the rear area. So when I needed an aide, I brought Jim back."

A week later, Davis said, he received a letter from Jones' uncle, then-Lt. Gen. William Jones, that read, "Ray, when you got Jim out of that rifle company back to be your aide, there were a lot of 'Hallelujahs' in the Jones family."

Jones said he believes he was in more danger flying around those firelights with Davis than being back in his rifle platoon. He said Davis liked to see all the action, which meant getting shot at on a number of occasions. After Vietnam, both went on to storied careers. Jones' is evident by his current position. Davis went on to become assistant commandant of the Marine Corps before retiring, but his affiliation didn't end there. Now, Davis is a champion for Marine issues and is still close to Gen. Jones.

Davis said he's proud of Jones' success and takes no credit for any of it. "He did it not by who he knew or by connections, but by his performance," Davis said. "That's the thing I admire most about him."

TRICARE proposes simplified pharmacy co-payment schedule

WASHINGTON - TRICARE officials propose to simplify co-payments for prescription drugs in accordance with last year's appropriations act. The new copayments will be uniform for all beneficiaries and based on whether a generic or brand-name medication is dispensed.

The current co-payment structure is complex and confusing, said Army Lt. Col. William G. Davies, director of DoD Pharmacy Programs, part of the TRI-CARE Management Agency in Falls Church, Va.

'We're trying to improve the TRI-CARE pharmacy benefit, to make it simpler to understand, and more uniform, consistent and equitable for everyone,"

If the proposal is approved, he said, it

2001, when the TRICARE Senior Pharmacy program is operational.

Under the proposed changes, beneficiaries would pay \$3 for generic prescription drugs and \$9 for brand-name drugs at TRICARE-affiliated retail drug stores for up to a 30-day supply or through the National Mail Order Pharmacy program for up to a 90-day supply.

TRICARE Prime enrollees who choose to obtain their prescription drugs from non-TRICARE affiliated retail outlets would continue to pay a 50-percent pointof-service penalty after meeting their deductible. All others would pay the greater of a 20-percent co-pay or a \$9 charge per prescription.

"There are cost savings available to the majority of the beneficiary population," Davies said, depending on how the prescription drugs are obtained. Prescriptions obtained through the mail program are would be kicked off DoD-wide April 1, generally less expensive, he noted, pate, officials noted.

because the government gets federal pricing. Also, the patient can receive three times the quantity for the same co-pay as through a TRICARE retail pharmacy.

Davies noted there is no co-pay for prescriptions filled at military hospital and clinic pharmacies. This, he said, is the best financial value for beneficiaries.

Beginning April 1, 2001, military retirees age 65 and over will be provided the same pharmacy benefit offered to beneficiaries under age 65.



TRICARE senior pharmacy benefit details announced

The Department of Defense announced today that on April 1, 2001, uniformed services beneficiaries 65 years of age and older will begin receiving pharmacy benefits provided by the 2001 National Defense premiums for their TRICARE Authorization Act (NDAA). An estimated 1.4 million beneficiaries are eligible for the they use NMOP and retail netbenefit.

The new program will limit their out-of-pocket costs and increase their access to the National Mail Order Program (NMOP), and retail pharmacies that are part of the Department of Defense (DoD) network, which include many major chain drug stores. In addition, they may use nonnetwork retail pharmacies.

"Drug therapy, for many of our older retired servicemembers, is one of their greatest network. The BRAC pharmaand most costly medical needs. This is a comprehensive drug benefit that makes pharmacy care accessible and

affordable. This expanded benefit should contribute significantly to their quality of life," stated J. Jarrett Clinton, M.D., acting assistant secretary of Defense for Health

Beneficiaries who are 65 years of age and older will not pay enrollment fees or annual pharmacy benefits, but they will pay modest co-pays when work pharmacles. In addition, beneficiaries will also be able to use non-network pharmacies, but this option will cutail a slightly higher co-pay and deductible. In the past, only those beneficiaries who were eligible for Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) benefits and the Pharmacy Redesign Pilot Program (PRPP) were able to enjoy modest out-of pocket costs through the NMOP and retail pharmacy cy benefit and the Pharmacy Redesign Pilot Program are replaced by the new program.

By law, to use the TRI-

CARE retail and mail order overseas can use their TRIbenefit, beneficiaries age 65 and over must be eligible for Medicare Part A and enrolled in Part B. There is an exception: Those who turn 65 before April 1, 2001, are eligible for not enrolled in Medicare Part

Effective Oct. 1, 2001, Medicare-eligible military beneficiaries become eligible for all other TRICARE henefits. The law requires that all, Medicare-eligible beneficiaries, regardless of age, must be enrolled in Medicare Part B to receive the other TRICARE benefits; and they are advised to enroll in Part B as soon as they are eligible. The annual open season for enrollment in Medicare Part B is Jan. I March 31. through Information about Medicare enrollment is available at local Social Security Administration offices, or on

They also will be able to utilize the NMOP, If certain the benefit, even if they are requirements are met. Federal and state legal restrictions apply to the prescribing, dispensing and mailing of prescription drugs, so the NMOP can only mail to APOs and FPOs, which are part of the U.S. Postal Service. Also, the NMOP can only fill prescriptions written by providers licensed to practice in the United States.

The NMOP offers the largest discount to DoD beneficiaries. It is convenient for filling prescriptions for chronic conditions like high blood pressure or diabetes. The retail network pharmacy program







Marine Raiders honored with uniforms

TRIPLER ARMY MED-ICAL CENTER - As the final flag is solemnly unfurled and the last note of taps drifts off, the lost Marine Raiders returned Dec. 17, 1999, to the country they fought so valiantly for.

Like the Viking heroes of long ago who went to their graves with their battle dress, so do the Raiders, wearing the Marines' famed dress blue

These Marines were part of a special commando unit, championed by Col. Evans F. Carlson and then-Capt. James Roosevelt, son of President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

After comprehensive strategic and tactical training in California and Hawaii, the majority of the unit set out for the South Pacific, for a diversionary attack against the Japanese.

After setting out from Pearl Harbor aboard the submarines Nautilus and Argonaut, the group headed for the Butaritari Island in the Makin Atoll, where the Japanese had a small base for seaplanes. Fighting rough swells and raging surf, the group traversed to the island where intense combat ensued.

After overrunning the bulk of the force, the Raiders attempted to withdraw to the waiting submarines, but the angry seas kept some of them from reaching the safety of the subs.

submarines were forced to go back, unfortunately leaving 19 Raiders who had been killed in the battle. Those Marines remained there in unkown, unmarked graves until August 1998, when a team from the Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii found significant evidence to believe that the remains of the lost Raiders were found.

Excavations were made, and more teams were brought to Butaritari Island before all 19 of the Marines were recovered. They were then brought back to Hawaii where the story had commenced in August 1942.

"It's really a touching story," said Navy Chief Petty Officer Eugene Paul, the Navy/Marine Corps Mortuary Affairs Officers and the Director of the Navy Liaison Unit at Tripler Army Medical Center here. "The Marines were gone for so many years, but that didn't take away from the fact that they are still Marines, and should be treated as such."

When the Marines arrived at CILHI's lab at Hickam AFB, it was Paul's job to contact their family members and get their records updated.

Paul. a Phoenix native, is one of less than 20 morticians throughout the Department of the Navy and is personally responsible for taking care of all deceased Marines and Sailors stationed in Hawaii.

Like any Marine killed in action, the remains of the Makin Marines were treated with respect.

A full set of the Marine dress blue alpha uniform was given to each Marine, complete with the proper accouterments and medals.

"We're given a list of what medals, ribbons and other things are required for each uniform," said retired Master Sgt. Danny Ramos, the military clothing specialist and buyer for MCB Hawaii's MCCS, who helped coordinate the preparing of the uni-





EVERY CLIME AND PLACE Marines use battle skills during SULE

MARINE CORPS AIR **STATION** FUTENMA. Okinawa, Japan Fortunately for Leathernecks assigned to Marine Air Support Squadron 2 here, the running course surrounding the station known as the Habu Trail contains much more than blacktop and poisonous serpents.

In fact, the trail boasts ideal terrain for a rope bridge, land navigation, an infiltration course, and hasty rappel area, each of which was a separate station during the squadron's recent Small Unit Leadership Exercise, also known as SULE.

According to Capt. Aric A. McKenna, training officer, MASS-2, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, SULE was developed a year and a half ago to help the squadron's noncommissioned officers fine tune their leadership skills in hostile battle scenarios.

"We try to get the small unit leaders - from the newly-promoted corporals to the senior sergeants — to run a squad in an attack scenario where they have to be creative in devising a plan and executing it," McKenna said.

"As a support squadron, we do a lot of stuff in the field. But in the SULE, we try to make it more of a tactical, infantry-like scenario that forces them to go back to their cross the bridge] were afraid battle skills training and individual training standards."

Cpl. William 1. Johnson, electrical equipment repair specialist, MASS-2, is one of more than 70 Marines who participated in the five-hour exercise.

"(SULE) points out your weaknesses," Johnson said, "It shows what needs to be focused on in future training to remedy discrepancies."

Johnson said he wished the squadron did the SULE more often than twice a year because it not only benefits the NCO's, but the junior Marines who have to display their skills during the exercise as well.

"I saw Marines trying to remember stuff from boot camp and Marine Combat Training, from which some of them recently graduated," said Cpl. Timothy M. Kramer, training clerk, MASS-2.

Kramer briefed squads at the rope bridge portion of the exercise. He said he saw a few teams learn from their mistakes firsthand when they sent the radioman over the bridge

Kramer said. "If he gets killed by the enemy, how is the squad going to radio for help."

Kramer said he also saw the exercise as a confidence McKenna said.

"It is not everyday the Marines are hanging on a rope over a ravine," Kramer said. "Some of the Marines [I saw of heights."

According to McKenna, the squadron designed the exercise after other confidencebuilding exercises like the Crucible, the culminating exercise of Marine Corps recruit training. He said designing the exercise for the station was the hardest part of organizing the SULE.

"With the airstrip taking up most of the space, there aren't a lot of obstacles and training

aids for Marines to run and be challenged on, so you have to be really creative and use what's available to you,"

Besides using points at every section of the Habu Trail, SULE organizers had to than I ever expected. I saw a make use of other common station features. For example, squads searched for mines beneath the sands of a volleyball court and crawled through a long drainage tunnel that runs in front of MASS-2 head-

Many Marines agreed getting through the tunnel in a hostile environment scenario provided one of the most difficult parts of the training.

"You have to keep quiet, you are cramped, and you are using muscles you don't usually use," Johnson said. "You get

frustrated."

One of the "coolest" parts of the training, according to Johnson, was that Marines discovered parts of the station they never knew existed.

"The jungle here is thicker spider in there this big," Johnson said, holding his hands together to form a circle the size of a grapefruit. "I saw snails that looked like they could crawl up your leg and suck your kneecap off."

MASS-2's creative use of the limited training areas on the station is proof that any unit can develop their own SULE, McKenna said. With the squadron's third SULE completed successfully, he said they plan to continue the semiannual exercise with small modifications.



crashed at a small airport near Tucson, Ariz. The accident investigation team later blamed the crash on windy conditions and a chain of human errors.

The Osprey is the first operational aircraft to use tiltrotor technology. It flies like a plane; its two swiveling wing-tip engines and rotors lift and land it like a helicopter.

The Marines plan to acquire 360 Ospreys by 2013, with the Navy and Air Force planning to purchase about 50 each. The Marine version can transport 24 combat-equipped personnel or a 15,000-pound external load.

Lieutenant Gen. McCorkle noted that the Marine Corps has recommended a delay in the decision to proceed with production pending further information.

"This program is very important to the Marine Corps, to me, and, I think, to the nation," he said. "We're going to work very hard to see what caused the accident."

"They're the most courteous. They have the


most discipline and the hardest boot camp," he said. "I felt it was the place for me."

can be used for short-term, immediate use medications. Lists of TRICARE network pharmacies will be available from regional TRICARE contractors. Beneficiarles who use non-network pharmacles will have to meet an annual deductible, incur a higher co-pay, and pay the entire bill up front, and then file a claim for appropriate reimbursement.

One of the most important steps eligible beneficiaries can take to be sure they can use the expanded pharmacy benefit is to update their Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) record with

their correct address and any changes in family status, such as marriage, divorce, birth or adoption. Eligible beneficiaries may update their addresses in DEERS in a number of ways: By visiting local personnel offices that have an ID card facility; by calling the Defense Manpower Data Center Support Office (DSO) Telephone Center at 800-538-9552 (The best time to call the Telephone Center is Wednesday through Friday, between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. (Pacific Time) to avoid delays); by faxing changes to (831) 655-8317; by mailing the change information to the DSO, Attn: COA, 400 Gigling Road, Seaside, CA 93955-6771; by visiting a Military Treatment Facility; by E-

mailing information to addrinfo@osd.pentagon.mil and including the sponsor's name and social security number, name(s) of other family members affected by the address change, effective date of address information, and telephone number (to include area code), if available. Internet users should use all lowercase letters.

To change information in DEERS other than address data, beneficiaries may visit an ID card facility, or mail or fax changes with appropriate documentation to the address or fax numbers provided above. For beneficiaries to learn what documentation is required, they should contact the nearest military ID card facility.

There are indicators people can look for which forewarn when someone is coming down with a case of the holiday doldrums.

Anyone who displays sadness, increased alcohol consumption, withdraw from normal routines or begins isolating themselves could possibly be sending signals that he or she is suffering from depression, according to Rhodes.

"Sometimes people will just come out and say that they are feeling sad or down," said Rhodes.

The tough image of Marines, and their ability to take care of themselves in difficult situations, is one of military life's doors that many younger Marines have a hard time going through.

Often, Marines with problems are sent to the chaplain's office or to Family Services to talk to a counselor, and a majority of the time that's not the solution to the problem, noted Rhodes.

"The chaplain's office is good, the counselors at Personal Services are good, but are they better than family members and friends?" questioned Rhodes. "I'm not so sure."

He believes Marines should be encouraged to express their emotions, instead of holding them inside.

"Identifying how you feel will help," said Rhodes. "Letting out that emotion is called venting."

The solution to dealing with the holiday blues

varies from case to case, but most of the time it can be handled by keeping busy with holiday activities or hanging out with positive people.

Sometimes just a simple call home can do a world of good to someone who is homesick for the holidays, according to Rhodes.

The Single Marine and Sailor Program is offering a multitude of holiday activities for Marines and Sailors who find themselves looking for things to do this holiday season, according to Dawn H. Williams, coordinator of the SMSP. Semper Fit Division.



It's William's goal to get as many Marines out of their rooms and out doing different activities on the island as possible.



Marine boxers prepare for All-Marine action

The smack of a leather-covered fist hitting bare skin echoed loudly throughout the small

The smell of old sweat perfumed the air, and the overhead fluorescent lights cast small shadows beneath the two combatants sparring in the center of the ring.

The boxers hobbed and weaved, jabbed, and swung at each other in what looked like a choreographed dance.

The two pugilists were Cpl. Wade L. Cotter, 22, an embark chief for Landing Support Co., Combat Service Support Group 3, and Lance Cpl. James N. Robinson, a motor transport operator for 1st Radio Bn. "Both fighters are hard working and determined to do well at the competition," said Cazares. "I think they'll both make the team."


While Cazares was confident in his fighters' abilities, he said he wished he could have given them more battle experience.





Program helps Marines, Sailors 'take care of their own'

It's just another day at the Stevens home aboard MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay.

The early afternoon hour beckons the children home from school and they pour into the living room. Happy chatter is rapidly exchanged and bits of bright orange cheese crackers begin to sprinkle their deep blue carpet.

Along the kitchen beam dons not one, two or three Christmas stockings, but eight—one for each family member.

The Stevens' family includes six children. Four of which are

diagnosed with Down Syndrome.

The siblings who adorn this family tree range in age from two to 14 years old. 1st Sergeant Tim Stevens of CSSG- 3 and his wife Kelly, have three biological children, two daughters, Jazmin and Brooke and one son, Jeremiah. Jeremiah was diagnosed with Down Syndrome at birth.

This couple both grew up in large families and knew they wanted to adopt children once they created their biological fam-

"After Jeremiah was born," said Kelly, "we just knew that we wanted to adopt children with special needs."

They soon adopted Shawnee, Lyndsy and their newest addition to the family, Keanu. According to the Stevens, each child in this family adds additional love and grace.

Providing and creating an environment with children who require special educational, emotional and medical needs is sometimes difficult. That's when the Exceptional Family Member Program will function as an immense resource for families like the Stevens.

"It's not like we're asking for special treatment," said Kelly. "We chose to have these children in our lives, but the EFMP has helped us tremendously."

The Stevens discovered this Headquarters, Marine Corps Program shortly after their son was born in 1989.

said Stevens.

Like many potential EFMP beneficiaries, the misconception about this program is that it may hurt or hinder the military member's career. "That is absolutely false," claims Paula Webster, MCCS' Personal Services EFMP's Coordinator.

"The only way a family who has a spouse, dependent parent or child with special needs will hurt is if they don't enroll," noted Webster. "We act as a resource and an advocate on their behalf."

According to Paula, there are approximately 100 families aboard MCB Hawaii who can benefit from this program. Getting started is easy. The first step to make sure your family is

"Kelly and I were nervous to enroll in the program at first," enrolled in the Defet se Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS).

Next is to make an appointment with Paula. Once the paper work is reviewed by Headquarters Marine Corps, a family becomes an EFMP recipient and in the system for two years. Privacy and confidentiality are more daunting aspects. Tim and Kelly were skeptical about sending such personal matters up to headquarters.

Again, Paula's reassurance is enlightening, "No one will know about your enrollment status other than Headquarters and the monitor." A monitor will only have knowledge of a particular category that your specific needs fall under.

No detailed, personal family information is recorded. The four categories are a listing of all global Marine/Navy bases that state what medical and educational resources are available. This will help an EFMP family so that they will not be stationed somewhere where military family members will not have access to the care they require.

"Any Marine or Sailor will be more mission ready knowing that their family is being taken care of," said Stevens.

And while the family is taken care of, the military member continues to function according to their military occupational specialty. Still deployable, Still ready to go anywhere, anytime.

Stevens recently returned from a six-week deployment from the Big Island, Hawaii.

His wife said she feels the burden of being the single parent but takes it all in stride,

"I knew he was a Marine when we married. That's who he is—that's what he does. We manage. We're a family," she said. Back inside the Stevens' intimate, active living room, children interact like a normal family. Honestly, what is "normal,"

If you feel your family would qualify for the EFMP, call Paula Webster at 257-7783 for an appointment. Heed Kelly's advice and don't hesitate, it "will make all the difference in the
